## An ace in space? You bet!

Astronaut Gregory Johnson today will present to the ACBL an ace of spades that he carried on the Shuttle Endeavor on a 15 -day mission. The STS-123 Endeavor orbited the earth 250 times, traveling 6.6 million miles in 15 days and 18 hours March 11-25 in 2008.

Johnson will present the card to Jay Baum, ACBL's chief executive, at 11:30 a.m. today on the fourth floor at the Hilton Americas near the registration desk.

Astronauts are allowed to carry up to 10 items on shuttle flights, and Johnson selected the ace of spaces from an official ACBL deck of cards to honor the organization and demonstrate his love of bridge.

Johnson has been a bridge player for more than 30 years. He started duplicate as a new U.S. Air Force pilot in 1988. He is a Life Master.

## Plug them in and see how it goes

Today, the ACBL will conduct an experiment in remote bridge play.

In the Silodor Open Pairs, one pair will have a player sitting at a table in Houston. His partner and a monitor will be sitting at a computer in Las Vegas.

Via the Internet, with assists from numerous humans, the experiment will help the ACBL evaluate possibilities for future bridge competition.

## New Yorkers take NAP-A

Jim Krekorian and John Rengstorff won the North American Pairs, Flight A, by more than a board. The New York City pair took the lead after the first final session by more than 17 matchpoints (13 top). They had a $53.85 \%$ game in the evening to win by about 15 matchpoints.
"With three rounds to go, we went into the four corners," said Krekorian, making a basketball reference. "I knew a pair would have to have a huge game to catch us, and I didn't want any zeroes."
"We went conservative," added Rengstorff.
The winners have been a regular partnership for about 15 years. They credit their defense as the biggest reason for their victory.

This is Rengstorff's second NABC title and Krekorian's fifth. This is their first NABC championship as partners. They have one previous win as teammates in the 1997 Board-a-Match Teams in St. Louis. Krekorian is a full-time player. Rengstorff is an actor.

In second place were Robert Heitzman Jr, of Suffern NY and Jonathan Weinstein of Princeton NJ. Their score was 412.86. In third place were Mark Itabashi of Murrieta CA and Steven Love of Laguna Niguel CA with 390.81.

## Silodor Pairs starts today

The four-session Silodor Open Pairs starts today with two qualifying sessions. It will conclude on Saturday with two final sessions.

The winners' names are engraved on the Silodor Trophy, presented in memory of Sidney Silodor, winner of the Bermuda Bowl, the McKenney Trophy and more than 30 North American championships.

Silodor, a member of the team that won the first Bermuda Bowl World Championship in 1950, won the Vanderbilt eight times, the Reisinger six times, the Spingold, the Open Pairs and the Master Mixed Teams three times each and the Mixed Pairs five times.

# U UST FOR NEW PLAYERS 

## Dear New Players:

Congratulations! Here you are at the Mecca of bridge ... the North American Bridge
Championships. Wow. Pretty exciting, no? And for a relative newcomer, it can be a little
overwhelming. Not

to worry. Just like the government, I'm here to help you. Only I'm not going to help you with your actual bridge game - there are others much better qualified to do that. (Don't miss a single column in this newspaper. Ideas everywhere.) No, I'm going to help you with the decisions and problems that no one else ever tackles, and yet are pivotal to your success.

For example, today we are going to discuss "Sitting North-South or East-West," a decision that can affect your entire game. If your position goes against your basic nature ... well, there goes your afternoon.

Theories abound. You've heard the one about sitting the same direction as the bathtub, haven't you? I had a partner who insisted it was lucky, but couldn't begin to explain why. She was adamant she start sitting the same way as the tub at every party. (Okay, okay. I admit I like to sit facing the same direction as the makeup counter at Saks in New York, my personal Mecca. In case you care, it faces East.) Others like to sit East-West "because I like to stretch between rounds." Listen folks, there is absolutely no law against standing up and stretching if you are North-South, so let's be a little more thoughtful about our rationalizations.

