## Bridge players' bracketology

It's that time of year, when bridge players turn their attention to bracket matchups in two of their favorite sporting events - the Vanderbilt Knockout Teams and the NCAA Basketball Tournament.

It's not surprising that so many bridge players are also fans of athletic sports, but basketball seems to be a special passion. Some players are filling out bracket sheets right now, hoping to win cash prizes in their office pools. This weekend, they'll be sprinting down to the hotel bar between bridge rounds to check scores on TV.

Among the most ardent fans is Fred Hamilton, a graduate of Michigan State University. Fred grew up in East Lansing MI, where his father, an MSU professor, moonlighted as a ticket-taker at the basketball arena. Fred was just eight years old when his dad began sneaking him into the stands, and he's been a diehard fan ever since.

Fred believes his Spartans are talented enough to beat any team in the tournament, but were plagued by inconsistency during the regular season.
"I'd love to see them in the Final Four," said Fred, "but my best guess is they lose in the Elite Eight."

Fred sees many parallels between bridge and basketball. "Both require skill, but luck is a big factor, too," said Fred. "Some days, even your good, open shots
 - and your best bridge decisions - keep missing the target and bouncing the opponents' way. Other days, the shots go in, the contracts make and you feel like nothing bad can happen."

Tournament director Rick Beye of Memphis TN is an admitted basketball junkie. He arranged his NABC directing schedule to provide maximum time for TV viewing when the first-round games begin

## Down 67 IMPs? No problem for the Nickell team

How do you come back from 67 IMPs down with 32 boards to play?

Ask the team that has made more remarkable comebacks than any other: Nick Nickell, Richard Freeman, Jeff Meckstroth, Eric Rodwell and Bob Hamman, along with the sixth team member, first Bobby Wolff, then Paul Soloway and now Zia Mahmood. They use controlled aggression. You cannot afford to give away 13IMP swings. You must try to pitch a shutout and attempt to push the opponents into errors.

To see how this works, you could have watched the second half of the Round of 64 of the

The team captained by Aubrey Strul, seeded No. 3, fell behind in the opening quarter of their Vanderbilt Knockout Teams match against the French team led by Franck Multon and were dispatched 144-92

Multon's teammates are Pierre Zimmerman, Thomas Bessis, Frederic Volcker and Lionel Sebbane. Strul played with Mike Becker, Larry Cohen, David Berkowitz, Chip Martel and Lew Stansby.

Most of the rest of the matches ran true to form. The top-seeded Nick Nickell team, who had to rally from 67 down at the half to advance on Monday, made sure there was no drama in Tuesday's action as they stretched an 18-IMP halftime lead over Dan Morse and company to 68 after three quarters on the way to a 155-96 win.

The closest match of the day involved the No. 5 seed, captained by Ron Rubin,who had to rally in the fourth set to defeat Uday Ivatury 123-122.

## League of nations

In the round of 32 in the Vanderbilt Knockout Teams, 61 of the 176 players slightly more than one-third - are top-class foreign internationals from 12 countries. France and the Netherlands have the most players at 10 each.

Here are the numbers from other countries: Sweden, 8; Italy, 7; China, 6; Norway, Poland and Russia, 4 each; Japan, England, Israel and Egypt, 2 each.

## Canadian pair leads Mixed

Michael Yuen, of Vancouver BC, and K Fung, of Edmonton AB , lead the 130 pairs who qualified for today's final in the Rockwell Mixed Pairs. Their carryover is 189.30 , nearly three boards. The pair scored $64.19 \%$ in the first qualifying session and followed with $60.88 \%$ in the evening.

Sylvia Caley, of Montreal, and Simon Kantor, of Agawam MA, are close behind the leaders with 187.71. Last year's winners, Gail Greenberg and Jeffrey Hand, lie in third with 168.28.

The winners will have their names inscribed on the Rockwell Trophy. It was donated by Helen Rockwell in 1946.

Over East's 3 overcall, Allen decided not to lose the possible spade fit and tried a negative double rather than 3NT. This gave me a serious problem: I was too strong for $4 \star$ and my clubs were not good enough for five. So, I decided to try the 4-3 heart fit. Allen bid Key Card Blackwood, and when I showed three he tried 6NT.

