## Bridge teachers celebrate 50 years

The American Bridge Teachers’ Association (ABTA) has just met in Nashville for its 50th annual convention.

In auction bridge days, Milton C Work held conventions for his bridge teachers. In the early days of contract bridge, Ely Culbertson founded National Studios to train teachers in his system.

Teachers of the Goren system dreamed of a professional organization, but it was not until 1957 when George Coffin, financed by promoter Alexander Black, invited 650 bridge teachers to meet in New York City.

On May 27, 1957, 14 of them from eight different states joined the promoters to become charter members of the ABTA. The members hoped to raise the level of bridge teaching and create a professional organization having the status of other professional groups. From 1957 to 1969, Goren Teacher Forums were held in New York City to certify teachers in the Goren methods. These forums were the only way to become certified as a bridge teacher.

From 1969 until the ACBL education program began in the mid-Eighties, the ABTA was the only organization certifying bridge teachers. Today, ABTA and the ACBL education program complement each other nicely. Many ABTA members are also ACBL-accredited teachers. Unfortunately, all of the early ABTA members Continued on page 4

## J ackson, Hamman take Open Pairs

Joan Jackson and Petra Hamman had a $65.8 \%$ game in the first final session to charge into first place. They followed with $58.33 \%$ in the evening to win the Wernher Open Pairs. Their final score of 1681.54 (including carryover) was nearly 68 matchpoints ahead of second place ( 51 was top on a board).

The duo play frequently as partners and teammates. Both are many-time NABC winners.
"We've won board-a-match and other teams, but this is our first win as a pair," said Jackson.

The two were on the winning Women's Team Olympiad in 2000 and have competed in other world championships. Both are from Dallas.

Other NABC victories together include Women's BAM Teams in 1989, 1998 and 2000, and the Women's Swiss Teams in 1999.

In second place were Jonathan Steinberg and Daniel Korbel. Steinberg represents District 2 on the ACBL Board of Directors. Korbel is active in Junior bridge.

The Wernher Trophy was donated in 1934 by

Sir Derrick J. Wernher and presented to the winners of the National Men's Pairs Championship. The event was contested at the Summer NABC until 1962. It moved to the Spring NABC in 1963 where it remained for 40 years. In 2004 it returned to the Summer NABC lineup. Last year's winners are Jianrong Lin and Julie Zhu.

## O'Rourke ousted in Spingold upset

The team captained by Richard Coren, seeded No. 29, led from start to finish in taking the measure of No. 4 Lou Ann O’Rourke on day three of the Spingold Knockout Teams.

Coren, of Hollywood FL, was playing with Melih Ozdil of Istanbul, Turkey, and New Yorkers James Rosenbloom and Brian Glubok.

The squad jumped ahead of the powerful O'Rourke squad 73-35 after one quarter, never trailing. O’Rourke (Marc Jacobus, Eric Greco, Geoff Hampson, Giorgio Duboin, Norberto Bocchi) mounted a rally in the third quarter to pull to within 22 IMPs but did little further damage in the fourth quarter.

There were several other close matches, as No. 6 Carolyn Lynch nipped Mike Cappelletti (Hixson TN) 144-143, overcoming a $23-\mathrm{IMP}$ deficit in the fourth quarter.

The No. 1 seed, Nick Nickell, took a 28-IMP lead into the fourth quarter against Sylvia Moss, No. 32, and survived a furious rally by the underdogs, who won the final set 53-30. The final score was 139-134 for Nickell.

