Spingold, Wagar Knockouts enter third day

It was smooth sailing for the top seeds in the Spingold yesterday, as all 32 advanced except for the #20 seed captained by Robert Kent (themselves a giant-killer from the previous round) when they were ousted by the squad led by Mark Bartusek (Stephen Goldstein, Harold Mouser, William Pettis, Lou Reich and Marc Umeno).

In the Wagar Knockouts, the #5 seed (Disa Eythorsdottir, Valerie Westheimer, Judy Wadas, Jill Mellstrom, Linda Lewis and Karen Barrett) was upset by the #12 seed captained by Jan Martel (Sally Woolsey, Judy Pede, Carreen Hinds, Marinisa Letizia and Carlyn Steiner).

When the #8 and #9 seeds squared off, the #9 team led by Beverly Rosenberg was victorious, winning big 181-91. Her teammates were June Deutsch, Marcia Masterson, Janet Daling, Dorothy Truscott and Sharon Colson. Sixteen teams remain in play.

Next Olympic step — form the USBF

Major steps were taken yesterday toward the formation of the United States Bridge Federation. The plan is to have the USBF represent *all* bridge players in the United States -- not just those in the ACBL, and not just those in the American Bridge Association.

Plans are going forward for possible inclusion of bridge in the Olympic program. In order to approach the U.S. Olympic Committee, bridge needs a united front. An affiliation with the U.S. Olympic Committee is necessary before American bridge players can be a part of the Olympic movement. The boards of directors of both the ACBL and the American Bridge Association have already approved the concept of the USBF.

David Silber, CEO of the ACBL, has agreed to be the official who will deal with getting the attention of the U.S. Olympic Committee. He will serve as acting CEO of the proposed USBF. He was one of those who met yesterday to decide on the approach. Others in at-

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Juniors lead Red Ribbon; Trugit ahead in Senior Swiss

Kevin Bathurst of Thousand Oaks CA and Ari Greenberg of Malibu CA, two outstanding Juniors, put together two powerful games to take more than a board lead over the field in yesterday's qualifying sessions of the Red Ribbon Pairs. Their score of 1738.57 on a 51 top equates to 66% over two sessions.

Darrell Gibson of Billerica MA and Nathan Glaser of Somerville MA were second with 1681.26. The only other pairs over 1600 were David Yang of Chicago, and

Xiaodong Shi of Highland Park IL, 1669.41, and Kenneth Smith of Southfield MI and Michael Gosnell of Monrovia CA, 1613.82.

Trudy Nugit's team led the qualifiers in the NABC Senior Swiss. Nugit, Hamish Bennett, Gene Simpson and Mike Shuman had an 11-VP advantage over Lowell Andrews, John Swanson, Harvey Brody, Jerry Gaer, Carol Dalzell and Becky Rogers.

Both events will stage their two final sessions today.

Directors-in-Charge know their game

Thousands of bridge players, two large hotels, dozens of different events: how is such a production managed? It begins by relying on experienced, first-rate staff. And in the area of tournament directing, ACBL calls on Sol Weinstein and Doug Grove for the Summer North American Bridge Championships.

Sol Weinstein, of Yonkers NY, has more than 30 years of experience as a director. He was named a National Director in 1978. Weinstein is best known to players in the New York City/New England area, where he has directed countless tournaments.

Doug Grove, of Silver Spring MD, is

an Associate National Director who worked his first NABC in 1983. He has been a tournament director for more than 20 years, and is also a familiar face to players from the East coast, from Boston to Atlanta.

Together, Weinstein and Grove oversee a group of some 57 directors during the Anaheim NABC. This staff is spread out over many different playing sites at the two host hotels. Coordinating the people with the places is challenging task, but it's just part of the job for Weinstein and Grove.

"One of my chief duties is assigning director personnel to each event and making sure that the directors are at the right

Hayman and Binder reached the excellent heart slam. After Katz doubled the Blackwood response, Jacobs led the ♠8, and declarer won the ace perforce (dummy and East played low). Declarer was concerned about the possibility of clubs being 6-1, so she played three rounds of trumps ending in hand, crossed to the ♦A and called for the ♣J. Katz covered and Binder ruffed. Declarer reentered the dummy with the ♥K and played the ♠10. Katz again covered and declarer ruffed with her last trump. Jacobs discarded a diamond, and this was the position:

Declarer now played the ♦Q, drawing West's last non-spade, and continued with the ♠A and a low spade. Jacobs won the ♠Q, but was forced to concede the last two tricks. Making six, plus 980.

