Stansbys strong in LM Open victory

Lew and JoAnna Stansby, propelled by a huge first final session, claimed victory by more than a board in the Life Master Open Pairs -- their first major pairs win together, and her first North American championship.

"Our combined pairs wins just tripled," Lew said after learning of the win. "I had one and she had none."

The Stansbys won with a 68.5% game in the afternoon, followed by 58% in the evening. In second place were Ron Smith of San Francisco and Richard Schwartz of Flushing NY.

Lew's only other win in a major pairs event was with Ralph Katz in the Open Pairs at the 1986 Spring

Barbara Sartorius of Parsippany NJ and Sharon Hait of Livingston NJ are best friends, bridge partners -- and now North American champions. They had two great sessions yesterday to win going away in the Life Master Women's Pairs. Runners-up were Rhoda Walsh of Los Angeles and Shannon Lipscomb of Red Bank TN, followed by Mildred Breed of Bryan TX and Shawn Quinn of Katy TX.

Sartorius and Hait got better and better as the event moved along -- their two strongest sessions were the finals. They won by more than a board a half.

"We didn't give anything away today, and we took whatever the opponents offered," said Sartorius.

"We got a zero on our second board tonight -- misunderstanding -- and we got another zero in the third round -- self-inflicted," said Hait. "But then we pulled ourselves together. We played solid the rest of the way."

Hait was especially excited -- it was her first North American championship. Sartorius won the 1969 four-session Open Pairs. They play Eastern Scientific with lots of gadgets.

Both are retired schoolteachers -- Sartorius taught English and social studies, Sharon taught the handicapped. Actually Sartorius still is a teacher -- now her subject is bridge.

When the Junior players got together for their Junior Day dinner, they were told of the recently enunciated Junior Corps mission:

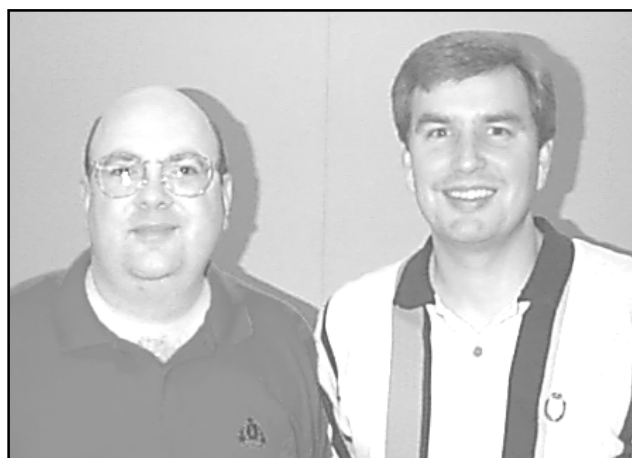
- Recruit new members.

There is nothing more important for us than the Junior programs." He asked the Juniors to pass along any ideas they have concerning Junior bridge and bridge in general.

Brian Meyer of Buffalo and Todd Wolford of Aurora OH were inducted into the Junior Corps by their District 5 director, Sharon Fairchild.

Wolford, 21, is training to compete for a berth on one of the Junior teams that will play in the World Championships next year. He also teaches bridge as

Then they racked up a 67.6% game in the final session, making absolutely sure that no one could catch them. They won by more than three boards over Andy Muenz of Glen Rock NJ and Bob Zehm of Allendale NJ. Lon Sunshine of Framingham MA and Ivania Yeo of Bright MA were third, another board in arrears.

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Father vs. sons -- a lively time

Bob, Erik and Roger Breum of Sanford FL came to Orlando to play in the Bridge+ game yesterday -- but they arrived too late. That didn't faze Tournament Director Betty Bratcher, however. "If you stay a little while, you can have complimentary entries to the 3 o'clock game," she told them. That appealed to Bob, the dad, and his sons.

As luck would have it, they got entries in different directions in the same section. That means Dad had a chance to see how well his boys have learned the lessons he's given them. He found that he had taught them well. Each of the boys played a hand and made their contract for above-average results. And Dad went down in his contract -- another plus for the boys.

