Bidding commentary: East's 2NT

response to a two-level overcall shows 10-12 HCP, possibly 13 with a singleton club, a flaw. West, with seven taking tricks, has an easy raise to 3NT. A 3♣ rebid would be non-forcing and cowardly to the max.

Defensive commentary No. 1: North plays the ♠2 at trick one, denying an honor. When partner leads the queen versus notrump, third hand unblocks or overtakes with honor doubleton, signals encouragement with an honor plus length, otherwise plays low. No-high lows with small doubletons! This is notrump. North cannot ruff the third spade!

Play commentary: East wins trick one with the ♠K, keeping North in doubt as to whether West has led from a Q-J or an A-Q-J combination. With an A-K(x) stopper, taking the first trick at notrump with the king is far more deceptive than winning with the ace. Do it!

Defensive commentary No. 2. After winning the ♣A, South counts East for at least nine tricks: five clubs, two spades and at least two hearts. When declarer has enough quick tricks in three suits to make the contract, it's not

a bad idea to shift to the fourth suit. Actually, it's a very good idea! If South shifts to the ♦2, North wins the ♦K and returns the ♦J (higher of two remaining cards). The defense cashes four diamonds. Down one. And just how does North know to return the ♦J and not a spade? When partner leads a low card in the second suit (♦2), partner wants the second suit returned. If partner leads a high card in the second suit, partner wants the first suit returned. Got it?

Duplicate Experiences

Odds and ends

A. Dummy's Rights

Some think dummy has no rights and cannot say anything during the play. Wrong! Dummy does have rights.

Dummy can:

— Call the director if there is an irregularity after the play is over.

— Verify that declarer (not defender) cannot follow suit: "No clubs, partner."

— Attempt to prevent an irregularity by declarer, e.g. pointing out that declarer has a trick turned wrong (provided the admonition occurs before a card is played to the next trick) or is leading from the wrong hand.

In general, dummy must be "dummy"; he must remain stone-faced and not assist, coach or influence the declarer in any way during the play.

B. Claiming

Claiming can be tricky. The most troublesome part is that if you think you have the rest of the tricks and you are wrong, or if you do not spell out your line of play, there is no going back and picking up the play. The director must be called to unravel the situation. The proper way to claim is to announce your line of play and face your hand. Half measures, e.g. saying, "I have the rest" will not do.

Yes, you may have the rest with any line but if you don't, you create an awkward situation, or worse, end up sacrificing one or more tricks. Your opponent must give away information about his hand in order to challenge the claim and that gives you an unfair advantage. Saying, after your claim is

challenged, "Oh yes, of course, I would pick up the last trump first" is not adequate and a director call is in order. So get into the habit of including your line of play with all claims, however obvious they may be.

C. Conceding

When we know our side has no more tricks, sometimes we concede to speed up the play. The important point to know is that, if one defender concedes, it is not binding on the other defender, who has the right to disagree. Dummy, however, does not have that right vis-à-vis declarer.

D. Bid box etiquette

Settle on your call without touching the box or making any motion toward it. When you are sure you know what you want to do, then reach for the box and make your call. It's like getting married. When asked the big question by the preacher, you say, "I do." The time for thought, hesitation and changing your mind is over when you're at the altar with your bride.

So, hands off the box until you are sure you know what you want to do.

Focus on where you are

This deal was played in the Vanderbilt Knockout Teams round of 32.

South deliberated for some time before bidding 4♠. When dummy hit the table, declarer was not entirely pleased with his decision. West started with the ♦3.

The problem at hand, however, is how you should play to give yourself the best chance of making 4♠, which appears to be fairly solid.

Is there a way to take out insurance against bad breaks in the black suits that will not result in defeat against normal breaks?

As with many deals, it is right to concede your diamond loser early. If declarer ducks the opening lead, the defense is helpless.

If you look at the full deal below, you will see that if you win the first trick with the ♦A and play two rounds of trumps, the defenders can succeed by having the hand with the long trump win the second round of the suit. Ducking the diamond enables declarer to lead up to the clubs three times, West having to discard or ruff a loser. Declarer can enter his hand by ruffing dummy's third diamond and low hearts as West follows helplessly.

Declarer can still succeed even if he wins the first diamond with the ace as long as he plays only one high trump. Most important, of course, is to focus on the contract you are in (4♠) rather than the one you think you should be in (6♣).

"I fell into a few of the squeezes just by accident, but the book helped me recognize what was happening," Carla said. "And I've actually set up one or two squeezes on my own, which was pretty exciting."

Carla recently graduated from the University of Illinois with a Ph.D. in Material Science and Engineering. She's currently looking for a job and enjoying the chance to play more bridge with her parents and other partners. Today, she's playing in the finals of the Red Ribbon Pairs with Dede Pochas of New York City.

Mixed Pair champs take control of Moysian fit

Maintaining trump control is often the most difficult aspect of declaring a 4-3 fit. When it's done right, the Moysian can be a matchpoint bonanza because it often provides overtricks that aren't available in other contracts.

