Brian Russell is not the type of person to be discouraged easily. If you don't believe that, consider his introduction to bridge.

One day while he was attending Douglas College in British Columbia, he and a friend were playing table tennis. They had to give up the table, so they migrated to a bridge game in the corner of the gym. One of the players told Russell and his friend that they were going to a bridge club that night. When Russell showed up, he was recruited to fill out the movement.



His bridge knowledge at the time: zero.

"I was playing with an 80-year-old guy," Russell recalled, "who was getting cranky by the end of the night. We didn't do very well."

Despite that, Russell soon was very much into bridge and even traveled on the tournament circuit for a while.

Russell is a native of Scotland. When he was

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Lavee, Yasuko ahead in Mini-Blue Ribbon

Daniel Lavee of Thornhill ON and Kosaka Yasuko of Yokohama, Japan, were the leaders at the halfway point of the Mini-Blue Ribbon Pairs, restricted to qualifiers with fewer than 5000 masterpoints. In second, with two sessions to play, were the Edmonton AB couple of Vince and Anita Lambert.

Meyers, Levin lead Blue Ribbon

A relatively new partnership – Jill Meyers and Jill Levin – took the lead after two qualifying sessions of the Edgar Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs. In second with four sessions to go in the event were the father-son duo of Richard Pavlicek and Richard Pavlicek Jr.

In third place were the Seattle pair of Barrie Wall and Ray Miller.

Meyers is one of only two women to win the Blue Ribbon, taking the title in 1999 with John Mohan. Dorothy Truscott won the inaugural Blue Ribbon Pairs in 1963 with B. Jay Becker. A women's pair has never won.

Senior KO Teams reduced to eight

All the higher seeds won yesterday and eight teams are left in the Senior KO Teams. It was not easy, though, as three top seeds had to come from behind with one quarter to go.

The #2 seed, DeMartino team found itself trailing 126 to 98 with one quarter to play. They rallied against Ellington to win 159-136.

Murphy, the #3 seed, came back from a 108-78 deficit to edge Kirkham by 14 IMPs. The # 6 seed captained by Sillins rallied from 21 down with one quarter to go to win 161-141 against Barbour. Matchups and line scores on page 9.

Denver 1978: a look back

Denver last hosted an NABC in the fall of 1978 where the final table count was 9467. Some things have changed in 27 years but many things have stayed the same.

Two things that never change are that bridge players appreciate well-played hands and funny bridge stories. Here are some of the stories from 1978.

All of a sudden, in the middle of the Ballroom area where all the Life Masters were playing, a baby let out a big wail. A player muttered, "Somebody just saw the dummy."

As the elevator door opened on the fifth floor, the waiting mob could see that only one of them would be able to get on board. Somebody on the elevator hollered, "The place goes to the high bidder." Whereupon John Jones called out "Seven notrump" and climbed aboard.

At a Ruling the Game seminar, someone asked for a definition of an intermediate two bid. Maury Braunstein offered, "It ain't strong and it ain't weak."

An entry form came in to be entered and where the player number belonged, it said, "Forget. Can't remember what trump is either."

It was a non-smoking section, so what was that man doing with a cigar in his mouth? Cliff Bishop kept the stogie between his lips, but it was unlighted. He threatened from time to time to light up. Finally somebody told him he shouldn't be smoking in a non-smoking section. "You don't undersand," said Bishop. "This is a psychic cigar. I never light it."

Jerry Machlin told a story about a hand getting into play with two aces of the same suit. The declarer said, "It's the first time I've ever had a two-way finesse for the king of trumps."

