

## South Carolina woman wins ABTA best teacher award

Tina Radding, described by friends and students as a tireless worker for bridge, has been selected as the first recipient of the American Bridge Teachers Association Master Point Press Teacher of the Year award.

The presentation to Radding, of Charleston SC, was one of two ABTA functions at the Summer NABC in New Orleans. At the other, the ABTA - a professional organization of bridge teachers from Canada, Mexico and the U.S. - announced various awards, including two for books and another for software.

The ABTA Book of the Year Award is given for two categories: beginners and intermediate players. The winners in the beginner category were Barbara Seagram and David Bird for their collaboration on Planning the Play of a Bridge Hand. The

## WBF president invites all to Philadelphia championships

World Bridge Federation President Jose Damiani, stepping down later this year after 16 years at the helm, visited the Summer NABC in part to make sure that the final world bridge championship under his direction is a big success.

That would be the World Bridge Series Championships, scheduled for Philadelphia

Oct. 1 through Oct. 16. It will be the first world championship on American soil since the 1994 tournament in Albuquerque NM.

It was in 1994 that Damiani was elected president of the WBF. During his presidency, the WBF was recognized by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) first as a Recognized Sport Organization (1995), and then as an International Federation (1999) which is the last step before admittance in the Olympic Games. In addition, the WBF is now a member of the Association of the IOC-Recognized International Sports Federations and the General Association of International Sports Federations.

In 2008, Damiani oversaw the first World Mind Sports Games in Beijing, China, and as president of the International Mind Sports Association is anticipating the second edition of the Games in 2012. Bridge is one of the mind sports.

For now, however, he is concentrating on Philadelphia and promoting the world

There were 157 tables in the field at the start, reduced to 78 for today. The event concludes on Sunday.

Sandra Nott of Memphis and Clair Berry of Germantown, a Memphis suburb, forged a lead of less than a matchpoint after the first two qualifying sessions of the Bruce 0-5000 Life Master Pairs. Their score of 493.05 was just ahead of the 492.07 posted by Californians Grant Robinson of Orinda and Teresa Boyd of Lafayette.

The event started with 75 tables, reduced to 39 for today's semifinal sessions. The event concludes on Sunday.

## Texans tops in Young LM <br> Mitch Towner and Robert Whitcher of

Austin TX took the lead after the opening two qualifying session of the Young 0-1500 Life Master Pairs. They posted a total score of $185.64,6.67$ matchpoints clear of Dexter Senft of Bedford NY and S. Leech of Pasadena CA. Eleanor O'Connor and Richard Hurd of Trumansburg NY are third going into the second day of the three-day event.

## GNT: semifinal matchups

Four squads remain in each of the four Grand National Team flights.

In the Morehead Championship Flight, Doug Simson's District 11 squad will face Dan Morse's District 16 team, as Jill Meyers of District 23 battles John Onstott of District 10.

In the Goldman Flight A, District 4, led by Elliot Shalita, will play District 11, captained by William Higgins. In the other bracket, Lance Shull and his District 7 foursome will take on the District 17 squad led by Dom DiFelice.

The Sheinwold Flight B matchups feature Paul Chan's District 15 team against John Adams's District 22 lineup, while Ryan Connors from District 24 takes on Eric Hendrickson \& Co. of District 14.

When using bid boxes, the ACBL requires that players tap the Alert strip and say "Alert" at the same time.

When making an Announcement, use the Announcement word (such as "transfer") and tap the Alert strip at the same time.

A player who Alerts or Announces a bid must make sure his opponents are aware that an Alert or Announcement has been made.

More than half a century ago, bridge was a genteel game. Even Miss Manners got into the act by declaring, "Never double your hostess for penalties." In fact, if you didn't know how to play bridge, you were considered a social pariah. My, how times have changed. A very charming player at my club, the late Rossi

 Lindstrom, was the

queen of our little bridge arena. After asking about my grandchildren, making appreciative sighs of how beautiful they were, she proceeded to, shall we say, bludgeon me with her formidable bridge skills. She was so sweet, I usually never knew how badly she had beaten me until I saw the scores at the end of the game.

A competitive sport can bring out the best or the worst in anyone. In the bridge world, we need the former disposition and must work very hard to present our best face at all times. Easier said than done, I know. At a local club, there were times when I was brutalized by a venomous player (I even wanted to nominate some of them to be a member of the Throw Them Off the Bridge Plane organization). As time passed, my opinions grew less strident and I learned to tolerate their passion and colorfulness at the table. I was reminded of the infamous comedian Don Rickles - insulting to everyone, but we laughed and enjoyed his strange view of the world.

