
Quinlan and Shipley
-- 'we're like family'

"It's going to be different. We're like family."
That was Tom Quinlan speaking. He was talking about the fact that he and Bobbie Shipley are working their last NABC together as the chief directors. Starting in Vancouver next year, three different sets of directors will be running the NABCs - one for the spring, one for the summer and one for the fall.

"We started working together in Las Vegas in 1991 -- the biggest NABC ever held," said Shipley. "And we have become close friends. Tom has stayed with us in our motor home, and we've visited him out in San Francisco."

"In all that time there's never been a cross word between us," said Quinlan. "We get frustrated sometimes of course, but no arguments. When we disagree, it's usually about bidding a bridge hand."

The Mexican connection: TD Guillermo Poplawsky

Wednesday was one of those days when it is important for a tournament director to keep his cool. In the Stratified Senior Pairs, there was a mixup in the crossover and several pairs had begun the second session at the wrong tables. Lots of work had to be done to get things straightened out.

Luckily, the TD in charge of the game was a man with a high threshold of anxiety -- and it didn't happen by accident. In fact, he has studied and practiced meditation for years and has come to know what inner peace is all about.

"When you have peace of mind," says Guillermo Poplawsky, Mexico's only rated TD, "it's easier to solve problems."

Sure enough, he smoothly sorted out the situation, gently assuring concerned players that all was well and explaining what happened. Just what you would expect from a seasoned TD with associate national rank.

There's more to Poplawsky, however, than entering scores and sorting out fractured movements. He is one of the many interesting, distinctive characters who populate the world of tournament directing.

First of all, there's the voice. When Poplawsky makes an announcement, it's difficult not to notice the deep, resonant tones and the pronounced His-

New way to handle

Appeals at all events without NABC+ rating will get a different kind of treatment at the Spring NABC in Vancouver and the Summer NABC in San Antonio. All such appeals will be handled by the tournament directing staff rather than by an appeals committee.

The intent is to resolve appeals in a more timely fashion with less inconvenience for all concerned. Another major intent is for consistency.

Exactly how the new procedure is going to be implemented has not yet been determined. Players will still be able to appeal rulings given by the director, but the decisions will be reviewed by other tournament directors.

Many appeals cases don't need expert judgment, just fresh minds. And if expert help is necessary, directors will be able to talk with experts or members of the National Appeals Committee.

Many players, directors and administrators believe the primary focus at a bridge tournament should be on the game rather than on litigation. Irregularities and other such problems of course have to be handled -players have to live with them -- but most believe the primary focus still belongs on the game itself.

What's the impact on tournament directors? Do they like the new setup? Overall, it appears that the reaction is favorable. Of course there will be full reviews of the new process after the Vancouver and San Antonio tournaments.

Levine vs. Koley in Senior KO final

The team captained by James Koley broke loose in the second half to score a convincing victory, 167-96 over the Donald Turner squad in one of the semifinal matches in the NABC Senior Knockout Teams. Defending champion Michael Levine and his teammates had a few worrisome moments after a poor third quarter, but they came back strongly over the last 16 boards to eliminate Ken Barbour's team, 160-128.

Five of the six members of the Levine team have won this event before. Zeke Jabbour was on the winning team the first three years the event was held --1994-1996. Tommy Sanders has triumphed twice, and Chuck Said, Fred Hamilton and Levine have one victory apiece. Levine, Jabbour and Sanders were on the team that lost in the final last year. Arnie Fisher rounds out the team.

LEVINE jumped ahead by 9 in the first quarter and extended their lead to 26 at the half. But BARBOUR got 17 IMPs back in the third quarter to trail by only 9. The fourth quarter was wild, with many doubled contracts making for major swings. But most of the swings went to LEVINE -- they won the set, 68-45. That's right -- 113 IMPs in 16 boards.

Playing with Barbour were Alan Truscott, William Esberg, Jim Hamilton, Trudi Nugent and Hamish Bennett

The KOLEY-TURNER match was close for the first 32 boards. KOLEY took a 9-IMP lead in the first quarter, and the teams drew in the second. But KOLEY won the third quarter, 33-10, then blew out their opponents over the final 16 deals, 82-43. Playing with Koley are Gene Simpson, Gene Freed, Syd Levey and Simon Kantor. On the Turner squad were Liane Turner, Natalie Hertz, Dan Hertz, John Gustafson and Helen Gustafson.

LEVINE and KOLEY will face off in a 64-board final today.

