**The time has come for Intellympics**

"If we believe in our capability, we will succeed in our project to build a new category of Olympic Games, the Intellympics," World Bridge Federation President Jose Damiani believes. He is with us here in New York this week because of the Junior activities.

"There are not many sports that can help youngsters to improve their memory, their concentration and their reasoning skills and at the same time help older people to avoid or reduce the effects of Alzheimer's or Parkinson's. We have prepared presentations along these lines that are being sent to Olympic authorities."

According to Damiani, the International Olympic Committee expects the bridge world to show how important we are not only as a competitive sport but also as a human activity. "We have been officially confirmed as an international sports federation under the new criteria set by the IOC. This was by no means automatic, as many federations have been rejected."

Damiani and Gianarrigo Rona, president of the European Bridge League, will speak about the contribution bridge makes to education and health at the Congress of Sport for All, organized by the IOC.

Damiani is very concerned about the situation concerning young bridge players.

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**Rosenkranz leads Senior Swiss Teams**

The team captained by George Rosenkranz was in the lead after two qualifying sessions of the NABC Senior Swiss Teams. The event concludes today.

Rosenkranz is playing with fellow Mexican Miguel Reygadas, Floridians Ed Schulte and Zeke Jabbour and Arnie Fisher of Clementon NJ.

They had a lead of 12.24 Victory Points over the second-place team from Nebraska: Gary Amundsen, Mike Albert, Rod Beery and Mary Egan.

**Two major upsets in Spingold KO**

Teams captained by Rose Meltzer and Rita Shugart are on the sidelines today as the third round of play gets underway in the Spingold Knockout Teams.

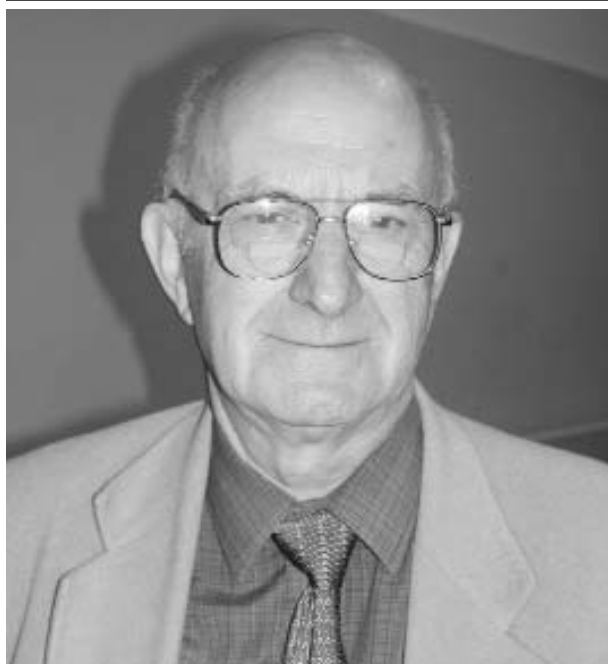
Meltzer's all-star squad – Kyle Larsen, Peter Weichsel, Alan Sontag, Chip Martel and Lew Stansby – fell to the No. 61 seed, an all-England team captained by Jack Mizel. Meltzer jumped out to a 48-13 lead after the first quarter but were blasted 52-5 in the second quarter and never recovered as they dropped a 135-88 decision.

Mizel played with Alexander Allfrey, Arthur Malinowsky and Andrew McIntosh.

By contrast to the other match, Shugart held a 41-IMP lead with a quarter to go but were outscored 53-8 by a New York-Canada team led by Fred Hoffer. The final score was 140-136.

Hoffer, of Cote Saint-Luc in Quebec, and fellow Canadian Don Piafsky of Toronto were playing with New Yorkers Barry Piafsky, Allen Kahn and David Rosenberg.

In another upset, the No. 15 seed, captained by Bart Bramley, lost a close match to the team led by Phillip Becker.

Stan assisted John Donnelly during that first assignment back in 1954, but he was the director-in-charge the following year. His assistant? None other than Phil Wood, the man who eventually became the king of directors in the Northwest.

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### Little fish are sweet

In order to become a top-class defender you must get used to drawing inferences from the spot cards that partner plays. The following is a classic example.

North led the ♥A (attitude) and when South played the 2, North switched to a spade. Declarer went up with the ace and played a second heart.

