## Surprise! You've been elected to the Bridge Hall of Fame!

It's not often that ACBL Goodwill Committee Chair Aileen Osofsky is rendered speechless, but it happened (almost) at Monday's meeting of the committee she has served for so long and so well.

Osofsky had just finished introducing Mark

Lair, newly elected to the ACBL Bridge Hall of Fame, and was listening on the side as Steve Robinson, a member of the selection committee, described the different ways a person can earn a cherished spot in the Hall.
"You can be elected the way Mark was," Robinson explained, "or you can be given the von Zedtwitz Award, for people who would have been elected in their time as players but who aren't known to many now.'

Explaining further, Robinson said the third way is to receive the Blackwood Award, for individual contributions to bridge without necessarily being a great player.

The latest recipient of the
Blackwood Award, Robinson said, was chosen by unanimous vote of the Hall of Fame committee - "and it's the chairman of this meeting."

You could have knocked Osofsky over with a feather, and she breathlessly took the podium as the assembled group took to their feet for a rousing ovation.
"It's more than I can believe," Osofsky said. "I do this because I love it, and everyone makes me feel so welcome . . . I better shut up now.'

There was more: "Don't tell my son (Alan Osofsky) that I didn't know what to say."

The standing ovation for Osofsky was the second one of the meeting, the first being for Lair, who will be inducted into the Hall of Fame at the 2009 Summer NABC in Washington DC. Betty Ann Kennedy, already in the Hall of Fame, told the group she was honored to call Lair a friend. "He is the epitome of the Southern gentleman," she said, "and he is a born-again Christian who lives his

# (I UST FOR NEW PLAYERS 

## Dear New Players:

## By Marti Ronemus

Here's an e-mail that was in my box this morning. "Dear Marti, I'm having a wonderful time here in Houston, but I've got a problem. There aren't enough potty breaks, and when they DO have one, there are too many people heading for
 the same spot. Do you have any advice? Signed, Cross-legged in Ballroom Five."

Didn't I tell you I would tackle the problems no one else will? This is a problem I personally understand. I was making plans to go to Washington for Inauguration Day until my husband reminded me I would be more than an hour from a potty at any given time.

This is not a trivial problem. What good is remembering that you play reverse Drury if all you can think about is your next potty break? And, naturally I've got advice.

1. Know the location of every single restroom. Often there are restrooms that aren't as much on the beaten track as others. I found a super one at Gatlinburg and another Hunt Valley. And no, don't ask me, because I'm not sharing!
2. Get a table near the door. If you buy your entry early, you can often get a table exactly where you want to be. The closer to the exit near your selected restroom, the better.
3. Wear sneakers. You want to be able to get a running start when a window of opportunity opens.

The best strategy of all, however, is Learn to play faster!! Listen, gang...seven and a half minutes a board is enough time to play your boards, go potty, get a drink of water (oh, did I mention? There's a link between fluid consumption and potty breaks!), and take a nap. If you learn to play faster you can schedule your own breaks.

The benefits of playing faster are myriad: Everyone will love you, as rapid play gives everyone a chance for a break! Also, slow play conversely makes you despised and scorned. There are actually some very foolish people who play
slowly as a (supposed) strategy for good boards. They think their opponents are so dumb that they'll forget what cards have been played! Just how long does it take to play 13 cards, anyway?

The key to playing faster is to make a plan when the dummy comes down. Whether you are declarer or defender, take a minute, visualize the hands based on the bidding, and make your plan.

As declarer, take time to read the opening lead. Often that will give you the placement of all five honors in the suit led. You'll start to get a feeling for where the cards you need to finesse are. Know how many more tricks you need, then make your plan and get going. You may have to change in mid-stream, but (to mix metaphors) you can't get out of the garage 'til you've got a map. There are whole books written on making your plan. Read them.

Know that no matter how long you look at those cards, they won't turn into aces. I've watched people stare at the cards, rub them, squeeze them, change their position in the hand. None of it works. They will still be losers.

And finally, and probably most important, T.C.O.B.( Take Care of Business)! First, play the hands. Save the conversation for when the boards are finished. Get the cards out of the board! Once cards are out of the board, all talking about past boards or chit-chat ceases. Smile extremely nicely at the new arrivals, a quick, "Hi, I'm Sally and this is George," and get down to it! Save the, "Oh, you're from Pittsburgh. Do you know my cousin Charlie?" for after the boards.

