## Pre-Alert/ Disclosure forms

If your partnership plays special overcalls, you must fill out a pre-Alert/Disclosure form and make it available to your opponents when you play in events that allow Mid-Chart and Super-Chart conventions.

This applies to NABC+, regional or higher knockout and Flight A Swiss games. Look for the light blue forms on the table where convention cards are available.

## Look in your registration bag

Some lucky players will find a special surprise in their registration bags.

Necessary Elements (www.jewelryinsterling.com) has donated about 80 pieces of jewelry as surprise gifts. You might receive one, along with the usual assortment of goodies including a travel alarm clock, a blinking guitar pin, GooGoo Cluster candy, a convention card sticker, etc.
 the opponents ask you about your carding and you have no answer maybe you aren't even sure what is meant by the term. You should discuss carding with your partner, and the opponents have a right to know what agreements you have.
Look at the back of the convention card down in the lower left-hand corner. That's the area where you and your partner indicate which card you would lead under various circumstances, as well as what signals and protocols you use for defense.

If you are unsure what card you would play, note the bold on the grid - it tells you what card is chosen by the vast majority of players. Only if you have agreed to lead otherwise do you need to mark anything on the card. The two most likely differences are leading third best or "jack denies" from combinations such as K-J-10-x. Also, leading the ace from A-K-x is very popular today on opening lead.

Even if you like leading the ace from A-K-x (starting with the king from a doubleton A-K), there are clear exceptions. Lead king from A-K at the five level and higher. Partner will know when the king holds that you have the ace. After all, you might well lead the ace even without the king at such a high level, so do what you can to keep your partner well-informed. If it isn't clear to you why you would make the lead indicated, ask a director or a more experienced player.

Look over at the notrump grid and you will see one bold choice which looks odd: K-Q-10-9 shows the queen in bold. This is a popular lead agreement. When you lead the queen against a notrump contract, it tells partner, "Drop the jack if you have it!" The location of the jack is very important to the opening leader.

This particular lead problem was first identified by the whist players of Bath, England,
three centuries ago. A crafty declarer holding A-J-x will hold up on the lead of the king, hoping that the leader will continue and give declarer an undeserved trick. This little ploy is called the Bath Coup in memory of all those hours spent at the whist tables of Bath. But the defending side won't fall for the Bath Coup if they have agreed to "drop the jack." You should also agree, by the way, that if partner of the opening leader does not have the jack, the card played should show count: low from an odd number, high from an even number.

There are fewer differences between leading against suits and against notrump than you might imagine. Many leads are equally effective against either one. The biggest difference is that it is common to lead away from aces, or even A-K, in notrump, but not at all effective to lead away from aces against suit contracts. Also, usually top of a sequence for notrump leads is from a sequence of three or more (e.g., Q-J-10) or nearly three in a row (Q-J-9), while a sequence of two (Q-J-) is not uncommon against suits.

Besides your lead agreements, carding also means signaling and discarding. Most players use standard count and attitude signals. When the opening leader's card is holding the trick, perhaps on the lead of the ace, third hand usually signals attitude, playing high-low to tell the opening leader to continue the suit, playing a low card to show no interest in a continuation.

The count signal in standard carding is similar: High-low for an even number, low-high for an odd number.

Attitude signals are also used when discarding: A high card tells partner that you have values in the suit discarded. A low card tells partner you have a poor holding in the suit you just played.

Please note, if your first discard is what you want partner to lead, even if it's the 2 , you are not using standard carding. Note that fact on the card so the opponents can be properly informed. Here's an example of why this non-standard

Bidding commentary: South has a "picture" weak two-bid. South has a strong suit with a normal range of 6-9 high-card points. Weak two-bids have an actual range of 5-6 to 10 HCP. But a 5 - or 10 -point weak two-bid is atypical. North is strong enough to raise to game. West has a picture-perfect takeout double of $2 \boldsymbol{v}$ : Opening bid strength plus heart
shortness. West needs another ace to double $4 \boldsymbol{v}$, which also would be for takeout.

Defensive commentary: Assuming dummy takes the first trick with the $\approx \mathrm{A}$, East makes an encouraging signal to show the jack.

Play commentary: As declarer, you can see that the opponents have the $\star A$ and $\bullet K$, and the suit wasn't led. Translation: West doesn't have both honors. Given the bidding, the diamond honors are almost certainly split. Going further: If East has a diamond honor, West surely has the balance of the missing HCP for the double. Given this ugly diamond position, the idea is to force the opponents to lead the suit first. In order to do that, the hand must be stripped before exiting with a club, an equal-length suit. Win the club lead, draw trumps, lead a spade to the queen, cash the $\uparrow \mathrm{A}$, ruff a spade, enter dummy with a trump, ruff dummy's last spade and exit with a club. Defensive commentary: When thrown in with a club, the defense needs three diamond tricks. If West wins the club, West must hope East has the - A J x. If East wins the club, East must hope West has the $\diamond \mathrm{K} \operatorname{lo}$, so he will lead a low diamond. As it happens, South has the $\bullet$ J, so there is no happy ending for East-West.

