Batman received the lead of the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$, which he ducked. A second heart went to the jack and ace. Playing West for the $\bullet K$, declarer played the $\bullet A$ and continued with the $\bullet 10$. West ducked and Batman overtook with dummy's queen. A club finesse was next, East ducking. Declarer correctly reverted to diamonds at this point, throwing West on lead. A low spade went to the 9 and jack. The $\uparrow$ A was next followed the $\uparrow \mathbf{Q}$ to blot out any possible spade winner in the danger hand, East.

The defense was finished: West could cash the ^ 8, but was then forced to play a club. Whether East covered or not, there was no way to prevent Batman from gaining access to dummy's diamonds.

Making three was worth almost all the matchpoints.

oints, so Wildavsky was willing to commit to game holding an ace. He bid $3 *$ to show his second suit. As the auction unfolded, Doub could see that 3NT was unlikely (even if Wildavsky held an ace), and so, accurately, bid 5*.

A 3NT contract has no play, but 5 * made to allow the winners to gain 5 IMPs. This was significant because their winning margin was only a little more than 2 IMPs.

Bridge has been an important part of Compton's life since an early age. He learned to play when he was 11 years old. About that time he moved to Houston TX where he played as a teenager in his father's club. As a youth, he was a frisky player.
"I was barred from playing there three times because I liked to psych," said Compton.

Compton tried college, but dropped out six times to play bridge. One of these times was when he was 21 years old. That year, he went on the bridge tournament circuit and was fifth in the race for the McKenney trophy (now called the Barry Crane Top 500).
"Bridge was the first thing I found that I could be good at if I applied myself," said Compton. "I have learned discipline through bridge, and I learned the value of long-term commitment."

He applied that discipline to education. He returned to college, and then to law school. His wife, Donna, has also earned a law degree. "For eight years, one or both of us were in school," he said.

Compton says he finds bridge exciting. He enjoys the risk calculation. As declarer, he tries to view the problem from the defenders' point of view, and play to give them a guess or a losing option.

This tournament, he played on the Nickell team in the Vanderbilt Knockout Teams. "It’s exciting to play on teams with players like Bob Hammon, Nick Nickell, Eric Rodwell and Jeff Meckstroth," he said. "I've also had tremendous support from Rose Meltzer."

The Comptons have two daughters, aged nine and 12. "They play bridge with us and with their friends informally," he said.

Compton likes bridge because it appeals to all ages. "You can have grandparents, parents, and children, all playing as a group. There are not too many activities where three generations can enjoy a challenge together," he said.

# J UST FOR NEW PLAYERS 

## Changing partnership agreements <br> By Lynn Berg



Sometimes we don't realize the extent of the ripples in the pond after we throw in a stone.

Most of us start out playing a fairly simple convention card. As time goes on, we add on
conventions and complicate our bridge
lives in the process. Every time we add a convention - or change one - we can lose natural or familiar calls we are used to.

The first convention most players adopt is Stayman. Transfers come soon after. And we lose the ability to play two of a minor after partner opens 1NT. Bridge judgment tells us that the benefits of these conventions outweigh the disadvantages. And that's the decision you have to make about any addition to your convention collection.

Before you add a convention, ask some

## questions:

$\bullet$ Is the convention going to be used frequently?

- Will we be able to remember it? Will we remember to Alert it?
- What natural bid are we giving up?
* Are we trying to change too much too quickly?
- Do we both want to make this change?
- Have we established a set time to try out this convention?

There is a mistaken belief that adding just one more gadget will improve your game - and then another and another. In fact, conventions are useful only about $10 \%$ of the time in the typical bridge session. They don't take the place of careful counting, clear communication and informed deduction. If you've added too many new things at once, the strain of trying to remember them can interfere with your ability to concentrate.

Perhaps you have attended some of the
excellent lectures at this NABC, and you are going home fired up with the idea of modifying your partnership agreements. The first consideration should be the comfort of the partnership. Do you and your partner agree that there is a need to deal with the bidding problem the convention is supposed to address?

For example, perhaps you are changing your protocols for opening 1 NT and 2 NT so that a five-card major is common (you have noted that on your convention card, I hope). Now you see a good reason for adopting puppet Stayman, which uncovers either four- or five-card majors in opener's hand.

Do you want to play that convention over 1NT and 2NT openers, on only over 2NT? Are you both sure of the responses? Will you remember to Alert? Will you be forgiving if either of you forgets part of the convention?

How long will you give yourselves to learn and try out the convention? Allow at least four to six months before revisiting the question. If the convention rarely is useful, do you want to bother to continue putting it on your card? Do you keep getting it wrong or forgetting to Alert, or feeling confused? In that case, is it worth keeping ?

With the increasing popularity of $2 / 1$ game force, these questions are probably more important than ever. Bridge has always changed. Bidding is both more accurate and more aggressive than it used to be.

