## 81st Fall North American Bridge Championships

## DeMartino, Milner in Senior Knockout final

The team captained by Richard DeMartino, down by 44 IMPs with a quarter to go, staged a huge rally in the final set to defeat the Carolyn Lynch squad win by 5 IMPs. That earned DeMartino a spot in the final against the Reese Milner squad, who came from behind against Hamish Bennett and company.

DeMartino, who represents NABC host District 25 on the ACBL Board of Directors, is playing with John Stiefel, Geoffrey Brod and Pat

McDevitt. Milner's team is Sam Lev, Fred Chang, Matt Granovetter, P.O. Sundelin and John Carruthers.

The DeMartino team held a 6-IMP lead at the halfway point of the match with Lynch but suffered a 63-13 pasting in the third quarter. DeMartino turned the tables on their opponents in the last set, winning 63-14.

Milner trailed 93-84 with a quarter to go but won the final set 30-15.

## Wolpert, Smith lead Blue Ribbon qualifiers

Gavin Wolpert, Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs winner three years ago, and Ron Smith, who won the event in 1979, had two solid games in the first two qualifying sessions to take the lead by less than a board.

Wolpert won the event at the Fall NABC in

Denver with Jenny Ryman, now his wife. Smith won at the Cincinnati NABC with Bobby Levin.

In second place after two sessions were Michael Rosenberg and Richard Zeckhauser, followed closely by Brian Senior and Nigel Bird of England.

## Head to Sanremo for sun tans and grand slams

If a trip to the Mediterranean coast of Italy next summer appeals to you and you want to include some bridge play with a world championship atmosphere, Gianarrigo Rona has a suggestion - the 4th European Open Bridge Championships in Sanremo, June 12-27, 2009.

Rona, president of the European Bridge League, is visiting Boston during the Fall NABC with two objectives in mind - promoting the tournament in Sanremo and making contact with other bridge officials.

The European championships were first opened to all players in 2003, in Menton, France, not far from the Sanremo venue. Two other tournaments - in Tenerife, Canary Islands, and Antalya, Turkey - attracted many stars from around the world.

The tournament will be run on a typical European schedule: Most events are played in a
longer, single session starting about 10:30 a.m., leaving evenings free for dining and other activities. All events are transnational and there are no restrictions on the number of entries per national bridge organization.

The scheduled events are Mixed Teams; Mixed Pairs;

## The king? That costs a trick! By J an van Cleeff

When Jan Jansma gives you a hand, you had better be sharp. Before you know, he destroys your analysis and makes fun of you. This one, from Sunday's Mitchell Open Board-a-Match Teams qualifying session, is typical:

West led the 10 , denying the jack. Dummy played low.
"What card do you play?" Jansma asked. "What's wrong with the king?" I replied. My answer, of course, was naïve, since Jansma is never looking for the obvious. He cheerfully continued: "The king? That costs a trick!"

Still, I had no clue what he was aiming at. Should I play low then? Letting declarer win his jack? Jansma showed the full deal (spots approximate):

From East's point of view, natural defense would be cashing two top spades and then switching to clubs. In this case, that would cost a trick because a heart loser would disappear on a high club. A timely heart switch, however, would lead to the all-important extra undertrick. But how could East know?

Louk Verhees, Jansma's partner, showed the way. He took the first trick with the ace and cashed his king as well. Jansma rightfully understood the message (suit preference for hearts). And then it was his turn to do something intelligent: he contributed the 9 . Verhees immediately knew what to do. He tabled a heart.

True, East-West can win 11 tricks in spades, but that is hindsight.

## NABC Insider

At the Chicago NABC in the Summer of 2006, Kathy Benjamin came into the Bulletin office to say she was to be one of the co-chairs of the Boston NABC. She had some great ideas for the tournament and was wondering how she could work with ACBL to implement these plans. She and her co-chair, Frank Lombardo, have worked tirelessly since then to put together a team of local volunteers to make those plans the reality you are enjoying this week. The two of them do not agree on any political contest from the presidency to the dog catcher, but they do agree on what it takes to put on a successful bridge tournament. The results speak for themselves. It has been a pleasure working with both of them as well as the scores of helpers they have enlisted.