North won and reviewed the evidence. South had followed to the spade with the 2, which might be a singleton. On the second round of hearts, however, South had followed with the 5, the lowest outstanding heart.

With a singleton spade, South would surely have played his highest remaining heart, and he would also have done it with two spades and no high diamonds.

If the defenders play four rounds of diamonds starting at trick four, declarer would have to guess very well to finish three down.

So, watch those low cards!

### Old-timers remember Freeman the scorer

Dick Freeman is another super-success story. Today's players recognize Dick as a great player, a key member of the team that has dominated American bridge for the last decade or so. He has three world championships under his belt as well.

But what most players today don't know is that Dick once was the king of bridge scorers. Nobody could touch him at matchpointing or adding. Nobody could read his figures either, but it didn't matter. He was always in balance the first time, usually putting his sheet on the wall before anyone else had finished matchpointing.

Dick has always been good with numbers. Back in the days of the Quiz Kids radio show, the world tuned in to see if he could handle that week's mathematical problem in his head when most of the listeners couldn't solve it with pencil and paper. Sometimes it took him a few seconds, but he always had the answer — most of the time almost immediately.

When he got married, he put down his red pencil and became a star player. He won world championships in 1995, 2000 and 2003, and his exploits in North American tournaments include numerous championships. He is one of the game's fastest analysts — and not surprisingly he is almost always right.

### New player on the block

Hansa Narasimhan may not be a name you know too well, but you will be seeing a lot more of her soon.

Her team has reached the round of 8 in the Wagar Women's Knockouts. She served notice of her skills after a robust bidding sequence on this deal from the first round of the event.

Irina Levitina opened 2NT with the North hand and Hansa leaped to 6♦. East won the opening club lead by taking dummy's king and returned a passive trump. Hansa ran all her trumps but one, producing the classic ruffing-squeeze ending:

East still had to make a discard, but whatever she did, Hansa had her 12th trick by playing on that suit.

### Beer Card hand

Have you ever heard of the Beer Card? The ♦7 is called the Beer Card under very special circumstances – when it wins trick 13 in a successful contract. When this happens, the declarer yells “Beer Card” and his partner must buy him a beer.

Where did all this Beer Card stuff start? Well, the ♦7 plays a special role in a Danish game called Boma-Loma. Partly because of this, bridge players in Copenhagen were the first to use the Beer Card term. It became quite common and reached London by the Eighties. The term was imported to the United States by the American Junior team after they made a visit to Poland for a World Junior Camp. Now Beer Card is a term used worldwide.

David Milton of Herndon VA earned a free beer from his partner on this deal.

That was quite a 1♠ opener by Milton, but of course he was third hand. Yes, the opponents could make game, but this story is about a Beer Card. And don't forget, declarer has to be successful in his contract. That doesn't look too likely when you see the North-South cards.

West led the ♥K and switched to the ♦J to dummy's king. Milton ruffed a heart with the deuce, then crossed to the ♦K to ruff another heart with the 3. He led a diamond to the 6, West pitching and East ruffing with the 4.

East led a trump, and Milton went up with the ace. He led still another diamond, ruffing with the jack. He called for dummy's last heart and ruffed with the 5, West winning with the trump queen.

West cashed the ♠K and Milton carefully discarded the ♦8. West was forced to cash the ♣A and lead a club, so Milton won the ♣K. Then he took trick 13 with the ♦7 and yelled “Beer Card.”

### Good card reading

Bob Morris read the situation just right on this deal from the Spingold. As a result he scored up his vulnerable game.

Glenn Eisenstein led the ♥6 to dummy's king and Larry Sunser's ace. East led the ♥J, which was allowed to win. He switched to the ♠9 and Morris rose with the ace. He cashed his top diamonds and then took a third when the queen fell. After cashing the ♣A and the ♥Q, he led his last diamond to dummy, led the ♣Q and pitched a spade. Eisenstein won with the king and was down to all spades. He led the queen, but Morris ducked. The next spade lead let Morris make both his king and his 10 for nine tricks.

### More Beer Card facts

You don't have to score the Beer Card (the ♦7) as declarer. You're entitled to call out “Beer Card” if you set an opponent's contract and score the final trick with the ♦7.

If you are declarer in a cold contract and go down because you try to score the Beer Card, you have to buy beer for the table.