Some of the names from 1978 haven't changed either. Many of them are still familiar. The Aces, led by Bobby Wolff and Bob Hamman, won the Reisinger Teams. David Berkowitz and Ron

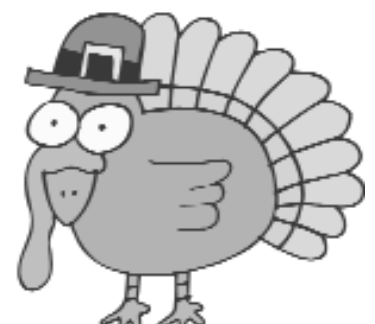

JUST FOR NEW PLAYERS

Cuebids

The cuebid can be an effective way to explore for slam below the level of game—and when your hand is not appropriate for Blackwood. Say you open 1♠ with

♠K Q 10 7 6 5 ♥9 2 ♦A Q 8 ♣A K

You are delighted to hear partner bid 3♠ (limit raise). Although you are interested in slam, don't use Blackwood with that heart holding—just cuebid 4♣.

Tip: Don't use Blackwood without known second-round control (or better) of all suits. Partner probably won't have all the missing controls, so you won't know which ones are missing.

And now you know why 4♣ should not be Gerber after a suit opening. You want to be able to cuebid in a suit when Blackwood is inappropriate.

If partner does bid 4♥, you can go directly to 6♠. It's unlikely you'll have what it takes for 13 tricks even if you have all the controls. Remember, all the aces and the king of trumps are still only five tricks: you have to be able to count to 13 to make a grand slam. On this auction, that's unlikely.

Cuebids show first round control: this can be a void as well as an ace. If you have any reason to suspect the former, you can use Blackwood before you make a matchpoint notrump bid. Don't forget that slams are rarely "flat" boards. There's always someone who marches to a different drummer.

Another use of cuebids is to show support for partner in a competitive auction. Say partner opens 1♥ and there's a 2♦ overcall. It's become popular to use 3♥ as a preemptive raise in this context, so you would use 3♦ to show a limit raise or better in hearts. Compare the next two hands:

♠9 6 ♥K 9 7 2 ♦Q 8 3 ♣8 7 6 2

♠A 6 ♥K 9 7 2 ♦K Q 3 ♣8 7 6 2

It's handy to be able to distinguish between preemptive and limit raises in competitive auctions.

Another use for a cuebid is to ask partner if the suit is stopped for no trump. 1♥ is opened on your right, and you hold

♠K 6 ♥7 4 ♦A 2 ♣A K Q 10 9 6 4.

You can have a partnership agreement that your 3♥ bid asks partner to bid 3NT if he has hearts stopped. You have a great source of tricks in a minor suit. Partner can usually tell which minor—it's likely to be the one he has fewer of.

Michaels cuebids have become a popular way to show 5-5 hands. 1♣ is opened on your right. Here are three hands with the same pattern:

♠K 10 7 5 4 ♥A J 9 4 2 ♦6 ♣8 3

♠K Q 7 5 4 ♥A Q J 9 4 ♦6 ♣8 3

♠K Q 7 5 4 ♥A Q J 9 4 ♦A ♣8 3

Use the Michaels cuebid of 2♣ with the first hand or the third one, but not with the middle hand. With the weaker hand, bid 2♣ and then stop bidding. With the third hand, cuebid and then raise. Taking another action after the cuebid tells partner that you have a great hand.

Avoid Michaels cuebids with the middle hand, indeed with hands in the 11-16 point range. Also avoid Michaels when you have the pattern but your points are in the wrong places, e.g.:

♠9 7 5 4 2 ♥Q 7 6 3 2 ♦K ♣A 8

What few points you have should be in your long suits. Then, at least, if your side defends partner won't make an embarrassing lead, such as the king from ♠K 6.



Thinking bridge

Opening lead: ♥3.

Bidding commentary: In general, it is a losing policy to use Stayman with a 4-3-3-3 hand pattern: (1) Opener's rebid gives away his distribution, (2) third hand has a chance to double the artificial club response for the lead, and (3) even if a 4-4 fit is uncovered, it is not clear that declarer will have an easier time in a trump contract, although it's usually the case unless opener has the same 4-3-3-3 distribution.

Lead commentary: Normal. South knows a heart lead is coming, but must keep a stiff upper lip.

Defensive commentary: If South can just get North to lead a spade, four tricks are available in that suit. However, if South discards an encouraging spade, he is discarding

a trick!