The Insider also wants to thank the Tournament Services crew. These four guys arrive a couple of days before the tournament to unload 21 tons of equipment needed to put on an NABC , they set everything in place, work throughout the tournament to be sure everything runs smoothly and then pack things to send back to Memphis. They had several special circumstances in Boston that tested even their expertise. First, the equipment that was to arrive on Friday was delivered on the following Monday. Then, the truck that arrived at the Marriott was loaded with everything intended to go to the Westin. Then, when that trailer was re-directed for later delivery to the Westin, it wouldn't fit through the door to the loading dock and had to be unloaded by hand, at night, in a cold drizzle at the end of a 12 -hour day. And after all of that, they were back at it early the next morning. If you run into Martin, Brian, David or Ken, thank them for a job well done - one they won't finish until 5 a.m. next Monday.

## Bid Box Alerts and Announcements

When using bid boxes, ACBL suggests that players tap the Alert strip and say "Alert" at the same time.

When making an Announcement, use the Announcement word - such as "transfer" - and tap the Alert strip at the same time.

A player who Alerts or Announces a bid should make sure his opponents are aware that an Alert or Announcement has been made.

## (1)J UST FOR NEW PLAYERS

## Director, please

## By Bruce Greenspan

If you are new to duplicate, calling the director brings back thoughts of being sent to the principal's office in junior high school. You've done something wrong, and now it's time to pay the piper. This is not the case at all.

The director is there to explain the rules and options and guarantee that both sides receivable an equitable result. Even
 the best players occasionally do something that requires a director. If you need the director, raise your hand and politely - but loudly enough to be heard - say, "Director, please."

Don't try to sort things out at the table. You may have options available that are quite helpful. Here's an example from an actual occurrence.

My partner opened $1 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$. The next player, thinking about dinner or something equally important, did not notice. He bid 1v. At that point we asked for the director. I held:

If there is an insufficient bid, the first option is to accept it. I accepted the bid and now I bid $1 \boldsymbol{A}$. Partner then knew that I had three spades but a hand that wasn't even good enough to bid at the two level.

Here are a couple of other tips. Always put the opening lead face down on the table and ask partner, "Any questions?" Partner may ask the opponents any questions regarding the bidding, or he just might say that it's his lead, so you can put the card back in your hand without having committed an infraction. You can never lead out of turn if you put the card face down.

If you are in the passout seat, meaning that the auction will end if you pass, do not ask the opponents questions about the bidding. If these questions suggest a lead to partner, the opponents will call the director and you may be penalized. Wait until partner makes the opening lead face down on the table. Now you can ask. Even better, wait until it's your turn to play.

During the auction, if you have no intention of bidding, ask no questions. Don't let the
opponents wake one another up. They may forget an agreement and end up in a terrible contract.

Once the bidding is complete and you're on lead, ask away. Make sure you completely understand the bidding.

As declarer, you are entitled to know the defensive methods employed by the opponents, although in the newcomer games you probably will not encounter much that is esoteric. For example, don't assume that if you are declaring a notrump contract that the opponents are leading fourth best. I play attitude leads. This means if I lead a low card it tells partner to return the suit. A high card says you may return this suit, but look around to see if there is something better.

Players are not allowed to have secret agreements. Make sure you receive a full explanation for any aspect of the opponents' bidding or defensive agreements. For example, partner opens 1 NT and the

You ask what your left-hand opponent what it means and he just says, " DONT." That is not a sufficient explanation. If he says that the bid shows diamonds and a higher-ranking suit, you have all the information that is required.

A bid is

invitational and shows 20-21 HCP. Partner could have nothing! As South, you have enough to accept partner's invitation.

Defensive commentary: As East, start a high-low in hearts. On the third heart, discard the * 2 .
You need partner to play a fourth heart to promote your $\boldsymbol{A} \mathrm{J}$, so make a negative discard in
clubs, the suit partner is likely to lead.
Defensive commentary \#2: As West, honor partner's discard of the $\& 2$, telling you nothing doing there. If there is nothing doing in clubs, the only hope is that partner has the a J , in which case you must lead a fourth round of hearts for a trump promotion.

