## Duplicate any time, anyw here is goal of Danish entrepreneur

Growing up in Denmark, Peter Just knew bridge because his family played for as long as he could remember. He found rubber/party bridge to be unsatisfying, however, so he was drawn to duplicate.

Five years ago, he sold the communications company he founded and immersed himself in a project he hopes will produce his ideal scenario for
bridge - the ability to play duplicate bridge any time, anywhere with real cards.

The product is called
Bridgespinner, which Just envisions as a virtual bridge club - but not Internetbased. With Bridgespinner, you could play a session of duplicate, using real cards, no matter where you are.

The core of the product is a unit that can connect - via wifi or mobile phone - to a central server that allows for downloading of randomly dealt hands, previously played tournaments, lesson deals - you name it.

The Bridgespinner holds two decks of cards with invisible coding for dealing purposes. The device deals the cards according to the desired type of game. The cards come out of slots in the device, which looks like a small model of a flying saucer. It can be seated in a specially built table so that the surface of the table is completely flat. The dealer can also stand alone in any setting. It is battery operated.

## Board-a-match bidding quiz By Karen Walker

Many players consider board-a-match (BAM) scoring to be the toughest form of the game. It's similar to the head-to-head competition of IMPs, but each board is scored like matchpoints with a top of 1 . You either win (1), lose (0) or tie (1/2) the opposing team, and the smallest scoring increment makes a difference

The second qualifying session of the Mixed Board-a-Match teams featured several bidding decisions that are particularly interesting at this form of scoring. Try these problems:

(a) Denies three-card spade support

## The analysis:

(1) If you play support doubles, you already know there's no future in spades, so the task is to get your side to 3NT. 3 is the most straightforward way to force to game and ask partner for a diamond stopper, but the greedy BAM player is always looking for a bigger score. Try for it by reopening with a double. Partner will appreciate the opportunity to pass, as he holds:

3NT would have made at least 10 tricks for plus 430. 2 doubled, however, goes down three or four tricks for plus 500 or 800 .
(2) The overly optimistic might try $4 \boldsymbol{A}$, but a 4 bid seems the safest retreat. You need plus scores at BAM, though, and with this hand, you can be fairly certain you won't be getting one on offense. Partner has a strong hand for his high-level double, so pass and hope he has enough quick tricks to scrape up a set. Partner held:

- K 76
- AK 85
-A 10765
* K

4* will go down one, two or three, depending on how partner guesses the layout, and $4 \star$ goes down one or two.
(3) At IMPs, you might consider a $5 \vee$ bid as "insurance" - you're willing to go minus 100 or even minus 300 to avoid a possible minus 620 for defending their vulnerable game. That type of compromise offers no benefit at BAM, though, because any negative point differential - whether it's 10 points or 1000 - will still be a zero.

Essentially, you need to guess right now whether you can set 4a and whether a bigger plus score might be available if you declare $5 \boldsymbol{\downarrow}$. The red-vs.-not opponents seem pretty happy with their $4 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ contract, and it's sounding like both sides have a big double fit. When in doubt at BAM, it's often wise to put on the pressure, so try $5 \vee$. Maybe the opponents will be so anxious to declare that they'll bid $5 \boldsymbol{A}$, or maybe 5 will make.

The bad news is that $4 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ was going down because partner held wasted spade cards:

The good news is that he had the diamond fit you were expecting and the $\bullet K$ was onside, so you score up 11 tricks.
(4) Open $2 \wedge$. Yes, you have that side four-card major, and you're vulnerable in second seat (the worst position for a preempt). Even those who are fanatical about their weak two-bid requirements, though, usually loosen up at BAM. If you open 2A, your LHO will double and partner will bid $4 \AA$ with: - A 742

- AJ 62
- Q 63
- 73

The opponents will probably double and you'll score up plus 790. If you instead pass at your first turn and try to describe this hand later, you may give East-West room to find their double fit in the minors and take a $5 \star$ or 5 sacrifice, which goes down just one.
(5) Some would call your notrump response a "BAM hog bid," but RHO's takeout double and your flat distribution make 1 NT an attractive alternative to $1 \boldsymbol{A}$. Should you suggest more notrump now, or do you think you've done enough?