West dutifully led his diamond, and after some thought East won and shifted to the $\uparrow$ Q. Before tackling clubs, Allen decided to get more information. He won the $\boldsymbol{A} A$ in dummy, and took the (almost) certain diamond finesse. West showed out. East has seven of them. He cashed the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$. East followed with the 10, then showed out when he cashed the jack. Allen next cashed three hearts, both opponents following.

So now he knew twelve of East's cards: seven diamonds, two spades and three hearts. He cashed the $\approx \mathrm{A}$; East followed. All 13. He led the $\boldsymbol{\approx} \mathbf{J}$, and finessed into the known void.

Plus 990 was worth 22.5 on a 25 top.

## NABC Insider

Yesterday, the Insider was reminded that the ACBL gives employee performance reviews around the first of April each year. He was reminded of this when the Supreme C. came down from the 42nd floor executive suite to observe the Insider in action. Since the S.C. didn't come down until 1:30 p.m. as the Insider was heading off to lunch, he didn't see much. Because we may not see him again before he flies off to some tropical locale, the Insider is not expecting much positive in his review. So far, the input has been that the Insider's notes have been inaccurate, exaggerated and often completely made up. (The very reasons many of our fans read our musings each day.) # UST FOR NEW PLAYERS 

## Dear New Players:

## By Marti Ronemus

Isn't it great to be out of the gloom-and-doom world for a while? I know when I'm at an NABC, the only newspaper I see is this one...and it's plenty! Who needs to know more?
 Everything will be waiting for us when we get home, so this is an island of peace. Sort of.

Today, however, I'm going to drag in a little of what we are all escaping. Whatever your political persuasion, it's hard to deny that we all, as individuals and a nation, have been spending money we didn't have.

Does this have anything to do with bridge? It sure does! I see new players spending money they don't have all the time. Let's talk about some of the ways you do this. The big one is this:

Not recognizing the importance of limit bids. Even though bridge is, in my humble opinion, as much an art form as a science, it still involves the ability to add. Once one of you has made a bid that shows a point count, it is (usually) up to the other partner to Do The Math and place the contract. Let me give an example from Real Life. I was playing with a beginner, and I held this hand:

- 54 QQ 106 • 843 ャK Q J 86.

Nothing special, right? Pard opened $1 \downarrow$. I analyzed my options: As nice as my clubs are, I can't buy a new suit at the two level. That costs 10 and I only have 9 ( 8 HCP plus 1 for the fifth club). I could bid 1 NT , but while that would show my point count and fairly balanced hand, it would deny holding a heart fit. So I choose the sensible, budget-conscious $2 \downarrow$. That bid says it all...6-9 points and a fit with pard's suit.

Please write this down somewhere: The rebid of an old suit at the 2-level shows a minimum hand. I rebid an old suit at the two level and
partner now knows my point count. Simple, right? Minimum for responder is $6-9$ or 10 (12-14 or 15 for opener). Next thing I see is her $3 \vee$. Wow.

Now write this down also: the rebid of an old suit at the three level promises an intermediate hand. (By the way, we are talking auctions where the opponents are silent.)

She has just shown me 16-18 points (intermediate for opener. Intermediate for responder is $10-12$ ). Her bid is invitational and says the same thing all invitational bids say: "If you are at the top of your range, take us to the next bonus level."

Well, now I'm on the hook. When I bid 2 $\mathbf{\bullet}$, I thought it was her problem. Now that she has limited her hand, I'm the one with the problem. Well, let's do the math.


My 9, plus her 16 means we have at least 25 points, and as high as 27 . I've got two honors in our suit, and some nice tricks in my clubs. Sounds like game to me, right? I'm at the top of my range, so I take us to the next bonus level and bid $4 \vee$.

Turns out she only had 14 solid points (which by an optimist could be stretched to 15) but wanted me to know she "had extra."

Extra what?! Had she Done The Math when I showed 6-9, she would have known we didn't have game. When I mentioned that 15 plus a max of 9 is only 24 , which isn't game (usually), her reply was that we weren't vulnerable.

That cracking sound you hear is me banging my head on the wall.

So, let's talk budgets. Repeat after me, out loud: The rebid of an old suit at the two level promises a minimum hand. The rebid of an old suit at the three level promises an intermediate hand. If you can get a solid grasp on these two principles, you will go a long way toward balancing your budgets. And we each have to do what we can to help our nation in crisis.