Levin-Weinstein hold slim Blue Ribbon lead

The new partnership of Robert Levin and Steve Weinstein entered play in the Blue Ribbon Pairs today with a lead of 12.75 matchpoints over Robert Blanchard and Jim Krekorian, who won the event two years ago.

Levin and Weinstein are former winners of the Blue Ribbon with different partners. Levin won with Ron Smith of San Francisco in 1979, Weinstein with Fred Stewart in 1987.

In third place after Wednesday's two semifinal sessions were Howard Weinstein and Zia Mahmood, followed by Mark Lair and Richard Coren.

National Head Caddies keys to successful NABCs

Back home in Fort Collins CO, 19-year-old Travis Radtke often works as a caddy at sectionals in his home town and other cities in the area. In fact, he is often the *only* caddy at many tournaments he works.

Tough assignment? Not for Radtke.

"He never misses a beat," says Jackie Matthews, the tournament director in charge of caddies at NABCs. "Travis can easily pick up five sections."

Radtke is one of several National Head Caddies working the Orlando NABC. In Matthews' mind, they are essential to the smooth operation of the tournament

A bidder's game

The par contract on this deal from the second qualifying session of the Blue Ribbon Pairs is 2♠ by South.

3♦ by East is likely to go for minus 200 if East-West bid too much, but if East does not get into the auction after 1♠ by South and 1NT by North, West might well lead a club. If he does, declarer can put in

dummy's 10, take East's king with the ace and return the suit. Now the shift to the $\oint K$ is too late. Declarer wins, crosses to the $\oint K$ and discards his low diamond on the $\clubsuit J$.

If declarer reads the position perfectly he can make a lot of tricks. He ruffs a diamond, cashes the ♠A, noting the fall of the queen from East, then plays three more rounds of hearts, ruffing in dummy. Now declarer can lead anything from dummy and ruff with the ♠9. West can overruff, but he must give declarer another trick in trumps for a spectacular plus 170.

P.S. In our section, conceding 110 got East-West only 40%. Perhaps this board is tougher for North-South than it looks.

Heart attack

Here is a deal from the first qualifying session of the Blue Ribbon Pairs where an aggressive opening lead paid off.

4♥ was the popular contract, frequently played by North after a transfer auction. On the lead of a black suit, declarer wins in hand and cashes his top hearts. Now declarer must play for a trump coup. Best is to cash the top clubs (pitching a diamond from dummy) and ruff a club. Then if declarer can cash the ♠A and ♠K and ruff a spade, dummy will be down to the ♥Q 10 and two losing diamonds. Declarer exits with a diamond and collects two heart tricks for plus 650 and a great score.

Alas, at my table, Joann Glasson as East alertly pitched a spade on the fourth round of clubs and was able to ruff my second spade winner, holding me to plus 620 and an average score.

Danny Sprung played 4♥ from the South seat after West had overcalled 2♠. West continued his plan of disruption by leading a low diamond at trick one. The defense cashed three rounds of the suit and exited in spades.

Perhaps Sprung should have realized that to recover any matchpoints on the board he needed a 4-1 trump split *plus* a trump coup. 4♥ can still be made. Cash the top spades and ruff a spade, then the top clubs and ruff a club. Now go to dummy and cash the top hearts, and the lead is in dummy for the trump coup. To play this way you must assume the 4-1 heart split without testing it.

It would have been a spectacular recovery.

Illusions

Keith Garber of Pelham NY liked his partner's opening lead style on this deal from the Monday Stratified Open Pairs. Garber was playing with Cam Doner of Vancouver.

Doner figured East probably had only one diamond stopper, so he led the devious $\blacklozenge K$. This lulled declarer into a false sense of security -- it *did* seem that Doner had the $\blacklozenge Q$ to go with his lead of the king, meaning dummy's $\blacklozenge J$ was a second stopper in the suit.

With clubs splitting, declarer had an easy nine tricks. Looking for that vital matchpoint overtrick, declarer led a low heart from his hand at trick two. Doner pounced with the ♥J and returned a diamond. Suddenly, nine tricks had turned into eight. Plus 50 was worth 10 out of 12 matchpoints for Garber and Doner.

Breaking up a squeeze

Many players bid and made the slam on this deal from the Board-a-Match Teams. However, there is a successful defense -- all other variations allow declarer to prevail. Can you find the winning defense? If you are the declarer, do you see how to take 12 tricks?

First -- how to make 12 tricks. North has to protect both majors, and it looks as if he has to protect clubs as well. After the diamonds are set up, North is going to have to make two pitches. Even if he sees the situation and sluffs two clubs, declarer still has the edge. Declarer can cash two clubs, forcing North to make a pitch in one of the majors.