All this doesn't really make any sense, so let's talk about reasons that do make sense. It really comes down to your personality type.

Do you like to be in charge? Sit North. The responsibilities on North are myriad. You must make sure the right people and the right boards are in place. You are an official greeter and act as host at the table. You are responsible for switching to the next board, although you may delegate that to South if you can bear to give up that much control. (Do you know why only one person is to turn the boards? Well, some day when the director must be called because three of you are playing with yellow cards, and one with blue, you'll get it.) Some people are just plain born to be North. If you are one of them, you will drive everyone nuts if you are sitting somewhere else, being bossy, trying to resist touching the boards and just generally twitching.

Do you like to be associated with greatness? Sit South. Bask in North's glory. (South also should be someone who likes to declare. After all, South plays all the contracts in the newspaper.)

Do you like to know what's going on everywhere? Sit East-West. As you have to wait between rounds, you can be checking out the room, seeing where everyone is, noticing who is with whom, being in the know. But, horrors, avoid even glancing at hands being played! (Also, if you like to make the opening lead, sit West. Again, in the newspaper, West always leads.)

Another important distinction between
North-South players and East-West players: Are
you a minimalist, or "heavy" traveler? Do you find it impossible to go to the playing area without a coat, light sweater, travel bag with socks, emergency rations for that 3 p.m. blood-sugar drop? Knitting? A good book? A travel mug with a capacity that rivals a camel? A newspaper and the Daily Bulletin? For heaven's sake, sit either North or South. A heavy traveler takes forever to gather all their belongings, pack them up and move to the next table. Plus they invariably leave something behind. You don't really want to be that annoying, do you?

A minimalist is someone who pops a lipstick or room key into a pocket, along with a few bucks, and off they go. This is you if you can make do with those teensy hand-out pencils, see no need to drag stuff wherever you go. You happy-go-lucky folks are the perfect East-Wests, as you are ready for the next round with a few seconds' notice.

It all comes down to

## style. Here's what my

friend Paul McMullin has to say. He's a director and player in the Washington DC area.
"The truth is, on some days, the deals will match your style no matter what seat you're in. All your decisions will be good ones and you'll have a great game for no particular reason. On other days, the deals will be disasters for your style, and all your decisions will turn out poorly
. again, for no particular reason.
"The real trick to picking where to sit is to make sure it is opposite someone who smiles at you when you return from the restroom; someone

who usually leads your suit and returns your lead. And the easiest way to find that seat is to provide those same courtesies for your partner when you take your seat at the table."

Listen to the man.
Tomorrow, we'll once again take on the tough problems in bridge. Until then, have fun. And remember, I'm one of the few people who really wants to hear about your newcomer experiences. You can e-mail me anytime at mronemus@comcast.net.

Bidding commentary: South is not strong enough to open, but is strong enough to accept

North's invitational raise. Note: North does not count the $\uparrow J$ as a point. Unsupported jacks in suits bid by the opponents are usually worthless - unless partner bids notrump.

Defensive commentary: After East cashes three spades, West must find a discard. As West, before discarding, ask yourself which suit you want partner to lead. If you said a diamond, think again. You want a spade! Look at your hearts. If partner leads a spade and declarer discards, your $\checkmark 8$ drives out the ace. The $\vee \mathrm{K}$ is now the setting trick. If declarer ruffs with an honor (likely), you will discard - and your $\vee \mathrm{K} 9$ will now produce a trick! This is one of those time when you want partner to give declarer a ruff and a sluff!

So how do you get partner to lead a spade? You make a discouraging discard in diamonds, the suit partner will be tempted to lead. If you discard the $\leqslant$, discouraging, it doesn't take an Einstein to figure out you want a spade. After all, how could you want a club?

## Baldwin NAP-A winners

Play in the Baldwin North American Pairs, Flight A - a grassroots event that began last summer at the local club level - began Wednesday.

Qualifiers at the club level advanced to unit competition and those qualifiers advanced to district finals. Three pairs from each district - more, depending upon attendance - qualified for the North American final.