If the people are still talking about other boards when they arrive, just pull the cards out of the board and say sweetly, "Let's see what mysteries this hand holds," and take it from there.


If anyone wants to discuss the board, say - again, nicely - "Let's finish all these first." Sometimes you'll be following a slow pair and these techniques will be especially needed. "Let's play these and get caught up."

If you follow all this advice, you'll be far ahead of the rest of the gang, and well able to take a break whenever you want one. Ah, sweet relief.

I can't wait to see what other problems you want solved. Remember, here's where you get the honest scoop on the real problems of bridge. I'm waiting, with advice on every possible subject. Sometimes it's even right. mronemus@comcast.net

## Thinking bridge <br> By Eddie Kantar

 Michaels cuebid, showing 5-5 or 6-5 in the majors (either way) with typically 7-11 HCP. North has a choice of responses. One is to leap to $5 \star$, another is to cuebid $2 \boldsymbol{\downarrow}$, one of the opponent's known suits, showing a strong hand with diamonds. A third is to make a game-forcing jump in one of their suits to show a singleton in that suit with great support. No
point in bidding hearts naturally when West is known to have at least five!

Lead commentary: Even though East has shown something in hearts, dummy has shown a singleton heart and a spade lead stands out like a beacon.

## Play

commentary: From declarer's perspective, the spade position is recurring. It is very likely that the suit is breaking 5-2. If so, by winning the second spade, you cut the spade communication between the EastWest hands. Observe. You win the second spade, draw trumps and drive out the $\bullet \mathrm{A}$. East wins, but has no spade to return, so you can discard a spade on a high club. If you win the first spade (ugh!), East can return a spade upon
winning the $\bullet \mathrm{A}$, and now you lose two spades and a club. The general rule when playing a trump contract holding $A-x-x$ facing $x-x-x$ in the suit that has been led - one high card to remove - is to win the second round of the suit.

Planes, trains \& automobiles

My husband, Alex, and I decided to go to Reno for their annual New Year's Regional. We arrived in Reno on Dec. 23 and had arranged to fly to Los Angeles on Dec. 24 and to fly back the same day. We just wanted to visit a close friend, Alan Le Bendig, who we hadn't seen in ages.

Calling home to check voice mail before crashing in Reno ... a message from Alaska Airlines: "Don’t go to the airport in Reno on 24th, the flight is canceled." The return portion was still intact from L.A. back to Reno

We called Alaska Airlines and were told to call American Airlines (go figure). AA put us instead on to US Air, Phoenix to LA. We'd be in L.A. three hours later than planned, but it would have to do

We shelved all plans of playing bridge with our friends in L.A. and planned just a short visit for lunch. That all worked out ...at LAX, about to return to Reno, about to board the plane at 5.45 p.m. Alaska Air announced: "The flight is canceled. Go to the ticket counter."

Never go to the ticket counter when they tell you to. There are already 40 people ahead of you who have been bumped. There is one person in charge dealing with all of it and the line moves at a snail's pace.

It was Christmas eve, so there weren't any other flights available anyway. So back to the phone to call American Airlines. They were kind but could only get us a flight back to Reno on Dec. 29 (it was now the 24th).

One of the few things I dislike about this game is the way good bridge can sometimes go unrewarded. Take a look at this deal from the final of the Silodor Open Pairs:

Obviously you would like to like to bid a slam on the North-South cards, and it is not impossible to construct an auction where North-South go All In, for example:

even in a star-studded field, but you would expect a fair number of pairs to reach six hearts.

Alas, those heart slams appear to be doomed by the $4-1$ heart break A quick glance at the recap sheets did not reveal a single plus 1430. (If anyone made the slam, report it to the Daily Bulletin!)

As a play problem, seven hearts is easy. You have to assume trumps will divide 3-2, so all you need to do is ruff two diamonds.

You could adopt that line in six hearts, but it's not clear to me how important that potential overtrick might be, as in a pairs event a making slam is always a decent board.

On a diamond lead declarer can win with the ace, ruff a diamond and then play a trump, simply covering West's card. Even if East wins with a singleton honour it will be easy enough to arrange one more diamond ruff and draw trumps.

That is certainly the indicated line at IMPs, where making the contract is all important.

