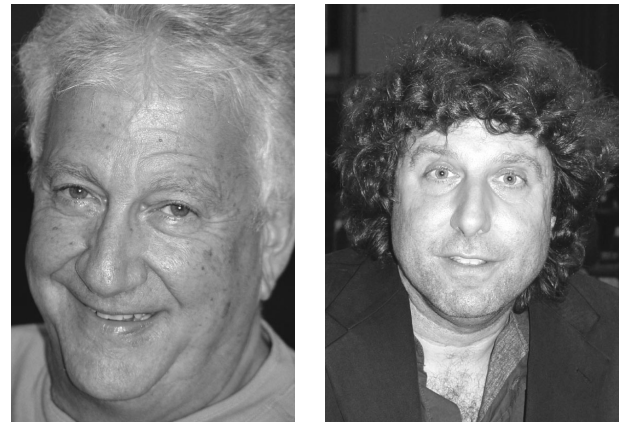
Let's see now. Maybe Glubok can produce a film with the names of Kasle, Said and Jabbour in the lights.

Wilkinson's father was also in the military, so he moved around a lot as a youngster, but he has called the Jackson MS area home most of his life.

He and his wife, Robin, have been married for 12 years.

The headline does not mean that this article will include submarine coups. Instead, "divers" means different in English, if not in American! Here are three dissimilar Spingold deals that caught my eye.

First, let's have a declarer-play problem.

Momentarily, let's go back to the first problem. Suppose you run the ♠10 at trick two. It wins. Now you play a club to the dummy and pitch a diamond on the ♠K. What would you do next?

The title of the second deal could be either What Might Have Been, or It's Easier in Four.

split 3-3, South played a trump to dummy and cashed the two club winners, reducing to this ending:

The last trump from the dummy saw everyone discard spades. Now reading the position perfectly, Levit played the ♦J to his ace to unblock the suit, then exited with the ♠K to endplay West.

What a brilliant way to make a slam! But now I must come clean. Levit was only in 4♥. And that, of course, made it safe to go for the endplay, although he was confident that he had worked out the end position correctly.

Finally, back to the problem that was faced by Tor Helness of Norway. Here is the full deal:

After winning trick one with dummy's ♥8, declarer called for the ♣Q, East covering with the ♣A and South ruffing. Now declarer should have played a spade to dummy's ace and continued with the ♣J, discarding a diamond from hand. Then he would have made the contract along the lines that he followed.

However, Helness actually played a trump to the dummy at trick three, after which he should have failed. He called for the ♣J and threw a diamond. West returned the last trump. Under dummy's ♣10, East and South pitched diamonds. Now came the ♠A, a spade to declarer's 8, and the ♦K exit. That left this position, with South needing three of the last four tricks:

If West had led the ♣9, with East discarding a spade, the contract would have failed. Declarer would ruffed with his final trump, but when East

won a spade trick, he could have exited with the ♦J for his partner to take the last two tricks.

However, West acted too quickly, playing the ♦Q. Now Helness could ruff and exit with the ♠5 to endplay East.

Finally, back to the full deal for the initial problem:

After taking the first trick with the ♠A, if you lead a trump immediately, you lose four tricks in gig time. But if you successfully run the ♠10 at trick two, you must still be careful. After crossing in clubs and throwing a diamond on the ♠K, you must continue with a diamond to cut the defenders' communications. If instead you play a trump, East wins with the queen and returns her last club. Then East, when in with the ♥A, can lead a diamond to her partner's ace and receive a killing club ruff.

How I wish I had found that line of play at the table. Then this article could have had a more self-congratulatory slant!

Gold Life Master

Gail Bell of King of Prussia PA took an advance save on this deal, but it turned out to be a make the way she played it. That gave her enough points to make her a Gold Life Master (more than 2500 masterpoints).

Even though she had a minimum, Gail jumped to game because she wanted to make it as difficult as possible for the opponents for the opponents to play in hearts. It so happens that North-South can beat 4♥ with four fast tricks in spades and diamonds, so it was important for Gail to find a way to 10 tricks.