Winners will have their names inscribed on the Baldwin Memorial Trophy and will also receive certificates of recognition.

The trophy is presented in memory of Col. Russell J. Baldwin (1889-1969), U.S. Army officer and expert on tournament procedure who was ACBL Honorary Member of the Year in 1943.

Baldwin was active as an organizer from the earliest days of contract bridge. He became a director of the American Bridge League and its treasurer shortly after its founding in 1927. He was a member of the ACBL Laws Commission and primarily responsible for the first Duplicate Code issued in 1935.

Baldwin was active as a tournament director from 1927 until 1941. After service in World War II, he was ACBL business manager from 1946 until 1951.

He was recalled to military serve at the outbreak of the Korean War and retired from the U. S. Army in 1957. He rejoined ACBL in 1958 and was in charge of tournament scheduling until his retirement in 1963.

George R. Brown Convention Center (GRBCC) and Hilton Americas garage. Please note there are no in-and-out privileges with the discounted parking. A person from the Houston Convention and Visitors Bureau will be at the entrance of the garage from 6 a.m. until 7:30 pm. Please identify yourself as a bridge player or show your convention card. You will be given a parking pass that must be presented to the parking attendant upon exit to receive the $\$ 5$ parking. The garage is connected to the Hilton Americas with a skywalk on the second floor of the hotel. There are 400 discounted spaces available. The availability will fluctuate each day depending on the number of overnight cars.

If you leave the garage you will have to pay for parking and upon re-entering you will have to get a new pass (if available).

Parking lot at Polk and Chenevert. Please note there are no in-and-out privileges with the discounted parking. The entrance for this lot is on Polk and is two blocks from the Hilton Americas Houston. There are 200 discounted parking spaces available. The cost is $\$ 5$ per day. You will pay upon entering the lot.

## Bored-a-match victory?

Toward the end of the second qualifying session of the North American Pairs, I was pressing hard in an ultimately unsuccessful campaign to qualify for the second day.

Maybe I did too much as West but at the time I thought I had my bids. Alex Ornstein was hoping to buy four trumps, of course.

The wily campaigner in the North seat won the opening club lead and returned the suit (a naïve diamond shift might have worked).

Alex ruffed and played the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$. When the queen appeared, he elected to unblock the diamond suit, playing to the singleton ace, then a heart to dummy allowed him to pitch a, club on the $\bullet K$. He then finessed North for the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} J$. Contract made.

When I asked why he had taken the apparently anti-percentage in spades (North clearly had five or six clubs from the auction, while South had three or four), he told me:
"Many years ago I read a story about an expert declarer who tranced in this position. When one of his opponents ordered a drink from a passing water, he played him for the missing card. Here, while I was thinking, North yawned three times. Nobody could be that disinterested - he had to have the critical card!"

Say you reach $4 \vee$ as South on a diamond lead. The normal but unsuccessful line is to play three rounds of diamonds, ruffing in dummy. Now you unblock hearts, play a spade to the king and cash the $\bullet$ A, finding out the bad news. Your only chance now is the trump endplay, and you need to reduce trumps twice to achieve that.

When you exit with your $\wedge$ Q, East must win and should not exit with a spade. If he does, you ruff, cross to the $\because$ A to ruff a spade, then exit with a club to collect one of the last two tricks. Instead, East plays a club at the critical moment, and you can no longer ruff two spades.

Armed with hindsight, can you do better? Yes, though protecting against 4-1 hearts onside with West having a low singleton trump is against the odds.

There are lines involving trump endplays where you don't cash the $\downarrow$. Win the diamond lead in dummy and play a spade to the king. Then exit with the $\leadsto Q$. Now you can arrange to ruff a spade while you still have an entry to dummy. When you test hearts to find the 4-1 break, you can then use the remaining entry to North to ruff again.

After two hearts, three diamonds, four rounds of spades and the $\because \mathrm{A}$, you can exit with a second club and collect a trump trick from your J-9.