So the question is -- how can the defense break up this squeeze. The only defense is to lead the suit that looks as if you shouldn't be leading -- the auction tells you that declarer's long suit is hearts. So you lead the **♥**J because squeeze defense requires that you attack entry conditions and beware of "correcting the count."

Once a heart is led, the ball is in South's court. South must win the THIRD round of diamonds as North sluffs a club honor. Then South must fire back a heart to sever communications between declarer and dummy. North must rely on partner's holding the ♣7 to stop the suit, and South has that card.

South cannot wait until the fourth round of dia-

monds to take his ace because North will have to make a premature discard and the squeeze will be in effect again.

Here is another deal from the Sunday night game called "Deduce, a matter of control."

Competitive bridge bidding sometimes makes you think that someone has introduced a pinochle deck into the game. The diamond opening lead is ruffed and the **♥**K goes to the ace. Dummy then is tapped again with another diamond. The club return is taken by North's ace, and once again a diamond forces dummy to ruff. Now a club to the queen and the ♥8 is led. South should duck in case North has the 9, but it is to no avail. Whether or not South wins the trick no longer matters because East's trumps now put him in control -- he loses only the \clubsuit A, the \blacktriangledown A and the \blacktriangledown J -- making four.

After it was over, North said, "I feel that we should have beaten this contract."

My reply was that this was something that she would have to deduce. She thought for a while and then asked me to explain. I replied that she should replay the hand and examine the effect of playing the trump 2 under the king.

No matter how declarer struggles, he can no longer make the contract. If a club is led from dummy, simply rise with the ace, cash the trump ace and revert to leading diamonds. Declarer now must lose a diamond in addition to the above mentioned losers.

The Facts: 5♥ went down two, plus 200 for E/W. The break in tempo was agreed to by all parties. The Director ruled that pass was a logical alternative for West (Law 16) and changed the contract to 4♥ made four, plus 620 for N/S.

The Appeal: E/W appealed the Director's ruling. E/W were the only players present for the hearing. West stated he always intended to bid 5♦. He bid only 4♦ in case game was not reached. He bid 5♣ to muddy the waters in case the opponents were headed for slam.

The Committee Decision: The Committee believed that there was no logical alternative to West's bidding to a 5♦ contract at favorable vulnerability.

The Committee further determined that even 4♥ should go down because the line of play should include a heart finesse followed by the ♣A, ♣K, and a club ruff. 5♥ had put N/S into a minus position achieved on their own.


Therefore, the contract was changed to 5♥ down two, plus 200 for E/W.

In both rooms West played 3NT after having shown long hearts. Dan Morse, North, led the ♦9, and declarer won in hand and finessed in clubs. Bobby Wolff won and shifted to a low heart. After hard thought West took his ace and finessed in spades. Wolff cashed out for minus 630.

In the other room Garey Hayden led a spade and Bill Pollack took his king and tracked a low heart. Again declarer hopped with the ace to play clubs. He also made 630 for a push.

What a turnabout!

"Di-rek-tor!" called the woman. When he arrived she explained that declarer had revoked. She said he had led a heart from dummy and had pitched a club on it, then later had led a heart. As always, the director checked out the story. When he found the trick where the offense was supposed to have occurred, it turned out that declarer had led a club, not a heart, from dummy. So there was no revoke.

The director started to leave when suddenly the declarer, Charles Davis of Atlanta, realized something and called the director back. "The lady thought a heart was led so she followed with a heart," he told the director. "Then she won the last trick with the queen of clubs, a card she could played on that club where I was supposed to have revoked."

The director checked it over again -- and awarded two tricks to declarer. Declarer was called for a revoke by his opponent -- and GAINED two tricks.

Blurred vision

Sometimes spotting the winning line at matchpoint pairs is tough. The line for overtricks often gets in the way of clear vision. This is a good example.

It looks normal to play 4♥ on a club lead. The point here is to win, play one round of trumps only, then ♠A-K and ruff a spade. Now a heart to the ace, ruff the last spade if it is not high, and exit with a club. The defense wins, but they have to break diamonds, which means you hold your losers to two.