The Cinderella run of the Hailong Ao team continued as the original No. 67 seed came from

# （I）UST FOR NEW PLAYERS 

## Using interference for your benefit By Lynn Berg



Twenty－first
Century bidding style －openings and competitive bids are lighter than ever before —— means that there are few uncontested auctions．The opponents will try to obstruct your communication，but you can often use their actions to increase the accuracy of your own bidding．You and your partner should discuss what your bids mean in competition．Don＇t assume that everything should stay the same．Expand your comfort zone and take advantage of opportunities created for you by the bidding．

Here＇s an easy example of taking advantage of the opponent＇s bid．You hold：

ヘK 943 v6 AJ 97 ャQJ 92.
This 11－point hand is not good enough to open in first or second seat，but if your right－hand opponent opens $1 \vee$ ，you should be delighted to make a takeout double．When you can tell partner to exclude hearts from consideration，your hand is worth 14 dummy points，more than enough to ask partner to choose a suit．Here are two more hands to consider：

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*92 Q632*A875 &752
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A92 AQ63 A875 *752

Your partner opens $1 \downarrow$ ．With the first of these hands，you＇d raise to $2 \boldsymbol{v}$ ．With the second，you would make a limit raise to $3 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$ ．But what if right－ hand opponent overcalled $2 \boldsymbol{*}$ ？Now，you can take advantage of the situation．With the weaker hand， bid $3 \boldsymbol{v}$ ．In competition，this promises single－raise values but with four trumps．So what do you do with the stronger hand？Cuebid the opponent＇s suit．You can have a partnership agreement that in
competition the cuebid promises limit－raise values or more．

You will find that there are many opportunities to tell more about your hand after an opponent has butted in． Consider this hand：
ヘKJ6 A 2 QJ 98 •AJ 94. Let＇s say you open 1NT with this hand，the next hand passes，and your partner bids 2 as a transfer．The next opponent doubles．You should pass．You can tell partner you do not have three hearts by passing．If you bid $2 v$ at this point，you would be promising at least three hearts．Not only should you not accept the transfer in this situation，but sometimes you can redouble．If you had five diamonds，the redouble would give a double message：You have only a doubleton heart－plus five diamonds and a willingness to play diamonds or to double the opponents in diamonds．

So－called＂stolen＂bids have also become popular because interference over the opponent＇s opening 1NT openers has become popular．
Consider an agreement that your 1NT systems are still in effect（＂systems on＂）over a double or a $2 \boldsymbol{*}$ overcall．Over the double，you can bid just as always with Stayman and transfers．

You can double a $2 \boldsymbol{\mu}$ overcall for Stayman and continue to use $2 \bullet$ and $2 \vee$ as transfers because your bidding room has not been preempted．Don＇t forget to Alert that the double of $2 \boldsymbol{*}$ is Stayman and to Announce transfers as usual．

You should discuss with your partner how far you go with the stolen bid concept．Some players like to double $2 \bullet$ and $2 \vee$ for transfers，some prefer to keep the option of the penalty double．I am in the latter group but，truly，the need to make

a penalty double at such a low level doesn＇t come up often．

Two other examples of taking advantage of the opponents＇bidding are negative doubles and redoubles after the opponent＇s takeout double． The negative double（a takeout double by opener＇s partner）allows you to explore at a low level without using up bidding room．If your partner opens and the next player doubles，you can use redouble to warn your partner that you do not have a fit for his suit but you do have points －－an inexpensive way to avoid trouble．

Talk to your partner about how you can take advantage of the modern style of competitive bidding．

When dummy has an honor and third hand has a higher and a lower honor，the lower honor is played．If East guesses to return a club，rather than a diamond，West wins and fires back the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$ ，and the defenders take the first four tricks．

Play commentary：Given the heart lead， declarer assumes East has the A and plays low from dummy．Aces are seldom underled against suit contracts at trick one．If East wins the jack and shifts to a diamond，South has been given a reprieve．（A club shift followed by a second heart
defeats the contract still born．）South plays three top diamonds，discarding a heart，and then a spade to the jack．After this holds，declarer leads a club and eventually gets to dummy with a club to take a second spade finesse．Lesson：With A－ K－J－10－x－x facing x－x，take two finesses．Do not play a high honor first．If a high honor is played， you can no longer pick up Q－x－x－x onside． However，with A－K－J－10－x facing $x-x-x$ ，a high honor should be played first because two finesses are still available．

have retired or passed on. Roslyn Cooper, of Northbrook IL, holds the distinction of being the longest-standing member. She is followed by Masa Nishimura of Lakewood CO. Masa joined ABTA in 1966 and held the office of second vice president in 1987-88. Patti Chambliss, of New Smyrna Beach FL, holds the title of oldest active member. In her 80s, this lively lady still eagerly attends our conventions.