So let's discuss how to handle good or bad results in a way that won't upset the victims . . . er, other players.

1. How to be a nice opponent: Introduce yourselves and say something nice to your new opponents immediately upon arrival. Bend over backwards to compliment them on their bidding or defense, if warranted. Wish them good luck on departure.
2. How to be gracious: Compliment your partner every time dummy comes down. Say, "Nice hand, Pard. Thanks!" As appropriate,
compliment the declarer. Say, "Nicely played."

If you get a good board because of the opponents' bad bidding or play, just score it up and keep your mouth shut. The bridge goddess will not give you any more gifts if you show you're incapable of receiving them with grace If you must gloat, write down in your convention card the letter " $G$ " for gift. When I was a newcomer, I arrived at the table of the elder Mike Cappelletti - yes, that Cappelletti. I noticed him putting a big "F" next to his score from the last board. I laughingly asked him if that stood for "fix" or something else. Of course, he just smiled.
3. How to be forgiving: If partner makes a mistake, ask yourself, "What could I have done to prevent this misunderstanding? How can I make this easier for partner?" Instead of playing the blame game, try playing the it-might-be-my-fault game. If your lips are actually moving and words are about to escape, those words better be, "I would've done the same thing, pard."
4. Discussing bad results: If I can get misty-eyed when a contestant wins a car on The Price is Right, you can only imagine the humiliation I'd feel if my partner were to ever criticize me in front of an opponent. Others are not so sensitive, but it is still important to talk about results at the table. Time must pass for you to get better perspective and give your partner a chance to get his breath back. I suggest you both write notes on the inside of your convention card that you can bring up after the game is finished, preferably over a nice mellowing glass of wine.
5. Don't be a result merchant! Sometimes I get a bad-looking result and I'm later surprised to find out it was duplicated at several tables, earning an average score. Minus 800 always seems atrocious, but it might actually be a good score if the opponents missed a slam. You won't get the results until the game is finished, so why waste your breath until that defining moment arrives? Just circle the board number inside your card to remind yourself to check on it.

## Thinking bridge <br> By Eddie Kantar

How you play certain card combinations depends on certain variables. The first three were listed in yesterday's Daily Bulletin on this page. Here are the rest. Tomorrow we will see some examples.
4. The bidding

The bidding frequently affects the play of a particular suit.

The normal play for four tricks with this holding is to lead the ace and low to the jack needing to find West with $\mathrm{Q}-\mathrm{x}-(\mathrm{x})$. However, if the bidding has told you that East must have the queen, play the ace and low to the king, hoping East has Q-x.

no adverse bidding and West leads a low spade an unbid suit. You would need a very good reason not to take the finesse. However, if East has opened $2 \boldsymbol{A}$, weak, presumably showing six spades, you can read the lead as a singleton and unless you enjoy seeing your good tricks ruffed away, play the ace.

What about at notrump, where there is no danger of a ruff? Nine times out of 10, finesse. When wouldn't you? In fact, there are several scenarios where you would be putting your contract at risk by taking the finesse when taking the ace is a $100 \%$ play to make the contract: 1 . You have enough tricks to make your contract, but are wide open in another suit.
2. You can't afford to let them in before you set up another suit for fear of a disastrous shift.
5. The count

Having the count on a suit is a huge plus before attacking a suit. It frequently alters the percentage play in the suit. Here is an example: North

The percentage play for four spade tricks is to play the ace and king and low to the queen. However, if the count tells you that West started
with four spades, play the ace-king and low to the 10. If the count tells you that East has four spades, pray that West has J-x!
6. Avoidance plays: keeping the danger hand off lead.

It might be worth a possible trick (even several) to make sure a particular opponent - the "danger hand" - does not get the lead. Perhaps you have K-x in a suit. The trick to keeping the danger hand from getting in is to make sure that hand plays second to the finesse trick, not last.

If West is the danger hand, play the king and low to the 10 finessing into East. If East is the danger hand, play the ace and low to the jack, finessing into West. In both cases the danger hand plays second to the trick, the non-danger hand, last.

In summary: Whether you are declarer or third hand, before playing to a trick, particularly the first trick, consider the deal as a unit, not just the suit that has been led (a common error partner often makes). Do the same later in the play before attacking a suit. One of those $\& \wedge \% \$$ variables might apply! Look ahead. Amen.

## Entries

All North American championships with no upper masterpoint limitation
(Note: only ACBL members are eligible to play in NABC+ events. $\$ 1.50$ per person per session benefits the International Fund.)