When making a discard in a situation where you need a trump promotion and want partner to give declarer a ruff and sluff, discard negatively in a suit partner is likely to want to lead (clubs). Don't waste a discard in a suit (diamonds) partner is unlikely to want to lead in any case.

overall finishers. Players entering four events receive a $25 \%$ discount on the entry fees.

The hotels, including one five-star and two four-star properties, will offer a special bridge rate for tournament participants.

Rona said the Palafiore Convention Center, a converted flower market, is a modern facility that is fully air conditioned, as are the host hotels.
"We hope to have top players from the U.S.," said Rona. "We are interested in quality as well as quantity, but all players are welcome."

Sanremo, he said, is a half hour's drive from Monaco, where one of the world's most famous casinos is located. Also within easy driving distance is Genova (Genoa), and Milano is relatively close.
"It's a good place for a family vacation," Rona said.

He added that he is encouraged to note that several top players, including Jeff Meckstroth and Eric Rodwell, have already made reservations at the tournament. They won the Open Pairs at Menton in 2003.

For more information, including registration, you can e-mail ebl@federbridge.it.

Rona's other goal was to meet with ACBL board members, including the new ACBL representatives to the World Bridge Federation. He is also interested in promoting more cooperation between the EBL and the ACBL, especially in the area of technology. "I hope we can learn from each other," Rona said.

The EBL president said he would like to see some personnel exchanges, perhaps with EBL tournament directors working at ACBL tournaments, with a reciprocal arrangement in Europe for ACBL TDs.

Rona said that in late January and early February there will be a conference in Rome for bridge officials and that the ACBL will be invited to send representatives. One of the key topics for discussion, he said, will be advances in technology.

Ultimately, Rona said, he hopes that the ACBL, EBL and WBF will find a way to work together for the advancement of bridge. "We need to be a real team," he said. "It is the only way to go forward in my opinion."

## Misbid (some of) these hands with me

There is no doubt that slam bidding is one of the most testing areas of the game, even for experienced partnerships. Here are a few adventures from the final of the Mitchell Open Board-a-Match Teams.

With East-West competing so vigorously in spades, all South's high cards rated to be useful, hence the jump to $6 \star$.

On a spade lead, declarer ruffs, draws trumps, plays four rounds of clubs, ruffing when the suit fails to divide and then ruffs a spade. Now, with West counted for a 6-4-2-1 distribution, declarer plays the jack of hearts from dummy, running it if East plays low. When West wins and returns a heart declarer has a decision to make, but should probably get it right.

You have the South cards and we can treat this as a two-part problem. First, what do you do if West passes and your partner opens $3 \vee$ ? Second, suppose the opening bid is $4 \vee$ ?

In the first case, there is no real reason to do more than raise to game, as for a slam to be good you probably need partner to not only have very good trumps - say, seven to the A-K - but also a second-round diamond control.

In the second case you might simply jump to $6 \boldsymbol{v}$, but there must be some risk (and there are others) that a diamond lead will be awkward unless partner has a control in that suit. One way to find out is to bid $5 \boldsymbol{\&}$ over $4 \vee$. That asks partner to cuebid a first-round diamond control, or jump to 6 with a second round control.

If you wanted a spade control you would bid $5 \bullet$ over $4 \vee$ - once again bidding the suit below the one that you need partner to control.

However, this is not a perfect solution, as if partner has eight hearts to the A-K and two low diamonds, you clearly want to be in $6 \vee$. But give South two low diamonds and this neat convention may be the only way to reach a laydown slam.

On this occasion, as you will see when I reveal the full deal, anything other than $4 \vee$ is too high if East leads a diamond:

If you do anything other than play a club, declarer can get home. For example, suppose you switch to a heart. Declarer wins in hand and knocks out the king of diamonds. He wins the return in dummy, cashes a top spade, unblocks the diamonds, comes to hand with a heart and cashes the $\downarrow 10$. With all the vital black cards, West has no defense.

## Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6-board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

## Notice to players

Each player must have an ACBL convention card filled out and on the table. Please note that other types of convention cards, such as the WBF convention card or homemade cards that do not sufficiently resemble the ACBL convention card, are not acceptable substitutes.

1968, spent his professional career practicing law at his firm in Walnut Creek CA, specializing in water law. He represented governmental agencies and private land owners in real estate litigation involving water issues. He is now semi-retired.