ABTA has had 27 presidents. Those still active include current President Dennis Scott, Leslie Shafer, Mary Jane Von Moss, Ted Applegate, Ed Gentino, Ginny Schuett and Roberta Salob.

Although the name of the organization stresses teachers, anyone with an interest in any area of bridge is welcome to join (directors, writers, etc.).

After the founding, membership quickly grew and ABTA numbers surpassed 1000 by 1965. Today's membership of approximately 500 comes from all 50 states, Canada and many foreign countries.

Teaching members range from those who hope to start, to part-time teachers, to those who make their livings teaching huge classes. Anyone can join ABTA as an associate member. Professional teacher members have at least 100 hours of paid teaching experience.

The highest rank within ABTA is master teacher. Rankings and requirements have changed over the years.

Today, only master teachers are tested and they are subjected to a personal interview and oral test in front of the Membership Credentials

Committee in addition to other requirements.
ACBL presented a certificate of recognition for an outstanding publication in the field of bridge education for 1978-1979 to ABTA and Quarterly editor Frank Thomas. The ABTA Quarterly Magazine began as an annual publication in 1958, moved to semiannual and then became quarterly in 1963. Through all those years, the magazine has seen only five editors: George Coffin, Harold Shaw, Frank Thomas (who served for nearly 30 years from 1969 to 1998), Leslie Shafer and Donna Compton, the current editor.

The ABTA is proud to count a number of regular columnists for The Bridge Bulletin among its members: Leslie Shafer, Barbara Seagram, Marti Ronemus, Karen Walker, the late Harry Lampert, Pat Harrington, Eddie Kantar and Jerry Helms have all been active ABTA participants.

The first ABTA convention took place in New York City. An annual convention is held in conjunction with the ACBL Summer NABC.

Successful teachers donate their time and share ideas and teaching techniques to help others become top-flight bridge teachers. All of the afore-mentioned columnists have been speakers at conventions. Luminaries from the bridge world also donate their time to share with ABTA teachers. Recent speakers have included Larry Cohen, Frank Stewart, Zeke Jabbour, Fred Gitelman, Alan LeBendig, Audrey Grant, David Lindop, David and Lisa Berkowitz, Haig Tchamitch, Philip Alder, Eric Rodwell and George Jacobs.

A look at convention schedules in days gone by reads like a history of bridge. Regular speakers included Oswald Jacoby, Easley Blackwood, Richard Frey, Howard Schenken, Sam Stayman, Alfred Sheinwold and Fred Karpin.

Members were thrilled not only to hear what these experts had to say but to share conversations and take photos with them to take back to their students. Blackwood first came to ABTA because he was having trouble keeping his students. He learned how to be a better teacher through ABTA and he came back as a speaker and convention attendee year after year until his death.

All of the old-time experts eventually were named honorary ABTA members. The first honorary member was Charles Goren. In 2001, Max Hardy joined their ranks as the first ABTA honorary member to be named since 1982. Max was a regular convention speaker and also participated in the informative and often hilarious banquet panels for years. He always came to the banquet dressed in a tux and even helped provide the entertainment, singing with Norma Sands and other ABTA members. Max was such a fixture at ABTA that the banquet panel is now called the Max Hardy Memorial Panel.

An important moment in the history of ABTA came in New Orleans in 1983, when Oswald Jacoby chose the ABTA convention to announce his retirement from bridge competition. But circumstances soon made him change his mind, and he went on to win the Reisinger Board-aMatch Teams.

Australia also has an ABTA, but the first A stands for Australian. In 1979, ABTA President Antha Mallander traveled to Australia and assisted in the establishment of that organization, which was patterned after our ABTA

An important function of the ABTA is designating the Bridge Teachers’ Book of the Year and the Software of the Year. A committee of five members reviews submissions throughout the year, and the winners are announced at the convention banquet.