If West finds a spade lead (a decent choice against six hearts) declarer does not have the luxury of the safety play in trumps.

Do you feel that the North-South pairs who reached a slam on this deal were hard done by along with all the East-West pairs who saw their opponents stop in game?

## TOURNAMENT APPEALS

## APPEAL CASE 1

Subject: Unauthorized Information - Tempo
Event: Silodor Open Pairs
Session: First Qualifying


All Pass
(1) East-West alleged a break in tempo (BIT) disputed by North-South.

Facts: The opening lead was the $*$. The contract made 6NT for a North-South score of plus 990. The director was called after the play. East alleged a 30 -second break in temp (BIT) and West alleged a BIT of 20-30 seconds at South's first turn to call. North-South thought the BIT was between seven and 10 seconds. North stated that the reason she pulled 3NT was because of the lack of a diamond stopper.

Director's Ruling: The director judged: that
(1) There was an unmistakable BIT and that unauthorized information was available from that BIT.
(2) The UI demonstrably suggested that North bid rather than pass.
(3) That pass was a logical alternative - in fact, normally after one opens 1 NT and partner responds 3NT (without first mentioning another suit), there is no logical alternative call other than pass.

In accordance with Laws 12 and 16, therefore, the director adjusted the table result to 3NT by North, making seven, and a score of North-South plus 520

The Appeal: Both pairs appealed and all four players attended the hearing.

The STOP card was not used. North-South felt the time taken was ten seconds. North was worried that South did not have a diamond stopper. A double by South would have been negative. South said she considered double and thought of 4NT right after she bid 3NT.

Time was close to 30 seconds according to East-West. They considered that pass was a logical alternative. East said that he might lead the ace of diamonds against 3NT.

Because perceptions of time can differ, the committee asked each player in turn to demonstrate the length of the hesitation by waiting as long as the hesitation at the table had taken and then saying
"3NT." North took nine seconds, South 12.5, East 17, and West 25 seconds.

The Decision: The committee found the following:
(1) There was an unmistakable hesitation, partially because South took well over 10 seconds in the demonstration.
(2) The BIT demonstrably suggested doubt about 3NT as a contract.
(3) Pass is a logical alternative.

The committee judged that leading the $\bullet$ A was unlikely, and some felt a self-serving statement by East-West. The committee judged, however, that on a normal heart lead declarer would likely play on diamonds for her twelfth trick. Therefore, in accordance with Laws 12 and 16, the committee adjusted the result to 3NT by North, making six, North-South and a score of plus 490 for both sides.

Both appeals were found to have merit.
DIC: Henry Cukoff
Committee: Aaron Silverstein (Chair), Ed Lazarus, John Lusky, Chris Moll and Jim Thurtell.


Facts: South led the $\boldsymbol{a} \mathbf{J}$ and 3NT made three for an East-West score of plus 600. The director was called at the end of play of the deal.

Before the opening lead, South asked about the 3*: bid and was told that it was checkback. He asked if 3NT was a choice of games. East said, "I don't know." West said nothing, and later said it was undiscussed.

Director's Ruling: There was no evidence that East-West had any undisclosed agreements. In accordance with Law 40, the table result of 3NT by East making three, and a score of East-West plus 600 , was allowed to stand for both sides.

The Appeal: North-South appealed the director's decision. East was the only player who did not attend the hearing.

South believed that there must have been a partnership agreement. He suggested that East must know that it showed 4-4 in the majors or he would have corrected to $4 \boldsymbol{v}$.

West confirmed that they had no partnership agreement, and, recently at East's request, had agreed to stop playing Wolff signoff.

The Decision: South implied that had he known that West was showing 4-4 in the majors, he'd have led a diamond instead of a spade.

South and West confirmed their difference of interpretation when asked whether 3NT was "choice of games."

After reviewing Laws 20, 40 and 41 (with assistance from the screening director, Olin Hubert), the committee found no evidence of a partnership understanding.

Therefore, the director's decision to allow the table result of 3NT by East making three, and an East-West score of plus 600 was upheld.

The appeal was found to have merit.

Jay Baum, ACBL's chief executive, offered congratulations to Lair and Osofsky and noted that the ACBL "has only two things to offer masterpoints and goodwill." He said Lair and Osofsky should be "in other halls of fame too."