The typical BAM player will stand on his head to avoid playing in a minor if he thinks a notrump contract might be available, so try 2NT ("when in Rome ..."). Partner will raise to 3NT with:

- A K Q 873

You'll make 10 tricks with a heart lead, nine with a spade or diamond lead.

Sweating the small stuff

## By Karen Walker



Fred Hamilton shared this interesting defense from the second final session of his team's win in the Truscott Senior Swiss Teams. Fred's partner was Mark Lair and his teammates were Reanette Frobouck, John Carruthers and Allan Graves.

Fred, South, led a low diamond against East's 1NT contract. Mark played the $\bullet$ Q, won by declarer's A. Declarer now laid down the $\bullet \mathrm{A}$ and Fred promptly dumped his $\approx K$.

Fred knew declarer held the $\leqslant$, but he didn’t know it was unguarded, so he didn't want to be on lead at this point. He was also fairly sure his partner held the $\curvearrowleft \mathrm{J}$, as if declarer held that card, he likely would have gone to dummy with the $\boldsymbol{A} \mathrm{A}$ to finesse clubs.

Declarer now had two fast club tricks, but he couldn't establish a third without giving North the lead. When he did, Mark played back a diamond and declarer pitched a club, a heart and a spade while Fred ran his suit.

Fred exited with the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} \mathrm{Q}$ to the ace and declarer's now-singleton jack. Declarer cashed dummy's good club, but that was his last trick. Down two meant plus 200 for Fred's team and a 3-IMP pickup. His teammates were minus 110 defending 3 .
"Three IMPs doesn’t seem like much, but when you win the event by just 2 victory points, it means a whole bunch!" said Fred.

## Death trap revisited

Barry Rigal wrote about this deal earlier in the tournament. Rigal called it a death trap, and Deep Finesse says the limit for North-South is nine tricks in diamonds.

Don't tell that to Barbara Ames of Bethesda
MD and Ellen Cherniavsky of Silver Spring MD.

West twitched over 6 but passed, and East started with the $\because \mathrm{A}$. Cherniavsky ruffed in dummy, cashed two high spades, pitching a heart, then ruffed a heart, ruffed a club and ruffed another heart. She then drove out the A . When the suit split $3-1$, she was home with plus 1370 and nearly all the matchpoints.

Unlike Deep Finesse, East could not see all the cards.

## Thinking bridge

Reading the lead

Opening lead: $\mathbf{\nabla} 8$.
Bidding commentary: As South, you have a minimum for a one level overcall. As North, 16 support points (not counting the $\cup$ Q) facing a one-level overcall "usually" produces game.

Defensive commentary: As East, decide what partner is leading from to determine what declarer has in the suit. The lead is a likely top of a doubleton. With 9-x-x-(x) in an unsupported suit, partner leads low. If partner has a doubleton, declarer has the A-J-10-x. If you cover, declarer will eventually be able to discard two clubs from dummy on the $\quad \mathrm{J}$ and $\downarrow 10$. If partner has the $\star \mathrm{K}$, your cover costs a club trick, the setting trick! When partner's lead shows no honor cards,
dummy has a singleton honor, and you have a higher honor than dummy, cover if you can promote a second or third round trick for yourself. For example, cover holding the $\checkmark \mathrm{K}$ J or the $\vee \mathrm{K} 10$. If you can't promote at least a thirdround trick, play low.

Play commentary: As South, If East covers the $\mathbb{Q}$, blow East a kiss, draw trumps and discard two clubs on the two high of hearts.

Instead of losing two clubs, you lose only one and bag a miracle game.

Defensive commentary \#2: As West, give count $(* 4)$ when a diamond is played. As East, make sure you take four tricks in the minors, assuming you played low at trick one on the heart. Partner needs the $\star \mathrm{K}$ to defeat the contract and you know two diamonds are cashing.