Don Mamula wonders what happens if you score a Beer Card on defense when you're doubled and redoubled. “I think that calls for a six-pack,” he decided.

### Different kind of decision

Sometimes a penalty card gives you an added option. Sometimes that's an advantage – sometimes it isn't. Daniel Milton of Herndon VA had to make a choice on Monday.

The 4♣ bid showed a 12-15 raise with good trumps – at least two of the top three honors if a four-card suit, at least the ace or the king if a five-card suit. Milton, South, felt he was good enough to cuebid, and he wound up in the spade slam.

The opening club went to the king and ace, and he thought about that for a minute. He thought if he later led the ♣9 and East had the 10 but didn't cover, he could set up pitches for dummy's hearts. He cashed the ace, queen and 10 of trumps as West pitched two clubs. Then he led the ♣9, and his hopes plummeted when East discarded the ♥5. But West asked, “No clubs, partner?” and East produced the ♣5 as his face turned slightly red.

Milton went through with his original plan, following low and losing to the queen. West returned a diamond and Milton was at the crossroads. Of course he could finesse. If the finesse won he could ruff a diamond, cash his clubs to get rid of dummy's hearts, ruff a heart and get rid of his last heart on the ♦A. He would wind up with three trumps, three clubs, one heart, two diamonds, two diamond ruffs and a heart ruff – 12 tricks.

But the penalty card gave him another option. He could take the ♦A, ruff a diamond and lead a heart to the queen. If East had the king he couldn't play it – he'd have to play his penalty card. The diamond finesse would no longer be necessary.

After giving the situation a good deal of thought, Milton finally went with the diamond finesse.

That didn't work, but the penalty card play would have. He was disappointed, of course, but he dropped by the Daily Bulletin office because he thought our readers might be interested in his unusual story.

### Marshall your forces!

Tournament Director Dave Marshall heard a call for caddy, but there weren't any around. He went over and told the table, “I have to watch my step here – I've got to watch out for that powerful Caddies Union. But what can I do for you?”

One of the players said, “I don't know what to tell you. I'm a labor lawyer.”

### Determination pays off

Don Prior of Manasquan NJ really wanted to play in the Young Life Master-1500 Pairs, but he wasn't eligible – he wasn't a Life Master. But he was almost an LM.

He had another desire – he was born in New York City so he wanted to win his gold card in New York City. So he stopped playing for six weeks to make sure he didn't go over 300 points.



He came to the tournament early so he could take the director course, and suddenly he had an idea – he'd call his friend Richard Levendusky of Jersey Shore NJ and ask him to come to New York to play with him.

So last Friday Levendusky roused himself out of bed in time to catch the 5:30 a.m. train to New York. They came in second in the morning side game, and suddenly Prior had satisfied one of his desires – he was an LM – and he could satisfy the other – he was eligible for the Young Pairs. He could play in a Life Master game on the same day he became a Life Master.

The story isn't completely happy. They were seventh overall after the first qualifying session, but the second session was a disaster and they failed to qualify for the final.

But Prior is still going strong. He finished tied for fourth in Monday's Open Pairs, partnered by his good friend Roger Lord.

### Making a slam off three aces

Don Mamula, chairman of the Board of Governors, had the thrill of making a slam missing three aces. In fact he made an overtrick! The deal comes from the Life Master-1500 Mini-Spingold Knockouts.

When the dummy went down, Mamula, West, counted the trumps three times. “I finally realized that spades were dividing evenly – 0-0.”

North could have scored his ♥A at trick one, but he decided to lead the ♦A because of Randy Corn's splinter bid of 4♥. Mamula ruffed this in dummy. He led the ♣K and ruffed when South covered. He ruffed a diamond to dummy and pitched his hearts on the good clubs and claimed for plus 1860.

The auction at the other table was quite different:

Declarer also got the ♦A opening lead, but he made only 12 tricks. He conceded a heart at trick two, and that cost his side an extra IMP – 10 instead of 9.

"In the old days, our bridge population was renewed by the families where the children learned to play bridge with their parents. That no longer is the case for many reasons, including such things as the advent of TV and video games as well as the changing lifestyles of young people. Our bridge community is getting older and older.

"We should be aware of this danger. We want our children and our grandchildren to enjoy bridge as we do. That's the reason teaching bridge at school is essential for the long term."