That's my story and I'm stickin' to it. Let me know how you're doing and what you're doing to help your bridge economy. mronemus@comcast.net.

Bidding commentary: Playing support doubles, North's raise to $2 \vee$ shows four hearts. A double of $1 \wedge$ would show three hearts. Not playing support doubles, a single raise (as many play) can show three or four hearts. In any case, South, with a double fit (an upgrade), has a clear cut $4 \vee$ bid.

Lead commentary: Suits headed by the Q-J-9 are normally strong leads. East signals
encouragement with the $\uparrow 8$, the highest equal, at trick one.

Play commentary: The North-South hands have mirror (identical) distribution. Mirror distributions lead to strip and endplay strategies. Declarer wins the ^A, draws trumps, strips diamonds from the opponents' hands and exits with a spade, hoping for something good to happen in clubs. Defensive commentary: After declarer strips the hand and exits a spade, East wins the $\boldsymbol{\sim} \mathrm{K}$ and has a lot of information. Partner has shown out on third round of each red suit and needs five spades for the overcall.
Translation: South has exactly three clubs, and three club tricks are needed to defeat the contract. cruises and writing.

Furthermore, East can lead clubs only once. East must project West to have the A-Q-J-x and lead the $\boldsymbol{\&} 10$. This lead prevents South from ducking the trick into West, forcing a club lead from the ace.

It was surprising to see both South players double with a spade void．Did they really want to have to bid five hearts after $1 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$－Dbl－4＾－Pass； Pass－？Overcalling two hearts，then doubling some number of spades would have given a good description．

Kleinplatz should have settled for four hearts， which would have shown a good hand given his initial double．But he was thinking about a slam despite the spade duplication．

Rodwell was happy to double five hearts．
At the other table，it was surprising that East opened two spades with three first－round controls， and the auction timed better for Zia．

The play started similarly：spade to the king， ace and ruff；heart ace；heart seven to West＇s jack； spade to dummy＇s queen，club discarded．Now， though，South played a club from the board and East erred by rushing in with his ace．Now Zia could hold his losses to three hearts and one club for down one．As Zia said，＂It＇s embarrassing to make a slam try，then to go down in game．＂

Plus 800 and minus 50 gave Nickell 13 IMPs．
This was the next deal：

（1）14－16 points．
（2）Puppet Stayman（asking about five－card
majors）．
（3）No five－card major．
（4）Four spades and fewer than four hearts．
（5）Exactly five diamonds（with $4=6$ he would
have started with simple Stayman）．
（6）Roman Key Card Blackwood for diamonds．
（7）Two key cards and the diamond queen．
（8）Asking for side－suit kings
（9）Theoretically denying one，but West was not interested in a grand slam．

Where was the spade queen？Given the 6－2 club break，the odds favored South．So West ruffed a heart in his hand and cashed his last trump，unblocking dummy＇s spade jack in case North had started with the singleton ten．This squeezed South in the majors．He threw a spade， of course，so Rodwell took the last trick with his spade nine．

Minus 690 and plus 1370 gave Nickell 12 IMPs．

The auctions were strange on the next deal．

Why would South open one spade on a 9－ count，especially when well ahead in the match？ And why would North pass when ace－doubleton
of diamonds and two aces in partner＇s hand probably makes 3NT laydown？Meckstroth made 10 tricks in 3NT．

Against three diamonds doubled，East led the club ace，then shifted accurately to the heart queen．But Hamman guessed trumps correctly to escape for down two，losing one spade，two hearts，one diamond and two clubs．

Plus 430 and minus 300 gave Nickell 4 IMPs．
Board 46 was worth 3 IMPs to Nickell，but it could have been more．Lord was in four spades on a 4－3 fit that ran into a 5－1 break and went down three．Rodwell was in five clubs on a $6-2$ fit．The defenders could have immediately cashed three heart tricks，but had a signaling accident and took only two of them．Now Rodwell could have made the contract．He had to guess who had the club queen with A－10－8－6－3－2 opposite K－J．He played over to the king and ran the jack on the way back， losing to the doubleton queen．

But the session was not all Nickell．This was the final deal of the set：

Against Zia，Lord led the diamond ten．
Declarer took the trick with his king and returned a diamond，West rising with his ace and shifting to the heart seven．South，perhaps thinking that West must have had all unappealing leads to select the diamond ten，ducked．East produced the king and led back a heart．Zia had to lose two spade tricks， and another went with the bath water for down two．

