New foundation preserves, promotes game

A new foundation whose mission includes preserving bridge-related artifacts as well as promoting the game for future generations was launched during the Boston NABC. The Foundation for the Preservation and Advancement of Bridge is the name of the new organization and was created as a 501(c)3, meaning that donations made to it are tax deductible. All friends of bridge, especially ACBL members, are encouraged to give generously to the foundation.

Specifically, the Foundation for the Preservation and Advancement of Bridge will:

a. Collect through donation and purchase, items of interest to bridge players, including but not limited to bridge artifacts, works of art, literature, photographs, memorabilia and related materials which focus on the history of the game of bridge over time, its players, and those elected to the Bridge Hall of Fame.

b. Preserve the collections by adhering to professional archival standards with respect to conservation, preservation, storage and display, maintain a permanent record of holdings through documentation, authentication, study, research, cataloguing and publication as the Board of Trustees deems appropriate.

Zeiger promoted to National TD

Gary Zeiger, a fulltime ACBL tournament director since 1997, has been promoted to the rank of National Director. Zeiger, of Phoenix AZ, is well known to regional players in the Southwest. He is also the Assistant-in-Charge for the Fall NABCs as of last year in San Francisco, working with Director-in-Charge Millard Nachtwey. The duo will continue to be the lead team at the fall tournaments.

Fellow National TD Patty Johnson said, "Gary's talent has allowed him to come a long way in a short time. He is terrifically funny, and I

love to work with him. I'm proud to have him as a colleague."

Unlike many of the fulltime directing staff, Zeiger had no experience at the club level when he became a locally rated director in 1990. He worked part time at sectionals and regionals until 1997.

In April of 2002, Zeiger was promoted to Associate National Director.

Zeiger, 55, is married with one daughter.

Eric Rodwell and Jeff Meckstroth zoomed into the lead with a first final session of nearly 67% and went on to win the Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs by slightly more than a board on a 25 top.

Second place went to Martin De Knijff of Las Vegas and Frederic Wrang of Sweden. In third were Doug Doub and Adam Wildavsky.

The victory was Rodwell's third in the Blue Ribbon. He won in 1982 with Meckstroth and in 1985 with Walter Johnson. The win was the second for Meckstroth.

The winners started the day in eight place but posted a 66.69% game in the first final session to lead by about 32 matchpoints with one session to go.

The victory was the second North American championship the two have won in Boston. Earlier in the tournament, they teamed with Bob Hamman and Zia Mahmood to run away with the Mitchell Open Board-a-Match Teams.

Rodwell leading for Player of the Year

Eric Rodwell, with two firsts and a second in North American championships at this tournament, is the unofficial leader in the Player of the Year race for 2008 – and might just be a lock for the annual award for the player who earns the most platinum points.


Rodwell's chief competitor, Jeff Meckstroth, is his partner in the remaining event – the Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams – and therefore cannot catch him.

Meckstroth was leading in the Player of the Year race heading into the Fall NABC, but Rodwell took the lead when he and John Diamond finished second in the Nail Life Master Open Pairs while Meckstroth finished 14th with Perry Johnson.

- f. Honor by enshrinement those individuals who have or had exceptional and significant achievements in the game of contract bridge.
- g. Inspire youthful bridge players by means of honoring their achievements and supporting the participation of youth in bridge through scholarships and grants consistent with the purposes of the Foundation.

ACBL Chief Executive Jay Baum said, "The Foundation for the Preservation and Advancement of Bridge gives people with a passion for the game an opportunity to donate for a worthy cause. It helps to preserve what we have for future generations."

Bruce's top ten tips, part 1

The No. 1 rule of bridge: There are no rules, only guidelines. Rarely do I use the word never; this is an exception. Playing Standard American, if your partner opens a major, never jump to the three level in the same suit without at least four trumps. This is invitational, promising 11-12 points and at least four trumps. With three trumps, bid a new suit at the two level and then support partner. If partner has a minimum, play at the two level, not the three level.