## All Pass

Krekorian led the $\because 2: 7$, 3, Q. Declarer played the $\uparrow$ K, ducked by Krekorian. Rengstorff played the $\uparrow$, suit preference for spades.

Krekorian won the next diamond with the ace and stopped to consider. He could count declarer for at least the heart ace (no opening bid without it), four diamonds, two clubs, two top spades, and he inferred that declarer had three spades from his partner's count card in clubs at trick one, marking declarer with three clubs as well. Declarer surely was $3=5=2=3$, so Krekorian knew North could duck a spade to get three tricks in that suit. Krekorian reasoned that it couldn't cost to switch to the $\downarrow \mathrm{K}$ and it might gain, so he played the high heart. Declarer won the A, played a spade to dummy's ace and ran diamonds, pitching a heart and his other two clubs.

Declarer then exited with the $\boldsymbol{\bullet} \mathbf{J}$, pitching another heart. Krekorian won the $\& \mathrm{~A}$ and could have cashed the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$ and played a heart to his partner's jack to hold declarer to nine tricks, but he gave North a chance to go wrong, continuing with a low spade. Declarer, aware that the defense had been pretty sharp to that point, hoped to regain some matchpoints by making an overtrick, so he ducked, not unreasonably playing the takeout doubler for the $\uparrow \mathrm{Q}$. Rengstorff won the $\uparrow \mathrm{Q}$ and the defense cashed out for one down. That was 13 out of 13 matchpoints.

## Open Pairs competitors vie for Silodor Trophy

The Silodor Open Pairs is a four-session event consisting of two qualifying and two final sessions. The winners' names are engraved on the Silodor Trophy, presented in memory of Sidney Silodor, winner of the Bermuda Bowl, the McKenney Trophy and more than 30 North American championships.

Silodor, a member of the team that won the first Bermuda Bowl World Championship in 1950, won the Vanderbilt eight times, the Reisinger six times, the Spingold, the Open Pairs and the Master Mixed Teams three times each and the Mixed Pairs five times.

Barry Crane holds the record in the event with seven victories.

Silodor was an original member of the Bridge Hall of Fame, elected in the Sixties when the institution was the province of its creator, The Bridge World magazine.

The trophy was presented in 1963 in memory of Silodor and made retroactive to include winners of the event, which began in 1958.

## Houston 2002: A look back

The last NABC held in Houston was Spring of 2002. The table count was $10,656.5$ and Paul Soloway was the leading masterpoint winner with 357. Jeff Meckstroth was second with 292. NABCs were also held here in Spring of 1978 and Fall of 1970.

The tournament drew players from 17 countries, fewer than usual. Norman Kay was remembered at a memorial service. Dan Morse and Gary Blaiss were given a Goodwill tribute. The World Bridge Federation announced that revisions to the Laws of Duplicate Bridge were under consideration.

For your life, rise with the $\wedge \mathrm{A}$, lead a heart to the king and run the $\mathbf{v} 10$ into East. Assuming this loses, you have nine sure tricks, and a 10th if the clubs are 3-3.

If you duck the spade lead or put in the queen, the cards could lie in such a way that you would live to regret your greediness. East could shift to a diamond.

True, with the actual lie of the cards, you could still come out of this by rising with the ace and finessing a heart into West. Even if the finesse fails, the defenders could take only two more diamonds, but then again the diamonds might be placed differently, and you could lose three or even more diamonds tricks.

On the other hand, if you duck the diamond switch around to the queen, the cards might be as you see them. West wins and plays a second spade, which you duck again. This time, East wins and returns a second diamond, and you feel as if your head is on a swivel. You now find yourself down to guessing the Q for your contract. Ugh.

## Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a $1 / 6$-board
matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

## Bid Box Alerts and Announcements

When using bid boxes, ACBL suggests that players tap the Alert strip and say "Alert" at the same time.

When making an Announcement, use the Announcement word - such as "transfer" - and tap the Alert strip at the same time.

A player who Alerts or Announces a bid should make sure his opponents are aware that an Alert or Announcement has been made.