Against Kleinplatz，Rodwell led a heart． Declarer rose with dummy＇s ace and played the diamond queen around to West＇s ace．Back came a heart，ruffed by South．The diamond king was followed by a diamond ruff，a heart ruff，another diamond ruffed with the spade eight，and dummy＇s two top clubs．This brought West down to his four trumps．He had to ruff the next club play from the board and concede two trump tricks to declarer for his contract．Nicely done！

Plus 100 and plus 420 gave Kleinplatz 11 IMPs．They were still ahead by 35 IMPs with 16 boards to play，but the bookies made it about a 50 － 50 affair．

The leaders changed seats．
Zia produced a typical piece of magic on the fourth board．But first，you have this hand in fourth position with both sides vulnerable：
＾A Q 65 •A972 $642 ヶ A Q$
It goes $1 \downarrow$－Pass $-1 \downarrow$ to you．What would you do？（In case this influences your decision，at one table opener was known to have at least two diamonds，at the other at least four．）

The choices are pass，double，one spade and one notrump．We can quickly reject pass and
double. That leaves the overcall that shows some values, but lacks a fifth spade, and the intervention that describes the hand-type and strength well, but suffers from a diamond flaw.

Zia, whose opponent had shown four-plus diamonds, bid one notrump and was raised to three. West led the heart ten. This was what Zia could see. What would you have done in his position?

Against two diamonds, North led the spade king and continued his second spade, South taking two tricks in the suit while North discarded the heart eight. South cashed his heart ace, gave his partner a ruff, won the next trick with his club ace, and played another heart. Rodwell got this right, ruffing high and cashing his other top trump to escape for down one.

The first trick at Zia's table contained the ten, jack, queen and ace of hearts. Now Zia led his club queen: five, two, seven (upside down). Judging that West had started with king-third, declarer brazenly played a low diamond toward dummy and scored the trick with the queen! And now the contract was unbeatable. Zia called for the heart eight, which was allowed to hold.

Declarer cashed dummy's spade king, played a spade to his ace, and continued with the heart nine. East won with his king and played a diamond, but after West took three winners in the suit, South had the last three tricks with the club ace, spade queen and heart seven. Zia had taken three spades, three hearts, one diamond and two clubs.

Meckwell had a smooth auction. When Rodwell could ask for the king, Meckstroth decided he had sufficient for the grand. Seven clubs, as you can see, was laydown.

The other auction went off the rails when Leonard inexplicably rebid two notrump instead of three clubs. He had easily enough to rebid three clubs then, if necessary, continue with four hearts over three notrump. After all, he could count ten top tricks. Of course, partner would have raised three clubs to four, and East could have leapt majestically to seven.

Note that seven notrump can be defeated only by a diamond lead from either side. Zia led the club ten, and declarer took all 13 tricks. Plus 1440 and minus 1020 gave Nickell 9 IMPs.

What strange happenings at both tables. Lord opened three clubs with a super-strong hand, then wouldn't sit for three notrump doubled, which was unbeatable. (Yes, maybe Rodwell would have run to a major via four clubs, and four hearts could have escaped for down one if declarer guessed well.)

Four clubs made five, of course.
Zia threw caution to the wind with his fiveclub opening and bought one of the best dummies
in history. Minus 150 and plus 750 gave Nickell 12 IMPs.

Lord let Meckstroth get away with robbery when he did not double three notrump. And the defense dropped a trick, letting declarer escape for down seven.

Zia could not double three diamonds (four diamonds anyone?) with only one spade. Also, East's defensive raise suggested that North would have some useful cards. So Zia overcalled three notrump.

West thought at great length over his lead, wondering if a diamond would concede the ninth trick. But perhaps remembering the earlier board when Zia had three low diamonds, West led the diamond queen.

Declarer won and ran his clubs. He then cashed his spade ace and played a heart to dummy's ace. With nine tricks in the bag, Zia ran dummy's heart nine and took 12 tricks: one spade, four hearts, one diamond and six clubs.

Minus 350 and plus 690 gave Nickell another 8 IMPs.

When the arithmetic was done, Nickell had won the last session by 71 IMPs to 25 and had taken the match by 11 IMPs, 183-172.