Former ACBL President Dan Morse, who represents District 16 on the ACBL Board of Directors, talked about his choices for the 2009 Volunteers of the Year - Houstonians Eric Snow and Bert Onstott.

Snow, Morse said, has served in a variety of capacities, including chair of two NABCS, unit and district president, "and he does everything that anyone asks him to do."

Onstott, said Morse, "is the most organized person in the world. He helped set up an online partnership service."

Also on the agenda was announcement of grants from the ACBL Charitable Foundation, which awards funds to districts on a rotating basis. It's the district's choice in how to allocate the funds. Receiving \$5000 each are Texas Hearing and Service Dogs and the BlueBird Circle (for children with neurological problems), both of Houston; the Family Guidance \& Outreach Center of Lubbock, and Meals on Wheels Plus of Abilene.

## Slow Play

Slow play, as opposed to careful or thoughtful play, is discourteous to your opponents - and to all other competitors as well. Players and pairs who take more than their allotted time are subject to penalty.

In general, pairs who are rarely late will be warned while pairs who are habitually tardy and/or pay no attention to time limits will be penalized.

Let＇s say you pass 3NT．Now switch to the defense．

You lead the $\downarrow$ Q，and declarer wins the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ as partner drops a discouraging 2．Declarer leads a heart to the queen，then plays four rounds of clubs， your partner winning the $\& \mathrm{~J}$ on the fourth round． Declarer pitches two hearts on the third and fourth clubs，what do you discard？At the table，West pitched a heart and a diamond．

After winning the $\boldsymbol{\&} \mathrm{J}$ ，your partner continues with the 4.

Finally，as declarer，you get to see the full deal：

As declarer，you take the first diamond，lead a heart to the queen，which holds，play four rounds of clubs and win the diamond return as West pitches a heart and a diamond．You cash the $\mathrm{A}-$ no king appears．You now have a choice of lines： you can play a spade to the king，hoping the defenders have only two diamonds to cash，with the $\uparrow$ A onside．Or you can play for 6－2 diamonds with the $\boldsymbol{A}$ offside by exiting with a heart to endplay East．

To decide，consider how West would have discarded if he had the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} \mathrm{A}$ and five diamonds．He would have pitched a spade，not a diamond，of course．So you must play East for the $\uparrow A$ ．

So who got the board right at the table？Not North，who should have corrected to $4 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$ ，which is easy on a diamond lead．Not West，who should have pitched a spade，not a diamond，and not South，who failed to draw the right inference and went down anyway．

## It＇s bridge，J im， but not as we know it

The first episode of Star Trek was broadcast on Sept．8， 1966 on the American television network NBC．Since then it＇s become an enormous franchise，spawning feature films，spin－off series， magazines，books，songs，toys and of course，many famous phrases．

One of the classic lines occurred when，on seeing new life on a strange planet，Dr．McCoy turned to Captain Kirk and said in an ominous tone： ＂It＇s life，Jim，but not as we know it．＂

I have unashamedly adapted it to reveal some of the stranger happenings I have encountered so far－ and the tournament has hardly begun！

In the modern game，you will not find too many people passing on those East cards，and when the Rabbi elected to kick off with a somewhat eccentric opening bid，he stole the pot．

West led the queen of spades and declarer won with the ace and played a heart to dummy＇s ten． When that held，the Rabbi boldly went where no Rabbi has gone before（You knew I was going to split that infinitive，didn＇t you？）and played a diamond．If East had risen with the ace，the defenders would still be taking tricks，but he played low and the Rabbi won with the king and reverted to hearts．West won and continued with a spade and South won and cashed out．（I can＇t help wondering．．．if declarer ducks the second spade would West have played another？）

Plus 90 was by no means a top，as several East－ West pairs attempted 3NT and，oblivious to the Rabbi＇s Rule，an early diamond finesse saw them go crashing off．

A sure way to end up with a poor result is to be uncertain about the strength of partner＇s bid－as in this example：

For some reason West thought three hearts was intermediate．

Declarer ruffed the diamond lead and tried a spade to the king．North won and switched to a heart，so South took the queen and ace，cashed the queen of spades and played a club．The ace followed by another spade trick completed the rout．

My next example is one of those annoying situations where good defence not only goes
unrewarded，but also ends up earning a dreadful result：