- 1. Opponents bid 1NT 3NT. What is your opening lead?

- 4. You open 1NT (15-17) and partner responds 2NT, invitational. What do you bid with these two hands?

5. Partner leads the ♠K (from K Q) and you hold the ♠J 9 3. Assuming you want a spade continuation, what card do you play?

Answers

- 1. Don't automatically lead your fourth-best club. When you are on lead, first estimate how many points partner holds. In this case the answer is pretty easy - none. A club lead only helps declarer. Lead a spade. A passive lead is called for, and every time you get back in, lead another spade if you still have one. Don't give any tricks away.
- 2. Originally, my answer was 3NT. My reasoning was with a flat hand and no ruffing values, you'll probably make the same amount of tricks in notrump or spades. Two years

ago, I was program chairman of the American Bridge Teachers Convention. Four world class players – Jerry Helms, Zeke Jabbour, George Jacobs and David Lindop – discussed this question for 15 minutes. Their conclusion: "Do what's right."

3. There are three types of defensive signals – attitude, count and suit preference. Whenever there is a singleton or void in dummy and either partner's card is a winner or you can't beat the dummy, suit preference is the primary signal. In this case, a high club asks for a heart switch, a low club asks for a diamond switch, and a medium card says "Partner, you're on your own." Partner is signaling for a heart switch. The other time that suit preference comes into play is when you know you are going to give partner a ruff. A high card says come back in the higher-ranking non-trump suit, a low card says come back in the lower-ranking non-trump suit. With no preference, return a middle card.

- 4. When partner invites to game and you have 15 high-card points, pass. With 17 HCP, go to game. With 16 HCP, examine your hand for positive and negative features. Do you have a five-card suit or good intermediate cards (9s and 10s)? Negative features are flat hands where there are no possibilities for promoting tricks. In the two example hands, the first has nothing but high-card points. Pass 2NT. The other has two suits that could provide three or even four tricks. Bid game with that hand.
- 5. When partner leads an honor, attitude is the primary signal. Play the 9. It tells partner to keep on coming. The other alternative is to do a hand stand, but your opponents may call the director. You must be careful and watch the spots. If you lead the king and partner hold J-3-2, he is going to play the 3. Don't be fooled. If the 2 doesn't show, partner may be encouraging a continuation. Be wary, however. A good declarer doesn't follow with his lowest card in this situation.



Thinking bridge

Opening lead: *2.

Bidding commentary: South is strong enough to compete to 2♠ and West is strong enough to compete to 3♥. However, West's failure to make a game try over 2♠

(bidding anything other than 3♥), tells East to shut up! North has enough to bid game once South makes a peep at the two level.


Lead commentary: As West, a singleton lead stands out like a beacon when holding the trump ace. The idea is to find an entry to partner's hand after you get in with the \(A \).

Defensive commentary: As East, if you recognize the lead as a singleton, give partner

suit preference at trick one! A low club suggests diamond strength (typically the ace or king) a high club, heart strength (ace or king).

Play commentary: As South, draw trumps as soon as possible. There is no need to ruff hearts. The idea is to set up the dummy, the hand with the solid side suit. If you do, you don't have to worry about your heart losers. Just pretend North is the declarer.

Defensive commentary: As West, when in with the $\triangle A$, try the $\triangle A$. If partner signals encouragement, continue with a diamond to the king and ruff the club return. If partner discourages in diamonds, shift to a heart hoping partner has the ace. You have to find partner with one of those two cards, so rather than guess, give yourself two chances by starting with the $\triangle A$.

Rodwell and Meckstroth were on the winning squad in the Mitchell Open Board-a-Match Teams, then they won the Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs last night. Rodwell has earned 423.75 platinum masterpoints at this tournament.