The defense started with a heart and two clubs, and Gail needed the rest. She ruffed the heart continuation and got to dummy by ruffing her last club. She led a spade, and she eyed the ♠Q from East with hope. Sure enough, when she cashed the ♠A, the queen fell. She drew the last trump and then thought about what to do with the diamonds.

West had shown up with a lot of stuff, so she decided to play East for the ♦Q. She knew from the count that West had only two diamonds, so her plan was to smother the 10. She led a diamond to the king and shot back the jack. East ducked, but she let the jack ride, and down came the 10. Suddenly the ACBL had a new Gold Life Master.

'You owe me 2 beers'

Marvin Kullbeck of Toms River NJ owes Frederic Brown of Bayhead NJ two beers. Brown scored the Beer Card – the ♦7 – on consecutive deals in the Thursday afternoon pair game.

You remember the Beer Card idea, don't you? You have to win the last trick with the ♦7 in a contract you make or one that you defeat.

Against 3NT Brown led a low club. Declarer guessed wrong and played low from dummy, so the defense took the first six tricks. Kullbeck switched to a spade, and declarer went after diamonds after winning the ♠A. He had pitched a couple of diamonds on the run of the clubs, so Brown won the fourth diamond, cashed his top hearts and produced the ♦7 for the last trick to set the contract five for a top on the board.

Kullbeck and Brown moved for the next round and picked up the cards for Board 3.

They bid their way up to 5♦, and Brown immediately realized he could score another beer card. He also saw that he was headed for a bottom because East-West were cold for slam, but he figured at least he would have a story to tell if he scored the Beer Card on two deals in a row. So he orchestrated the play in such a way as to make sure the ♦7 scored the last trick in a making contract. It was the only solace for a bottom board.

Silver Life Master

Barry Margolin of Arlington MA needed 25 points to become a Silver Life Master (more than 1000 points) when he arrived at the tournament. He picked up 12 by coming in second in a Bracketed Knockout and then got six scattered points. On Friday he reached the final of Bracket 2 of the Wednesday-Saturday Morning Knockouts, and that was a guaranteed 9 points. He played with Michael Andresen of Cambridge MA in both knockouts.

Peter Thayer of Naples FL won the "King of Hearts" afghan that was pictured in the Daily Bulletin earlier this week. His name was drawn from among the names of all competitors in this week's Intermediate/Newcomer games.

Tip your caddy, please

You show up at 1:30 for your game, play for three hours (maybe a little more), check the scores and leave, but a caddy is there at least a half hour early for sign-in and setup and at least a half hour later for cleanup. It is fair to say that one session of play is usually at least four hours of work for your caddy.

Our pay? At small sectionals, I rake in \$20 per session. At regionals and NABCs, my wages skyrocket to \$25 per session. That means that we caddies receive somewhere between \$5 and \$6.25 per hour. We are not paid overtime, but when we work a week-long tournament, we usually work at least two sessions daily, but we try to work all four if we can. So let's crunch some numbers.

The morning game starts at 9, so we wake up at 8:30 to get a shower and food. That food, by the way, is never provided, and in the big cities that host these tournaments, it's more expensive. So between 8:30 a.m. and 1 p.m., we've made \$25 but spent, say, \$5 on breakfast. We grab lunch in time for the afternoon game, spending maybe \$7. Make another \$25, \$7 more on dinner, then back to work.

At midnight, we may hang around to work one more session, but most of us will go to bed somewhere in a hotel that we also have to pay for, unless we are lucky enough to have parents staying here, too. Most of us don't.

We can't afford a room on our own, so we share and split it 12 ways when we stay at a hotel that allows that kind of thing.

So, at the end of a typical day we've worked at least 12 hours, made \$75 but spent \$29 (at least) for a net of \$46, and we've had to sleep like sardines, compromise all privacy, put in a 12-hour day for all those big dollars.

Repeat seven times and don't forget travel expenses – we caddies come from all over the continent to move your boards and pick up your score cards. Here in NYC we have at least nine states represented, plus Canada and Puerto Rico.

If we work seven days with no days off, we've worked 84 hours and made \$322 net. That's if we are lucky enough to average three sessions a day.