## Making something out of nothing

Charles Goren used to say you need 25 or 26 high－card points to make 3NT．Maybe Goren hadn＇t seen board No． 7 from the second qualifying session of the Silodor Open Pairs．


After Casen＇s 1NT rebid，his partner，Jim Krekorian，raised to $3 N T$ ．He liked his $\downarrow \mathrm{J}$ as a pusher．West led the 6 and the jack held the trick．Casen could count four diamonds，one spade，one heart and one club for seven tricks． Based on the bidding，the club finesse was likely to fail．

It was awkward for Casen to come to his hand，so he tried the effect of leading the $\boldsymbol{\uparrow} 2$ from the dummy at trick two．East followed with the 8 and declarer＇s 9 forced the queen．West could see that if he defended passively，South could set up the spade suit with one more loser，so he did the best he could by playing his partner for the $\vee 10$ ， and leading a second round of the suit．

Casen won the $\vee \mathrm{K}$ and played four rounds of diamonds，and West came under pressure．He safely discarded a club and a spade，but what to play on the fourth round？He discarded the 8 ．

Reading the position，Casen played $\wedge A$ and another．West cashed his two good hearts，but then had to lead a club from his king into South＇s $\because A$ Q for declarer＇s ninth trick．

The board was worth 23 matchpoints on a 25 top and was important to allow Casen and Krekorian to qualify for the finals．

After a relay action she learnt that dummy would appear with a 6－2－4－1 shape，so，on lead against four hearts，she cleverly decided to underlead her king of hearts to prevent dummy from scoring ruffs．

Declarer took the trick with the ten and tried to unblock spades．

Now Linda attacked dummy＇s entries with a diamond．Declarer took the trick，played a club to the ace，ruffed a club，cashed the other top diamond and in the position below played a top spade to get rid of the penultimate club．

## European Championships open to all comers in 2009

A fourth edition of the European Open Bridge Championships is scheduled for Sanremo, Italy, June 12-27 next year. Sanremo is a resort community on the Italian Riviera not far from Monaco.

The European championships were first opened to all players in 2003, in Menton, France, not far from the Sanremo venue. Two other tournaments - in Tenerife, Canary Islands, and Antalya, Turkey - attracted many stars from around the world.

The tournament will be run on a typical European schedule: Most events are played in a longer, single session starting about 10:30 a.m., leaving evenings free for dining and other activities. All events are transnational and there are no restrictions on the number of entries per national bridge organization.

The scheduled events are Mixed Teams; Mixed Pairs; Open, Women's and Senior Teams, and Open, Women's and Senior Pairs, with cash prizes for overall finishers. Players entering four events receive a $25 \%$ discount on the entry fees.

The hotels, including one five-star and two four-star properties, will offer a special bridge rate for tournament participants.

The Palafiore Convention Center, a converted flower market, is a modern facility that is fully air conditioned, as are the host hotels.

Sanremo is a half hour's drive from Monaco, where one of the world's most famous casinos is located. Also within easy driving distance is Genova (Genoa), and Milano is relatively close.

Facts：North led the $\boldsymbol{2}$ against 3NT．Declarer made 10 tricks for a score of East－West plus 630.

The director was called after the opening lead and again after play was completed．Before the opening lead there was discussion about the $2 \boldsymbol{v}$ bid．East said it was a transfer．West said it
became obvious，later in the auction，that $2 \vee$ was a transfer．

Director＇s Ruling：The director ruled that the answer to the question about $2 \downarrow$ was unauthorized information for East．The UI demonstrably suggested to East that the contract should not be placed in hearts．The director judged that $4 \boldsymbol{\sim}$ over $3 \vee$ or 3NT was a logical alternative．The result was adjusted to 4＾，therefore，by East，down two， and a score of East－West minus 200 and North－South plus 200．This was in accordance with Laws 12 and 16.