Further defensive commentary: When a defender wants partner to lead a particular suit but cannot safely discard from that suit, he must embark on a different campaign. He discards negatively in suits he does not want partner to lead. At trick one, South discards the ♣2. When West continues hearts as he must, South discards the ♦2. South has now told North he has no interest in clubs or diamonds. Maybe, just maybe, North will come to the party and switch to a spade upon winning the ♥A.

At notrump, in particular, tend to make negative discards in suits you don't want led, keeping goodies in the suit you do want led. Keep winners – discard losers! Finally, if you can make only one discard, discard negatively in a suit partner might be thinking of leading, not from one that partner was never going to lead in a million years.

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five, his family moved to Australia, where the government was providing incentives for tradesmen (his father was a house painter). Russell likes the NABC job because of the travel involved – “and I get to meet a lot of good people.” Also, he said, “Three times a year I get some exercise.”

returned to bridge, but also because Pamela grew up in Cleveland OH, not far away.

Although violence and danger were part of their daily lives in Israel, they leave their adopted country with a tinge of sadness.

“Israel is wonderful,” said Pamela. “There is nothing else like it.. It's very spiritual there.”

“It's the land of the Jewish people,” said Matthew.

Both said they often heard explosions and other sounds of violence, and “it makes you more intensely aware of life and death,” said Pamela.

Matthew said his 83-year-old mother, Shirley, remains in Israel – “and she plays bridge every day at the club.”

The Granovetters said they have found the U.S. to be very welcoming. “Everyone has been just wonderful,” Pamela said.

Both are very happy to be part of the American bridge scene again. Being away from it, said Pamela, was the one negative about living in Israel.

Their 11-year-old son, Pamela said, may be the happiest member of the family. “(Shmuel) really likes it in the U.S.,” said Pamela. “It's a gentler country.”

No calls, please

Being patient

Sometimes you have to do something actively to get a good board. But sometimes it is better to be patient. This part-score hand helped Jill Levin and Malle Andrade win the Helen Sobel Life Master Women's Pairs.

The opening ♦2 was won by the king. Andrade cashed the ♦A and exited with a club won by the queen in dummy. Declarer led a spade to the ♠K which held. Next declarer ruffed her losing diamond and let another spade.

Again Andrade patiently ducked. Declarer guessed wrong and put in the ♠10, losing to Levin's jack. Making two was only an average for Levin and Andrade, but saved them some matchpoints.

Resnick's Rule – redux

Many years ago – or so I'm told – at the Boston Chess Club a bridge player named Resnick played a slam with a side-suit loser and a trump suit of six to the Q-J opposite six to the ace. When he led the trump queen and his left-hand opponent showed out, he resignedly ducked in dummy, losing to the bare king.

From that point on, Resnick's rule was formulated: with 12 trumps, play for the drop!

No doubt this is a sound rule, but Dennis Dawson and Clement Jackson were able to introduce a variation in their Senior Knockout Teams on Monday.

This was the setup:
 Dlr: South ♠ A 10 8 6 4 3
 Vul: E-W ♥ 5
 ♦ 9 4 2
 ♣ 8 6 3

♠ — ♠ K
 ♥ A 7 4 2 ♥ K Q J 6 3

Both tables preempted with the South hand and the sacrifice in 6♠ was reached. At one table, the Barbour team's North-South pair were doubled in 6♠ and went down 800.

Against the same contract at the other table (also by South), Dawson led the ♦K, and Jackson overtook with the ace. He cashed the ♥K, then the ♣K, on which Dawson gave count (an odd number). Jackson cashed the ♠A, then led the ♦J. Dawson overtook with the queen and played a third round of diamonds, allowing Jackson to ruff with the ♠K, thereby scoring a trick for his side with their only trump. Take that, Resnick!

Every trick counts

In Board-a-Match Teams, every trick can be worth a whole board. Here is a deal that helped the Welland team win the Mitchell Open B-A-M Teams.