Opening lead: $\uparrow A$.
Bidding commentary: There are several ways to sign off in a minor after partner opens 1NT. East-West were using jumps to $3 *$ and $3 \star$ as signoffs. Others use the jumps as invitational and others as slam tries! What does this tell you? It tells you that you have to discuss your methods for responding to 1 NT with long minors with your partner.

Defensive commentary: West starts with three high spades, East discarding the $\star \mathrm{Q}$, showing a sequence in clubs headed by the queen. West plays a fourth spade to kill dummy's established jack. East ruffs with the $\vee$, overruffed by South.

Play commentary: As declarer, the key card to find is the $\downarrow$, and there is no rush to play diamonds. As much information as possible (points and distribution) should be gleaned from the other suits before you attack diamonds, a suit that can be finessed in either direction. South drives out the $\downarrow$ A. West wins and exits safely with a club to your ace. After drawing trumps, you have the following information at your disposal: West started with 9 high-card points in spades, 4 HCP in hearts and the \% K (known because of the discard of the $\% \mathrm{Q}$ by East at trick three) for a total of 16 HCP .

That's enough. If West had the $\vee$, he would have 18 HCP and would have been too strong to open 1 NT. Play East for the $\downarrow$ Q. Had the HCP count been inconclusive (either player could hold the $\downarrow$ Q), try to work out the distribution, eventually playing the opponent with the greater original length in diamonds for the queen.

For example, if the opponents were playing a 1618 point notrump range, you couldn't be sure who had the $\vee$. However, the count would tell you that East started with four diamonds and West three. The odds are now $4-3$ that East has the $\bullet$ Q.


Not long ago, I saw a wonderful old Model A Ford driving down the main street in our town. It provides basic transportation, of course, but would you like to give up on the conveniences and gadgets in today's cars? Your bridge agreements should be "easy to drive," but you also like to keep up with the times.

Your best resource is probably a class you and your partner can take together. Look for an ACBL-accredited teacher and a member of the American Bridge Teacher's Association if you want high quality instruction.

The Facts: The director was called after the play of the hand. East explained the $2 *$ bid to North as Stayman, and West explained the $2 *$ bid to South as natural. South said that to double a natural $2 \boldsymbol{\circ}$ bid he needed more clubs. He said he could have doubled had the $2 *$ bid been for the majors.

South led the $\vee 5$. North-South took seven tricks for plus 100 .

The Ruling: The director determined that there was misinformation (MI), but that it was unlikely that the MI led to the decision to double or not. Therefore, in accordance with

Law 21B1, the table result of $2 *$ by East, down two, East-West minus 100, was allowed to stand.

The Appeal: North-South reiterated that a double of a natural $2 \boldsymbol{*}$ in this situation shows clubs and a double of an artificial $2 *$ shows values, so South could not double. With the correct information, he might not have led a heart.

West thought East misbid. He also said $2 \boldsymbol{v}$ is only down one. After being questioned, he said 1NT-Dbl-2* would be Stayman.

The Decision: There was definitely MI, and North-South were damaged by it as a result (Law 40C), so the committee adjusted the score per Law 12C2.

The committee assessed the likelihood of the various contracts and results tha might have been
achieved had North-South been properly informed. Had South doubled, for example, East might have bid $2 \leqslant$ or redoubled. The committee judged that minus 300 for East-West met the standard of "the most unfavorable result that was at all probable" for the offending side, while the "most favorable result that was likely" for the non-offending side was plus 100.

Therefore, the committee judged to award a split score of plus 100 to the non-offending side (NorthSouth) and minus 300 to the offending side (EastWest). Each result was IMPed separately, and the IMP scores averaged.

The Facts: The director was called after the auction was concluded at $3 \vee$, because the explanation of East's double was changed to penalty rather than responsive showing four spades. North was permitted to change her call. The director was called back after the play (South went down one in $4 \boldsymbol{\infty}$ ). North-South argued that the pull of the double of $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ may have been based on Unauthorized Information (UI). If East had passed, South would have pulled to $3 \star$, which would likely have ended the auction because East had described his values.

The Ruling: The director determined that the

Misinformation (MI) did not damage NorthSouth. However, it was determined that the UI had an effect on the outcome. Therefore, in accordance with Laws 16A and 12C2, the director adjusted the score to $3 \boldsymbol{*}$ by South making three, North-South plus 110 and East-West minus 110.

The Appeal: South said he did not bid $3 *$ on the second round of bidding because he wanted to be able to cuebid spades in an effort to get his side to 3NT if North could bid it. If he had known East's double showed hearts, then he would probably have opted for $3 *$ on the second round, which may have frozen East out of the auction. South felt that with the poorly placed $\approx \mathrm{K}$, East may not have bid.

