Honorary Member of the Year, by the way, is an award voted on by the ACBL Board of Directors and presented to an individual for long and meritorious service to the organization.

The list of previous recipients of the award reads like a who's who of bridge history - Oswald Jacoby, Easley Blackwood, George Rosenkranz, Edgar Kaplan, Bob Hamman, Bobby Wolff, Alfred Sheinwold. Bobby Goldman, Chip Martel and Norman Kay, to name just a few.

It's an impressive roster, and Zia was grateful to be honored.

Rather than dwelling on the plaudits, he chose to use the forum created by the announcement of the award to focus on certain issues.

The first is the plight of the people in his
homeland of Pakistan. Zia still has family there, some very close to where the recent earthquakes wreaked absolute havoc and killed thousands of people. "I have heard first-hand how horrible it was," Zia said, "and I know bridge players are a caring group. I know

Zia said the English Bridge Union is sponsoring some special bridge events to raise funds for Pakistan relief, and he urged bridge players everywhere to support any such efforts.

## World Championships

## just around the corner

The 2006 World Bridge Championships will take place in about six months' time - June 9-24 in Verona, Italy.

This is your chance to compete in a world championship without having to qualify via trials competition. Here are the noteworthy points of the tournament:

- There is a full schedule of world championships: Mixed Pairs, Rosenblum (open) and McConnell (women's) Teams, Senior Teams, Open and Womens' Pairs, Senior Pairs and - brand new IMP Pairs, following the qualifying stages of the Open Pairs.
- For the first time, all world championships will be transnational: pairs and teams can be composed of players from any combination of countries.
- No brown-sticker conventions will be permitted.
- All scoring will be done by the Bridgemate electronic devices that were so successful at the European Open Championships in Tenerife in June and at the World Bridge Championships in Estoril, Portugal, which concluded earlier this month.

The weather in Verona is expected to be fair, but in any case all play will be in an air-conditioned facility.

## Up the line?

Here's a trap for the unwary: a common bidding situation for which it's very easy for partners to have different approaches and not be aware of the problem until disaster strikes.

$$

If your partner opens $1 \star$ and you hold this hand, you have no problem responding $1 \vee$. If partner doesn't raise hearts, you can always raise diamonds later, but you want to explore for the 4-4 major suit fit first. This approach is just about universal, regardless of methods, for North American bridge players. But what if partner opens $1 \curvearrowleft$ ? Now there are at least three schools of thought. One group always just bids $1 \vee$. After all, who wants to delay looking for that major suit fit?

Another group would bid $1 \star$ since they see 11 high-card points, more than enough to plan to bid twice. But give them this hand:

A972 $\bullet$ J 843 - A Q J 7 \& 32
With only 8 HCP , the proponents of this approach would bypass this excellent diamond suit to bid $1 \vee$. Their argument is that with such minimum values it is wiser to bid the major first. These folks would even bypass a five-card diamond suit to bid the four-card major.

Then there is the third group which always bids up the line. With either of the hands shown so far, they'd bid the diamonds first. Their theory is that there is a better chance that the stronger hand will become declarer if a 4-4 major suit fit exists. Since 1 * does not deny a four-card major, opener now bids major suits up the line, and there's a reasonable chance that the stronger hand will now be concealed.

Most of us say we play "Standard American," but here's a good example of the flexibility - some would say vagueness - of this umbrella term. We sit down to play, agree that we play "standard" style, and what do we do when this very common bidding situation arises? There's a place on the convention card to mark if your style is to bid the major first, especially over a longer diamond suit. But do you always bid the major, or do you bid up the line when you have a better hand? Or do you always bid up the line?


If one of the joys of partnership bridge is successful communication, one of the frustrations is to find out that one of you is speaking a slightly different dialect that the other! It's a great idea to check from time to time, even with a frequent partner, to make sure your styles haven't diverged. Remember, too, that as your style changes so should your convention card.

Your opponents are entitled to know your systems now - not just what it was six months or a year ago.

Bidding commentary: A dogfight for the contract, and as usual the side with the spades has the advantage. South's $3 \downarrow$ bid is competitive - North is not allowed to bid $4 \vee$ ! If South was interested in game, he would bid a new suit. In this auction, $3 \bullet$ by South would be a game try. On this deal, however, South does not have a game try, but West has enough to raise to $3 \boldsymbol{A}$, and that's that.