The Appeal：East－West appealed and South was the only player who did not attend the hearing．East provided system notes showing that without interference，the $3 \vee$ would indicate a doubleton heart along with spade support．East argued that his hand didn＇t merit anything other than signing off in $3 \boldsymbol{A}$ ．When asked why he passed 3NT，he mentioned the possibility of $\vee \mathrm{K} \mathrm{x}$ or A Q doubleton．

The Decision：The director reported polling five experts with three of five stating they would bid $4 \boldsymbol{\uparrow}$ over $3 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$ ，but that they had been told that $3 \vee$ showed heart values with spade support．The consensus of the committee was that with 3 v showing a doubleton，the odds didn＇t favor committing to game．It was agreed，however，that a substantial fraction of players of the caliber of the appellants would seriously consider bidding $4 \wedge$（or $4 \bullet$ or $4 \vee$ to make West declarer），and that some would bid it．There was unanimous agreement，therefore，to uphold the director＇s adjustment of $4 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ by East down two，East－West minus 200 and North－South plus 200，per Laws 12 and 16.

The appeal was found to have merit．

It sometimes takes me a while to work around to the finer points of an analysis，especially when it involves a contract not reached at our table．

On this deal－Board 21 from the first final session of the Silodor Open Pairs－our East－West opponents were both lucky and unlucky．They reached $4 \boldsymbol{a}$ after a bidding accident and were fortunate to find the trump suit breaking 4－3．

Although 6 can be brought home，the field contract was 3NT，which was supposed to make only ten tricks．The $4 \boldsymbol{A}$ contract at our table handled for 11 winners，and the unlucky aspect for our opponents was that they received only 27 out of 77 matchpoints for ．plus 650 ．

So，let＇s revisit the defense when West is declarer in the more common 3NT contract． North＇s best lead is a low club（the second－highest $\star 6$ is fatal）to the $\star \mathrm{K}$ and $\star \mathrm{A}$ ．Declarer now works on diamonds．North wins the third diamond lead and leads another club to partner＇s jack． Declarer ducks this，and now what？

South＇s best defense is a shift to spades，but if he makes the normal exit of his third club， declarer wins his $\& \mathrm{Q}$ and pitches a spade from dummy．Now comes the critical moment．If North is 2－4－3－4，declarer must cash his J and then three rounds of spades，which will produce a simple club－heart squeeze．

Far more elegant－after all，who plays for a simple squeeze if he can play for a double squeeze？－is to cash the $\quad \mathrm{J}$ then the two top hearts．This produces the following ending：

On this line，it doesn＇t matter which defender has the spade length．With North guarding clubs and South forced to keep his high heart，neither can keep a fourth spade，so declarer ．scores up 11 tricks．

Mark Gordon，playing with Pratap
Rajadhyaksha，defended 3NT as South．Pratap led a club to the king and ace．Three rounds of diamonds put Pratap on lead again，and he continued with a low club．When West ducked the $\because \mathrm{J}$ slowly，Gordon shifted to the $\uparrow \mathrm{J}$ to break up the squeeze．Well done！

## Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6-board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

## Monitoring

At this and future North American Championships, ACBL will be monitoring NABC+ events with visible, real-time cameras. The images will be recorded and will be available for later official inspection and review.

By general monitoring of the session and participants' behavior, ACBL has another source of information that may be useful in determining facts and settling issues arising from some types of ethical and behavioral complaints or actions. Please summon a director if a problem occurs at the table.

This procedure is intended to assure everyone that the playing field is level and that misbehavior will not be tolerated.

## Entry fees

Players must be ACBL members whose service fees or dues are current in order to compete in any of the following nationally ranked events: Silodor Open Pairs, Vanderbilt Knockout Teams, Leventritt Silver Ribbon Pairs, Rockwell Mixed Pairs, Lebhar IMP Pairs, Whitehead Women's Pairs, Jacoby Open Swiss Teams, and the Machlin Women’s Swiss Teams. The entry fees for these contests are $\$ 20$ per player per session.

Players must also be current ACBL members to play in the Bean Red Ribbon Pairs. The entry fee is $\$ 17$ per player per session.

Regional championships are $\$ 16$ per player per session for ACBL members, $\$ 18$ for nonmembers.

All other events are $\$ 15$ per player per session for ACBL members, $\$ 17$ for nonmembers.
(Note: There is no entry fee for any flight of the North American Pairs, but participants are still required to be paidup members.)

## Notice to players

Each player must have an ACBL convention card filled out and on the table. Please note that other types of convention cards, such as the WBF convention card or homemade cards that do not sufficiently resemble the ACBL convention card, are not acceptable substitutes.

## Bid Box Alerts and Announcements

When using bid boxes, ACBL suggests that players tap the Alert strip and say "Alert" at the same time.