## TOURNAMENT APPEALS

In order to keep the bridge public informed of appeals results in a timely fashion, the NABC Daily Bulletin staff publishes
 write-ups. Every effort is made to ensure that these reports are accurate and complete. However, before they are published in the NABC Appeals Casebook revisions may be made.

(1) Agreed as forcing, but was not Announced.

Facts: The director was called prior to the opening lead. East started to speak up to inform his opponents of his partner's failure to Announce that 1NT was forcing. The director instructed the table to play the deal. South stated that had he known that 1NT was forcing, he would not have balanced.

Director's ruling: The director determined that there was misinformation because of the failure to Announce in a timely manner. In accordance with Laws 75 and 12C2, the result was adjusted to 1 NT by West down two and a score of East-West minus 100.

The appeal: All four players attended the hearing. East-West stated that that the difference between a forcing and non-forcing 1NT seemed so slight that it ought not matter that the other side was misinformed.

The decision: The committee felt that doubling 1 NT was a hairline decision. It felt that one would double on some days and not others. That the 1NT call could have been stronger was, therefore, relevant. It pushed the tight decision a little bit in the direction that would be successful. Therefore, the committee judged that the MI damaged the NorthSouth pair.

The next question was whether North-South's bad result was due directly to the MI or was it due to North's decision to bid rather than pass the double? While many of us would pass without pause, the committee learned that both North and South thought the double was takeout of hearts not penalty. Given North-South's experience level and given that they appeared to be on the same (albeit unusual) wavelength, the committee judged that this did not constitute subsequent damage.

The number of tricks East-West would take in 1NT was rather hard to decide. Deep Finesse calculated and the director judged five. Some lines of play will lead to four. Whether those lines are likely enough to invoke Law 12C2's "at all probable" standard is another matter.

Because this was a NABC+ Fast Open Pairs, the committee decided not to try and to guess that and concurred with the director's adjustment of 1 NT by West, down two and a score of East-West minus 100 .

Because the bridge judgment was very close, East-West were not assessed an appeal without
merit warning.

(1) Break in tempo, no stop card used by East.

Facts: The director was called at the conclusion of play. All parties at the table agreed that there was about a 20 -second hesitation preceding the double of $4 \vee$ by South.

Director's ruling: The BIT did not demonstrably suggest that bidding would be advantageous to passing. This was based on the possibility that South was debating double versus pass in which case bidding on might turn a plus into a minus. In accordance with Law 16, the table result of 5 doubled, down two, East-West minus 300 was allowed to stand.

The appeal: Only East attended the hearing. The slowness of the third double suggests a desire to bid; therefore, bidding is demonstrably suggested.

The decision: The committee believed that an in-tempo double would indicate normal shape ( $4=2=3=4$ ) and extra values. An out-of-tempo double indicates a desire to bid something else - not pass. Because of that, the committee decided that the BIT demonstrably suggested bidding and that pass was a logical alternative (LA). In accordance with Law 12C2, the most favorable result that was likely for the non-offending side and the most unfavorable result that was at all probable for offending side was $4 \bullet$ doubled, down one, EastWest minus 100 and North-South plus 100.

Although double dummy play would produce 10 tricks, the committee adjusted the result as above.

West, Marion Michielsen, led the 8 and East, Meike Wortel, played low. If Wortel had played the $\vee \mathrm{K}$, declarer could concede a diamond and claim six. Deas played the $\uparrow$ A Q J ending in dummy with the third round in dummy with the king. Declarer next led a diamond to her queen and West's king. West exited with the $\uparrow 9$, won by Deas with the jack. Declarer now led the 8 to dummy's ace, as West played low. Notice that if she covered with the 10 , dummy's 5 would be good. Deas could have passed the $\uparrow$, but because West led the 9 , she couldn't be sure who had the 10.