Gitelman's decision to open 1NT meant the fit in diamonds was undisclosed so a slam was never really in the picture. You want to be in 6 on these cards, but as it happens a diamond lead will defeat you.

Here North led the $\uparrow 8$, and declarer won in hand and drew three rounds of trumps and then played on diamonds, claiming 11 tricks.

Very impressive bidding to reach the slam, perhaps the key being East's splinter in clubs.

Would North find the killing lead?
It was difficult to be sure, and when North led the $\& 6$, declarer was almost home. South won with the king and switched to the $\uparrow$ Q. Declarer carefully won in dummy, cashed the $\boldsymbol{\vee} 10$, played a heart to the jack, ruffed a club, drew trumps and played a diamond. When everyone followed he could claim plus 920 and 11 well-earned IMPs.

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## Defying Deep Finesse

Each set of hand records includes analysis of each deal in terms of how many tricks can be made in various strains. Deep Finesse is never wrong, but one must remember that the program's analysis is based on a full view of all four hands. When results vary from what DF says can be made, it's a human thing: One or more mistakes have occurred or the human did not find the double-dummy line of play.

On this deal from the second qualifying session of the NABC Fast Pairs, Rick Kaye of Detroit benefited from an error by the opponents (hands rotated).

Deep Finesse correctly assesses nine tricks as the maximum for North-South in spades, but it doesn't account for errors - and East made a big one.

West started with the $\approx K$, taken by the ace. A diamond went to declarer's king, and Kaye got out of his hand with a club: 9, 10, jack. Had East cashed his - A at this point, there would be no story to tell, but he may have expected his partner to hold the A . The play of the 3 at that point was not the best move for the defense.

Kaye let the heart to go dummy's king, and he followed with the top two hearts from his hand, discarding dummy's now-singleton diamond.

From there, he ruffed a diamond, ruffed a club and ruffed another diamond. When he exited dummy with the singleton trump king, East won and returned a diamond. Declarer was down to all trumps, as was West. Kaye ruffed low and was overruffed, but at trick 12 , West was on lead with the $\wedge J 9$. Kaye held the $\uparrow$ Q 10. That was 10 tricks, plus 790 and 24 out of 25 matchpoints for North-South.

The $\bullet \mathrm{K}$ gets the 2 (odd number), and the $\star \mathrm{A}$ draws the 3 from partner. Do you trust partner and underlead your club holding for a possible diamond ruff?

Susan Miller, playing with Bob Sartorius, did so, and this was the full story:

On the system card I could see，North＇s 1NT is 12－14 and he had already shown up with $\uparrow \mathrm{J}$ ，

On this deal from the Mixed Board-a-Match Teams, the room played 3NT. It's best from the North hand to prevent the defenders attacking spades if East has the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} 9$.

In fact, when 3NT was played by South on a club lead, the defenders still have the tempo to establish clubs for the fourth defensive winner but they have to be careful.

At our table, declarer received the lead of the \& 7 , which went to the ace. Declarer won the second club and led a heart to the queen and ace. He took the third club in hand and played the $\vee 8$ and ran it. Now West could be kept off play, and the long heart in dummy was good for the 10th trick.

Of course, if East ducks the first heart, declarer is likely to lead back to dummy's remaining top honor. Now West's $\downarrow$ J represents the entry to the long club.

A curiously paralleled theme to the previous deal is contained in the following.

How should South play 3NT on the lead of the fourth-highest $\& 2$ ? The natural reaction is to duck, win the second club and take the diamond finesse. If you do, you will live and die by the success of that finesse.

A better approach (it can't lose and might gain) is the win the $\boldsymbol{A}$ at trick one, simulating a show of strength, and immediately advance the $\checkmark$ 8. West might duck the $\vee \mathrm{K}$, East might fall from grace and duck the $\vee$ - and the latter did happen at our table. If you are sure that clubs are $4-4$, playing hearts just gives you a small extra chance. You can revert to diamonds if the heart loses.

The box on the convention card in the notrump section, "system on over $\qquad$ " was blank on both East's and West's convention card.

The Decision: Players are required to Alert or Announce conventional bids that they have explicitly discussed or implicitly understand through partnership experience. East-West had no agreement about the meaning of West's 2 bid, so not only did East properly not Alert, but West should not have been expecting an Alert. Thus, there was no UI to West regarding East’s $3 \bullet$ bid. He was free to bid whatever he judged best.

Additionally, the committee agreed with West's bidding judgment that even if East was showing a good raise of hearts, with most of the defensive strength sitting over partner's hand, it was well against the odds for West to drive to $4 \vee$.

Finally, if West had chosen to play $4 \vee$, he would have done so through a retransfer. Playing $4 \vee$ from East's side would likely result in the same result that was achieved in $3 \boldsymbol{v}$ from the West side - minus 50.

The committee restored the table result of $3 \vee$ by West, down one, North-South plus 50.

Director's Ruling: 6* by East, making seven, East-West plus 940.

The Facts: The director was called during the auction and after play had concluded. The BIT was acknowledged as above.