It's not the first time the boys have played in a tournament -- but it was their first bridge tournament. Both are seasoned chess players of approximate equal strength -- "We break about even in our games," said Erik, the 13-year-old.

"Well, maybe I'm a little ahead," said Roger, who is 10.

Erik won the sixth grade chess state championship last year, and he's going to try to add another championship when he com-

Double tough

Shireen Mohandes and Andy Bowles of London didn't come all the way to Orlando to drop tricks in the Life Master Open Pairs. On this deal from the second qualifying session, Mohandes showed that she can be as greedy as the next person when it comes to matchpoints.

North led a low heart and Mohandes won the trick with dummy's jack. She cashed the ♠A and played a diamond to her ace to advance the ♣J, ducked by North. A third round of clubs went to the 10 and a spade was played to the queen. Next came the top two hearts, then the ♠K. This was the position with three tricks to go:

When Mohandes played the ♣5, South had to hold onto the ♠K, so he let go of a diamond. Mohandes discarded the ♠10 and it was North's turn to squirm. A heart discard would make dummy's ♥5 good, so he too was forced to part with a diamond. Mohandes then overtook dummy's ♦J and won trick 13 with the ♦8. Plus 520 on the double squeeze was only average on a 51 top -- many pairs bid and made slam on the East-West cards -- but Mohandes gained 11 matchpoints for making the overtrick.

Advantage, Nickell

Too bad Nick Nickell didn't know how well he was going to play this deal from the first qualifying session of the Life Master Open Pairs. If he had known, he could have bid more. Nickell was playing with Richard Freeman.

Nickell and Freeman did well to reach the correct spot, then Nickell achieved a spectacular result to put the icing on the cake.

5♦ has little play, and Freeman judged well to stop in 3♦. North, seemingly persuaded by his partner's double of the 2♥ cuebid, started with an intellectual low heart, and Nickell's ♥K scored at trick one. When Nickell led a spade towards dummy's queen, North grabbed the king and failed to find the club shift. Instead he tried to cash the ♥A. Nickell ruffed, crossed to the ♠Q, unblocked the ♦A and ruffed a heart. Next came a bunch of diamonds. With four tricks to go, this was the position:

Nickell played the ♠A, discarding the ♣10 from dummy, and both opponents followed. On Nickell's last diamond, North had to discard a club to keep dummy's ♥10 from being good. South was also in a bind, forced into a club discard to guard spades. Nickell had no trouble dropping the singleton ♣K to take 12 tricks.

Count your cards!

Strange things can happen when you don't count your cards. This incident took place during the second qualifying session of the Life Master Open Pairs.

Yes, we know there's something wrong with this hand, but that's what the story is all about.

For the record, the defense took two diamonds, and then North led a trump. That's all Dave Treadwell needed. He had control of trumps, so he gave up a club and claimed his contract, losing just two hearts, two diamonds and a club. Both opponents had opening notrump bids, but distribution was everything, as is so often the case.

After the play finished, North asked, "Where's the king of spades?" Neither Darwin Afdahl nor Treadwell had it -- and neither did South. But when South counted his cards he discovered he had only 12.

The director was called, and a thorough search of the area followed -- no king of spades. The director went back to the previous table where a star player was sitting South. The opponents had made two hearts doubled against him as well. "What was your hand?" he was asked. And suddenly the expert realized that he had played the hand with only 12 cards.

So the director went back another table -- same story. South again had played without the king of spades. This didn't show up at any of these tables because in each case East had claimed well before the end of the play. And, strangely enough, the missing king never played a role in the play of the hand.

Three tables back South had held the king, and the director put the king back after the Treadwell play. But for three straight rounds the Life Masters sitting South weren't playing with a full deck.

What about the patient?