At one table, Zmudzinski led the ♥2 against 4♣ doubled. This was won by the king, declarer dropping the queen. Balicki switched to the ♣10 which declarer won in his hand to lead another heart. Zmudzinski made the nice play of ruffing with the ♣5 to lead yet another trump. When the smoke had cleared, declarer had only seven tricks for down 500.

When Martel declared, he realized that the opponents could probably make 3♦ for plus 110. He couldn't know about the 500 score at the other table, so his goal, therefore, was to try and escape for minus 100. He reasoned that West had most likely one heart, most likely four diamonds and was probably 4=1=4=4. Martel could ruff two spades in the dummy, but that would only be eight tricks — five clubs in hand, the ace of spades and two ruffs in dummy. Was there a way to get a ninth trick?

At trick two he cashed the ♠A and then led the jack, covered and ruffed. When Martel returned to his hand and led the ♠10, East's 9 fell and Martel had nine tricks.

What a lead, what a shift

Sometimes the opponents defend a hand so well, you just have to shake your head. Dennis Ryan, of Menomonie WI, reported this hand from the Monday A/X Pairs where this happened.

West, Greg Hinze, led the ♥9 against 3NT. This was covered by the 10 and won by the jack. East, Miguel Reygadas, shifted to the ♣10 ducked to West's king. The ♥Q was led to the king and ace. East now exited with the ♦J.

At this point declarer only had eight sure tricks — three clubs, three spades and two diamonds. He won the ♦A in his hand, therefore, and finessed to the ♦10, losing to the queen. The ♥8 was now the setting trick.

Too much information

Sometimes a defender can give declarer too much information by signaling in situations where doing nothing would be better. Consider this deal (rotated) from first session of the Sunday afternoon A/X Pairs:

You are South. When dummy appears it seems clear that North-South pairs playing in hearts will probably take 11 tricks if the ♠K is with West, so you unless you can score 11 tricks in notrump you're probably headed for a below-average result.

West leads the ♦6 to East's 10 as you duck. When East shifts to a low club, you can safely deduce this means he has no outside entry to the diamonds should they become established. So you win the ♣A and immediately play a low spade toward dummy's queen.

West ducks smoothly, but when you play the queen, East contributes the 10 (!) to initiate a count signal (high-low). While this might be useful to help the defense on some layouts, here it provides you as declarer with some valuable information.

A diamond to the ace (revealing the 6-2 split) is followed by five rounds of hearts. You pitch two low clubs from your hand to reach this ending:

On the fifth heart, West released the ♣10. If the spade count is to be believed (thanks, East!), it means that East started with a 2-1-6-4 pattern, and therefore West began with 4-4-2-3 shape. The entire deal is an open book: play a club to the king and a low spade toward dummy's 8. West can win the jack, but will then be forced to lead a spade from the K-7 into your A-9.

Making five was worth all the matchpoints.

South led a low club to the queen and ace. Two more high clubs from Steinberg revealed the good news in that suit. Next came the ♥A and the ♥J, covered all around. In dummy with the ♥K, Steinberg cashed his two good clubs, pitching diamonds from hand. North pitched two spades, South one heart and one spade.

Now Steinberg played the ♦Q. If South ducks, Steinberg catches him in a strip squeeze, playing a spade to his king and another spade to dummy. On the second spade, South would have to release his heart guard or throw the ♦J, in which case Steinberg could exit with a low diamond, winning the last two hearts in dummy on the forced heart return.

South won the ♦A, however, and could have broken up the squeeze by returning a diamond to his partner's 10. That is easier looking at all the cards, however, and South made the normal-looking play of getting out with his spade.

On the play of the ♠6 to dummy's ace, South had to discard a diamond to keep his heart guard. Now when Steinberg cashed dummy's ♥10, North was squeezed in spades and diamonds. Steinberg's ♦9 took the 12th trick for a win on the board (declarer made 11 tricks in the same contract at the other table).

Steinberg was happy with his result, but he realized it would have been better to pass the ♥J at trick four. When it is covered, he can return to hand with the ♥A to lead a diamond to the queen and then run the clubs, followed by the ♠K and the ♠A for the strip squeeze to which there is no defense.