Other North American championships $\$ 17$
(Note: only ACBL members are eligible to play in these events.)

Regional championships $\$ 16$ for ACBL members, $\$ 18$ for all others
All other events $\quad \$ 15$ forACBL members, $\$ 17$ for all others.

## Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a $1 / 6$-board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

championships, which will be run concurrent with a two-week ACBL regional. Both tournaments will award WBF masterpoints.

The venue for the World Bridge Series is the Philadelphia Marriott Downtown. "The playing space is very good," Damiani says, "and we will also be using room from the convention center, which is connected to the hotel."

The 2010 world championships do not require pre-qualification, and all events are transnational players are eligible to form pairs and teams without regard to their countries of origin.

With the regional going on at the same time, there will be something for players at every level of experience in Philadelphia.

Besides the host hotel, there are other hotels nearby, including the Courtyard by Marriott, less than half a block from the headquarters hotel, and the Hilton Garden Inn, a block and a half away.

Play will be at the Marriott.

This is the lineup of events: World Mixed Pairs, World Open Knockout Teams (Rosenblum Cup), World Women's Knockout Teams (McConnell Cup), World Senior Knockout Teams (Rand Cup), Generali World Open Pairs, Generali World Women's Pairs, World Senior Pairs (Hiron Trophy) and World Mixed Swiss Teams, a new event.

There are concurrent events for players and teams that fail to qualify for various stages of the primary events.

While the world events and ACBL regional are in progress, the 13th World Youth Team Championships will take place - the World Junior Championship (26 and younger for zonal team representatives) and the World Youngsters Championship (up to 21 years of age, for the Jose Damiani Cup). A new series, the World Girls Championship (zonal teams 26 and younger for the Gianarrigo Rona Cup) is also scheduled.

## Electronic Device Policy

The electronic device policy is revised as follows:

1. For all NABC+ rated events at NABCs: Electronic devices, including but not limited to, phones, cameras, PDAs, and others capable of sending or receiving electronic communication are excluded from the playing areas during any session of play. This does not apply to health-related equipment.
2. For all events at an NABC other than a NABC+ rated event: Except for health related equipment, or by permission of the Director in Charge of the tournament, cell phones, audible pagers or similar equipment may not be operated or operable in any manner in the playing area during a session of play. Any such equipment

must not be visible during the session. Sponsoring organizations of other ACBL sanctioned events are encouraged to adopt a similar policy.
3. These restrictions in numbers 1 and 2 above apply to all pairs, team members, captains, coaches, play recorders (except those designated by ACBL) and kibitzers and are in force throughout any actual playing session or segment of play.
4. A violation of any of the restrictions in numbers 1 and 2 above will result in a disciplinary penalty of one full board (12 IMPs at that form of scoring) for the first offense. A second offense will result in disqualification from the event for the pair/team. Kibitzers violating this policy will be removed from the playing area for the remainder of the session.

## Charity Foundation helps A pair of worthy causes <br> Before Hurricane Katrina hit New Orleans five

 years ago, there were 6000 homeless people in the city. The number doubled after Katrina devastated the city, and today it stands at 19,000 .Before Katrina, the New Orleans Mission - the city's largest private service provider for the homeless - had a staff of 28 . The hurricane destroyed the Mission's offices, and today it has only five staff members in the partially rebuilt facility. "We run it with volunteers," said Executive Director Ron Gonzales. "We couldn't do it without them."

Faced with such a daunting reality, Gonzales was more than happy to accept a $\$ 5000$ check from the ACBL Charity Foundation presented by foundation President Georgia Heth and Treasurer Shirley Seals Friday night at the Marriott.

Heth explained that the donation represented grants over and above the normal Charity Foundation grant to the district.

Gonzales said the money will provide food and shelter for 1000 homeless men and women, plus case management for those who are interested. If you wish to make a donation, you can do so by visiting the Mission's web site at www. neworleansmission.org.

A second check for $\$ 5000$ was presented to Dean Howard, development director for the Louisiana Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. He said the oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico has caused many families in the coastal parishes to relinquish their pets because, with no income, they can't afford to keep them.

Last year, Howard said, in St. Bernard Parish there were 17 owner-relinquished pets. In the past two months, there have been 170 .

The Louisiana SPCA will use the Charity Foundation money to fund the Gulf Coast Companion Animal Relief Program, which will provide families with free veterinary care and free pet food so that they can keep their pets. The hardest-hit parishes, he said, are St. Bernard, Plaquemines, Jefferson and Terrebonne.