In the Player of the Year race, Meckstroth is second with 783.02 points. Although all point totals are unofficial, no other player is within striking distance even with a 250-point payoff available for the winners of the Reisinger. Closest is Diamond, with 526.02. Even a Reisinger win would leave Diamond short of Meckstroth should the latter win no more masterpoints at the NABC.

Memorials and Sponsorships for Nov. 27 — Cape Cod Day

The memorials and sponsorships for Thursday's games were inadvertently omitted from yesterday's issue of the Daily Bulletin. With apologies, we present these memorials here.

On July 17, 1996, TWA Flight 800 crashed with my parents, Ruth and Edwin Brooks aboard. They were both bridge players and insisted that their four children learn how to play bridge during the Fifties. Dad had played constantly on his ship coming back from the Pacific and, according to him, "broke even" in 1945. I was the only one of the siblings who caught the "bridge bug" and I dragged my father kicking and screaming into tournament bridge. He was the most patient man I have every played with, but it became quite apparent that I had passed him in playing ability. He would come to visit in Rhode Island and play with my husband at the Bridge Club of Rhode Island and enjoyed the experience. Frank and I would play with Mom and Dad when we visited them on Martha's Vineyard, and it was always a pleasure!

Bridge was a part of my "growing up" and my parents were totally delighted when I became a Life Master. When I called home from Boston in 1982 my Dad said, "I knew you could do it!" I am delighted for the opportunity to have an event named after both of my parents at an NABC in our home state. *By Susan Mastrola*

I first met **Helene Lombardo** when she was a student nurse during my medical school days. We went on to enjoy a wonderful life together until her untimely death. A talented pianist and gourmet cook, a formidable tennis player and dedicated mother to our four great kids, she was also a very fine bridge player

and loved the game. She never attended tournaments, however, which she found "too serious," but thoroughly enjoyed playing afternoons with "the girls." She initiated a monthly fun-filled evening of dinner-and-bridge with three other couples that endured for two decades. She is remembered lovingly by Frank Lombardo and family.

Myles Walsh (1944-2008) lived on Cape Cod for 36 years. He was a kind and generous person who loved the sea, salt air and bridge. Myles sincerely enjoyed helping people with their bridge game, and he was extremely generous with his time and attention to details. He was always willing to play bridge with any level of partner.

Myles was an expert declarer and defender. He could read his opponents better than anyone in the bridge world. Myles won all his gold points playing in the Ethel Keohane Individual Tournament, which is played every January in the Boston area, winning the two-day tournament in 1985. In 1992, Myles started playing in the regional and national tournaments in the U.S., Bermuda and Canada with his wife, Margie Sullivan, who remains on the Cape today. (Margie won the Ethel Keohane Individual in 1995.) Myles and Margie had much success as a partnership and built a reputation on Cape Cod as the partnership to beat. Myles left the world of bridge as a Gold Life Master, only 265 points shy of being a Diamond Life Master (5000 points). He would want you to enjoy Thanksgiving Day and your bridge game today. Myles would tell you to, "Remember to read your opponents . . . they will tell you a lot about their hands!" Don't Miss the Swiss

Play begins today in the six-session **Keohane North American Swiss Teams**, with semifinal matches on Saturday and the final matches on Sunday.

Players will be vying for the Keohane Trophy, donated by Ethel Keohane in 1973 in memory of her husband, William H. Keohane, one of the leading New England bridge personalities.

Bill Keohane (1896-1972) was a consulting engineer, bridge teacher and bridge administrator. He served as chairman of the 1970 Summer NABC in Boston and, for many years, was chairman of the New England Individual Championship.

Keohane was elected in 1972 to a one-year term as the first District Director of the newly created District 25 (New England). He died later that year, just before he was to attend his first Board meeting.

The Keohane Trophy was presented for the Open Individual Championship until it was redesignated in 1995 by the ACBL Board of Directors for the North American Swiss Teams.