In the world of bridge, Polisner may be best known for his service as ACBL Counsel from 1985 to 2000. Since leaving that position, he has been counsel for the World Bridge Federation.

Polisner, however, has served the game in a variety of roles. He is a past unit and district president, and served several terms on the ACBL Board of Governors. His true interest, however, has been the legal and ethical issues in bridge, leading him to serve as the first chair of the ACBL Disciplinary Committee, as a member of the ACBL Ethical Oversight Committee, as vicechairman of the National Appeals Committee and as a 25 -year member of the ACBL Laws Commission.

At the table, Polisner has three second-place finishes in national-level contests, and held the rank of WBF World Master in 1986. Polisner has two grown children and two grandchildren.

Speaking of the new Honorary Member, ACBL District Director Joan Gerard said, "When a star player like Jeff volunteers his time, it's special. He gave the ACBL the benefit of his knowledge for many years."

In a phone interview, Polisner said, "My hope for bridge is that we are able to make bridge acquire the status of an Olympic sport. Because we all know the survival of the game is dependent on getting young people involved, especially after we have missed several generations since the game's peak in the Fifties, we have to make it attractive for youth. One way to do this is through cooperation with other 'mind sports' (such as what we saw at the world championships in Beijing with games like chess and Go) to show the world that there's a venue for people to compete intellectually, not just physically."

We assume a normal Mitchell movement （the wording of the problem precludes a Howell）．Since the obnoxious man was entering a score into the traveler，he must have been sitting North．But if North was dealer on the last board of the round，it couldn＇t have been a two or four－board movement，because North only deals odd－numbered boards．So we assume a three－board movement．In that case， the only time North is dealer at unfavorable vulnerability on the last board of a round would be on Board \＃21．

## Notice to players who live outside North America

Participation in the Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs and the 0－5000 Mini Blue Ribbon Pairs is limited to those ACBL members who have earned a Blue Ribbon qualification（or for those members on the Lifetime Top 100 masterpoint list）．

Foreign players who do not meet this criteria， but feel they are otherwise eligible，must receive a waiver prior to the commencement of these contests．Note that waivers for qualified foreign players will be given only for the Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs and not the 0－5000 Mini－Blue Ribbon Pairs．

Declarer played dummy＇s diamonds，pitching a spade from hand，and West had no answer．West tried baring the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} \mathrm{K}$ ，but declarer made no mistake，playing a spade to the ace，dropping the king and scoring the slam．

Alas，the 13 IMPs won wasn＇t quite enough to win the match．

## Nov. 26: Rhode Island State Day

Rhode Island, whose official name is the "State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations," consists of five counties (Bristol, Kent, Newport, Providence and Washington), seven cities and 32 towns. Providence, Rhode Island's largest city and the state capital, was founded by Roger Williams in 1636. On May 4, 1776, Rhode Island was the first state to declare its independence from England - and the last of the 13 colonies to ratify the U.S. Constitution. Many buildings, including some private homes, date back to colonial times.

Rhode Island ranks 44th of the 50
 states in population and is the smallest state geographically.Yet, Rhode Island has more than 300 miles of coastline and many rivers and lakes within its borders. The most prominent feature of the state is Narragansett Bay, which contains many small islands. Block Island is located 10 miles south of the mainland. The western part of the state is heavily forested, containing many fresh water lakes, ponds and rivers that appeal to the non-seafaring visitor. Historic features include the Blackstone River, considered to be the first industrial river in the state, and the first textile mill in America standing along the banks of the river in Pawtucket. The mill has been converted into a museum.

For bridge trivia enthusiasts our state has something special to share. According to the bridge encyclopedia, Harold S. Vanderbilt of Newport, Rhode Island, was the man who revised the scoring principles of auction bridge into the modern game of contract bridge enjoyed by millions today. Many of the early bidding systems were attributed to Vanderbilt. ## Boston 1999: A look back

This is the fifth NABC held in Boston. The Fall of 1999 was the last time an NABC was here, and there were 12,749 tables in play. The previous Boston NABCs were all Summer affairs: 1970, 1981 and 1990.