Dana said she and Michael didn't play many conventions - perhaps Stayman - but they did put their names on their convention cards.

In the last round of their game, they played against two women.

One of them picked up Dana's convention card, saw the name and just had to know if she and Michael were related to David Berkowitz.

When they acknowledged that their dad is one and the same, one of the women said, "Oh, he's so famous - and he's so lucky!"
"Lucky?" inquired Dana.
"Yes - he gets to play with Larry Cohen!"

Banquette: Sidewalk
Bayou: Choctaw for "small stream." It's a creek with a slow current, flowing from a river or lowland lake, often through swamp areas, usually in a delta region. Among its many nicknames, Louisiana is called "The Bayou State" for its beautiful wetland regions.

Cajun: Nickname for Acadians, the French-speaking people who migrated to Louisiana from Nova Scotia, starting in 1755.

Cities of the Dead: New Orleans cemeteries. Because of the high water table, we spend the afterlife buried above ground instead of six feet under it. Elaborate monuments cluster together like small communities.

Directions: There is no West, East, North, or South in New Orleans. We head uptown, downtown, lakeside and riverside. And anywhere the music is.

Fais-do-do (fay-doe-doe): It means, "Put the kids to sleep." And party hearty. In the old days, when Cajuns would celebrate, they brought the kids with their blankies so the little ones could snooze while adults would eat, drink, and dance their way through the night.

Faubourg (foe-burg): As in "Faubourg Marigny." Originally suburbs, they are now neighborhoods near the French Quarter. (The Vieux Carré once defined the entire city of New Orleans.)

Gris-gris (gree-gree): "X" marks the spot. Voodoo spells, often indicated by Xs, are still found on tombs like that of legendary voodoo queen Marie Laveau.

Gumbo ya-ya: "Everybody talking at once."
Isleños (iz-lay-nyos): Islanders; in this case, Spanish settlers from the Canary

Islands. Since 1799 , they've been fishermen, trappers, and master boat builders in Louisiana. You can find them downriver, in St. Bernard Parish.

Jazz: Louis Armstrong said, "If you gotta ask, you'll never know." So much for a definition. As for origin, some say it was a New Orleans barber named Buddy Bolden, who in 1891 blew a few hot notes with his cornet and invented a new form

of music that's been an American favorite since the Jazz Age of the ' 20 s . Jazz mixes African and Creole rhythms with European styles. Surprisingly, the Irish, Germans, and Italians contributed the brass bands.

Krewe: Members of a carnival organization, as in Krewe of Rex. A variation of "crew," the word was invented by 19th-century New Orleanians who privately bankrolled the balls and parades (as is still the case).

Lagniappe (lan-yap): A little something extra A free coffee or dessert or a few extra ounces of boudin put the "bons" in "bons temps."

Laissez les bons temps rouler! (less-say lay bon tonh roo-lay): Let the good times roll.

Makin' groceries: Shopping for groceries. What you do before whipping up some gumbo

Neutral ground: When the Americans arrived in New Orleans after the Louisiana Purchase of 1803, Europeans and Creoles who inhabited the French Quarter (then, the entire city of New Orleans) considered them unwelcome interlopers. So the immigrants settled across Canal Street and established what is now the Central Business and Arts District. Canal Street became
the "neutral ground" in the clash of cultures. Ever since, New Orleans has been a city sans medians. Here, we have only neutral grounds. In case you're wondering, cars parked on the raised neutral grounds mean only two things: nearby parades or a forecast of rain.

New Orleans: Pronounced noo aw-lins or new or-lins or new or-lee-yuns, but not new orleens Unless referring to the street or the parish of or-leens. Or when you're singing. Confused yet?

Parish: Equivalent of a county in the other 49 states.

Pass a good time: Live it up.
Picayune: Old Spanish coin, $1 / 8$ of a dollar. Connotes something really small or petty.

Pirogue: Shallow canoe used in the bayous.
Pro bono publico: "For the common good," motto of Rex, King of Carnival.

Secondline: The people who follow a brass
band on the street while swinging a handkerchief in a circle over their heads. These second-liners also have a special shuffle step or dance they do when following the band. This is called "secondlining."

Streetcar: New Orleans' name for the world's oldest continuously operating electric street railway. In 1835, a steam engine train ran from the Vieux Carré along St. Charles to the outlying town of Carrollton (now the Uptown Riverbend area). In the 1860 s, the route became a horseand mule-drawn line, and went electric in 1893. Today, over 20,000 peo ple a day ride to work and play aboard 35 original electric cars (available for private parties), all named to the National Register of Historic Places. You can get to a historic place riding in a historic place. Only in New Orleans.