## Defensive commentary: North wins the

 $\nabla$ A (East might have a bare king!) and, glancing to his right, he notices threatening clubs. Clearly North must shift to a diamond but which diamond? When dummy to the right has the $10-\mathrm{x}-(\mathrm{x})$ and the player on lead has the K-J-9-(x) or the A-J-9-(x), the correct card to lead is the jack. It is called a "surrounding" play. North has the 10 surrounded by the J-9 along with a higher non-adjacent honor. Leading the jack nets the defense three quick diamond tricks to go with the $\vee \mathrm{A}$ and the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ for a one-trick set. If any other diamond is led, declarer loses only two diamond tricks and makes his contract.Further defensive commentary: Another common surrounding play occurs when dummy to the right has the $9-x-(x)$ and the player on lead has the Q-10-8-(x) or the K-10-8-(x). This time the 9 is surrounded by the $10-8$, and once again there is a higher non-adjacent honor. The proper lead is the 10 . The lead works particularly well when declarer has A-J-x-(x). The lead of the 10 limits declarer to one trick. If a low card is led, declarer plays low, forcing third hand to win with an honor. Declarer remains with the A-J-(x), the remaining honor finessable, and takes two tricks.

more about how to contribution to the Pakistani people.
"If every bridge player gave just $\$ 5$," said Zia, "it would be a huge donation."

On another subject, Zia said he is hopeful a policy can be worked out that will allow more expert foreign players to participate in ACBL events such as the Blue Ribbon Pairs more frequently. He noted that several excellent pairs who attended the Fall NABC were not allowed to play because they had already used their one and only exemption from Blue Ribbon qualification.
"The NABCs have always welcomed all players," Zia said, "and in many ways the NABCs are now better than the world championships because if you win you beat all the best."

Zia said he was one of the first foreign players to be welcomed to NABCs, and he sympathizes with some of the Europeans who traveled to Denver on vacation and were not allowed to play in the Blue Ribbon.
"I understand there have to be guidelines, and I agree that they have to be followed," Zia said. "I just hope that it can be worked out."

On still another subject, Zia put in a plug for more enjoyable bridge events at the big tournaments. At the top of his list, he said, is an individual. "Bridge has become exceptionally serious," he said. "I would like to see some fun events."

Reflecting on his long career in bridge, Zia said he still feels "as much pure passion for the game as I did 40 years ago."

Now that he is a husband and a father, Zia said, he understands that "there is no greater emotional attachment than one's family."

Not too far behind, however - for Zia , at least - is bridge.

He said he still plays as much rubber bridge as he can, mostly in New York City and London. Zia recommends rubber bridge for all aspiring players, mainly because you can pack so much more experience into a shorter amount of time.
"Roy Welland," Zia said, "has become a very good player over the past five years because he plays a lot of rubber bridge against very good players."

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were separated by one-half board.
"I didn't think about whether we were winning," said Ryman, who lives in Sweden and recently represented her country in the Venice Cup in Estoril, Portugal. "I was trying to play my best, but I knew we had a chance."
"I knew it was possible," said Wolpert, a young Canadian who plays bridge full time. "We had many good results."

Wolpert and Ryman are thought to be the youngest pair to win this event. They met at the Bermuda Bowl in Monte Carlo in 2003 and are engaged to be married. They haven't set a date yet.

Ryman and Wolpert, who play a strong club system with five-card majors, seldom get to play together. Wolpert has a regular partnership with Vincent Demuy. They were part of the Canadian team that won a bronze medal last summer in Sydney, Australia, at the World Youth Championships. Ryman plays internationally with her mother, Mari Ryman.

The runners-up were leading by 9 matchpoints with a round to go, but came away from the final round with only 6 of 76 matchpoints. An allwomen pair has never won the Blue Ribbon Pairs and they were hoping to become the first.

very first day: "You can't open the bidding with a double."

At the age of 11 , young Barton-Paine was a serious player. She and her mother even won some women's pairs at sectionals in the area. She was playing, caddying and helping out at the bridge club.
"I wasn't addicted like some people," she said. "I was more of a typical teenager - I wanted to go to ball games and dances."