The Ruling: The director judged that a pass to 6* was a logical alternative (LA) call that would have been less successful and that bidding was demonstrably suggested by the BIT. In accordance with Laws 16A and 12C2, the director adjusted the result to $6 *$ by East making seven, East-West plus 940, because it was the most favorable result likely had there been no BIT.

The Appeal: North stated that after his $4 \vee$ bid, the subsequent bids of $5 \&, 5 \bullet$ and $6 *$ were very fast. He did not feel that his pass of $6 \propto$ was different from his normal tempo. South said that he had wild distribution and that his seven-card suit had been vigorously supported by partner when he had only promised five of the suit. $6 \vee$ was unlikely to cost more than the value of EastWest's game and might even make on a good day. Had South been on lead against $6 \boldsymbol{*}$ he would not have expected a heart lead to do any good and would have tried a spade as the best chance to build or take a trick. East said that North's hesitation suggested South's $6 \vee$ bid. As to the opening lead, although a spade lead is logical, it could be the only lead to give away the contract.

The Decision: North had to make a highlevel decision after three bids had been thrown at him in a very short time. In a "normal" game the time it took North to pass might not be considered a BIT, but in a fast pairs it probably was. Further, although North might have been considering a double with his actual hand, he might also have been thinking about bidding $6 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$, which is the normal assumption. So, the committee did determine that the BIT demonstrably suggested that South bid $6 \vee$.

However, look at the South hand. It has freakish distribution with a void in the opponent's suit and two additional cards in the suit that partner had jumped to game in. Although it need not work out best to bid $6 \mathbf{v}$, it would be difficult to find a player who would not bid $6 \boldsymbol{v}$ on the given auction. The committee did not consider pass to be a LA. Therefore, the committee restored the table result of $6 \checkmark$ doubled by North, down one, North-South minus 100.

Onstott led the $\boldsymbol{\uparrow} 5$ against $2 \downarrow$ doubled and redoubled. Declarer won and led a club to the jack which held. He then led the 5 to the queen and West's king. Onstott cashed the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} \mathrm{K}$ and led another spade to Krekorian's jack.

Declarer now had to lose a club and two hearts for down one - plus 400 for East-West, and a 51 on a 51 top.

Deep Finesse says that North-South can make $2 \boldsymbol{v}$, so what could declarer do? When he led a diamond, if he had put in the $\uparrow 9$, instead of the queen, that would force the $\leqslant \mathrm{K}$ and he would have a discard for his club loser. Sometimes the difference between a top and a bottom is that close.

## Shuttle service

A system of shuttle services is being provided throughout the tournament to assist you in transportation needs. These shuttles cover the following:

1. Service to or from the Nashville Convention Center and the host hotels in the downtown area (Sheraton, Best Western, Doubletree, Courtyard by Marriott (4th \& Church), Hampton Inn (behind Hall of Fame) and
2. Dinner service to restaurant areas.

Please note - While these services are provided as a convenience to help you enjoy your visit with us, we are not equipped to move everybody. All of the unattached host hotels and many fine restaurants are within a relatively easy walk from the Convention Center. The transportation is there in case you find it too steep, too hot, your puppies are just too tired, or you can't believe you ate the whole thing. If it rains, be prepared, because not all will be able to ride.

What to Look For
Service can be provided by any of three shuttles:

1. Large - Anchor 55 passenger - usually white,
2. Medium - A Black Mini Bus (has replaced the White Mini Bus),
3. Small- Black 15 passenger van.

Look for signs in the front curb side window
(opposite the driver). Each has a "Bridge Buggy" sign as well as another sign to identify the mission (route) it is currently on.

## Hotel Service

Service begins at 8 each morning, and it will run continuously through most of the day. There will be planned breaks in service for an hour at 10 a.m. and for a half hour at 1 p.m. Service will be more frequent before and after the bridge events.

Hotels served include the Sheraton, Best Western, Holiday Inn Express, Hampton Inn (4th and Korean War Veterans), Courtyard Inn (4th and Church) and Doubletree. Guests at the Wyndham should walk to the Holiday Inn.

## Dinnertime

The shuttles run a continuous loop among the host hotels and the downtown eating establishments on lower Broadway and 2nd Avenue.

In addition, the black van will transport you to either Nashville's famous Swett's for great soul food or to Magic Circle for electric choices. Request these locations to the van driver and he will arrange a time to retrieve you.

Convention Center is the Hub
Important: The Convention Center loading and unloading point is the Commerce Street entrance. This also applies to tours or any other special transportation.

## Look for the Bus!

Generally, the services are to be provided in a continuous loop, and there will not be scheduled arrival or departure times. No announcement will be made in the hotels. Please: it is important that you actively look for the bus so that you make the connection! The bus will wait only a couple of minutes at each "stop," and if no patrons are seen, the driver will move on to the next location. Especially on the dinner routes. Be prepared to get the driver's attention. Many of these streets are very busy or narrow, and they are not conducive to any type of long-term stop or blockage of other traffic.

Hotel Service Frequency (note - these are estimates)

Sheraton: 8 a.m. to 10 a.m., 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., 10 minutes; all other service periods - 20 to 30 minutes. All other hotels, 20 to 30 minutes during service periods.