Why do we do it? Because it's nice to get away from home, and we like each other. In the few moments of the day we have to ourselves, we have loads of fun. But when we go home we're exhausted – and still more or less broke.

You can help.

In a typical session, a caddy is in charge of about 30 tables. If each of those 120 players realized just how vital caddies are to duplicate bridge – and decided to thank us for keeping the tournament going with a tip of, say, a dime, that would amount to an extra \$12 per caddy per session. That could cover our basic expenses so we could actually take home our \$25 per session. If you are feeling particularly generous, you might leave a whole quarter per session, helping us to rise above minimum wage.

If you can't find quarters or dimes, we accept paper money, too.

Even if you decide you've spent enough on bridge, we'll still be grateful if you just close up your bid box after the final session.

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basketball and football as the major sports. Not hockey? “No, hockey isn’t a major sport,” said the man whose family grew in Montreal Canadiens territory.

And what about Jose Damiani of France, president of the World Bridge Federation? “I might have been a tennis star. I was ranked reasonably high among French players. Or I might have been a rally sports car driver. I’ve done some of that and I always enjoyed it.”

Paul Soloway isn’t sure what he’d be doing, but he’s sure he would have been a success. “I was designing avionics chips for a while, but they let me go because I didn’t have enough engineering experience. I could have gone back to school, but in 1965 I got an offer I couldn’t refuse. Malcolm Brachman asked if I would like to play pro with his group.

“That was it. I said yes and I’ve never looked back. I have no regrets – it’s just been fantastic. I live my own life, I work a lot or a little – it’s up to me. I meet interesting people and I’ve traveled all over the world. Why would I ever want to do anything else?”

At first Bobby Levin thought he would be doing stock options. “No, I don’t think so. I got into stock options because of my contacts in bridge. I was studying criminal law back in 1981, so maybe I’d be a big criminal lawyer. But when we won the Bermuda Bowl in 1981, that was the end of criminal law for me.”

We might have had another lawyer – Grant Baze. “I always had an interest in the law, but not courtroom law. I would be in constitutional law.”

Bob Hamman worked hard getting ready for his career as a mathematician. He studied engineering originally, but then switched to physics and math. Everything was going along fine until a friend had this to say: “Show me a man who works and I’ll show you a failure.” That did it – Hamman didn’t want to be a failure. So he gave up any thought of working and just played bridge.

Allan Cokin would be a college professor teaching American literature. “I actually did it for a while,” he said.

Andrew Robson says he is better known for his teaching than for his bridge playing in Great Britain. “Teaching is my passion. If I hadn’t wandered into the bridge world, I’d be teaching math in a secondary school.”

When Tournament Director Roger Putnam what he’d be doing if bridge wasn’t available, he looked puzzled. “I don’t know. I never really thought about it. I guess I’d be working as an accountant in a crowded dark office somewhere, but I’m really glad bridge was available.”

Michael Rosenberg sounded just as excited as Putnam about being an accountant. “That’s probably what I would be doing, but I’m glad I’m not.”

Tournament Director Guillermo Poplawsky had no hesitation answering the question. “I’d be a civil engineer working on construction projects. That’s what I did before I found bridge.”

Another pro who would be into scientific work would be Sam Lev. “My entire early background was in chemistry, but chemistry really isn’t my thing. I might have been a chemist, but I would have become a serious poker player when I discovered what kind of money their tournaments offer.”

“I guess I’d be trading stocks,” said Roger Bates. “I’ve had occasional regrets about living a bridge life, but all in all it’s been a good life.”

After 15 years of looking for tax breaks for a petroleum firm, Barry Rigal had had enough. He looked for something that had nothing to do with taxes or gasoline – and he found bridge.

Geir Helgemo of Norway said he’d be a computer programmer – but he said it with a grimace.

Mike Moss didn’t take the question all that seriously. “I guess I’d be sweeping streets and washing dishes,” he said with a big smile.

Michaels made an amazing opening lead during the final round to defeat a 3♠ contract when most of the field was making 4♠.