Electronic devices banned in national events

The ACBL Board of Directors approved a comprehensive ban on electronic devices for all national level events, but not to regional or Intermediate Newcomer contests:

Electronic devices, excluding health related equipment, capable of sending or receiving

communication, including but not limited to, headphones, earphones, cellular phones and minicomputers: (1) shall not be allowed in the playing areas, adjacent hallways, restrooms or accessible break areas; and (2) shall not be used during a session.

These restrictions shall apply to all pairs,

team members, captains, coaches, recorders and kibitzers and shall apply throughout any actual playing session or segment.

A violation of this policy shall result in a disciplinary penalty of one full board (or 12 IMPs at that form of scoring) for the first offense. A second offense shall result in disqualification from the event for the pair/team.

Kibitzers violating this policy shall be removed from the playing area for the remainder of the session.

Participants will be reminded not to approach the playing area with a personal electronic device in their possession, even if the device is turned off.

Cayne Team won 2007 Reisinger

The team captained by James Cayne came on strong in the second final session of the Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams to win the championship by nearly five boards.

The winners were Cayne, Michael Seamon and Italian stars Lorenzo Lauria, Alfred Versace, Fulvio Fantoni and Claudio Nunes.

Their final score of 35.55 was well ahead of the runners-up, led by Aubrey Strul, whose squad won the Mitchell Open Board-a-Match teams earlier in the tournament. Strul played with Mike Becker and teammates Chip Martel, Lew Stansby, Larry Cohen and David Berkowitz. The Strul team ended with a score of 30.79.

After the first final set, Cayne held a lead of less than half a board, but the squad scored 18.5 out of 26, better than 70%, to win going away.

The Reisinger

The event is contested for the Reisinger Trophy (the Chicago Trophy until 1965). It is a six-session open team-of-four event scored by board-a-match with two qualifying sessions, two semifinal sessions and two final sessions. It was contested as a four-session championship until 1966.

The event began in 1929 as the North American Open Team Championship and the prize was the Chicago Trophy, donated by the Auction Bridge Club of Chicago. (In 1928, the open team competition was for the Harold S. Vanderbilt Cup.)

The Chicago Trophy was replaced in 1965 by the Reisinger Memorial Trophy, donated by the Greater New York Bridge Association in memory of Curt H. Reisinger.

Reisinger (1891–1964), New York City, was a principal patron of contract bridge and the American Contract Bridge League in the early years of both.

Reisinger was a great-grandson of Anheuser and a grandson of Busch, co-founders of the brewery from which he inherited great wealth. That wealth enabled him to become a stalwart financial supporter of the game, as well as a noted philanthropist on a far larger scale.

In the years when there was often a struggle to meet the League's modest payroll, Reisinger was often called upon and never failed to help with a loan or an outright gift. His support made possible several early contract bridge tournaments, clubs and books.

Among the positions in which he served were director of the United States Bridge Association, president of the Greater New York Bridge Association and chairman of the ACBL. In 1953, Reisinger was named ACBL Honorary Member.

The Brain Sport By Arjai Barrington



On a cold November day in 1979, our family followed the moving van up the coast from San Francisco toward the soggy cultural wasteland of Seattle. Tony Bennett's "I left my heart in San Francisco" played in my mind as we drove.

We settled in Clyde Hill, just across the Evergreen Point Bridge from Seattle, where the Welcome Wagon

was our first visitor. They offered bridge as a club activity. I had only just finished a beginner's course, so I joined and began to play in the duplicate group.

There I met Penny. She told me she had been a few times to bridge clubs in Bellevue and Seattle where we could play every day if we liked and earn masterpoints.

"What are masterpoints?" I asked, displaying my ignorance. She said, "They are little slips of paper. You collect them at each game and send them to the American Contract Bridge League. If you get 300 masterpoints you will be a Life Master."

I liked the idea of becoming a master of something.

Penny had a temper (not uncommon with red hair) and intense blue eyes. With a purposeful manner she introduced me to club play, and we slowly began to collect the little slips of paper. Within three months, I had 12 slips totaling 4.30 masterpoints. I did the math and determined that at this rate of progress I would be a Life Master in a little over 18 years!