It never rains but it pours

More often than not, a favorable lie of the cards results in overtricks rather a crucial game-going trick. This was certainly Ron Smith's experience early in our match against the O'Rourke team when he racked up a succession of overtricks in partscores. "This never happens when I'm in game and *need* it at rubber bridge." Soon afterward it was my turn to put Ron's dictum to the test. I was declarer with the South hand.

Roger Bates led the ♠2. Ron won the king and made the excellent return of a low spade, threatening my trumps. I ruffed with the 9 and led a low diamond. Perhaps you might care to visualize what you need for the contract if Roger rises with a diamond honor and plays the ♠Q.

Ron knew exactly what the answer to that question was – the hand he held

♠ A K 7 5 4 ♥ J 4 ♦ K 7 3 ♣ 10 6 3.

I could take the second tap, knock out the ♦K and ruff the fourth round of spades with the queen. After cashing the ace and king of trumps, felling Ron's jack, I could play the ♣5 to the queen and draw the last trump with dummy's 8. Finally, I would re-enter hand with the ♣A to enjoy the good 10-9 of diamonds for my contract.

I'm sure Ron was thinking "and *only* when the opponents play a thin game."

Defensive problem

Here is what you can see as West on this deal from the Spingold:

Joey Silver, playing on the Jeff Aker team, found the best defense. He led a top club against 4♥, and partner followed high showing no great interest in diamonds. Declarer won and returned the ♥Q. Do you win or duck?

Joey took the ♥A and shifted to a spade. When declarer finessed, Debby Rosenberg won her ♠K and shifted to a diamond. Now declarer had no chance.

At my table West ducked the ♥Q, and I won to take the spade finesse. East won and shifted to a diamond, but I could take this with the ace and ruff dummy's last spade. When West was thrown in with the ♥A, he had to offer a ruff-suff or give me a trick in either minor while I still had a heart entry back to hand.



Steve Gross passes 10,000-point mark

When Steve Gross of Ventura CA arrived here for the tournament, he needed about 65 points to go over 10,000 masterpoints. Yesterday in the Morning Knockouts he got the last points he needed to reach 10,000.

Gross has been playing bridge a long time – he took up the game when he was 12. His first major victory was in the Teener Pairs at a Chicago NABC back in the Fifties. The victory was worth one and a half points – a big deal to the 14-year-old.

He had a really good partner when he was at UCLA – he and Grant Baze won the Intercollegiate Championship one year. He also finished second in one of the pair events at the World Championships in Albuquerque in 1994. He has won almost 100 regional events.

His regular partner these days is Ellen Anten of Los Angeles. Anten started playing six years ago and she already has more than 3500 points. Other partners Gross has had many games with over the years include John Fix and Bob Bass.

Two wrongs sometimes do produce a right

Misunderstandings don't always wind up as bottoms. Once in a while they result in spectacular tops – just ask Bill August who was surprised to wind up as declarer in a slam on this deal.

 Confused? Of course you are. South's 2♦ was negative and his 3♦ bid was a transfer to hearts. But North forget that transfers were on in a sequence like this and went on in notrump.

South, August, felt his hand would produce no tricks in notrump (actually it would have produced a lot of tricks), so he ran to 4♥. North, still believing that 3♦ showed diamonds, took 4♥ as an invitation, and he accepted by bidding 6♦. August corrected to 6♥, and that became the final contract.

Count South's tricks – six hearts, three spades, one diamond and one club – a total of 11. August saw only one hope – finesse for the ♠J. As you can see, it worked! As a result of two bids that were totally misconstrued, August and partner got to an incredible contract – and made it!

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place at the right time," said Grove, who spends much of his day in the Tournament Headquarters office. Schedule sheets and walkie-talkies help coordinate the TDs to make sure every game – from morning pairs to midnight knockouts, from Intermediate/Newcomer events to the Spingold – is appropriately staffed.