It was announced that John Mohan was the Player of the Year, winning 832.78 platinum masterpoints at the three NABCs. Chip Martel was named Honorary Member for 2000. Glenn Smith was announced as the 2000 ACBL president. Two players were inducted into the ACBL Hall of Fame: George Rosenkranz and Meyer Schleifer. Jeff Meckstroth was named Player of the Decade.

The final of the Internet World Championship was held in Boston. Without ever touching a card, a United States team defeated a Russian squad 123-69. The U.S. team was Paul Soloway, Eric Rodwell, Marty Seligman, Doug Simson, John Schuler and Michael Crawford. The original field was 172 teams from 33 countries and played online at OKbridge.

Some of the familiar names who won the major events included: Mildred Breed, Shawn Quinn, Paul Soloway, Steve Catlett, the Lynn Baker team, the Rita Shugart team, Jill Meyers, John Mohan, Billy Eisenberg, David Berkowitz and Larry Cohen.

$4 \checkmark$ by South is not such an unreasonable spot, is it? West led the $\bullet$ Q, low, king and taken by the ace. West is "known" to be $7-1$. I led a heart from

hand and West showed out - ugh! Not to worry - I would still be well placed if the spades were $3-2$. I put in the $\vee \mathrm{J}$ and East won to return another heart.

I cashed the top hearts, and then cashed the spade king (West dropping the 10) and another spade to my ace. I intended to cash the $\vee 10$ and play winners. Sooner or later, East would ruff and be endplayed in clubs. Spades were 4-1, however, with East holding four. Because West was now known to be 7-5 in the minors, I could still hope to cash three clubs with the aid of the finesse. Again, East could ruff in, but would be endplayed to lead a spade into the tenace. When I took the club finesse, however, East won the $\approx$ Q (doubleton), and I was one down. The spade endplay still held my losses to minus 50, but it was yet another case of what might have been.

You have three top losers in aces and kings, not to mention a couple of finesses. Well, consider $5 \bullet$. All you need is a $7-1$ club split with West holding the stiff ace - not too much to ask for, is it? Then on a top club lead and a heart shift, you win in hand, draw trumps with the aid of the finesse, and take the spade finesse. So long as the $\rightarrow Q$ is onside and the suit splits, $3-3$, you can dispose of your club loser on the fourth spade.

How likely is the game to make? Well, a conservative estimate comes to $.0005 \%$. And, of course, if all that comes home, your partner will point out that 3NT would have fetched plus 430!

While a fair percent of the field reached $4 \boldsymbol{A}$ on this deal with mixed success, $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ was a sensible partscore:

The $\& 6$ was the usual lead from West, and declarer usually put up the king to muddy the waters. When East takes the ace, he has the problem of whether to play to give partner a ruff or cash the hearts. It looks reasonable to return a club, I think.

Now declarer takes the \&J and has to decide what to do next. Obviously, he has two potential winners in dummy for his heart losers. If diamonds are $3-3$, he might emerge with 11 tricks, but if he plays for 11 , he might finish with only nine winners. For example, if he tests diamonds and the suit is $4-2$, he might not get the discard on the club in time.

The best play is to enlist the opposition's help by leading the $\uparrow$ before cashing the $\uparrow \mathrm{A} \mathrm{K}$. Both defenders can be relied on to give count, assuming their partner has the $\star$. When the suit seems to be 3-3, declarer can cash the top spades, play two more rounds of diamonds and follow with the «Q. When the same hand is long in both black suits, declarer can discard both his hearts for a valuable extra trick.

## Stansby top MP earner at '07 Fall NABC

Lew Stansby earned 375.28 masterpoints at the Fall NABC in San Francisco, more than any other player in the tournament, to win the Lou Herman Trophy, given in recognition of the feat.

As a member of the winning squad in the Mitchell
 Open Board-a Match Teams, Stansby earned 140 points. Playing with the same squad, he finished second in the Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams for 150 points. A ninth-place finish in the Nail Life Master Pairs netted him an additional 35.71 masterpoints, and his 14th-place effort in the Blue Ribbon Pairs provided another 49.57 points. Stansby, however, is the last winner of the Herman Trophy: It is being re-christened as the Paul Soloway Trophy and will be awarded annually to the Player of the Year for the individual who earns the most Platinum points in a year.

The new trophy that will be given in honor of the top masterpoint winner at the Fall NABC will now be called the Goren Trophy.