In one respect, however, Barton-Paine was different from other young people - she was famous.

When she made Life Master at the age of 18 , she was the youngest ever to do so. She was featured in a full-page spread in the Saturday Evening Post and on the cover of the ACBL Bridge Bulletin.

She was invited to appear on the television show To Tell the Truth, and the legendary John Gerber wrote her father a letter saying he wanted to play with her in the national Mixed Pairs at the next NABC (it didn't happen because her father took ill at the last minute).

Fame didn't really suit Barton-Paine, and she was happy when the limelight turned to someone else.

After her father died in 1959, Barton-Paine helped out at the bridge club and began directing at sectionals in the area.

Bridge and directing took a back seat in her life when she married Eustes Paine in 1965 and they had a son together. She resumed directing part-time in the early Seventies, and she served as the team photographer for the NBA's Golden State Warriors from 1965 to 1971.

During the Eighties she worked for the Bank of America as a systems manager and a systems security consultant. In 1987, she was laid off from the bank and was able to increase her yearly sessions for the ACBL. She became a full-time ACBL employee in 1993.

Through it all, Barton-Paine has not lost her love for the game or for the aspect of her job that she enjoys the most - managing crises: "I enjoy the job the most when I'm able to resolve problems."

She can still play, too. Three years ago, she and fellow TD Gary Zeiger hooked up in the Mixed Pairs at the year-end Reno Regional - and they won. Said Barton-Paine proudly, "We played almost no conventions - not even negative doubles."

## Matchpoints or IMPs?

I often tell people I don't know how to play matchpoints. I just play the usual IMP style at matchpoints and keep an extra eye out for the overtricks. At the Fall NABC here in Denver, almost all the main events are matchpoints, so you can never relax! I played this one with my husband, Matthew, in the Charity Pairs.


In our sequence, 3 by North was forcing to game or four of a minor. My $3 \downarrow$ bid was a probe for 3 NT and he decided not to bid it with his $\vee \mathrm{Q}$ 4. I then retreated to $4 \star$, not forcing, and he raised to five.

West led a trump. That looked like a good lead for me - maybe. Had they cashed two hearts and shifted to a club, I might have gone down by trying to ruff a heart and two clubs in dummy, and been overruffed on the third round of clubs. But after the trump lead, I counted my tricks and saw that I needed three ruffs in dummy to get rid of all my losers. The problem was they could lead another trump or two if I attacked hearts, so the ruffing-losers plan was no good.

Setting up the spades was the only alternative. Lucky for me, I recognized this card combination from bridge literature: How do you take four spade tricks with this holding? The answer is to take a first-round finesse, which is what I did. Then I cashed the $\uparrow$ A and ruffed a spade, the king dropping. When trumps broke 2-2, I was able to throw all three hearts away for a nice matchpoint score of 640 (higher than 630). My knowledge of how to play the spade suit at IMPs helped me get a top at matchpoints!

looking for ways to amuse ourselves."
Hubert can't remember when or where the practice started, but he gives a lot of credit to Matt Koltnow, a fellow TD from Redmond WA. Koltnow is positively cerebral about it.
"Flexibility is the key," he says.
Actually, Koltnow is a purist of sorts when it comes to the Swiss numbers. "The more steps you get away from the original the better," he says.

For example, Cincinnati equals 109, right?
Well, in the Swiss numbers game, "red" automatically adds 100 to any number, so the ninemember baseball team in Cincinnati - the Reds - just naturally equals 109 .

Not all of them are so obscure, but Koltnow says the main thing is that everyone involved enjoys the process. "The players absolutely love it," he says.

Many of the allusions are to bridge or cards - full deck is 52 , "not playing with a full deck" is 51 .

If a TD says, "Match Goren's 1NT," that means teams 16 and 18 are playing each other.


What if your
team's VP total is Alfred Sheinwold? Easy: that's $35-5$ Weeks to Winning Bridge, Sheinwold's bestselling book, equals 35 days. Grand slam?
Why, that's 37 . Says Koltnow, "Everyone knows you need 37 highcard points to make a grand slam."
There are many sports references, of course. In Hubert's bailiwick, Herschel Walker (the Heisman Trophy winner from the University of Georgia) is 34 . In a different part of the country, you would get the same number by calling out, "Sweetness," the nickname of Walter Payton, the late Hall of Fame running back for the Chicago Bears.
"Michael Jordan" will get you 23 just about everywhere, and in the South, Hank Aaron is a clear cut 44.