When making an Announcement, use the Announcement word - such as "transfer" - and tap the Alert strip at the same time.

A player who Alerts or Announces a bid should make sure his opponents are aware that an Alert or Announcement has been made.

## Trouble with trumps

With a combined trump holding of Q108 opposite A32 you would not expect the defenders to score five trump tricks every day of the week, but see what happened on this deal from the Rockwell Mixed Pairs:

With honours in both short suits I don't care for North's 1 NT at all - for the umpteenth time 5-4-2-2 is not a notrump distribution.

However, on this occasion, opening one diamond would not necessarily have worked out any better.

East led the queen of diamonds and declarer won with the ace and tried to cash his top clubs. East ruffed and played another diamond, which declarer ruffed on the table to play a heart to the eight, jack and ace.

East now played the ten of diamonds ruffed by declarer and overruffed by West who played another club.

Declarer discarded a diamond and East ruffed and played the jack of diamonds, ruffed and overuffed. The ace and king of spades gave the defenders two more tricks for two down.

Plus 100 was worth a significant share of the matchpoints.

There are two points to notice.
Declarer could have saved a trick by discarding one of dummy's spades on the third or fourth round of diamonds, but after he failed to do so the first time, East can ensure two down by playing a low spade after the second club ruff.

Declarer has already turned up with seven points in clubs, four in diamonds and one in hearts, so he should have 3-5 more. When they are the $\uparrow \mathrm{Q}$ and the $\downarrow \mathrm{K}$ the low spade switch gives declarer no opportunity to discard a diamond.

Even if North has the king of spades and the $\checkmark$ Q J, this defence will result in one down.

## World Transnational Open Teams

Even if you didn't qualify in a team trials, you can play in the world championships scheduled this year for Sao Paulo, Brazil.

The World Transnational Open Teams will take place during the second week of the tourmament, which runs from Aug. 29 to Sept. 12. The Transnational teams will begin on Monday, Sept. 7. The format will be Swiss teams, 10-board matches for 15 qualifying rounds. The knockout phase, starting with quarterfinals, will begin Thursday, Sept. 10. The event will conclude on Saturday, Sept. 12.

Players in good standing with their national bridge organizations are eligible to participate.
There are no country quotas, and teams may be made up of players from any countries.

Registration will be open through the start of the tournament, subject to availability. Players eliminated from the Bermuda Bowl, Venice Cup or Senior Teams will be eligible to play in the TNOT.

## Electronic devices banned in national events

The ACBL Board of Directors approved a comprehensive ban on electronic devices for all national level events, but not to regional or Intermediate Newcomer contests:

Electronic devices,
excluding health related equipment, capable of sending or receiving
communication, including but not limited to, headphones, earphones, cellular phones and minicomputers: (1) shall not be allowed in the playing areas, adjacent hallways, restrooms or accessible break areas; and (2) shall not be used during a session.

These restrictions shall apply to all pairs, team members, captains, coaches, recorders and kibitzers and shall apply throughout any actual playing session or segment.

A violation of this policy shall result in a disciplinary penalty of one full board (or 12 IMPs at that form of scoring) for the first offense. A second offense shall result in disqualification from the event for the pair/team.

Kibitzers violating this policy shall be removed from the playing area for the remainder of the session.

Participants will be reminded not to approach the playing area with a personal electronic device in their possession, even if the device is turned off.

## Tournament Terminology 101

Stratified Pairs：The idea is to compete against everyone but to be ranked only with your peers．

Each pair is assigned a stratum or＂strat＂based on the masterpoint holding of the partner with more masterpoints．

Example：A＝1000＋masterpoints； $\mathrm{B}=300-$ 1000；C＝0－300．

Thus，the most experienced players are placed in Strat A，intermediate players in Strat B and less experienced players in Strat C．Masterpoints are awarded for placings in all strats but gold points are awarded only in A and B．

The game proceeds normally－the difference comes when the scores are tabulated and ranked．

In a three－strat game，the scores are ranked three times．The first ranking is done as in a regular open game．These are the Strat A results．

If a B or C pair does well in this ranking，they receive full credit for that performance．It is not all that uncommon for a Strat C pair to place first overall，and they receive the full masterpoint award for that game．

Note：A pair is eligible for only one set of masterpoint awards and automatically receives the highest award．