If, as here, the ♠Q falls, you pitch dummy's club loser on the ♠J, ruff a club, and now have to lead a diamond away from the king. You still make 11 tricks if West has the $\triangle A$ or no diamond higher than the 10, but otherwise your blurred vision has cost you a trick. Page 4 Daily Bulletin

Literal interpretation


It happened in the Women's Board-a-Match Teams. The opening bid by West was 2♦ Multi, and the opponents suddenly realized they hadn't decided how to defend against the Multi. They called the director, and he allowed them to decide whether they would use the simple or the complex defense.

After deciding on the complex method, North overcalled 2NT, showing 16-18 balanced high-card points. South Alerted and told the opponents that they bid the same way over this 2NT as they would over an opening 2NT. South then bid a 3♥ transfer, then corrected 3♠ to 3NT.

After the opening lead, South put down a hand with five spades and only four high-card points. After the hand was played, North asked South why she bid over 2NT. "Well, we agreed to play the same as we would over an opening 2NT, and that's what I did."

Devastating defense

At most tables North-South made at least 10 tricks, often 11, playing in 3NT. But Ira Ewen and Gene Prosnitz cooperated neatly to defeat the contract. The deal came up as Board 15 in the second final session of the Open Board-a-Match Teams.



- (1) 12-14 high-card points.
- (2) Forcing showing a balanced hand with five spades.

Ewen led the ♦10 -- best for the defense. Prosnitz ducked this to declarer's queen. Declarer led the ♠10 and covered with the jack, but Prosnitz smoothly played low. Next came the ♥9 which lived. Declarer switched to dummy's ♣10, losing to West's queen. Ewen led another diamond, and once again Prosnitz ducked to declarer's jack. Declarer took another spade finesse and was not at all happy when Prosnitz won with the queen. Prosnitz quickly cashed two diamonds and the ♣A to set the contract.

The same pair came up with another neat defense in the second qualifying session of the Blue Ribbon Pairs

That was an interesting 3♠ bid by West -- with just a singleton. Of course it was the best possible singleton.

The opening lead was the ♥7. Declarer rose with dummy's ace, and declarer dummy's ace of trumps. He led a club to Prosnitz' ace, and back came a heart, forcing declarer to ruff. He led the ♠Q to Prosnitz' king, and Prosnitz saw that it was necessary to force declarer twice more. Leading the ♣K wouldn't get the job done -- declarer could control the next round of clubs. So Prosnitz led his low club! Declarer of course thought South had the king, so he ruffed. But when Prosnitz won the ♠10 with the jack, he led the ♠K, and suddenly Prosnitz had more trumps than declarer -- down one.

4♠ by North is easy, but with the great heart fit East-West have a good save at 5♥, which goes down only two tricks. 5♠ seemed beatable on a diamond lead by East, who can take the first round of trumps with the ace and underlead his ♥A for the diamond ruff. The counter is known as a Scissors Coup. Declarer wins the diamond lead and plays the ♣A, ♣K and ♣10, discarding his ♥J. East gets a surprise trick in clubs but no diamond ruff because he can't get to his partner's hand.

That is exactly how Greenberg played it in 4 rianlge. Recognizing the potential ruff, he executed the Scissors Coup and emerged with 11 tricks. He deserved more than the 7.5 matchpoints (out of 12) that he got for his fine play, perhaps because several East players started with the rianlgeQ, allowing North to win the ace, finesse the rianlge10 and take the heart pitch on the rianlgeK for plus 480.

Disappointment

Adam Wildavsky failed to qualify for the semifinal round of the Blue Ribbon Pairs, doubly disappointing for him because he and Allan Falk won the event last year in St. Louis, and Wildavsky and Haig Tchamitch were the winners the last time the Fall NABC was in Orlando.

Wildavsky did report on one deal, Board 27 from the first qualifying session.

Wildavsky described the auction as bidding what comes naturally. "Allan and I didn't manage to qualify, but we had at least one nice hand," Wildavsky said. "Allan found a good natural call and, knowing he probably had •K x x x x told me all I needed to know.

"The first pair I showed it to had also bid 7♦. They too failed to qualify. If there's a moral there, though, it's beyond me."

Barry Rigal also had a tale to tell about Board 27. He described the auction he had with Alex Ornstein:

Rigal said his partner's jump to 7♦ implied no real interest in playing 7♥ or 7NT unless he had some source of tricks. "My soft black-suit cards seemed unlikely to fill any gaps in Alex's hand," Rigal said, "so I passed. If for no other reason, it is never a good partnership action to convert a making grand slam to a non-making one on the first board of an event."


As you can see, 7NT is a maker if declarer can avoid the opening lead of a spade. On the lead of a red suit or a club, declarer wins, draws trumps, cashes the ♣A (Vienna coup) and runs the rest of the winners. East, holding the ♠K Q and the ♠K, cannot stand the pressure.