Street Names: We've got some strange pronunciation. A sample:

Burgundy (bur-gun-dee)
Conti (con-tie)
Calliope (kal-ee-ope)
Melpomene (mel-puh-meen)
Tchoupitoulas (chop-ih-too-liss)
Clio (clee-oh) but often completely misread as C-L 10. Honest.

Swamp: A low, marshy wetland, heavily forested and subject to seasonal flooding.

Vieux Carré (vyeuh kah-ray): Literally, "Old Square" or "Old Quarter," it refers to the French Quarter. Before it was "Old," "French," or a "Quarter" of any kind, the area was just the "Ville," the entire city of New Orleans. Today, its 90 city blocks hold about 2,700 European and Creole-style buildings, most with a long and fascinating history.

Voodoo: From voudun, meaning "god," "spirit," or "insight" in the Fon language of Dahomey. Voodoo came from the West African Yoruba religion via Haiti, where African practices mingled with the Catholicism of French colonists.

Yat: A local denizen. Named for the Ninth Ward greeting, "Where y'at?"

championship is a serious matter, but it can have its lighter side. Germany's Sabine Auken tried the poker player's equivalent of a bluff on this deal from the match against Russia.

Perhaps, but using Blackwood is not a great idea as the lead will be coming through East's $\downarrow \mathrm{K}$.

I suggested a jump to $4 \star$, a splinter, hoping partner might be able to bid $4 \vee$. Seems reasonable, but in this particular case it would be a fit jump. Okay, let's bid 4 and see if partner has a heart control. However, Sabine saw a way in which she might be able to give herself a $50-50$ chance of making a slam even if partner held only one ace.

She jumped to $4 \boldsymbol{\vee}$, ostensibly a splinter in hearts. From her point of view the auction then developed in an ideal way.

When South doubled $6 \boldsymbol{a}$, do you blame North for leading a diamond?

## Survival Story

Germany made a cracking start in the women's championship, and with all three pairs in good form it would take some doing to stop them.

Pony Nehmert was one of the few declarers to survive on this deal from Round 3:

North led the $\downarrow \mathrm{K}$ and declarer won with the ace and played three rounds of diamonds, disposing of her losing heart. She ran the $\AA 8$ to North's king and ruffed the return of the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$.
(North missed a difficult chance here - a diamond, offering up a ruff and discard, allows South to discard a club. Then if declarer plays a trump off dummy, South can go up with the ace and play a heart, which secures trump control.)

Why was North forcing declarer to ruff?
Pony decided that there was a strong indication that trumps were 4-1, so rather than play a spade, relying on 3-2 trumps and a winning guess in clubs, she cashed the top clubs, felling North's queen. She continued with the $\& \mathrm{~J}$, and when North discarded, declarer continued with a fourth club, ruffing with dummy's $\boldsymbol{\wedge} 5$. South could overruff, but there was only one more trick for the defense.
$4 \uparrow$ failed at the other table, giving Germany 12 IMPs.

When Daniela von Arnim made a weak jump overcall, Auken, confident that her side had a comfortable lead but ever hungry for IMPs, wondered if there might be a slam. Could partner have two aces for her weak jump overcall?

## New Orleans: Delectable Tidbits

## (continued from Issue 1)

King Cake: These racetrack-shaped cakes are served only between Twelfth Night (January 6, the Feast of the Three Kings) and Mardi Gras, the day before Ash Wednesday. Originally a version of French brioche, they are typically decorated in purple, green, and gold sugar. By tradition, whoever gets the piece with the tiny plastic baby or bean baked inside throws the next party and serves the next cake.

Mirliton (MER -lih-tawn or MIL-lih-ton): A tropical, pear-shaped squash. Louisianans love to stuff them with seafood, meats, and cheese. Elsewhere, they're called vegetable pears, chayotes, chochos, or christophines.

Muffuletta: It's not a sandwich; it's a meal packed into a pizza-sized Italian bun. The calories don't count when you're having fun: salami, ham, and provolone lavished with olive relish. Go to the source: Central Grocery on Decatur Street, an Italian import store where the sandwich was invented about a century ago to satisfy hungry Sicilian stevedores on the nearby docks.

Oysters Eating them raw on the half shell still separates the natives from the tourists, the sushi craze notwithstanding. Connoisseurs like to oversee the process, watching as the shells are pried open. Most natives dip them in a sauce made with ketchup, Tabasco, horseradish to taste and a squeeze of fresh lemon.