The list goes on and on, and Koltnow says many TDs have done their part to enrich the roster or improve the calls. There are codes for every number between 1 and 100, although Koltnow says that for a long time there was nothing for 58 .

That was before a 14 -year-old caddy who was tuned into the exercise postulated that if "The Big Crash" was 29 (the infamous stock market crash of 1929), then why couldn't 58 be "a head-on collision?"

Everyone has fun with the Swiss numbers, especially when the TDs are playing tricks on each other.

Before TD Kathy Whidden of the Atlanta area retired last year, she was called upon to work a regional in Seaside OR. Somehow the West Coast TDs found out that Whidden was studying up on the Swiss numbers, and they were ready.

As Whidden was writing the VP totals, someone called out "Chipper Jones" (one of the Atlanta Braves' top players). Whidden was stumped. The other TDs looked at her askance as though "everyone knows it’s 73." Later, she got "Rafael Furcal." Again, a blank look. Turns out the other TD s were having some fun at Whidden's expense - both codes were phonies.

TD Gary Zeiger of Phoenix recalls a story from a tournament where John Ashton of Portland OR was calling and Matt Smith of Victoria BC was writing.


Ashton had devised a new code that he didn't tell anyone about, and when the opportunity came, he sprung it on Smith. Such-andsuch team, said Ashton, has "? and the Mysterians." Without missing a beat, Smith wrote down the number
96. He knew that the reference was to a Sixties rock group whose only hit was "96 Tears."

Later, Smith was up to the challenge again when Ashton offered, "Blues Image." Said Smith in short order: 73. Blues Image was a rock group with a onehit wonder entitled Ride Captain Ride. The opening line of the song is: "Seventy-three men sailed up. . ."

## Self-promotion: not always a bad thing

Pamela Granovetter sat down to play in the Compact Knockout Teams on Thursday, and the first deal generated a nice point of declarer play.

On a diamond lead and continuation, declarer simply loses two diamonds and a trump, ruffing one club in dummy and pitching two on dummy's side winners (the $\uparrow A$ and the good $\bullet Q$ ).

Pamela led a club, however. Declarer won and unblocked the $\wedge \mathrm{A}$, ruffed a club and cashed the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ to pitch a diamond from hand.

Declarer then crossed to the A and ruffed another club to reach this ending:

Declarer led a diamond. East won the ace and played a spade, ruffed with the $\mathbf{8}$ and overruffed by Pamela with the 10. A club return allowed East to ruff, followed by another spade, promoting the $\checkmark \mathrm{Q}$ to the setting trick.

In the ending described, declarer could have survived by ruffing the third round of spades with the $v$ and exiting with a heart.

Even better, however, in the diagrammed ending would have been for declarer to lead the $\uparrow 9$, discarding the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$ ! Now no matter how the cards lie, 10 tricks are assured.

## Today is Northern Colorado Unit 363 Day at the Colorado NABC

Unit 363 is the northeast quadrant of Colorado that begins in the east with the stark beauty of the high plains and the Pawnee Buttes. But, that club name was mistaken and started a long- running joke when one of the first new players to Junior Duplicate looked around the room at the age of the players and told Fred, "If this is the junior duplicate, I'd hate to see the senior players!"

Morgan returned to his hand with a heart. From North's signal in hearts (showing an odd number) and the fall of the $\& 10$, Morgan was able to visualize the actual defensive hands. He took the spade finesse and cashed the ace discarding a club. Declarer returned to his hand with a heart and cashed the last one. On this, North had to save his $\& \mathrm{~K} 7$ and so had to reduce his diamonds to one.

Harris, from Chicago, was looking for help in clubs when he made his 2NT bid. (In their methods, an immediate $3 *$ would have been a short-suit try.) His partner, Jacob Morgan, could have jumped to $4 \boldsymbol{a}$ at this point with a supermaximum. Since he didn't and since there was no room left to make a further try, Harris took a conservative view and signed off.