Laurie Kraniak played in 7♥, which also makes if West does not find a spade lead. Against Kraniak, the opening lead was a passive heart, and she executed the Vienna coup after drawing trumps to come home with all the tricks and most of the matchpoints.

The National Head Caddy program was started by Matthews about five years ago as a way of recognizing excellence in the caddy corps. The caddies she has chosen to wear the distinctive white badges, Matthews says, are the young men and women who take their jobs seriously and don't quit until the work is done. There are 25 National Head Caddies in all.

"They just won't leave you," she says. "The National Head Caddies make it fun for me. I can now send out ships with captains and first mates."

Tom Marsh, of Tournament Services, echoed Matthews' sentiments. He has worked closely with the National Head Caddies and proclaims: "They have done a great job for me the whole tournament."

Matthews, of course, is partial to the caddies, all of whom she knows by name, along with just about everything else about them. At the Fall NABC, 85 different caddies have been at work, although not all at

once.

"This group is so polite," Matthews says. "And one of them even called me 'Miss' instead of 'Ma'am."

Matthews says the players have also noticed how conscientious and pleasant the caddies have been at this tournament. "We've had all sorts of compliments."

Among the National Head Caddies working at the Convention Center Wednesday night was Dan Hagerty of Jefferson City MO. The 28-year-old, who caddied regularly for about four years until quitting eight years ago, is visiting his parents in Orlando for the holidays and decided to see if he could help out at the NABC.

Hagerty says he has noticed a big difference in the way NABCs are run. "They've come a long way," he says. "They are organized better and the atmosphere is better -- more relaxed."

Rebecca Wickham, another National Head Caddy, is a veteran of at least eight NABCs. It might be more, but the 20-year-old from Naperville IL has lost count. "I wouldn't miss it for the world," she says.

This time, Wickham recruited a Chicago-area friend, Jeremy Mooi of Bolingbrook IL.

"She did a con job on me," says a smiling Mooi, also in the National Head Caddy ranks. "I didn't know I'd be doing all this running around, but it's fun."

Mallory Foy, daughter of Meeting Services Director Nancy Foy, came to Orlando from Memphis to work as a caddy "and to hang out with my mom."

Another caddy with a bridge background is lanky Jacob Helms, son of bridge teacher/bridge pro Jerry Helms of Charlotte NC. Considering that his dad makes his living at bridge, says Jacob, "I didn't have much choice about caddying."

Working her first tournament of any kind on Wednesday was Darcy Miller of Orlando. The perky 15-year-old impressed everyone with her enthusiasm. "It gets a little hectic, but you learn fast -- and it's money."

Some of the caddies complained about impatient, even rude players. Rather than scold the unpleasant people, Matthews chooses to emphasize the positive: "I want to thank everyone who is nice to the caddies. It makes them feel good, and they perform so much better."

"That's right," Shipley said. "We both have always looked forward to the three times a year that we work together. We're like family."

Quinlan remembers how surprised he was seven years ago when then Tournament Manager Jim Miller told him about his new assignment. "I guess I'll think it over," Quinlan told Miller.

"Too late," said Miller, "Bobbie's already accepted."

What's the story about next year? The chief directors in the spring will be Chris Patrias and John Ashton. Sol Weinstein and Doug Grove will take over for the summer. Then it will be Millard Nachtwey and Betty Bratcher in the fall.

And what will be Shipley and Quinlan be doing next year?

"I'm going to start playing bridge again," said Shipley. "I already have dates for San Antonio (Summer NABC) with Virgil Anderson and Roy Green. I think I'll stick to the Senior games. I'll still work a little, but not much. For instance, I'll work exactly six sessions total for the first three months."

Quinlan says he'll still be a director. "I'll sell entries and put out the hand records and take rulings and answer questions."

Strangely enough, both Shipley and Quinlan mentioned how much they enjoy selling entries

Many times in the past seven years players have been surprised to see Shipley selling entries for the side game. "I enjoy it. It gives me a chance to see old friends and catch up on the news.

Quinlan likes to play "Guess your partner" when he's selling entries. He tries to guess who the buyer is going to play with.

The elusive top

Mark Lair must wonder what it takes to get a top in the Blue Ribbon Pairs. You may wonder, too, after you see what happened on Board 13 in the second semifinal session. Lair was playing with Richard Coren.