The second ranking compares the scores of only the B and C pairs－the scores of the Strat A pairs are eliminated．Once again，if a C pair does well，they receive points for their finishing position in the Strat B results．

The third and final ranking compares the scores of only the C pairs－all the scores of the Strat A and Strat－B pairs are eliminated．

Strati－flighted Pairs：The top group plays in a game of their own — Flight A．The rest of the field in divided into strats and plays as in a regular stratified pairs．

There can even be stratification within Flight A．Flight A may be listed as 3000＋MPs while Flight X may be listed as 0－3000 MPs．

Masterpoints：the unit which measures bridge achievement in competition．Masterpoints are awarded at ACBL clubs and tournaments in amounts proportional to the size and classification of the event and the rating of the club or tournament．

Black points：awarded at club games．Some special club games award red，gold or silver points．

Red points：awarded for section placements at regional tournaments and NABCs．Also awarded at clubs for special events such as the qualifying rounds of the North American Open Pairs and the Grand National Teams．

Gold points：awarded for section firsts and overall placing in regionally rated events that have no upper masterpoint restrictions．

Platinum points：awarded for NABC＋events．
Gold points are also awarded for sectional firsts and overall placing in regional events of two or more sessions that have a masterpoint limit of 750 or more points．

One gold point is awarded to section winners in the annual ACBL Instant Matchpoint Game in sections of seven or more tables．

In addition，new players may now win gold points in their own NABC events： .50 gold in the National 49er Pairs at the Spring NABC， 1.50 gold in the National 199er Pairs at the Summer NABC and 1.00 gold in the National 99er Pairs at the Fall NABC（the remainder of the award is in red points）．

A major source of gold points is the Bracketed Knockout Teams．The overall awards for the top brackets are all gold while the lower brackets may receive a percentage of gold points and the remainder in red points．

Silver points：awarded for sectional firsts and overall placing at sectional tournaments．Also awarded at Sectional Tournaments at Clubs（StaC）．

There is no doubt that defense is one of the more testing areas of the game．

Here are a few deals that caught my eye：

A typical matchpoint auction，with East－West doing well to push North－South up a level．

West led the ace of diamonds and continued the suit．Declarer ruffed and exited with the jack of hearts．East won with the king and played a diamond，and declarer ruffed and played another heart．West won with the queen and found the only winning defense of exiting with a heart．East won and fell from grace by exiting with the queen of clubs．

Declarer won with dummy＇s king，cashed three spades，ending in dummy，then the established heart，after which the ten of clubs pinned West＇s nine．

On my next deal，declarer missed an
opportunity for immortality：

South led the three of diamonds and when the queen was covered by North＇s king declarer won and advanced the queen of clubs．

When South followed with the two there was strong case for going up with the ace，not least because of who was sitting North．

As it was，the Rabbi won with the king， cashed a couple of diamonds and switched to a spade．

3NT made－but by the defense！
On my next deal，the vast majority of the field missed a straightforward defense：

West led the six of diamonds and South took the queen with the ace and played the king of hearts（a spade or a diamond works best as the cards lie）．

West won and the defenders continued with two more diamonds．It was easy enough now to arrange to draw trumps and come to nine tricks for plus 140.

If West leads，or switches to his singleton club，then he will be able to get East in with a diamond to score a club ruff．

It＇s worth noting that the preempt prevented North－South from reaching the excellent club game．

If you find yourself coming under pressure on a deal as declarer runs a long suit or cashes winners it is important to show no sign of distress． Easier said than done，but the defender in the West chair was up to the task on my final deal：

Facing a passed partner，there is nothing wrong with adopting a variation to your notrump range，but doing it with a healthy 19 count is taking things a little too far．

East led the four of hearts and declarer was pleased to win with dummy＇s ten．A diamond to the jack was followed by the ten of spades，which lost to West＇s jack．Declarer won the heart return and played the king of diamonds，West taking the ace and switching to a club．East won with the jack and returned the suit，dummy＇s ten being covered by the king and ace．Declarer cashed his club tricks to reach this four card ending：

When declarer cashed the ace of hearts West was in trouble，but with no sign of discomfort he discarded the six of spades．Declarer cashed the jack of diamonds and played a spade．

I know you won＇t believe me，but the Rabbi finessed！

Full marks to Baytown＇s Mack Miegs who was brave enough to survive the Rabbi＇s Rule！