Declarer played the $\boldsymbol{\uparrow} 10$ and both defenders discarded a heart. This was the position as Deas cashed dummy's last spade:



On the last spade, East had to save a heart and so discarded the 44 as Deas discarded the $\because 2$ and East the $\mathbf{2}$. Declarer led a club to the king and cashed the A. Now it was West's turn to feel the pressure. She had to save the 10 (or the 5 in dummy would be good), so she discarded a club. Now dummy discarded the $\leqslant$. Both East and West held only one club and so the $\div \mathrm{A} 10$ took the last two tricks. The team won 11 IMPs on the board as 6 NT was defeated at the other table.

## Martens University - new directions in bridge

## By Krzysztof J assem

Krzysztof Martens of Poland, a multiple world and European champion, in late Nineties and early part of this century divided his time between bridge and politics. Fortunately, his party disintegrated a few years ago and he can now devote his entire time to what he does best bridge: practice and theory.

In no more than three years he has written eight bridge books - translated into English under the common series title, Martens University (www.martensuniversity.com). The material for another four books has already been completed.

It looks as though he is now introducing another new theory, which I would name " 4 over 5." The below examples come from the Spingold Knockout Teams round of 64.

I thought that nothing coming from Martens could surprise me any more, but a four-card overcall of $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ over $2 \boldsymbol{v}$ still amazes me. The defender on lead cashed his two club winners and rested comfortably in his chair. The 9 was led to the third trick.

Martens won the trick and ruffed the club with $\star$ 6. He then cashed the $\star$ and $\bullet$. On the $\bullet K$, Martens carefully discarded the heart - not a club!

A diamond ruffed with the 2, a club ruffed with the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} 7$, heart to the queen and the high $\approx Q$ ruffed with the 8 . This was the ending:


Martens played the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} J$ and let it ride, reducing East's two trump tricks to one.

## False trail

The winners of the NABC+ Fast Open are no slouches at deception.

On this deal from round two of the Spingold Knockout Teams, Doug Doub found a play I've not seen before. See whether you can manage to match him for low-down cunning.

The opening lead of the $\&$ K gets the $\& 2$ from East (upside-down count). After some thought, West shifts to a heart to dummy's 9 as you drop the 8 . What should you do now?

Doub realized that he needed to attack diamonds. If he found the suit 2-2, he would be home, but how could he make it if diamonds were 3-1?

The point was that if West - who surely had the $\quad$ A - ducked the first diamond holding three of them, there was no lie of the cards that declarer could cope with.

Doub found an ingenious solution. He led the $\bullet K$ from dummy and dropped the $\bullet \mathrm{Q}$ under it as East played the $\bullet$. West took the $\star$ A and decided that his partner had three diamonds, so he needed to try to cash out the clubs. Contract made.

 Bridgespinner on each table could have a barometer game with instant scoring after each deal. Bridge clubs around the world could play the same deals at the same time.

Just visited Las Vegas as part of a tour of the U.S. to try to find investors. The company is already established in Denmark. The founders are Just and four well-known Danish players. German bridge star Sabine Auken, who lives in Denmark, is involved in marketing and development of the product.

North America is attractive to Just and his business partners because "it is the largest single market."

Just said he expects to launch the product in a tournament setting next year, probably in Europe. He is also planning a "pre-launch" demonstration at the 2009 Spring NABC in Houston, with a "showcase" tournament at the 2009 Fall NABC in San Diego.

He said he has not decided on a price for the Bridgespinner, preferring to assess market penetration first. Just said he has eight patents pending, and he is working on more.

If he is successful, Just predicted, the Bridgespinner could change the image of bridge, especially among young people, who are attracted to high-tech devices.

## Keep your mouth shut

Sometimes the opponents bid too much and tip you off on how to play that contract. That was the situation Jonathan Steinberg, playing with David Sabourin, found himself in on Board 10 in the first qualifying session of the NABC Open Swiss Teams:

West led the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} 6$ and Steinberg played low from dummy and won his king. He led the $\leqslant$ to the jack and East's king. East shifted to the $\because 9$ won by the queen in dummy. Declarer was at the crossroads.