## 3NT All Pass

North led the seven of clubs，and when South put in the jack，West ducked．

With so many points in dummy，the realistic target for the defence is three tricks and it is clear that the most likely place to find one is in the diamond suit．If partner＇s diamond is the ace，it doesn＇t matter what you do，but if it is the king it will be catastrophic if you cash the ace of clubs－ declarer will then have four spades，five hearts，and a trick in each minor．

So the indicated defence is to switch to a diamond．Declarer put up the king，North took the ace and returned．．．．a diamond．Goodbye top，hello bottom．

（1）Single－suited hand．
When North leads a spade－the queen was the card chosen at several tables－declarer won with the king，crossed to dummy with a heart and played a club．I hope you were ready with the ace，as the subsequent spade return gives your side the next six tricks．

Even if you didn＇t，you may be consoled by the fact that minus 600 was comfortably above average， as some Norths bid too many spades and went for a number，while others decided a spade lead was far too likely to give up a vital trick．

West leads a low club to East＇s $\boldsymbol{\bullet} \mathrm{K}$ and your ＊A．You draw trumps in three rounds and East pitches the $\downarrow$ ．Since East has an honest and open countenance，you lead a diamond from dummy to your $\diamond$ K．Mission accomplished：It holds．

East＇s bidding and discards mark him with four or more diamonds and five or more clubs． He＇s also shown up with two hearts，so he＇s short enough in spades that West cannot hold the doubleton $\uparrow$ K．It’s possible that West holds four spades，so you lead the $\uparrow Q$ to guard against a singleton 10， 9 or 8 in East＇s hand．West covers with the $\wedge K$ and you win dummy＇s $\uparrow A$ ，East following with the $\uparrow 4$ ．

You lead a low spade from dummy and East pitches．Rats！Spades are splitting 4－1．No justice． West wins and fires back a third spade，which you win with dummy＇s $\boldsymbol{\sim}$ J．You now have the choice of cashing your ten tricks or guessing to finesse for the $\boldsymbol{\bullet}$ ．A lead to your $\because 10$ will collect your 11th trick if it wins－or send you down one if it loses．

East＇s double of $2 \boldsymbol{*}$ with just $\boldsymbol{\sim} \mathrm{Kx} \mathrm{x} \mathrm{x} \mathrm{x}$ would be remarkably aggressive－particularly with a stiff spade and the A ，which means he would not mind the lead of either red suit．That convinces you to try the finesse for the $\boldsymbol{\bullet} \mathrm{J}$ ．

I was shown this deal－Board 1 from the first final session of the Silodor Open Pairs－as an example of the benefits of restraint in the auction．

At many tables，West heard his partner overcall
1A and chose to punt 5 a，doubled and down 500.
However，when Craig Huston held the West cards， he sold out to a $3 \vee$ contract by South．I marveled at his restraint，but Craig correctly pointed out that 4＊ doubled would be set two and cost 300 points．

Curiously，South＇s $3 \vee$ contract is makeable－ though it was not managed at the table．West will lead his $\uparrow \mathrm{A}$ ，then shift to the $\approx \mathrm{K}$ ．As declarer， you＇ll win dummy＇s $\& A$ and guess to play three rounds of hearts．West wins the third heart and plays a diamond，which you win in dummy．You＇ve now reached this ending：

You have eight tricks in the bag and need to set up one more．You can see that playing a spade or a diamond from dummy will lead to immediate failure．The winning line is two loser－on－loser plays： Lead dummy＇s $\& 7$ and pitch a spade from your hand，then pitch a diamond from hand when West leads the next club！You＇ll ruff West＇s next club lead，then run your trumps and squeeze East in spades and diamonds．That＇s how to rectify the count！

\section*{STRATIFIED SENIOR PAIRS}

In the "In Memorial Section" of the December Bridge Bulletin is a list of deceased bridge players. A number of them have an asterisk by their name denoting "Life Master". Milton was one of those.

But he was not your ordinary "Life Master". He was an excellent bridge player, poker player and entrepreneur who backed his unit financially, as well as playing with all comers. He loved people and would play with "the good, the bad, and the horrible".

When you think of Milton "Life Master", remember that in real life and as a person he would have had over a million "masterpoints".

\section*{Convention card reminder}

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership
may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a \(1 / 6\)-board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director

If the director determines the partnership has
at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.```