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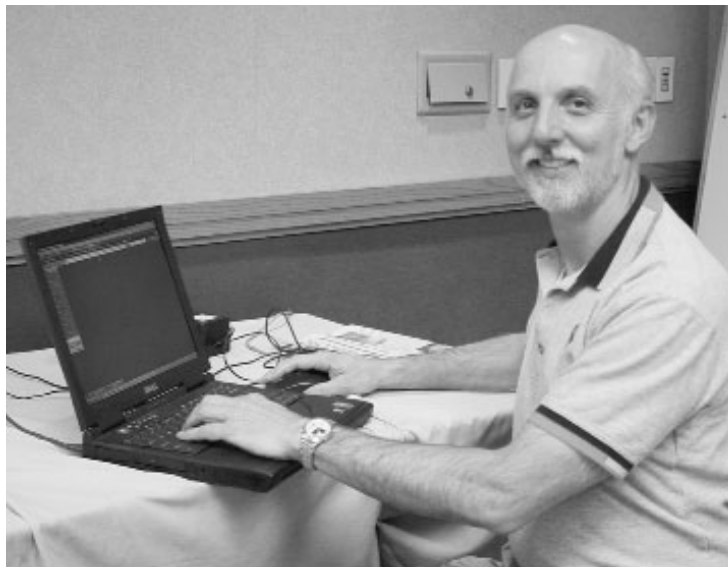
A wealth of bridge information and it's free!

Today is Colorado Springs Unit 360 Day at the Colorado NABC

Two features immediately strike you about bridge in Colorado Springs. First, when you step outside the unit-owned building, you are embraced by the clear crisp air at over 6,000 feet altitude and awe-struck by the glorious view of magnificent, snow-capped Pikes Peak. This 14,110-foot purple-mountain majesty was the inspiration for the song "America the Beautiful".

Secondly, the bridge center building is fully owned by the 500-member unit. In the mid 1970s, Bob Wingard - now the Denver NABC co-chairman - and 21 Colorado Springs bridge players had the foresight to take personal mortgages to finance the purchase of land and construction of a new building. The risk succeeded beyond the wildest hopes of the unit, and the mortgage was paid off five years early.

Today, five club owner-directors hold 10 games a week. Under the leadership of current unit president, John Grossmann, the building provides many innovative bridge activities, including: a mentor program, EasyBridge, summer bridge festival, a 199er tournament, bridge school and private lessons. The unit sponsors two annual sectionals in April and September, plus a regional every three years. For more information go to www.coloradospringsbridge.com.

Benefiting Silver Key senior services, the unit sponsors what has become one of the largest charity events in the country. For 25 years the annual auction-dinner was organized by local bridge maven, Toshi Yingst. Last year the event raised more than \$28,000. Recently, the unit raised \$10,000 for Katrina relief.

Dozens of tourist attractions highlight the Pikes Peak area. The three biggest attractions are the United States Air Force Academy, the Garden of the Gods and the cog railway to the summit of Pikes Peak.

South started with his singleton diamond. North won the first three and continued the suit, Brenner ruffing with the ♠J. Brenner then played a spade to the ace, cashed the ♠Q. After South's bidding, Brenner was not surprised to find the 4-1 trump split. North did not cover the ♠9, so Brenner played a club to her ace. When she cashed the ♠K, South was squeezed into submission, forced to concede the 10th trick in hearts or clubs.

Brenner and Caprera play negative free bids – a new suit by responder in a competitive auction is non-forcing. There is a difference of opinion among experts about the effectiveness of the method, but it paid dividends Monday night.

She returned the ♠8, and it was up to Caprera to decide whether to win immediately or duck to maintain communication between the East-West hands. He finally decided that with a singleton spade, she might have cashed the ♥A first, so he played an encouraging spade. Brenner then won the first round of trumps and played her second spade to get her ruff for down one.