The book award was created in 1982 with Caroline Sydnor's Bridge Made Easy - How to Win More Tricks named the first winner. A few subsequent winners were Eddie Kantar, Marty Bergen, Barbara Seagram, Larry Cohen, Mike Lawrence, Easley Blackwood, Audrey Grant and

Norma Sands.
In 1992, the award was renamed the Shirley Silverman Book of the Year Award to honor the ABTA member and author of one of the early five-card major teaching series. Silverman's books were published in 1976, before the award was created, so she never had the opportunity to win The first software award was given in 1999 to Bobby Wolff's Bridge Mentoring Series.

And that brings us to how use of computers and the Internet haave made ABTA activities more accessible to members. Leslie Shafer had a lot to do with making that happen. After years of hearing how nice it would be for the ABTA to have an Internet presence, she created the first ABTA home page. Currently the website, www.abtahome.com, is maintained by webmaster Michael Nistler.

In 1998, Leslie also managed to arrange for monthly member online chats and an e-mail discussion group for members. Canadian member Maggie Sparrow has been in charge of running both of these services for several years now.

Whether it was the written and spoken word or communication through technology, controversy has abounded through the years. The debate over four- versus five-card majors raged through the early Seventies. Other hot topics at that time were whether a 6 -point hand should raise opener's major, and if it was okay to open 1NT with a low doubleton.

A later controversy was limit raises versus forcing raises. Quarterly articles indicate that limit raises were part of the Culbertson system until 1933, when the jump raise was changed to a force The forcing method was adopted by Goren. But many experts went back to limit raises and eventually the bridge teachers followed suit, although some members still teach forcing raises. ABTA helps its members learn how to teach but does not tell them what to teach.

For many years, the ABTA published a pamphlet on Standard American bidding and tested members for various membership categories based on that pamphlet. The project was eventually abandoned because there were so many different approaches to bidding that it was difficult to say exactly what was standard. At the 1971 convention, Jacoby proposed that standard include weak two-bids, limit raises and transfers. Thirtysix years later, most B but not all B members finally agree.

The ABTA membership has included some colorful personalities from fields other than bridge. Lampert, former Bridge Bulletin columnist, author of several Fun Way bridge books, ABTA president from 1991 to 1993, and ABTA staff cartoonist for many years, had a life outside of bridge as a cartoonist.

Lampert started in movie animation in the Thirties, working on Betty Boop and Popeye. In 1940, Harry created the original art for the first appearance of The Flash comic book. During the Forties and Fifties, his humorous cartoons
appeared in several major publications (Esquire, Saturday Evening Post, New York Times and more). In 2003, ABTA presented Harry with a Lifetime Achievement Award for his many accomplishments and years of service to ABTA.

Thomas, long-term Quarterly editor, and ABTA president from 1981 to 1983, came from a show business family. Frankie Thomas Jr. started his own acting career in Carrie Nation, working with a young Jimmy Stewart and appeared in 35 movies with the likes of Spencer Tracy, Ginger Rogers, Mickey Rooney and Ronald Regan.

Frankie's favorite and most memorable role was as Tom Corbett in a TV series, Tom Corbett, Space Cadet (1950-1956). He demonstrated his show business flair as the emcee of many banquet panels. In the bridge world, Frank also authored several Sherlock Holmes, Bridge Detective books.

The author is the ABTA Historian and was business secretary from 1995 to 2006.

No one can say Bruce Ferguson is not a good sport - or that he doesn't know a terrific play when he sees one.

On this deal from the second day of the Spingold Knockout Teams, Ferguson had high praise for an opponent, Bob Etter, who lives in Sacramento CA. The spot cards are approximate. Etter sat East.

West led a low diamond, which went to the king and ace. Declarer, a top-flight player, put a club on the table at trick two, inserting dummy's jack. Etter smoothly played low from his doubleton king.

Declarer then played a spade to his king, and when it held, he tried a club to the queen - and Etter's king!

That limited declarer to five tricks for minus 400 and was good for 14 IMPs to Etter's team because 3NT was made with an overtrick at the other table.

## Mind games

If you don’t think bridge involves psychological warfare, take a look at this deal, offered by Ron Sukoneck. It was played in a team game at the recent regional in North Bethesda MD.