Damiani believes we must use the new technology, especially the Internet, to teach bridge to young people. "We shouldn't be afraid of developing a kind of 'virtual' club for them as I am quite sure they will join us once they have been able to practice and feel confident in their ability."

He calls the Internet a powerful tool for promoting bridge because of how international and national contests are being screened. "The Internet is a perfect tool when linked with video or television."

He is very happy that the international situation has changed sufficiently that the United States will be sending teams to the World Team Olympiad in Istanbul, Turkey. "I am happy to see that your teams will be with us in Istanbul, thus showing the world our solidarity and our determination to fight against those who wish to terrorize us."

## Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both partnership cards must be identical. Both must include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director.

Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6 board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

## Monitoring

At this and future North American Championships, ACBL will be monitoring NABC+ events with visible, real-time cameras. The images will be recorded and will be available for later official inspection and review.

By general monitoring of the session and participants' behavior, ACBL has another source of information that may be useful in determining facts and settling issues arising from some types of ethical and behavioral complaints or actions. This procedure is intended to assure everyone that the playing field is level and that misbehavior will not be tolerated.

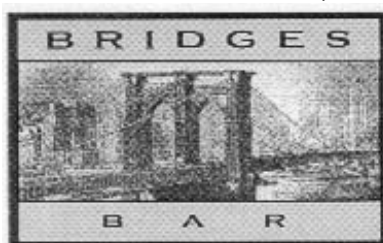

believe Welland is good enough to lead his team – Bjorn Fallenius, Michael Rosenberg, Zia Mahmood, Robert Levin and Steve Weinstein – to victory in Turkey.

Says Bob Hamman, a member of the Bermuda Bowl champion Nick Nickell team: “Roy is a good competitor. He’s technically sound and has worked really hard, especially in terms of seeking out good competition. He’s doing it all right.”

Teammate Zia is also complimentary: “(Roy) could be a bridge pro. He is by far the best player who sponsors teams. My only complaint is that if we go out to eat between sessions with Roy we have to drink so much good wine that I come back for the second session drunk, and if I have to choose between IMPs and a bottle of \$500 wine, I’m picking the wine.”

For his part, Welland strives to avoid any semblance of immodesty, but he will allow that his table feel is pretty good, perhaps from all the years of playing poker, at which he was expert long before he took up bridge.

Interestingly, Welland might not have found bridge if a regular poker game he played in had not been held in a bridge club.

Welland arrived in New York 23 years ago as an 18-year-old. He was living in Chicago at the time. One day he and a friend decided they would spend New Year’s Eve at Studio 54, a famous disco in New York. Welland arrived in the city and never left.

Always a games player, Welland played chess, backgammon, poker and gin, among others.

One day he decided he wanted to get into the options trading business, but he didn’t have the right educational background.

He played poker regularly at a bridge club, and his poker games often went on so long that he would meet the bridge crowd setting up for their game in the morning. One day he was talking to the bridge group and told them of his desire to work on Wall Street. One of them mentioned that a lot of good bridge players had been hired to trade options.

Welland immediately started kibitzing the rubber bridge game at the Manhattan Bridge Club, and after a couple of months he felt he was ready to play in the duplicate game. “I had a little bit of an advantage,” Welland says, “because I had played similar games. It wasn’t that difficult to pick up the rudiments.”

During 1986, Welland was a regular player in the Manhattan Bridge Club duplicate game, and he accumulated such a pile of rating point slips – the old way of keeping track of club masterpoints – that someone suggested he send them in to ACBL Headquarters.

It turned out that his collection of rating point slips amounted to 94 masterpoints, making him the 1986 winner of the national Ace of Clubs rookie category.

After a couple of years of bridge play, Welland was finally offered a job on Wall Street. Unfortunately, he was due to start just about the time of the stock market crash of October 1987. He had to wait until the following year to get started, but he has been enormously successful and now runs his own company – Wilcris Trading, named after William and Christopher, the twin sons he and Christal Henner-Welland had seven years ago.

Once he started his options career, Welland focused on Wall Street rather than bridge, but in the summer of 2000 he sponsored his first team in the Spingold.

By the fall of the following year, he was a North American champion – winner of the Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams, arguably the toughest event on the ACBL calendar.

Welland’s regular partner these days is Bjorn Fallenius, a veteran player who represented Sweden, his native country, many times in international competition.