I had heard that the man with the most masterpoints in the world, Paul Soloway, was moving to the area and he had 39,000 masterpoints! I wondered if he sent in his points once a week or waited to collect a month's worth like I did? Whichever path he took, he spent a lot of money on stamps!

Sectional tournaments awarded extra points for winning. Paul was at my first sectional tournament in Seattle. I knew it was him, not only because I had seen his picture, but because he was the only player surrounded by kibitzers. As is the case with any celebrity, it was almost impossible to get near him. I wanted to ask if he thought the book I had chosen, Sheinwold's 5 Weeks to Winning Bridge, was the right one to start serious study of the game. But I couldn't get close enough to ask.

Although Penny and I didn't win many points at the tournament there was a big change coming in my bridge life. Donna, the Welcome Wagon bridge teacher, moved away. The club president asked me to take her place. She said, "I heard you have been getting lots of masterpoints, so I know you are a good player."

Little did she know! My protests that I was not qualified, had only a few masterpoints, and had never

taught anything but Sunday school had no effect. She persisted, "Arjai, you have a natural gift. Donna has volunteered to give you her teacher's manual and the club really needs you."

After all that, I could hardly refuse. So I began.

Within a few weeks I understood that I had found a way to make a difference in people's lives. My students were forming friendships and getting together to play. They were coming back for more lessons, and I loved my new job.

Of course, I realized I was a neophyte, so I taught the lessons exactly as put forth in the manual. Before each class, I set up hands to illustrate the day's lesson. I described ways to give parties with prizes for winners and losers. By the second class of a series I called the roll by memory, going table-by-table, one person at a time. This allowed me to acknowledge each student and help them to know each other's names.

Just like Sunday school, I taught the Golden Rule: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." In other words, play well but be nice. My goal was to give them enough training to hold their own and continue playing. If I could do that, I would be giving them a lifelong pleasure.

Meanwhile Penny and I played twice a week at the Bellevue club. We played in "open" games with no limits on masterpoints. Many of these players had reached Life Master status years ago and gone on to higher levels of bronze, silver and gold status. They used advanced techniques and conventions to reach their contracts. Their play was mind-boggling. I knew how to finesse for a queen, but they finessed for 9s!

These players both loved and hated to see us coming. They usually got a top score, but they might get a zero. We didn't know for sure what many of our bids meant, so they didn't either. We were notorious for overbidding our hands, and they punished us by doubling our contracts. Once we learned to double, we had a wonderful new weapon. On one occasion, Penny doubled the opponents, the next opponent passed and I doubled again! The illegal second double brought a director to the table. We kept the directors busy.

One day, we drove across the Evergreen Point Bridge to Seattle to play in an advertised "big game." When I saw Paul Soloway there, I felt a thrill of excitement, similar but different to the thrill I had felt a few months earlier when I was in an elevator with Omar Sharif at a regional. Sharif's great passion was bridge, but to me he would always be Dr. Zhivago.

The room was almost too small to accommodate the huge turnout. As we were leaving, Paul happened to be in line just behind us. Everyone was crammed together at the exit.

Penny and I were arguing over the meaning of a reverse bid. He must have felt sorry for us because he politely volunteered the explanation.

Penny, her blue eyes flashing, turned on him with a scowl as I frantically elbowed her. She ignored me, got right in the face of the most accomplished bridge player of our time and snapped, "I don't have to take lessons from you!"

Paul's face turned red. Just then the jam of players

loosened and we began to move, saving me a lifetime of embarrassment. I explained to Penny who Paul was on the way home. She said she was mortified.

I was beginning to see duplicate bridge as a sport – the brain sport – and I wanted to be in the big leagues with players like Paul Soloway.

A few weeks later, a Life Master named Bill agreed to a game with me. Bill had flaming red hair and was nicknamed "The Volcano" for good reason. He erupted at his partners when they erred. It was a large turnout with 14 tables. I didn't want to face an eruption, so I decided to be cool and cautious.