Consider that you are South and find yourself in a spade slam on the accompanying auction.

West leads a diamond, and you rise with the ace. East drops the Q. What is your next move?

Obviously, you have 13 easy tricks if your trump suit behaves (any 3-2 split or a singleton jack in either opponent's hand). Can you take out some insurance?

One strategy might be to try the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$, tempting East to ruff. Suppose you do that and East does not ruff? Does that tell you anything?

Holding four spades to the jack, most players would probably decline to ruff. After all, when declarer makes this play, he surely must be catering to the East hand's holding an original singleton diamond. It would seem to most Easts, naturally, that declarer was fishing for the jack to four spades.

That then raises the question of whether it would be wise for East to ruff, whatever his spade holding might be. If refusing to ruff convinces declarer that there are four spades on his right, he might play the $\wedge \mathrm{A}$, then finesse in spades on the second round, losing to partner's doubleton $A \mathrm{~J}$.

It's all very complicated and illustrative of how devilishly cruel the game can be. This was the full deal:

At the table, declarer played $\wedge \mathrm{A}$ and a spade to the king. The contract was doomed at that point because no trump coup can be organized, but when declarer went to dummy with a high club and played a second high diamond, East fell from grace and ruffed in. Declarer overruffed and claimed.

How would you have played it?

## Nobody said it was easy

It's easy to forget that a huge tournament like this caters to players at every level. As you move along the bridge spectrum, the nature of the game is that you tend to see more mistakes - and some of them can be quite spectacular.

I spotted a couple while watching one of the many regional pairs events.


North led the $\vee 10$, and South won with the king and returned the suit. Declarer won in dummy, cashed a top club, played a spade to the ace, cashed two more hearts and then ran his club winners. That was good technique, hoping to find one defender with the $\uparrow \mathrm{K} \mathrm{Q}$ and four diamonds.

When the last club was played, North was down to $\uparrow K$ and Q J 4 and had to make a discard. If declarer had held the $\uparrow \mathrm{Q}$, he would surely have finessed, so it is clear to discard the $\uparrow K$, but North pitched a diamond and declarer had 12 tricks and a top.

Before we cover the play, let's take a moment to consider West's overcall.

Facing a passed partner, there is little chance the hand belongs to East-West, and there is nothing to suggest that West needs to ensure East leads a spade. The only effect of overcalling is to help declarer place the missing high cards.

East led the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} 10$, and declarer won in hand and ran the $\quad \mathrm{J}$ to West’s king. Back came a spade and declarer won in hand and played a diamond to the ace, felling the queen. Declarer was now set to take 12 tricks, but the next card was a low diamond! East won with the 9 and switched to a heart. When West withheld the ace declarer could claim plus 660 and a good score, as at several tables East led a heart ensuring at least three tricks for the defense.

That mysterious low diamond on the third round of the suit is explained by the fact that declarer had forgotten the jack had been played at trick two!

## Pre-Alert/Disclosure forms

If your partnership plays special overcalls, you must fill out a pre-Alert/Disclosure form and make it available to your opponents when you play in events that allow Mid-Chart and Super-Chart conventions.

This applies to NABC+, regional or higher knockout and Flight A Swiss games. Look for the light blue forms on the table where convention cards are available.

Since she started promoting the game to young players a few years ago, she and others have taught more than 700 youngsters to play bridge. She reckons there are about 150 of them who are regular players.

In January of 2006, Atlanta Junior Bridge was established as a non-profit corporation (that means it's tax deductible - hint, hint - if you donate to it).

AJB has 26 teachers and assistants. In 2006, AJB ran 11 summer bridge camps for youngsters. The number of camps increased to 19 this summer.

Tucker is especially pleased that the first youth championship will take place in Atlanta because of the large base of young players there.
"They love bridge," Tucker says of the youth players. "They really do."

The children who have participated are aged 7 to 17 or 18 , and Tucker says the Atlanta program may be teaching the game in as many as 18 schools this year. "We get calls all the time," she says.