What would lead with the North hand? Bet it wasn’t the ♠7, but that’s the card Michaels put on the table. That really put it to Warren Singer, the declarer. He figured his only real hope was that Michaels was leading from the ace-doubleton, so he put up the king in hopes of smothering the queen. No such luck. South fired back a heart, setting up the king while Michaels still had the top trump. Singer went down when the defense took three aces, the ♥K – and the ♠Q.

Getting to New York wasn’t all that easy

Three Canadian Juniors — Shona Crauson and Matt and Mark Donovan — had a rough time getting to New York for the World Individual last Wednesday. They drove from Kingston ON to Syracuse NY where they were supposed to catch a plane to New York City at 10 a.m. However, the flight was delayed several times because of thunderstorms in the New York area, and finally the flight was canceled.

To make it worse, it was impossible for them to get on another plane to make it to New York in time to play in the first session of the Individual. So they got back in their car, drove for more than eight hours and arrived in New York City in the middle of the night. They missed the first session of the Individual but played in the final three sessions.

The Rabbi’s Coup

Imagine you found yourself holding ♠K 8 2 ♥K Q 10 8 4 ♦6 5 2 ♣7 6 and heard your vulnerable opponents bid slowly to 4♥ after partner had overcalled the opening bid of 1♦ with 2♣.

Would you not imagine that Christmas had arrived a little early and double?

Well, when the declarer is the redoubtable Rabbi Leonard Helman you would do well to think twice, as you can see for yourselves as we take a look at this deal from the second session of the Lebhar IMP Pairs.

West led the ♣K and declarer won with the ace, played a diamond to the ace and ruffed a club. Then the ♦K was followed by a diamond ruff and the ♠Q, covered by the king and ace. Now declarer played a winning diamond discarding a spade from dummy. East ruffed and played the ♥K. Declarer won and played a club. It would not help East to ruff, so he discarded a spade and now declarer crossed to the ♠J to record his ninth trick. Now a club from the table enabled the Rabbi to score the game-going trick with the ♥J en passant.

Jack wins computer title

Jack (the Netherlands) retained its title of world computer bridge champion, defeating last year’s finalist, Bridge Baron (USA), 157-97 in the 64-board final.

Hans Kuijff’s robot Jack, winner of the last four annual championships, is on top of the computer bridge world.

Next year’s championship will be held during the World Bridge Federation’s Bermuda Bowl and Venice Cup tournament in Estoril, Portugal.

The good play on this deal from the final saw both computers playing it right.

The opening spade lead went to the 10 and ace. Declarer led a club to the ace and passed the ♥6. Next came the ♣Q, covered by the king and ruffed. Declarer cashed the trump ace, crossed to the ♥Q and cashed the ♣10-9, to make game with an overtrick (seven hearts, three clubs and a spade). The bidding and play was identical at both tables.

A neat trump coup

It's not really fair when your opponents play very well against you. Still, it provides material for the column. Aviv Shahaf declared 4♠ redoubled on this deal:

The opening heart lead went to Shahaf's king. He ruffed a club and led the ♦J to North's queen. A heart went to the ace, and Shahaf called for the ♦K, losing to North's ace. North led a third heart, ruffed with the 7 and overruffed with the 9. On a diamond return Shahaf won and cashed another diamond reaching this position:

On the fifth diamond, if North pitches his heart, declarer leads a spade for the finesse. North has to put in the 10 and the king wins. Shahaf crossed back to dummy's trump queen and scored the final two tricks on a trump coup. He held ♠A-8 over North's J-6.

If South had returned a club instead of a diamond, declarer ruffs and can achieve the trump coup, perhaps in even more elegant fashion.

Transnational Mixed Teams set for Istanbul

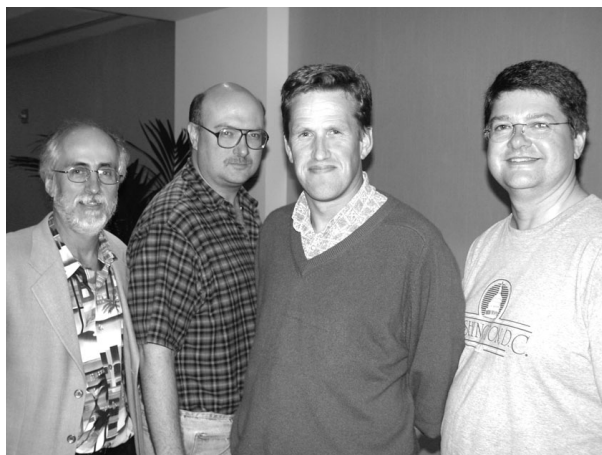
You can play in a world championship this fall, and you don't need to qualify to do so.