Weinstein described his work in Anaheim as, "super-vising space allocation for the various events. I also directly interact with the Memphis staff to make sure everything runs according to plan." Weinstein, with the help of tournament coordinator Jeff Johnston from the Meeting Services Department of the ACBL, helps make sure that the hotels have the designated playing rooms set up, with the appropriate number of tables for each event. Everything from water stands to room temperature to making sure the tables aren't too close together to ...well, you name it, is under the purview of the Director-in-Charge.

This is the second NABC that Weinstein and Grove have worked together as chief directors. Weinstein noted, "Doug does much more of the work, in my opinion. He's very detail-oriented, and he's an expert when it comes to using spreadsheet software, which is invaluable in this position."

Weinstein and Grove are part of the six-person team responsible for running the NABCs. Chris Patrias and John Ashton are the DICs for the Spring NABCs, while Millard Nachtwey and Betty Bratcher run the Fall tournaments.

Wedding

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Alan and Suzanne met when Alan first came to California 12 years ago and attended the San Diego Easter regional. He remembers he had to break their first date – he was called upon to preside over an ethics hearing.

They became bridge partners, and they still play regularly at local clubs and sectionals. Here at Anaheim they are going to be part of one of the teams in Mixed Teams this weekend.

Alan is co-owner of the Barrington Bridge Club, a past chairman of the Board of Governors and a past co-chairman of the NABC Tournament Appeals Committee. Suzanne, a Gold Life Master who took up bridge in the early 80s, is a past president of the Westwood Unit.

Fast Open Pairs premiers Thursday

The newest NABC+ event, the Fast Open Pairs, will begin on Thursday. The two-day contest features a two-session qualifier the first day and a two-session final on Friday. It will be held concurrently with NABC IMP Pairs.

The time limits for the Fast Open Pairs will be 11 minutes per session for two-board rounds or 16 minutes per session for three-board rounds. Please note that due to the nature of this contest, time limits will be strictly enforced. Penalties for slow play are mandated by the conditions of contest.

Additionally, conventions from the General Convention Chart only may be used. (The special exemption for Mid-Chart defenses to INT that are being allowed here in Anaheim does not apply to the Fast Open pairs.)

Please note that the starting times for this event will be 1 and 4:30 p.m. each day.

Defenses to 1NT

At this NABC, in General Convention Chart events, the Board of Directors has voted to allow constructive defenses to 1NT openings, even when those defenses do not contain a known suit.

Since these are Mid-Chart conventions, it is the responsibility of the pair playing these methods to pre-alert the opponents and to provide a suggested defense.

In order to help players counter these methods successfully, the tournament is making available copies of an article on the subject, written by Marinesa Letizia, that appeared previously in the ACBL *Bridge Bulletin*. Look for "Counter-Defense to Interference vs. 1NT Opener" in the rooms where General Convention Chart events are played.

The Facts: 6NT made six, plus 1440 for E/W. The opening lead was the ♠K. 3♥ was intended as a splinter bid in support of clubs. South bid RNCB for hearts and then 5♦ to ask about the ♥Q. North, believing that clubs were trump, decided he would not show the ♣Q. Before the opening lead was made, North told the opponents about the failure to Alert. The Director was called. E/W believed that the failure to Alert could have influenced North to not show the ♣Q. The Director ruled that even if North had shown the ♣Q, South would never have had an auction ending at the seven-level because South knew that an ace was missing. The table result was allowed to stand.

The Appeal: E/W appealed the Director's ruling. They believed that there was a fair chance that North would have bid at the seven-level if the 3♥ bid had been Alerted. North said that he had decided to not show his ♣Q because he had only three clubs. South said that he believed hearts were trump but in any case would never bid over 6NT because he knew that an ace was missing.

The Committee Decision: The Committee decided that even if North had bid 6♦ over 5♦ the auction would have proceeded 6♥ - 6♠ - 6NT - Pass. The table result was allowed to stand. The Committee assessed a procedural penalty of 2 IMPs against N/S for violating Law 73C ("When a player has available to him unauthorized information . . . he must carefully avoid taking any advantage that might accrue to his side.")

The Facts: 2♠ made two, plus 110 for N/S. The Director was called after dummy was displayed. South believed she had made a support double. North did not believe that anyone played support doubles after 1NT overcalls. North was unsure as to the meaning of the double. The Director allowed the table result to stand since neither East nor West had any clear action.