On this deal from the first qualifying session of the Life Master Open Pairs, David Berkowitz conceived a brilliant plan and executed it to perfection. Unfortunately for him, the operation was successful but... well, you know the rest. Here is the deal played by Berkowitz and Larry Cohen which resulted in 1 matchpoint out of 51.

Cohen was annoyed at himself for failing to double 4♦ based on the law of total tricks, which he has written about in three books. By Cohen's reasoning, the opponents had nine diamonds -- Berkowitz was unlikely to have a void for his weak two-bid -- and his side was known to have eight trumps. Nine and eight equals 17, the approximate number of tricks on the deal if each side played in its best trump fit. If East-West could make 10 tricks, that would leave only seven for North-South, so a double would net Cohen's side plus 800 (and that's what would have happened in real life).

At any rate, it is easy to see how the East-West hands produced plus 450 at most tables. Berkowitz managed to go down, but he was pleased with his effort. Here's what happened.

North led the ♦10, which held, and he switched to the fiendish ♣10. Berkowitz was well on his way to getting the opponents' hands all wrong. Berkowitz cashed dummy's high spades and played a heart. South rose with the ace, which looked like a singleton -- and played a high diamond, ruffed by Berkowitz.

It looked to Berkowitz as though North had started with a 3-4-4-2 pattern, with four hearts to the Q-10 and the doubleton ♣10. If that was indeed North's hand, Berkowitz could prevail with a strip-squeeze endplay. The plan would be to force North to come down to all hearts, at which point Berkowitz could lead low from the ♥K J 7 toward dummy's ♥9 4 3.

So, after ruffing the second round of diamonds and cashing the ♠Q, Berkowitz cashed another spade. Theoretically, this would force North to let go of a diamond, leaving him only one. If North ever discarded a heart, of course, Berkowitz could get his second trick in the suit simply by cashing the ♥K and playing another heart. So after North's diamond discard, Berkowitz could enter dummy with the ♣K, taking North's last club, and ruff dummy's third diamond, taking his last card in that suit.

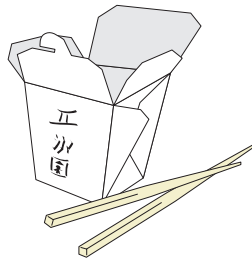
That would prepare the stage for the denouement, the lead of a low heart from hand. That was the plan and it was well executed, but when the ♥7 hit the table and North followed low, the cold truth began to dawn. All was known when South won his singleton ♥Q, cashed a diamond and then played a club to North's queen.

Down one it was, but Berkowitz still liked his plan. It was a good idea, applied on the wrong deal.

Open Board-a-Match Teams compete for Mitchell Trophy

The Open Board-a-Match Teams will begin play today for the Victor Mitchell Trophy, which honors one of bridge's most colorful characters -- the late Vic Mitchell was a champion player, philosopher and mentor to the stars.

Mitchell, a Grand Life Master with more than 10,000 masterpoints, won five North American championships, including the Spingold in 1956 and 1959, the Life Master Men's Pairs in 1962 and the Men's Teams in 1962 and 1963.

Mitchell claimed that he never played bridge for glory or prestige. "The people," he said, "are more important than the bridge. I've met some of the most fantastic people playing bridge. I've had a ball."

He was inducted into the Bridge Hall of Fame in 1996.

The game

The Open Board-a-Match Teams is a four-session event which consists of two qualifying and two final sessions. It was a men's event until 1990, when it became an open event.

Perhaps the event's high point occurred in 1977 when there were only three winners: Richard Doughty, Ron Smith and Lou Bluhm.

Sidney Lazard was supposed to play with Doughty but after a good first set, Lazard became ill and Irv Kostal took his place for the evening session.

Lazard was better the next day and in his seat for the first final session. Suddenly he toppled over and a call went out for paramedics. They arrived quickly and rushed Lazard to a hospital.

Meanwhile, Doughty had to find another partner and Bruce Ferguson was pressed into service. Ferguson, whose team had not qualified the previous day, was technically ineligible but allowed to play only in the afternoon.