When asked by the committee why East pulled the double of $2 \boldsymbol{A}$, East could provide no explanation other than he thought playing the hand in $3 \vee$ was clear-cut opposite a takeout double.

The Decision: This is a complicated case of combined MI and UI. The committee affirmed the director's finding that pulling the double of $2 \boldsymbol{a}$ was an infraction of Law 16, and that the Alert and explanation of East's previous double was MI to North-South. However, the committee disagreed with the appropriate adjustment. The committee found that had South, with the correct information, had bid $3 *$ on the second round of bidding, it was very unlikely that East would pass, even with the poorly positioned $\& K$ (which contributes to the likelihood that South will make his contract). The vulnerability and form of scoring both make East's passing unlikely and improbable.

Furthermore, in that auction North's eccentric bid of $3 \boldsymbol{A}$ would never have occurred. The committee also considered other likely auctions had the first double been properly explained and found that the most favorable result North-South was likely to achieve was $3 \boldsymbol{\vee}$, down one, NorthSouth plus 50 .

The committee considered the possibility that North's $3 \wedge$ bid broke the chain of causality from infraction to damage. It found that the MI early in the hand regarding spades made South's $2 *$ call sufficiently ambiguous that North's bid of $3 \boldsymbol{\infty}$ did not break the chain. The committee also considered East's pull of West's double of $2 \boldsymbol{\uparrow}$ to be apparently predicated on the UI he had from West's explanation of the double of $1 \vee$. The committee adjusted the result to $3 \vee$ by East, down one, North-South plus 50.

The committee was divided on whether to issue a procedural penalty (PP) but ultimately declined to do so.

Declarer ruffed the club, ruffed his spade in dummy and cashed the $\downarrow \mathrm{K}$, noting the fall of the $\mathbf{v}$. A diamond was advanced to the $\bullet \mathrm{Q}$ and $\bullet \mathrm{A}$. West exited with a club, ruffed by declarer. Wildavsky now drew trump and led the $\uparrow 10$. When West covered, he now had 11 tricks and his side won 9 IMPs. (West can duck the and hold declarer to 10 tricks.)

Making 6 was trivial and, even though it also makes 6NT, the pair picked up 5 IMPs.

Well, did you pass the first hand and open the second? Did you notice that Wildavsky did the opposite? He opened the bidding with the first hand that had 9 high-card points, and passed the second which contained 11 HCP.

Wildavsky opened the first hand because it could play in three suits, had playing strength and one and onehalf quick tricks. For the second hand, Wildavsky explains: "Doug and I play KS (Kaplan-Sheinwold), where it's important to have a sound hand when you open a minor."

## For a good cause

Ron Birnbaum came here from Los Angeles to win masterpoints -- but his mission is a little different than most players. Develin and Chen arrived in the pushy $4 \vee$. The defense can succeed by cashing two spades and breaking diamonds (in any order), but West chose to lead a trump and declarer, Develin, took full advantage.

First, it's important to recognize the importance of playing low from dummy at trick one. Declarer must preserve entries to (a) lead diamonds toward the closed hand and (b) enjoy all the clubs. True, clubs are 3-3, but Develin didn't know that.

East ducked the trump ace, and declarer's king won. A trump to the queen was captured by the ace, and East exited with the $\uparrow$ K. Develin won, drew the last trump and ran the clubs, pitching a spade. Making four for 40.5 out of 43 matchpoints.

What happens if East exits instead with a trump? Declarer must lead a diamond toward the jack, playing the 1NT bidder for the king-queen.

Finally, what happens if declarer plays a heart honor from dummy at trick one? East ducks, and the defence maintains control.

## E-ban takes effect at Summer NABC

Players are reminded that a new ban on electronic devices goes into effect for all nationally rated events at the 2008 Summer NABC. The new policy reads as follows:

Electronic devices, excluding health-related equipment, capable of sending or receiving communication, including but not limited to, headphones, earphones, cellular phones and mini-computers: (1) shall not be allowed in the playing areas, adjacent hallways, restrooms or accessible break areas; and (2) shall not be used during a session.

These restrictions shall apply to all pairs, team members, captains, coaches, recorders and kibitzers and shall apply throughout any actual playing session or segment.

A violation of this policy shall result in a disciplinary penalty of one full board (or 12 IMPs at that form of scoring) for the first offense. A second offense shall result in disqualification from the event for the pair/team.

Kibitzers violating this policy shall be removed from the playing area for the remainder of the session.

These devices are not permitted near the playing area, even if they are turned off.

Rozanne Pollack of Basking Ridge NJ attained the rank of Grand Life Master by finishing third in the Whitehead Women's Pairs. That rank requires more than 10,000 masterpoints and first in an unrestricted NABC event. In international play, she won the Women's Teams in 1994 and is a WBF World Grand Master. ## Monitoring

At this and future North American championships, ACBL will be monitoring NABC+ events with visible, real-time cameras. The images will be recorded and will be available for later official inspection and review.