The Appeal: E/W appealed the Director's ruling. North and West were the only players to attend the hearing. West believed that had he known South was making a support double, he might have bid 2NT. He believed that North should not have removed the double. North said that South was a relatively inexperienced player (a student of his, though a Life Master). He had explained at the table that his partner might have meant the double as Support, though he wasn't sure. He believed that removing the double was the right action with his hand.

The Committee Decision: The Committee believed that North went out of his way to explain the possibilities for his partner's double, that it was possibly meant as a Support Double, and that she was relatively inexperienced. At this point E/W could have asked North to leave the table and had South explain the intent of the double. The Committee believed that the decision North had made to bid 2♥ could just as well have worked out badly for his side. The result was "rub of the green" for E/W. The Committee allowed the table result to stand and believed the appeal just barely met the standard of having merit because N/S were not totally clear on their agreement.

The Facts: 4♥ went down two, plus 200 for E/W. The opening lead was the ♣K. After the hand was complete, the Director was called because the double of 2♣ had not been Alerted. East had meant his double as Stayman. West took the double to mean clubs. The Director determined through extensive questioning that even though E/W had been playing together for 20 years, they had not discussed this auction and, therefore, had no agreement. The Director allowed the table result to stand.

The Appeal: N/S appealed the Director's ruling and were the only players to attend the hearing. They each had played their partner to have club shortage because of the opponents' bidding and otherwise would not have bid 4♥.

The Committee Decision: The Committee accepted the Director's representation that E/W did not have an agreement. The table result of 4♥ down two, plus 200 for E/W, was allowed to stand. The Committee also discovered that this appeal had not been screened. The Committee had every reason to believe that if management had provided proper screening and explained the appropriate laws to the appellants, this appeal would have been withdrawn. For these reasons, the Committee did not assess an Appeal Without Merit Penalty Point.

District 22: 30 years of service

District 22 covers the width of California from Monterey and Modesto on the north to the Mexican border on the South, less Los Angeles County. This vast area currently boasts 27 units and 6,917 members.

The first meeting of District 22's board of directors was held Nov. 14, 1970. During its 30-year history, four men have served as District 22's representative to the ACBL Board of Directors.

Alfred B. Gilpin (1915-1984) of Riverside CA was the first District Director, serving from 1969 to 1975. "Big Al" also served two terms as president of the Western Conference and was a member of the Western Conference assembly for nine years.

Gilpin was a bridge teacher and club director who was a member of the ACBL Board of Governors from 1964 to 1982 and served as vice chairman from 1980 to 1982. He retired from the U.S. Civil Service Commission where he had been project head of the Navy's air-launched missile program.

Sydney A. Levey Jr. (1927-1999) of Valley Village CA succeeded Gilpin and served on the board of directors from 1975 to 1987. He was ACBL president in 1982 and chairman of the board in 1983.

Levey was born and brought up in Honolulu. He graduated from the University of San Francisco in 1950 and became a certified public accountant - and a bridge player.

A Diamond Life Master with more than 13,000 masterpoints, Levey won many regional events and represented the ACBL in international competition in Biarritz, France in 1982 and in Bal Harbour FL in 1986.

He served as a member of the Western Conference Board of Directors from 1962 to 1965, as chairman of the assembly in 1965 and as conference president from 1984 to 1985.

Levey was ACBL treasurer in 1979 and 1980. He was chairman of the ACBL Systems and Convention Committee and chairman of the Finance Committee. He was also a member of the National Board of Governors and the National Goodwill Committee.

Levey did not seek reelection in 1987. He was succeeded by **Frank H. Sweeney Jr.** of La Jolla, a retired CPA and graduate of the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business.

Sweeney was re-elected in 1990 and 1993. He was a member of the District 22 Board of Directors from 1982 to 1987, president of the Western Conference in 1991 and a past president of Unit 526 (La Jolla & Beach). He is a member of the National Goodwill Committee.

Sweeney did not seek reelection in 1996. He was succeeded by **Jim Kirkham** of San Bernardino, a Grand Life Master who was won more than 17,000 masterpoints. He and his wife, Corinne, won the Silver Ribbon Pairs at the 1999 Spring NABC in Vancouver and the Senior Swiss Teams at the 1999 Summer NABC in San Antonio.