If you see this man at the tournament today, wish him a happy birthday. It's Roy Weinstein, co-chair of the NABC. His age? Well, he's still not eligible for the Senior Pairs.

Oversight Committee report

On Nov. 18, 2005, the American Contract Bridge League Ethical Oversight Committee found Mr. Andrea Buratti and Mr. Massimo Lanzarotti guilty of violating Law 73 of the Laws of Duplicate Contract Bridge for deliberately communicating unauthorized information at the European Bridge League Championship earlier this year.

As a result, the Committee expelled Mr. Buratti and Mr. Lanzarotti from the American Contract Bridge League effective immediately. Mr. Buratti and/or Mr. Lanzarotti may appeal this decision to the League's Appeals and Charges Committee within thirty (30) days.

Susie Kennedy's 5NT response showed two aces and a void so Hamman decided to shoot it out in the notrump slam. He wasn't happy when a spade was led, he ducked it and it lost to the ♠K. The spade return cleared the suit.

He took a top heart, then cashed his top five minors. Now it was time to return to hearts — should he play for the drop or should he finesse? If he dropped the queen, he would make his slam, but everyone in hearts would make seven. So Bob had to hope the queen was third onside, because, by finessing, he could pick up a few match points from those who played for the 2-2 split.

His play salvaged quite a few points — 6 1/2 on a 12 top. If he had been wrong, he would have received a cold bottom, but so what? He would have received a near bottom if the ♥Q fell doubleton because all the heart bidders would be making seven.

Sometimes you're helpless

When declarer figures out your hand to the last card, there is nothing you can do if he does everything right. That what happened to West on this deal from the Mixed Pairs first qualifying session.

The opponents had bid both of his four-card suits, so West led a club away from his ace. Declarer, Mike Moss, won this with the queen, then played the diamonds correctly for four tricks. East was busy throwing away spades, so Mike decided to go for a

strip and endplay.

He took two spades, ending in hand, then led a heart to the king. A heart back gave West three hearts tricks, but then he was down to the ♣A 8 and had to surrender the ninth trick to the ♠K.

Do I look like Santa Claus?

Bob Hamman surprised declarer on this deal from the first qualifying session of the Mixed Pairs — he discarded instead of ruffing.

North-South arrived in 6♥ and the ♠Q opening lead was taken by the ♠K. Declarer got the bad news in trumps when he cashed the ♥A K. Then he lead the ♦10, covered by the jack and won with the ♦A. Declarer led the ♠A and Hamman discarded a club. Declarer discarded a diamond, then tried to set up the diamonds by cashing the ace and ruffing one, but the ♦Q didn't drop, so down he went.

Then declarer asked Hamman if he could have made it somehow and why didn't he ruff the ♠A? "Do I look like Santa Claus?" asked Hamman. "If you had played me for the minors, you would have had me on a dead squeeze."

As usual, he was right. After pitching a diamond on the high spade, declarer should come back to his hand with a spade ruff and force East to take his trump trick. The ♣K would come back and declarer could win in dummy. Now another spade ruff would put declarer in his and to run the rest of the hearts. This would be the position with three cards left to play.

Notice he didn't lead the ♣J which might advertise the solidity of that suit.

He next played a low diamond to the queen and ace. Since East appeared to have the ♥J, West banged down the ♥Q, won by Bjerkan's ace. A low club to the 8 let him lead another diamond from dummy. This time East won with the king to play a heart back. Surprise! Bjerkan produced his ♥J and ended up taking 10 tricks.

Too much talk

Silence can be golden, as Dave Berkowitz's opponents found out.

Baze began the carnage with the ♥A K, followed by a low club to Pender's ♣A. Pender returned the ♥2 for a ruff and Baze cashed the ♣K and gave partner a club ruff. Back came another heart, ruffed with the ♦J and the club return was ruffed with the defense's last trump.

So Baze and Pender scored all four trump tricks with ♦J 5 opposite ♦10 6 and took the first eight tricks. (Editor's note, the plus 1100 was under the old scoring. It would be 1400 now.)

Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6 board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.