Who can blame Coren for his enthusiastic jump to the notrump slam? North, as his partner pointed out in the post mortem, might have been content to simply pass and take his two sure tricks (plus 100 would have been worth 71 out of 90 matchpoints). It's difficult to restrain yourself in this kind of situation, however.

Coren, who probably suspected what was up, did the only thing he could by putting South to

the guess as to the opening lead.

Had South found the club lead, there would be no story to tell. Fortunately for Lair, South selected a low spade for his opening shot. That was all Lair needed on the lie of the cards.

He won the opening lead, drew two rounds of trumps, then cashed the ♠K and ♠Q, pitching clubs from his hand. Lair then ran off all his diamonds, coming to this ending:



On the play of the ◆4, South had to discard a heart or dummy's ◆4 would be the 13th trick. Lair threw the spade from dummy and North was in a vise. After some thought, he tossed the ◆A. Lair cashed the ◆J and took the heart finesse to claim plus 2140 for the grand slam.

That was good for 89 out of 90 matchpoints. Who got the top? It was the pair who made 7♦ doubled, no doubt on the same line of play, for plus 2230.

panic accent. At a Houston regional not long ago, Poplawsky was approached by a woman who wanted him to do a radio commercial. He gracefully declined.

Poplawsky's easy-going manner is another trademark, one that makes him popular on both sides of the border -- among players and colleagues. He is quick to laugh at himself and always seems to be in a good mood.

"He keeps his sense of humor," says Patty Johnson, an associate national director who lives in Sebring FL. "Guillermo is one of those people who understands that this is a serious job but he treats it as a fun part of life, and that comes across to everyone he works with. He makes it a happy time."

Poplawsky has been tournament manager for the Mexican Holiday Regional for 20 years, and he has been tournament chairman at the Mexican Nationals in Mexico City many times.

The 60-year-old, who divides his time between Mexico City and Cuernavaca, was born in Mexico City, the son of an immigrant from Poland.

Poplawsky studied engineering at the National University of Mexico and practiced as a civil engineer for 25 years before giving it up in 1988. It was about that time that he took up meditation, and he has visited India three times to further his studies.

Bridge came into his life in 1957. Poplawsky was taught the game by his first wife, Harlene. A year later, he took up duplicate. Because he was good with a pencil -- thanks to his engineering education -- Poplawsky helped the directors whenever he played duplicate.

In 1976, he had been running some club games for a while and was recruited to take a director's test at a Mexico City regional.

Two years later, after distinguishing himself in Mexican tournaments, Poplawsky worked his first tournament on American soil -- the 1978 Spring NABC in Houston. Far from being overawed, Poplawsky was more enthusiastic than ever about his second job (he was still a practicing engineer). "It was sensational," he says of the NABC.

Poplawsky is now a fixture at tournaments in the Southwest, at NABCs and at world championships. He is multi-lingual -- fluent in English and Spanish and "I can defend myself in Italian and German" -- and is often recruited to work at World Bridge Federation tournaments.

His world travels have convinced him that no bridge organization can hold a candle to the ACBL when it comes to running tournaments. "In other parts of the world," he says, "the tournament directors are not in charge of the tournaments. They are little more than caddies."

Poplawsky has noted many changes in organized bridge over the years, and he isn't afraid to speak out about what concerns him -- everything from the Alert procedure to the appeals process. "I'm really excited to see how the new procedure will work out in Vancouver," he says, referring to the experiment in which directors will hear and decide appeals in all cases except NABC+ events.

When he is not working as a TD or running his bridge club, Amigos, in Mexico City, Poplawsky likes to paint -- he works in oils and acrylics -- and spend time with his significant other, Emma Bensimon.

While in Orlando, Poplawsky had a chance to

Action in the slam zone

Take a look at this deal from the first qualifying session of the Blue Ribbon Pairs and check out the play in 6NT, reached after North opens an optimistic 15-17 1NT.

On a passive spade lead, declarer knocks out the ♠A and cashes all the spade and diamond winners before testing the hearts. Of course, if the same hand holds length in hearts and clubs he will be squeezed. If not, the first residual chance -- that someone holds ♥J 10 x -- comes in, and 6NT makes.

At more than one table, East led a heart against 6NT. The ♥6 is a difficult spot card to read, although I think declarer should get it right. But at least one declarer put in the ♥9 at trick one and later regretted it.

Even if declarer passes the first test and plays low on the $\blacktriangledown 6$, declarer might be put to the test by a crafty West, who can put in the $\blacktriangledown J$ and create an illusion of a finesse later on against the 10.