He and Welland knew each other from rubber bridge games, and they have formed a tough partnership over the last three and a half years.

Says Richard Schwartz, another tournament veteran and sponsor: “He and Bjorn are one of the best third pairs on any team in the country.”

Welland and Fallenius play a complex, transfer-based system they feel gives them a definite advantage.

Says Fallenius of his partner’s bridge acumen: “He has a very good feeling for what is going on at the table, so we can be more free in the bidding, and Roy is a good bidder.”

Welland has also shown a flair for card play, as illustrated by the following deal from the Mixed Teams at the first Open European Championships last summer in Menton, France. Welland’s sensational card play helped his team win the event in a star-studded field.

At the other table, the contract was 3NT by North-South, good for 11 tricks and plus 660. Welland was playing with Jill Levin, and the two of them took a very different view of the North-South cards.

Welland’s 3NT was aggressive. Levin’s raise to slam was, in context, normal. The problem was coming to 12 tricks. East led the ♠J, which denied a higher honor. Welland took his only chance by playing low from dummy. He was gratified to see the ♠K pop up, but there was a lot more work to do. He played a heart at trick two: 2, 8, K, 7. Welland then ran five club tricks, on which East discarded two spades and West three hearts. When Welland cashed the ♦K, he noted the fall of the 10 from East. Careful to unblock, Welland then played the ♦9 to his ace, felling the queen. He returned to dummy with the ♠Q to finesse against West’s ♦8 6 for 12 tricks, plus 1440 and a 13-IMP gain.

“I’m willing to gamble,” says Welland, acknowledging that there are many similarities between bridge and poker. “There’s more poker in my bridge game than in most people’s,” he says.

Welland says he and Christal don’t play much together these days, but they did early in his bridge career. “She is a saint,” says Welland, noting that they have more than a dozen regional wins playing together.

Christal is a fine player in her own right. She was captain of the winning Open Swiss Teams at the 2003 Spring NABC in Philadelphia – and she’s on a strong team in the Spingold at this tournament: Mike Kamil, Swedish stars Peter Bertheau and Fredrik Nystrom and Italians Claudio Nunes and Fulvio Fantoni, reigning World Open Pairs champs.

Besides bridge and his family, Welland has a keen interest in the food business. He has a financial interest in two New York restaurants – Hearth and Barbuto – and is a wine connoisseur (just ask Zia).

In the United States Bridge Championship in Memphis last month, the Welland team, playing four-handed, made it to the final against the Nickell team. Nickell won but opted to use the qualification for next year’s Bermuda Bowl instead of this year’s Olympiad, giving Welland and company the chance

for a world title.

Even with that opportunity looming in the future, Welland says, he has no trouble focusing on the current challenge – defending his team’s Spingold championship.

“I take bridge one day at a time,” he says. “I try to win my first match, and if I do I’ll try to win tomorrow’s match.”

Welland feels his team will have a good chance in Istanbul, and if they come home with the gold medal, it will be only the second time the U.S. has won the event. Says Welland: “Nothing would be finer than that.”

30 years, so he did all his directing on weekends and during vacations. He moved East to Ottawa in 1956, and he has especially enjoyed working in the Maritimes and northern Ontario. “The people are so social, so friendly, so enjoyable.”

Stan wistfully remembers the good old days when directors used pencils instead of computers to score. “It was more fun the old way, but I suppose the computers are faster.”

Directing is a great way to meet people and to travel, Stan said. “And I’ve so enjoyed working with such wonderful men who were my fellow directors – fellows like Johnny Wiser, Maury Braunstein, Harry Goldwater, Henry Francis, Tom Weeks, Karl Marks, Karl Johnson, Jerry Friedlander, Jules Jacobson, Jerry Prisyon, Lou Kelner, Mike Linah, Buddy Spiegel and Ronnie Rubin.

“Henry and I used to have a wonderful time in the Maritimes. We’d race to finish our 25-top sheets, and we’d each have a rooting section cheering us on.”

Doing sheets was fun for Stan. “One time we were doing a stanza 25-top where we scored the first half while the contestants played the second half. One of the players – Hugh McLean who used to play with Ron Andersen – bet us that we couldn’t get the first half in balance before play finished in the second half. We eagerly took the bet. Then we bet him we could finish by the 12th round. We won that one too. But when we offered a bet on the 11th round, Hugh refused. He had learned his lesson.”