## Go to your room to sleep

The NABC organizing committee and the host hotels have requested that bridge players refrain from sleeping in any of the public areas.

## Tournament Terminology 101

If you're confused by the terms used to describe the different types of bridge events played at clubs and tournaments, you're not alone. Here's a list of common bridge events with explanations.

Knockout Teams: an event in which a team (of four, five or six players - with four playing at a time) plays another team. The losers are eliminated or "knocked out" while the winners play other winners until only one winning team remains.

The length of a KO match may vary from a single session to a full day (the Vanderbilt and Spingold) to a multi-day event (the Bermuda Bowl).

Bracketed Knockout Teams: a KO event in which teams are divided into groups - usually of 8,16 or 32 teams - based on their masterpoint holdings. The top group - Bracket I - and all other groups compete in a separate event with their own set of winners.

Compact Knockout Teams: a shorter version of Bracketed KO teams.

Swiss Teams: an event in which a team (of four, five or six players - with four playing at a time) plays other teams in seven-, eight- or nineboard matches. Team A sits North-South at Table 1 and East-West at Table 2 while Team B sits EastWest at Table 1 and North-South at Table 2. The results are compared and scored by International Match Points (IMPs).

Pairings for the first round are random. Pairings for succeeding rounds are determined by a team's win-loss record or Victory Point total.

International Match Points (IMPs): the most common method of scoring Swiss Team matches. Scoring example: if Team A scores plus 620 for
bidding and making 4a on a particular deal and Team B scores only plus 170 (they didn't bid the game), the difference is 450 - which converts to 10 IMPs. The IMP chart is shown on the inside of your convention card.

Victory Points (VPs): a method of scoring Swiss Team matches. After the scores are compared and converted to IMPs, the IMP total is converted to Victory Points. A team's VP total may be used to determine its next opponents and its final standing.

Side Game Series: a series of single-session pair games that pay red points. These series include at least three sessions and may have as many as six. You may play in as many sessions as you like, but only pairs who play in at least two sessions are eligible for overall gold points. Your best two sessions are used for determining overall winners.

Flighted pairs: When flighting is used, the field is divided by expertise or experience or both into several separate games. Flight A "unlimited masterpoints" - will be open to all players while the remaining flights will be limited. Flight B might be $0-500$ MPs or $0-1000$ MPs while Flight C might be 0-300 or 0-500.

Each flight is scored individually, and masterpoint awards are made for each flight.

The masterpoint holdings of the players determine their flight. If one player is quite expert while his partner is new to the game, the pair must compete in Flight A.

In flighted events, you may play up but not down. That means you may play in Flight A or Flight B even if your masterpoint holding qualifies you for Flight C. Conversely, you may not play in Flight B or Flight C if you are a Flight A player.

Stratified Pairs: The idea is to compete against everyone but to be ranked only with your peers.

Each pair is assigned a stratum or "strat" based on the masterpoint holding of the partner with more masterpoints

Example: A = 1000+ masterpoints; $\mathrm{B}=300$ 1000; C = 0-300.

Thus, the most experienced players are placed in Strat A, intermediate players in Strat B and less experienced players in Strat C. Masterpoints are awarded for placings in all strats but gold points are awarded only in A and B.

The game proceeds normally - the difference comes when the scores are tabulated and ranked

In a three-strat game, the scores are ranked three times. The first ranking is done as in a regular open game. These are the Strat A results

If a B or C pair does well in this ranking, they receive full credit for that performance. It is not all that uncommon for a Strat C pair to place first overall, and they receive the full masterpoint award for that game.

Note: A pair is eligible for only one set of masterpoint awards and automatically receives the highest award.

The second ranking compares the scores of only the B and C pairs - the scores of the Strat A pairs are eliminated. Once again, if a C pair does well, they receive points for their finishing position in the Strat B results.

The third and final ranking compares the scores of only the C pairs - all the scores of the Strat A and B pairs are eliminated.

Strati-Flighted Pairs: The top group plays in a game of their own - Flight A. The rest of the field in divided into strats and plays as in a regular stratified pairs.

There can even be stratification within Flight A. Flight A may be listed as 3000+ MPs while Flight X may be listed as 0-3000 MPs.