We won!

I declared triumphantly to Bill that all I needed was good partners like him and I would be a Life Master in no time. He leaned across the table and emphatically stated, "You are not a bridge player yet!"

During that same game I confided to another seasoned player that I was teaching bridge. He said, "You're teaching bridge?" He left the table smiling and shaking his head.

Bill said, "Arjai, you shouldn't tell anyone that." Playing in high-level games and listening to the after-game analyses of experts helped me realize not only how much there was to learn but the pleasures ahead for me. I began to better prepare myself.

After an apprenticeship with an experienced teacher, I studied hard and passed the American Bridge Teacher's Association test. Passing the director's course was another milestone. In teaching strictly by the book and relying on expert advice, I gave good instruction. But the actual teaching of my students was probably the most effective thing I did to learn the game myself.

Eventually I felt I had the basics down well enough to take a 2/1 class. The instructor talked about grapes (the minor suits), bananas (the major suits), stiffs (singletons) and

other terms I had not heard before. I was too embarrassed to speak up, but noticed others in the class with puzzled looks when these terms were used. I learned little from this class, but it did reaffirm my belief that I should never ever talk over the heads of my students.

Within a few years, I had 200 students and was directing two newcomer games weekly. I taught at country clubs, retirement centers, Bellevue Community College and the Seattle Yacht Club. Between Thanksgiving and Christmas I taught and directed on cruise ships going to the Caribbean and Mexico. In the summers I traveled up the inland passage of Alaska.

Some years later I played as part of a winning team in at the Las Vegas Regional. As I was examining the scores on the wrap-up sheet, I turned to find Bill "The Volcano" standing behind me. He was grinning. He said, "I see you've become a bridge player."

My years in Seattle were happy ones. Twenty years and five moves later, I still get Christmas cards from former students. But, most of all, there was bridge and the occasional chance to play in the same room with the world's greatest player.

Straight talk for beginners

- 1. Take a beginner's class from a qualified teacher.
- 2. If possible find a partner with equal ability and interest in learning.
- 3. Begin with three conventions: Blackwood, Stayman and negative doubles. There are no simple conventions. They are fun, but too many too soon are counter-productive.
- 4. Understand that director's calls are part of the game and necessary to restore fairness. If an opponent bullies you or puts you down, you call the director. The ACBL has a Zero Tolerance policy in place for bad behavior.
- 5. When time allows, better players sometimes analyze the deal just finished. Listen, don't talk.
- 6. Be friendly, quiet and try not to hold up the game. Bridge is a timed event.
- 7. After the game, ask an approachable expert how he would have bid and played a specific board that was difficult for you.
- 8. Learn who the blowhards are and avoid them and their "lessons."
- 9. Don't ask an expert player for a game. Would Tiger Woods want to play with a beginner? If you can afford it, hire an expert to play "teaching games" with you.
- 10. Make it a habit to read the daily bridge column in the newspaper. If the bidding is baffling, concentrate on the columnist's description of the play and defense.
- 11. Bridge is a game of counting. For example: opener's 15-17 point bid of 1NT is raised to three. Dummy comes down with 12 points. You have 10 points. How many points does partner have? During the play, practice counting the number of cards in all suits in each player's hand. Practice counting the points in every hand, every day. Start slowly with these exercises. They will pay off for you.
- 12. After six months of play, take a more advanced class.
- 13. Don't whine. Every player experiences at least some of what you are going through.

Table result: Making seven, East-West plus 1390. Director ruling: 3NT by East, making seven, East-West plus 720.

Committee ruling: 3NT by East, making seven, East-West plus 720.

The Facts: The director was called by South after the auction and again after the play of the hand. Initially, the table director had thought that East-West had denied a BIT. The director determined that an "unmistakable

hesitation" had occurred due to the statements by North-South and West's hand.