Canada is a bilingual country, so at one point Stan was ordered to learn French because he was a high-ranking governmental official. He used his French exactly once in his work, but his new language has proved to be a big help indirectly – after all, he works a lot of tournaments in Quebec.

Now that he has retired, Stan works all the NABCs, so he is in frequent contact with all the friends he has made through the years.

“I love directing,” Stan emphasized. “I have enjoyed every minute of it.”

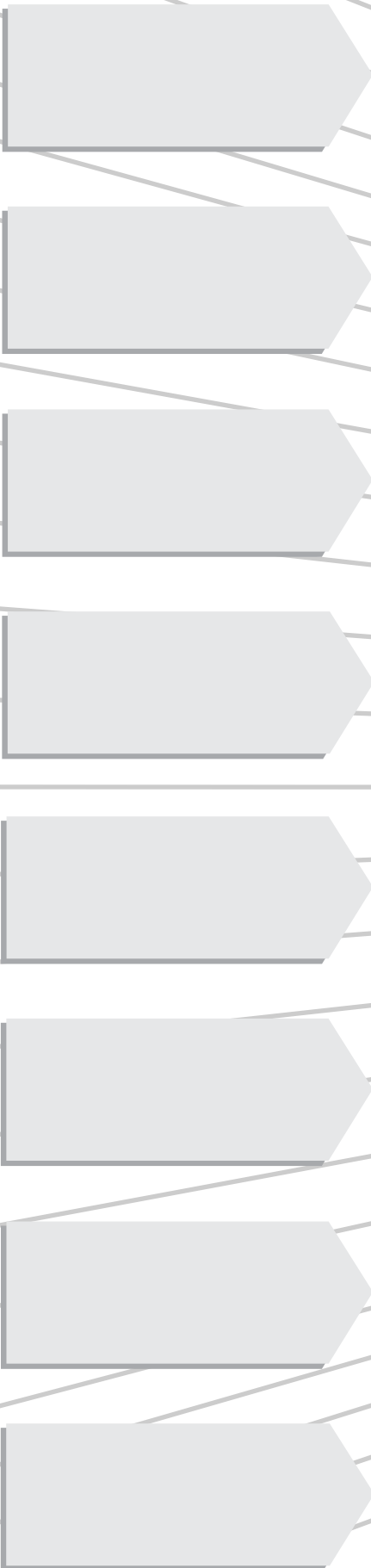

## 13 great years at 40 NABCs

Just the other day I realized that the New York NABC will be the 40th NABC with which I've been involved since I started working for ACBL in the summer of 1991. There are a lot of things I truly enjoy about my work, but the best part of my job with the ACBL is the friends I've made.

I enjoy working with my buddies daily in our headquarters office in Memphis, and the tournament directing staff is an added bonus. It's going to be a memorable 40th NABC for a lot of reasons, and I'm hoping for a huge turnout.

Luckily for me, I'm not stopping at 40. I'm looking forward to working with Jayne Thomas this fall in Orlando. Every time we do a survey about NABCs, someone will write a note that we should talk to Jayne and see how she does it in Florida. I told her I'll never be able to get out from behind her shadow.

Roni Gitchel of Pittsburgh has put together a great team for the 2005 Spring NABC and has already raised nearly \$100,000 in addition to the funds ACBL provides for an NABC. I can remember calling her a few years ago when we were concerned that the new convention center in Pittsburgh wouldn't be finished by March of 2003, when Pittsburgh was originally scheduled. Instead of being frustrated as one might have expected, Roni said she wanted what was best...and besides, it gave her two more years to make sure the tournament was remarkable. I don't think she's going to rest until she reads the great reviews from Pittsburgh.

And Jack Feagin of Atlanta, another Southern gentleman, will be a repeat tournament chair with me when he heads up the Atlanta NABC next summer. He puts my feet to the fire on occasion, and he'll make sure I do my job better than I did last time and that players will thoroughly enjoy their visit to Atlanta next summer.

Because of the examples these and other tournament chairmen have been to me, I've become more involved in volunteer work in my church and in my community. I've realized that by giving back, you get so much more.

If you haven't volunteered to work at one of your local tournaments or at an NABC, think about it. I'm looking for more friends all the time.