The event is the third World Transnational Mixed Teams Championship, scheduled to take place during the World Bridge Olympiad in Istanbul, Turkey, Oct. 23 through Nov. 6 and organized by the World Bridge Federation.

The Mixed Teams will begin Nov. 2 and will be played in 15 rounds of 10 boards each to qualify teams for the semifinal and final rounds. Teams can be made up of any combination of countries, with at least two men and two women playing in mixed partnerships.

Entry fees are \$800 for new teams, free for players eliminated from the Olympiad. If a team is composed of players from the Olympiad and new players, the players who have not competed will be charged \$150 per person for a team of six, \$200 per person for a team of four.

ACBL members who wish to enter should e-mail internationalevents@acbl.org or call (901) 332- 5586 and ask for International Events. Entries are due by Aug. 15, although late entries may be accepted if there is sufficient space at the venue.

East led a low club to dummy's queen. Dickman then played the ♠A and a low spade, taken by West with the jack. The ♣10 was next. Dickman would have done better to put in the ♣J, but she rose with the ace to lead the ♥10 from hand. Had East inserted the ♥J — always easier to see in the post mortem — the contract would have failed, but he played the 4, and Dickman made no mistake from that point.

She cashed two more high spades, then followed with the high diamonds from her hand. At trick 10, she exited her hand with the ♥K. East had two heart tricks coming, but had to surrender the ninth trick to Dickman's ♣J at the end.

Note that if East rises with the ♥A, that gives Dickman two heart tricks to go with three spades, two diamonds and two clubs.

Plus 600 was a 12-IMP gain for the Bennett team because the contract at the other table was 4♠ down one.

Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both partnership cards must be identical. Both must include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director.

Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6 board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems appropriate under the circumstances.

Here's what happened at one table. The opening diamond lead went to the jack and ace. He cashed his trump ace and led a second trump to North's king. North led the ♠Q and declarer ducked in dummy. So North led another spade to the 6, 8 (!) and 10! Declarer cashed the ♦K, ruffed a diamond to set up the 9, and drew the last trump to make 10 tricks. The spade tricks were won with the queen and the 10.

At the second table the opening lead was the ♥8, and declarer allowed the 9 to win. He won the diamond return and led a spade to the king. A second spade went to North's queen, and he shifted back to trumps, leading the jack. Declarer called for the queen, which won the trick. Declarer thus scored up nine tricks. The heart tricks were won with the 9 and the queen, not the ace and king as at the first table. And the spades were taken with the king and the queen, not the queen and the 10.

No, this article was not about good play — only about strange tricks.

The opening lead was the ♥J, and my wife ducked! She knew that if she covered, East would win and shift to a club. If West had the ♣A-Q, she would go down if the spade finesse also failed. So she took out some insurance by ducking.

Sure enough, all the key cards were in the wrong place, and she would have gone down to defeat both on the deal and in the match if she had failed to duck.

Of course East could still have beaten the contract by overtaking partner's ♥J with the ace and shifting to a club. However, this is not an easy play to find.

South's 1NT opener with a low singleton was eccentric, to say the least – and it helped West in the play.

North led a low diamond to South's king, and she cashed a second high diamond, felling the queen. The ♦J was ruffed at trick three. Instead of pulling trumps and giving the defenders information about how strong his spade suit was, Ravipudi led a low heart at trick four, trying to persuade North that he was trying to sneak a singleton through.

North rose with the ace and could have applied the coup de grace by continuing with a heart, but he made the fatal error of getting out with a club, allowing Ravipudi to execute a Vienna Coup by winning the club ace.