In the evening, Doughty recruited Les West -- his fourth partner in four sessions -- and the team went on to victory by a margin of two full boards.

Shuttle service

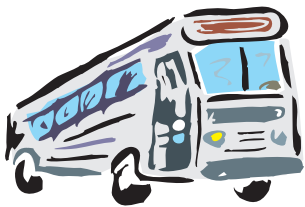

Coffin Trophy the prize in Women's BAM Teams

The Coffin Trophy is one of the oldest and most historic trophies in play in NABC competition. For years there was only one "National" Women's Team championship -- and that was a board-a-match event.

Donated by Charles Emmet Coffin in 1933, the trophy was contested at the "Winter Nationals" in the days when there were only two NABCs -- Summer and Winter. In 1963 the event was moved to the new Spring NABC where it was in play until the format was changed to knockout teams in 1976.

For the next decade, there was no national Women's Board-a-Match championship. Swiss teams had become popular and a Women's Swiss with NABC rating was established in the early Eighties. But board-a-match play for women was not dead -- it was just in hiatus for a few years.

The Coffin Trophy was revived at the Fall NABC in Atlanta in 1986 and new life was breathed into women's board-a-match play.

Many experts consider board-a-match the most exacting form of the game. Equal weight is accorded each deal and every trick is important when scoring is board-by-board.

Today's Swiss Teams honors Leon Smith

Today's Stratflighted Swiss Teams is dedicated to the memory of Leon Smith. He died on Sept. 13, one day short of his 54th birthday.

Smith was one of Florida's great bridge characters -- an ebullient player who enjoyed the spirit of competition and the fellowship of the game. Unlike most players of his ability, he could be teased about his bidding. There are many stories about "Leon bids" (most of them true, and he often told the stories on himself.

Although Leon retired from Prudential where he had been a programmer/designer, no member of the bridge community thought of him as other than a bridge player. Leon was active as an ACBL player for 35 years, starting with his days at Florida State University. During the Seventies the Jacksonville quartet of Larry Griffey-Leon Smith, Gary Tinkley-Loren Axtell dominated bridge in the upper half of Florida.

At the time of his death, Leon had won more than 7200 masterpoints with more than 200 sectional and regional victories. Leon represented District 8 at the North American Open Pairs a record five times, and he was the District 9 Grand National Team representative on two occasions.

Leon had been in poor health in recent years, resulting in a reduction in his bridge activity. His recent death has removed a (too rarely encountered) sense of joy from local bridge.

When using bid boxes, ACBL suggests that players tap the Alert strip and say "Alert" at the same time.

When making an announcement, use the announcement word -- such as "transfer" -- and tap the Alert strip at the same time.

A player who Alerts or announces a bid should make sure his opponents are aware that an Alert or announcement has been made.

NABC in Portland OR. That event is now known as Open Pairs I. Lew has many North American championships in team events, and two Bermuda Bowl victories.

The Stansbys have come close on two other occasions. They were second in the Spring Open Pairs in Atlantic City in 1991, losing out by one matchpoint. They were second in the North American Pairs, Flight A, last year.

"I want to thank Jill Levin," said JoAnna. "Without her, Lew and I could not have played in this event." Levin, then Jill Blanchard, filed suit with her husband Bob in 1984 over gender-based events, which she claimed violated a California anti-discrimination statute. The upshot was that, in 1990, three former men's events were changed to open events, including the event the Stansbys won.

Married 13 years, the Stansbys play "a fair amount," including the North American Pairs each year.

"Lew and I have had a great time playing together," JoAnna said. "Winning is a bonus."

Lew joked that their least favorite board of the day was No. 15. In the afternoon, they played Board 15 in 4NT, down three. In the evening, Board 15 was played in six hearts, down four.

"Fortunately," Lew said, "the event ended before we had to play 15 again."

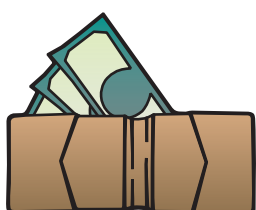