Tucker says she is hoping to land a corporate sponsor or two for the first Youth North American Bridge Championship next summer. After the initial tournament in Atlanta, the plan is for the two-day tournament to be part of each summer NABC thereafter.

Tucker says she worked with The League, the non-profit educational organization, to run an end-of-school tournament in late April and May, with all sites playing the same deals. She said the tournament had 155 pairs of youngsters participating in six U.S. states and three Canadian provinces.

The game was matchpointed by Tucker and retired TD Carey Snider.

## British invasion: UK entrepreneur targets U.S.

Terry Collier is a man with a plan. The former head of the English Bridge Union has long been interested in solving the problem of declining duplicate bridge awareness and attendance.
"I've spent the last few years identifying problems and finding solutions, and I’m ready to proceed," said Collier, whose idea is to utilize technology as well as some clever game-design ideas to woo casual players into trying duplicate.

The web site PlayBridgeUK at www.playbridgeuk.com is the hub of Collier's marketing project. The site has many features, including results from simultaneous pairs games that clubs, even informal ones that Collier refers to as "kitchen duplicate," can enjoy.
"Simultaneous pairs are very popular in Europe. In France, for example, it’s common for local club games to be a nation-wide matchpoint game that is scored online. Our site provides results and analyses for hand sets that clubs may use," Collier said.

How can local clubs easily pre-deal a set of 24 or so boards? The answer is a dealing machine called AutoDealer 4. Collier said that half of the clubs in Britain have dealing machines, and AutoDealer 4 allows those clubs to download hand sets online and have them automatically dealt.
"You don't even need the special cards with bar codes," said Collier. "The machine reads the faces of a standard deck of cards." AutoDealer 4 sorts the hands and drops them into a special duplicate board.
"This tool is used to support clubs and teachers, because it allows you to put together teaching hands, hands for competition or theme hands, such as deals from world championship play. And it's all downloadable from the PlayBridgeUK web site."

Although this plan works well for clubs and players already playing duplicate, Collier has bigger goals. He wants to reach the "kitchen duplicate" crowd, and he's doing so with the use of another product called iDeal Cards.

The iDeal Cards have special codes on the backs that allow players to create 24 deals. Each may be played anywhere - home, work, wherever. Afterwards, the players can go online to compare their scores to those on the web site.
"And the best thing is that there's analysis available so players can learn," said Collier. "This allows non-club players to play duplicate bridge. The long-term goal is to attract rubber bridge players interested in playing live bridge at a local club."

Collier's plans are even more ambitious, however, as he plans to begin marketing his ideas in the U.S. The name of the web site for his American audience will be (of course) PlayBridgeUS.

Facts: The director was called after West's
BIT. The director found that there was agreement about the BIT and instructed the table to call back if there was a problem regarding the BIT. The director was called back after the hand and discovered the facts about the $2 \bullet$ bid as above.

Director's Ruling: The director judged that 4 NT was not suggested by the BIT (double or 5 \& might be suggested); therefore, whether pass was a logical alternative (LA) was not relevant. In accordance with Law 16A, there was no infraction and no adjustment.

The Appeal: North-South argued that West's BIT suggested that East bid and that a pass by East
was an LA. East said that his clubs were worthless on defense and that with a fitting diamond honor and long, strong clubs that bidding on was indicated. West's 2 bid suggested $10+$ high-card points, but was not a game force.

The committee discovered that East-West did not have the agreement that West's pass of $4 \boldsymbol{A}$ was forcing. East did not double 4* because on a similar auction ( $1 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ - pass -4*) a double would ask for the lead of a heart.

The Decision: A clear BIT was established. Players seldom take a long time considering whether to double, but more often are thinking about bidding. The committee determined that the BIT demonstrably suggested that East bid. The committee judged that a pass by East was an LA to bidding. With a singleton spade or the ace or king of diamonds and the $\because \mathrm{A}$, West would almost surely have taken action over $4 \boldsymbol{A}$. So, at best, $5 \boldsymbol{*}$ or 5 would require a finesse or two and might be hopeless. On the other hand, East's doubleton diamond (as opposed to having three diamonds) was all right for defense. It would not be surprising for East-West to have four tricks in the red suits on defense or one black suit trick and three tricks in the red suits. Therefore, the committee disallowed the 4 NT call and adjusted the result to $4 \boldsymbol{a}$ by South down one, North-South minus 50.