After North played the ♥A, West knew that South had every other high card because of the 1NT opener. He therefore ran trumps with complete confidence that South would be squeezed in hearts and clubs. In the three-card ending, South could not hold two hearts and either high club. Whichever suit South abandoned would provide the 10th trick and plus 620 for a 10-IMP gain.

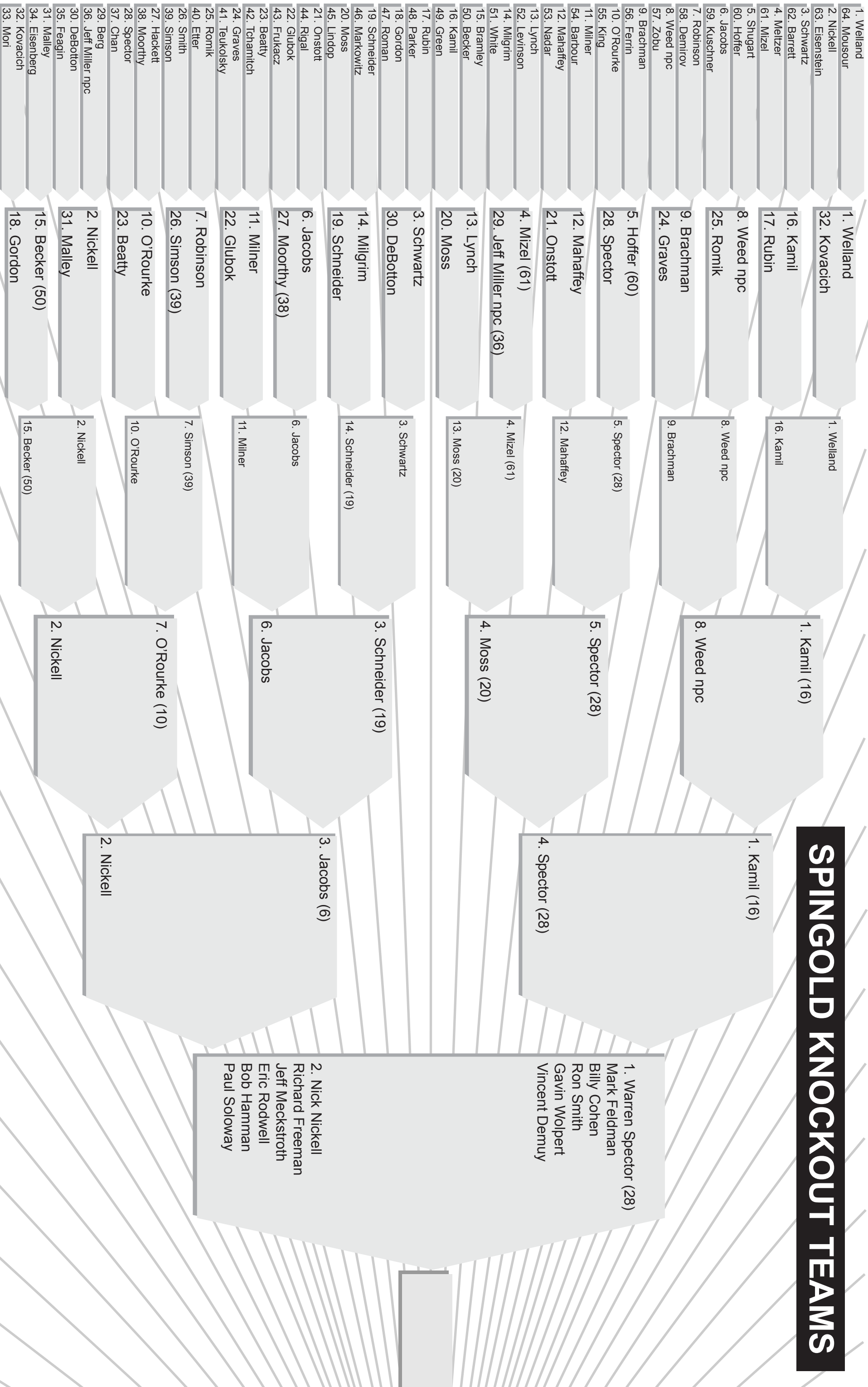