Kirkham, a retired U.S. Marine officer, is a former president of District 22 who has been a tournament manager and member of various unit and district boards since 1968. He is a member of the National Goodwill Committee.

consisted on one from the ABA and one from the ACBL. Competitors had their choice of where their points would be recorded – ABA or ACBL.

The united front will continue at the ABA Nationals in Reno next March when there will be another ABA/ACBL game. Plans are under way also for another such game at the Birmingham NABC in November.

ABA/ACBL games are not new, but these are the first at the national level. There have been many grass-roots games co-sponsored by the two organizations. And players from either organization are always welcome at tournaments of either group.

Excellent cooperation already exists between the two bridge organizations in the directing field. The Club Director courses are offered to ABA directors free of charge – the usual charge is \$100. Three ABA directors took the course here – Roz Dixon, Ted Brown and Calvin Dunn. Four ABA members also are accredited ACBL tournament directors – Annease Comer, Marvin Comer, Mary Duncan and Andrew Echols.

Four ABA Juniors also took part in the ACBL Bridge Camp activities earlier this month.

Further cooperation between ACBL and ABA is likely in other areas such as the Internet, scoring, laws, seeding, etc.

Olympic work goes on, Silber reports

David Silber, ACBL CEO, had this to say at the close of the ABA/ACBL meeting yesterday.

Bridge has some very good friends at the Olympic international level. The most influential is Marc Holder, president of the Switzerland Bridge Federation, who also is vice president of the International Olympic Committee (IOC). Holder is working with Jose Damiani, president of the World Bridge Federation, to keep the bridge agenda in front of the IOC.

One of our biggest problems is Salt Lake City, host to the 2002 Winter Olympics. The organizers there are having so many problems that it is difficult to get their attention. Holder and Damiani are doing their utmost to have bridge included as a demonstration sport in Salt Lake City.

We are much more optimistic about the Winter Olympics in Turino, Italy. If there is any country in the world with a better national Olympic committee than Italy, I don't know which it would be. Italy is the best place in the world for the Olympics that year, as far as bridge is concerned. So if nothing happens in Salt Lake City, don't be discouraged.

Cell phones restrictions enacted

At its meetings this week, the ACBL Board of Directors has voted to restrict the use of cell phones and other similar equipment. The Board passed the following policy, effective immediately: "Except for health-related equipment or by permission of the Director-in-Charge of the tournament or event, cell phones, audible pagers, and similar electronic equipment may not be operated or operable in the playing area during a session of play at NABCs. All other ACBL tournament sponsors are strongly encouraged to adopt this policy."

Junior coupons

Junior players (25 and younger) may compete for only \$6.00 per player per session – but they need a Junior coupon for each player and session. The green coupons are available at the ACBL Information Desk, at the Intermediate-Newcomer selling station or from Charlotte Blaiss, ACBL, Director of Junior programs. The coupons are available only to Juniors who have not yet celebrated their 26th birthday and whose membership dues or Life Master service fee is current.

Late night change

With the starting times for prime-time sessions set for 1 p.m. and 7:30 p.m., starting times for late-night games have been moved from midnight to 11:30 p.m. This applies to Zip Swiss and Knockout Teams.

The only exception is the second Sunday (the last day of the NABC).

Red Ribbon Pairs vie for Bean Trophy

Play begins today in the Red Ribbon Pairs, an event in which qualification is required.

Players earn qualification by placing first or second overall in regionally-rated events of at least Flight B status. Neither member of a qualifying pair may hold more than 1500 masterpoints at the time of qualification.

The four-session event began in 1986 and winners have their names inscribed on the Percy X. Bean Trophy.

Bean Trophy

The trophy was designated by the ACBL Board of Directors in 1996 to honor Bean, ACBL president in 1972 and chairman of the Board in 1973.

Bean (1916-1992) represented District 19 on the Board from 1964 until 1988 and served as president of the ACBL Charity Foundation from 1974 until 1981. He was a member of the National Goodwill Committee and the National Board of Governors and general chairman of arrangements for the World Team Olympiad in Seattle in 1984.

Bean and his wife Anne were named ACBL Honorary Members for 1992, the first time that honor was bestowed on a husband-wife combination.

Bean was the editor of Mad, Mad World of Bridge, a publication that strongly championed players of less than expert class.