The Ruling: The director polled six players with the East hand as to action over 3NT. Four of the players polled passed and two bid on. Therefore, the director judged that the BIT demonstrably suggested action (a bid) and that pass was a logical alternative. The director determined that action was demonstrably suggested by the BIT. Therefore, in accordance with Laws 16B1 and 12C1(e), the result was adjusted to 3NT by East, making seven, East-West plus 720.

The Appeal: Notwithstanding the appeal form, West allowed that 3NT might have taken 2-4 seconds more than the rest of his bids, since he did have alternatives to consider. He said that 3♠ and similar calls usually showed concentration of strength for notrump purposes, opposite which he had no matchpoint interest in minorsuit contracts. East said that over 3♠ he had huge slam potential and never intended to play in 3NT. He said he rejected an immediate keycard 4♠ over 3♠ because he hoped partner would be able to bid 4♠ over 3♠, eventually finding out about all of East's controls and the queen of diamonds. Once West didn't take charge over 3♠, East felt it was time someone bid key card but he was no longer interested in seven over West's supposed lack of interest.

The Decision: The committee found there was an unmistakable hesitation relative to the tempo of the earlier auction. It also found that the hesitation demonstrably suggested not passing 3NT and that passing 3NT was a logical alternative to bidding on, thereby upholding the adjustment to 3NT by East, making seven, East-West plus 720. In doing so, the committee felt that East might have intended 3♠ as asking for a singleton spade honor so that West's 3NT could have shown

making slam no bargain. There was also some sentiment that East's first two calls were not optimal so that there was no reason for him to be alive to the possibility of slam other than the suggestion of the hesitation. The committee did not disbelieve East's

reasoning for bidding $3 \spadesuit$ but found it irrelevant in light of the UI created by the hesitation.

Dissent (Ron Gerard): In my opinion, passing 3NT was not a logical alternative (LA) to bidding on. To bid 3♠, asking specifically for the singleton king of spades was fatuous since West would also bid it with singleton queen in case East's spade holding were KJx or K10x. Do any pairs have that specific an agreement about bids opposite marked shortness rather than the standard meaning of "I have a maximum holding for my previous auction knowing you are short?" Furthermore, why would West go out of his way to bid around his singleton king with the hand the committee cited as a reason for passing 3NT? No, East's 3♠ had to be a prepared slam try, not some quixotic inquiry about a 12-1 shot.

To penalize East for his $1 \blacklozenge$ and $2 \blacklozenge$ calls shows lack of proper appeals temperament. Opening 1NT or rebidding 2NT may be clear to your way of thinking, but holding that anything else is so irrational that you forfeit your right to later intelligent action does not belong in the committee room. East had reasons for each of his calls and was under no restrictions when he bid $3 \spadesuit$ as a slam try rather than that ridiculous "notrump help" thing the committee foisted on him.

Finally, I disagree with the polling procedure that established pass as a LA. The director poll resulted in four passes and two bids. The committee was given a blind poll prior to the hearing and two members said they would pass 3NT, while I would have cut my tongue out rather than do that, not knowing the hand (x, xxxx, Axx, AKQxx and Bob's your uncle in 7♦). The problem with the director poll is that it is done on the fly, without benefit of insight from the principals. The problem with the blind poll is that members answer in two seconds flat, then spend the rest of the hearing justifying their opinion when they didn't give due consideration to the auction. I defy anyone to support passing 3NT without creating a contortionist meaning for 3. And please don't hurl up accusations of bridge lawyering. It doesn't take a bridge lawyer to realize the value of that East hand when West goes out of his way to paint with pastels.

and eastern Canada, our great neighbor to the north. One major draw to this Granite State is a drive on the Mount Washington Auto Road. With the ever-changing weather conditions on this highest peak in New England, no two trips are ever the same and continue to lure travelers back. Beautiful Lake Winnipesauke is another key vacation spot. It is New Hampshire's largest lake and the third largest in New England, spanning more than 21 miles.