Facts: The director was called after the auction ended before the opening lead. Away from the table, West said that not vulnerable versus vulnerable that he would have doubled a nonforcing $3 \wedge$ bid.

Director's Ruling: The director judged that a double by West was not at all probable. In accordance with Laws 21B3 and 12C2 the table result was allowed to stand.

The Appeal: West asserted that had he known that $3 \uparrow$ was non-forcing he would have doubled. He made that statement before the opening lead was made and dummy revealed. The director was called immediately after the auction ended.

North pointed out that the convention card does not have a box in the opening preempts section that indicates that a new suit being nonforcing is Alertable. Having been away from bridge for years he was unaware that such an agreement is not standard and he had no way to find out. South said that he and his partner did not have an agreement that a new suit was not forcing. In fact, he thought it was, but decided to bid $3 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ "come what may."

The Decision: The committee believed that West would have doubled $3 \wedge$ had he known South was limited in strength as he was non-vulnerable with picture book shape. The moment that West makes a takeout double, forcing the hand to such a high level, East with a match in diamonds and three key cards in partner's suits would surely not stop short of game. Therefore, the result was changed to 5 by East-West making five, for a score of East-West plus 400 and North-South minus 400.

The committee furnished North-South with the written published description of Alertable calls, which is available to all players. The North-South pair was encouraged to decide what agreement they wish to follow in the future. Should they decide to agree that new suits below game are nonforcing they must Alert when the sequence occurs.

As an aside, however, there was sympathy for North's contention that since the convention card does not have a box to check in the concerned area for this non-standard agreement that he operated on the assumption that such an agreement was standard. The committee recommended that the ACBL put such a box on convention cards in the future to eliminate that reasonable ambiguity.

## For experts only (sort of)

## By Barry Rigal

After a quick exit from the Spingold
Knockout Teams, I thought I would like to share with you the way the real experts defend.


All Pass
West led the $\uparrow \mathrm{Q}$ to declarer's ace. Now South quite reasonably led a heart to dummy's 10 and East's jack. From this point it would take a real pair of experts to let through $4 \boldsymbol{\vee}$, right? Come the hour, come the men!

East continued at trick three with the $\boldsymbol{\sim} \mathrm{J}$ (some suit preference in the high honors). Declarer ruffed and led the $\mathbf{v}$ to the 8 and my partner's ace.

Back came a low club, and dummy's queen held the trick! Making 420.

East ducked the $\uparrow K$, hoping declarer held
$\uparrow$ A $10 x \mathrm{x}$ 『Kxxx $\mathrm{xxx} \& \mathrm{Ax}$, and that ducking might keep declarer from using a club as an entry to dummy.

West "knew" his low club promised the ace, and he did not want to lead the $\because A$ and another club in case declarer had a singleton in that suit.

Of course, both defenders were way off track here. West should have known South had two clubs: If declarer was $4=4=4=1$, the partner had a singleton diamond and would have switched to that suit at trick three.

East could have seen that ducking the club would accomplish nothing because, even if the distribution was what he was hoping for, declarer could play diamonds before drawing the last trump and make the contract.

But it just goes to show that no defense is so bad that an expert pair won't find it.

## Protecting partner

Cooperative defense often consists of finding plays that make it difficult or impossible for partner to go wrong. A variation of this theme occurred in the final round of the second semifinal session of the Von Zedtwitz Life Master Pairs.

East led the $\leqslant$, and declarer put up dummy's king. North cashed the $* Q$ and $\star 10$ and continued with a heart to dummy's king. On the next two clubs, West pitched the $\vee 10$ and $\uparrow 9$, playing upside-down count and attitude signals, indicating that declarer has the missing spade honor as well.