By general monitoring of the session and participants' behavior, ACBL has another source of information that may be useful in determining facts and settling issues arising from some types of ethical and behavioral complaints or actions. This procedure is intended to assure everyone that the playing field is level and that misbehavior will not be tolerated.

## Bridge Festival for women

The World Bridge Federation, in cooperation with Bridge Base Online, will host a Women's Bridge Festival to be organized on the Internet, April 7-13, 2008. Four 10-board tournaments (pairs and individual, alternating) will be offered daily, for a period of seven days.

All the tournaments are limited exclusively to women players. Advanced registration is required, no later than one week before the start of the Festival. In order to participate, competitors must also have the (free) BBO software installed on their computer. The entry fee is $\$ 1$ per session, the standard fee for most BBO "pay" tournaments.

## Bid Box Alerts and Announcements

When using bid boxes, ACBL suggests that players tap the Alert strip and say "Alert" at the same time.

When making an Announcement, use the Announcement word (such as "transfer") and tap the Alert strip at the same time.

A player who Alerts or Announces a bid should make sure his opponents are aware that an Alert or Announcement has been made.

## World Transnational Mixed Teams

You can enjoy the atmosphere of a world bridge championship while playing for one yourself in Beijing, China, this fall.

The World Transnational Mixed Teams is scheduled for the second week of the World Bridge Championships in Beijing. The bridge tournament will be part of the 1st World Mind Sports Games set for Oct. 3-18.

The mixed teams will start on Oct. 12 or 13, depending on the number of entries. The format will be determined by the size of the field, but it is likely to start with Swiss qualifying for a knockout phase (round of 16 or round of eight).

Teams eliminated from the main events - Open, Women's and Senior teams - will be allowed to re-form and enter the mixed event. All players in good standing with their respective national bridge organizations are eligible. Teams may form with any combinations of countries, and there are no quotas. Teams must be made up of two or three mixed pairs playing in partnership.

The World Mind Sports Games will be played at the Beijing International Convention Centre and may also utilize space within the Olympic complex. The 2008 Olympic Games will take place Aug. 8-24 in Beijing.

The other games scheduled for the Mind Sports Games are Go, chess, draughts (checkers) and Chinese chess.

## Toumament Terminology 101

If you're confused by the terms used to describ the different types of bridge events played at clubs and tournaments, you're not alone. Here's a list of common bridge events with explanations.

Knockout Teams: an event in which a team (of four, five or six players - with four playing at a time) plays another team. The losers are eliminated or "knocked out" while the winners play other winners until only one winning team remains.

The length of a KO match may vary from a single session to a full day (the Vanderbilt and Spingold) to a multi-day event (the Bermuda Bowl).

Bracketed Knockout Teams: a KO event in which teams are divided into groups - usually of 8 , 16 or 32 teams - based on their masterpoint holdings. The top group - Bracket I - and all other groups compete in a separate event with their own set of winners.

Compact Knockout Teams: a shorter version of Bracketed KO teams.

Swiss Teams: an event in which a team (of four, five or six players - with four playing at a time) plays other teams in seven-, eight- or nine-board matches. Team A sits North-South at Table 1 and East-West at Table 2 while Team B sits EastWest at Table 1 and North-South at Table 2. The results are compared and scored by International Match Points (IMPs).

International Match Points (IMPs): the most common method of scoring Swiss Team matches. Scoring example: if Team A scores plus 620 for bidding and making 4 A on a particular deal and Team B scores only plus 170 (they didn't bid the game), the difference is 450 - which converts to 10 IMPs. The IMP chart is shown on the inside of your convention card

Victory Points (VPs): a method of scoring Swiss Team matches. After the scores are compared and converted to IMPs, the IMP total is converted to Victory Points. A team's VP total may be used to determine its next opponents and its final standing.

Side Game Series: a series of single-session pair games that pay red points. These series include at
least three sessions and may have as many as six. You may play in as many sessions as you like, but only pairs who play in at least two sessions are eligible for overall gold points. Your best two sessions are used for determining overall winners.

Flighted pairs: When flighting is used, the field is divided by expertise or experience or both into several separate games. Flight A - "unlimited masterpoints" - will be open to all players while the remaining flights will be limited. Flight B might be 0-500 MPs or 0-1000 MPs while Flight C might be $0-300$ or $0-500$.

Each flight is scored individually, and masterpoint awards are made for each flight.

The masterpoint holdings of the players determine their flight. If one player is quite expert while his partner is new to the game, the pair must compete in Flight A.

In flighted events, you may play up but no down. That means you may play in Flight A or Flight B even if your masterpoint holding qualifies you for Flight C. Conversely, you may not play in Flight B or Flight C if you are a Flight A player.