Harris took the opening $\vee 10$ lead with his queen and drew three rounds of trumps, ending in dummy. When he led a low diamond, East rose with the ace and returned the $\boldsymbol{\bullet} 10$ to the jack and queen.

At this point, if West exited with a diamond, Harris could win the king, cross to the A and ruff out dummy's last diamond. Then a heart exit would end-play West.

In fact, West exited with the $\vee \mathrm{K}$, won by dummy's ace. Harris led a diamond to his king and a trump to dummy. When he led the $\boldsymbol{\rho} 4$ from dummy, the 9 appeared and he guessed to duck, making 170. This was worth 46 matchpoints on a 51 top.

## Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a $1 / 6$ board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

## NA Swiss Teams begins today

The 2004 champs were Larry Mori, Venkatrao Koneru, Marty Fleisher, Vincent Demuy, Barnet Shenkin and Gavin Wolpert, still basking in the glow of his victory in the Blue Ribbon Pairs on Thursday. He won with his fiancee, Jenny Ryman.

Players will be vying for the Keohane Trophy, donated by Ethel Keohane in 1973 in memory of her husband, William H. Keohane, one of the leading New England bridge personalities.

Bill Keohane (1896-1972) was a consulting engineer, bridge teacher and bridge administrator. He served as chairman of the 1970 Summer NABC in Boston and, for many years, was chairman of the New England Individual Championship.

Keohane was elected in 1972 to a one-year term as the first District Director of the newly created District 25 (New England). He died later that year, just before he was to attend his first Board meeting.

The Keohane Trophy was presented for the Open Individual Championship until it was redesignated in 1995 by the ACBL Board of Directors for the North American Swiss Teams.

Nickell and Co. won the contest by more than four boards in 2004.

The Nickell team is coming off a silver-medal finish in the Bermuda Bowl in Estoril, Portugal, where they lost to Italy

## The Reisinger

The event is contested for the Reisinger Trophy (the Chicago Trophy until 1965). It is a six-session open team-of-four event scored by board-a-match with two qualifying sessions, two semifinal sessions and two final sessions. It was contested as a foursession championship until 1966.

The event began in 1929 as the North American Open Team Championship and the prize was the Chicago Trophy, donated by the Auction Bridge Club of Chicago. (In 1928, the open team competition was for the Harold S. Vanderbilt Cup.)

The Chicago Trophy was replaced in 1965 by the Reisinger Memorial Trophy, donated by the Greater New York Bridge Association in memory of Curt H. Reisinger.

Reisinger (1891-1964), New York City, was a principal patron of contract bridge and the American Contract Bridge League in the early years of both.

Reisinger was a great-grandson of Anheuser and a grandson of Busch, co-founders of the brewery from which he inherited great wealth. That wealth enabled him to become a stalwart financial supporter of the game, as well as a noted philanthropist on a far larger scale.

In the years when there was often a struggle to meet the League's modest payroll, Reisinger was often called upon and never failed to help with a loan or an outright gift. His support made possible several early contract bridge tournaments, clubs and books.

Among the positions in which he served were director of the United States Bridge Association, president of the Greater New York Bridge Association and chairman of the ACBL. In 1953, Reisinger was named ACBL Honorary Member. Winners

## Health Note: High-Altitude Sickness

## What is high-altitude or mountain sickness?

Sometimes people get sick at high altitudes. This is called mountain sickness or high-altitude sickness.
What causes this problem?
Lack of oxygen causes high-altitude sickness. As altitude increases, the air becomes "thinner," which means less oxygen is in the atmosphere. You get less oxygen in your lungs with each breath, so the amount of oxygen in your blood declines. All people can experience mountain sickness, but it may be more severe in people who have heart or lung problems.

## What are the symptoms?

Symptoms usually begin within 48 hours of arriving at high altitude. Symptoms include:
-headaches, breathlessness, fatigue
-nausea or vomiting
-inability to sleep
-swelling of the face, hands and feet

## Recommendation

Most people adjust or "acclimatize" to the high altitude within a few days. Here are some tips: - Avoid strenuous activity for the first day or two.
-Drink extra fluid.

- Be careful of drinking alcohol. Its effect is magnified at high altitude.
- Your doctor may prescribe medication to help prevent or treat altitude sickness.