If West pitches another spade on the last club and East also discards a spade, postponing the critical discard, declarer can play a heart to the ace, rejecting the finesse because he knows East must have the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$ to have an opening bid declarer has discarded three diamonds on the clubs). This will be the five-card ending:


Daniel Korbel of Waterloo ON and J onathan Steinberg of Toronto were second in the Wernher Open Pairs. diamond honor to avoid the endplay (if he holds onto the $\quad \mathrm{A} Q$, declarer exits with a diamond and waits for the spade play, knowing where the king lies). If East pitches the $A$ or $Q$, when North plays a diamond, West will win and play a spade, allowing East to make two more tricks.

Unfortunately, in the actual play, East did not have a chance to play a diamond honor to unblock because West discarded the $\checkmark \mathrm{J}$ on the last club!

1. Large - Anchor 55 passenger - usually white 2. Medium - A Black Mini Bus (has replaced the White Mini Bus),
2. Small- Black 15 passenger van.

Look for signs in the front curb side window (opposite the driver). Each has a "Bridge Buggy" sign as well as another sign to identify the mission (route) it is currently on

## Hotel Service

Service begins at 8 each morning, and it will run continuously through most of the day. There will be planned breaks in service for an hour at 10 a.m. and for a half hour at 1 p.m. Service will be more frequent before and after the bridge events.

Hotels served include the Sheraton, Best Western, Holiday Inn Express, Hampton Inn (4th and Korean War Veterans), Courtyard Inn (4th and Church) and Doubletree. Guests at the Wyndham should walk to the Holiday Inn.

## Dinnertime Shuttle Changes

The shuttles run a continuous loop among the host hotels and the downtown eating establishments on lower Broadway and 2nd Avenue.

In addition, the black van will transport you to either Nashville's famous Swett's for great soul food or to Magic Circle for electric choices. Request these locations to the van driver and he will arrange a time to retrieve you.

Convention Center is the Hub
Important: The Convention Center loading and
unloading point is the Commerce Street entrance This also applies to tours or any other special transportation.

## LP Field Parking

If not staying downtown, you can park in Lot A / B at the Titans stadium lot at LP Field. This is an existing service for people who work downtown, and is available for us during the tournament.

Just check in with the security guard. Cost is generally free, but if the lot fills, the overflow lot is $\$ 1$. They have an existing shuttle service that costs $\$ 1$ each way. Look for the bright yellow Park It bus.

There is a change, however, from previous information published (web site, etc.). They will not be altering their route during the tournament. The nearest stops to the convention center are 4th \& Church (Courtyard by Marriott) where you can transfer to our hotel shuttle service. Or, you can exit at the next stop, 3rd and Commerce. Both stops are about two blocks away, but 3rd and Commerce is generally uphill.

The yellow shuttle service runs from 7 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Return service is from either of the aforementioned stops. The frequency is normally every 20 minutes, but every 10 minutes at peak, from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. and from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m.

After 6:30 p.m. use the Downtown Dinner route, and ask the driver to drop you off at LP Field. After 10 p.m., request service from either the driver of either the Minibus or the Passenger Van as they stand or stop at the Convention Center.

Important - this parking option is not available on the last Saturday or Sunday of the tournament.

## Vanderbilt Bridge Club

You can park and ride from the Vanderbilt Bridge Club.

Departure times: 8 a.m. \& 11 a.m.
Return service:

1. Black van at dinner break
2. Midnight from the Convention Center.

Look for the Bus!
Generally, the services are to be provided in a continuous loop, and there will not be scheduled arrival or departure times. No announcement will be made in the hotels. Please: it is important that you actively look for the bus so that you make the connection! The bus will wait only a couple of minutes at each "stop," and if no patrons are seen, the driver will move on to the next location. Especially on the dinner routes. Be prepared to get the driver's attention. Many of these streets are very busy or narrow, and they are not conducive to any type of long-term stop or blockage of other traffic.

Hotel Service Frequency (note - these are estimates)

Sheraton: 8 a.m. to 10 a.m., 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., 10 minutes; all other service periods - 20 to 30 minutes. All other hotels, 20 to 30 minutes during service periods.