South led the 4 from dummy and inserted the 8 when East played low! Notice that it would do her no good to split her 10-9. Next declarer cashed three diamonds, led to the $\uparrow \mathrm{A}$ and followed with the $\mathbf{A}$, the $\vee \mathrm{K}$ and a low heart endpaying West, who had to concede the $\approx \mathrm{K}$ to Steinberg.

This allowed him to make his contract by winning two spades, two hearts, three diamonds and two clubs. The result was a 4-IMP pickup.

## Waiter, l'll take the rare NY strip

Adam Wildavsky of New York City and Doug Doub of West Hartford CT won the NABC+ Fast OpenPairs. A strip squeeze is a rare play and more so when it is executed against the dummy. This is board 24 from the first final session (hands rotated):

Wildavsky led the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} 4$. Declarer played the 8 from dummy, Doub covered with the 9 and the trick was won by the ace. Declarer advanced the $\bullet 6$, won by dummy’s queen. The $\mathbf{~} 3$ was led to South's queen, and the A was cashed. Declarer continued with the $\quad 6$, won by West as East discarded the $\downarrow$. West now led the $\uparrow 5$ to the 10 , won by East's jack. Doub shifted to the $\because \mathrm{Q}$, which was ducked all around. East continued with the $\boldsymbol{\oplus} \mathrm{J}$, South ducked and West won the ace. On this trick dummy was strip squeezed. If declarer discarded a spade from dummy, both of West's spades cash. If he discarded the $\quad \mathrm{J}$, West’s 9 would be good; so he pitched a low heart.

West shifted to the $\vee$, declarer played the jack and East won the ace and returned a heart. After cashing the diamond, declarer had to lead a spade from dummy’s $\uparrow \mathrm{Q} 6$ to Wildavsky’s $\uparrow$ K 7.

The North-South pair had done well to reach 1NT. Plus 50 was only worth 46 on a 77 top for East-West because many pairs were going down in $2 \boldsymbol{\%}$.

## A rare play

In this deal from a pairs game, Simon Kantor of Agawam MA had fun with a rarely seen play a winkle (hands rotated). He was playing with Murray Melton.

In second seat after dealer passed, Kantor, South, opened 1NT and got to play it there.

West led the $10: 4,2$, queen.
Kantor then rattled off six diamond tricks, pitching three hearts and a club from dummy to reach this position:


Kantor exited with a low spade to West's nowsingleton ace. West played the $\& 8$ to East ace, and East switched to the $\vee \mathrm{J}$, covered by the queen and ace. West now cashed the $\star \mathrm{K}$ and played the $\downarrow 9$. Kantor discarded the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ from dummy and the defenders were fixed. If West was allowed to hold the trick with the $\vee 9$, he would have to give Kantor his eighth trick by playing a club to the good jack in dummy. If East overtook the 9 with the king, he would be left with only the $\mathbf{7}$ to play to Kantor's good 8. Plus 120 was good for about $80 \%$ of the matchpoints.

## Drawing the right inference

After a spirited auction, NABC+ Fast Open Pairs winners Doug Doub and Adam Wildavsky played $6 \checkmark$ on Board 14 of the second Qualifying Session. It's not often you have to take a finesse for the jack when your side holds nine trumps to the A-K-Q, but that was the case on this deal:


West led the $\curvearrowleft \mathrm{K}$ and Wildavsky won the ace, pitching a spade. He led a diamond to the ace and ruffed a low diamond, getting the bad news as West discarded a spade. Declarer ruffed a club, ruffed a diamond and ruffed a club. He now lead another diamond and ruffed with the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$

Wildavsky inferred that West rated to hold six spades, giving him a singleton heart. If he ruffed low and cashed the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$, he would have to shorten his trump suit to return to his hand. After ruffing high, however, he was able to play a heart to the 10 , draw trumps and claim his slam for 25 matchpoints on a 25 top.

When asked about the $6 \vee$ bid, Doub said he bid it as a two-way shot. He didn't like his chances of defending against $5 \boldsymbol{\sim}$ because his side might not get 500 . Also, after $6 \vee$, the opponents might save in $6 \boldsymbol{\uparrow}$ or make the wrong opening lead.