Rockwell Mixed Pair winners John and Laurie Kranyak got the chance to demonstrate the correct technique on Board 2 of the first final session on Wednesday:

Laurie had a tough decision at every point in the bidding, especially after John's 2♠ force. At this point, she was intent on slowing things down, and she figured a retreat back to 3♥ was the weakest action available. Since Laurie was unable to bid notrump, John settled on the heart game.

John won with the opening ♣J lead with dummy's ♣K to lead the ♥10 for a successful finesse. He knew he had to set up the diamonds while dummy still had trumps, so at trick three, he ducked a diamond to South's ♦Q. South could have led a club for partner to ruff, but instead returned a diamond, hoping to kill dummy's suit if John had only a doubleton.

John now had full control of both red suits. He won dummy's ♦K, led a spade to his ace and ruffed a spade in dummy. He led dummy's last trump for another finesse and ran the diamonds, pitching his clubs, to score up 12 tricks.

Plus 680 was worth 69 matchpoints on a 77 top. Even if North-South had taken their ruff and held the contract to +650, the Kranyak's matchpoint score would have been well above average. The majority of the field was in 3NT making just nine tricks, with a few pairs going down in club and diamond slams.

Not so vain

The deal from the Thursday Daily Bulletin about Bill Pettis's brilliant play in 5♥ (page 8) should not have had Pettis's byline. That was an error by the editors. The deal was reported by Roy Welland to Barry Rigal, who passed it along to the Daily Bulletin.

All the right moves

Dan Romm of Seattle was one of the very few declarers who managed to take the maximum number of tricks on Board 14 from the Tuesday evening qualifying session of the Rockwell Mixed Pairs.

"The hand-analysis booklet didn't mention the squeeze, and none of the experts I talked to found it, either," Dan said. "But I did."

Romm and his partner, Helen Abbott of Seattle, got to the field contract of 3NT with Dan declaring. West led the ♦K, which Dan ducked, then the ♦Q, which Dan won with the ace. The hand is now cold for 12 tricks on Dan's line of play:

Trick 3 – Low club to dummy's queen.

Trick 4 – Cash ♠K

Trick 5 – Cash ♠Q

Trick 6 – Low spade to ♠A

At this point, Dan ran the clubs and caught West in a diamond-heart squeeze. The secret to making the squeeze work is to cash the third spade before running the clubs.

If you make it fun, they will come.

That's Ron Smith's philosophy for developing young players, and he's putting it to work in his home city. A few years ago, Ron began mentoring a small group of college students in the San Francisco area. His informal group grew quickly and now includes 20 to 30 students from Stanford, Berkeley and other nearby colleges.

The players meet for duplicate games at the Palo Alto club and at the Quick Tricks club in San Francisco. Ron says he brings an average of three to four tables of students to each club game. Afterwards, most go over to Ron's apartment in the city's Fillmore District for pizza, snacks and lots of bridge talk. A few times a month, Ron also hosts informal games at his apartment and even cooks dinner for the players.

The group includes a wide range of skill levels, from learners to accomplished players. Some are playing at this tournament. They include Ron Fertig, who is studying mathematics at Berkeley, and Joon

Pahk, a graduate student in physics at Stanford.

Ron says the combination of bridge play, socializing and stimulating talk about the hands makes the learning experience fun for these students. They're serious about improving their skills, and they like having an expert player available to answer questions. "The free pizza is a draw, too," Ron quipped.

How did Ron recruit the students? "They found me at area tournaments," Ron said. "I kind of stand out."

Other area players have noticed Ron's work. Lew and JoAnna Stansby and Kit Woolsey have taken an interest in the group and are joining in the teaching and playing activities.

Ron says some of the students have been asking him how they can recruit even more young people for the group. His answer: "Find more girls. Then you'll get more guys." He says they're working on it.

Trevor, whose nickname is Dupey, works at a warehouse near Minnetonka, and Ahren is in business school there.

Matthews likes the Ames brothers so much she says, "If they don't come back, I'm not coming back."

It seems likely they will. Says Tony of the caddying gig: "It's a blast."

Another caddy on the brainy side is Greg Keidan, whose father, Bruce, is a well-known player in Pittsburgh.

Greg was working on his doctorate in neuroscience at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque when an opportunity to manage a rock band came along. He took it, but when the band broke up, he decided not to go back to working on the PhD. "I didn't want to go back to killing rats and mice," he says. "I'm more interested in plant science and hydroponics."

Keidan says he did a lot of caddying 15 or 16 years ago, so "it came back to me pretty quickly in Pittsburgh."

He is also seeing a lot of familiar faces at the Spring NABC, including his godmother, Judy Kay-Wolff. "I've known a lot of these people for years," Keidan says.

While many of the caddies are students looking to make an extra buck or two, some are simply retired individuals or, as in the case of Pittsburghers Dan Sonon and Carol George, they are "bridge widows or widowers."

Sonon's wife, Judi, is a player and a teacher, so he has helped out at a lot of bridge events, including a few cruises during which she teaches and runs bridge games. A retired researcher for U.S. Steel, Sonon says he never caddied prior to Pittsburgh but has been enjoying himself. "The people are very nice," he says.

George, a retired systems engineer for Alcoa, is married to the chief financial officer for the tournament, Aubrey George. "I figured I might as well be here," she says.

Good bridge comes with good will for Mixed Pair champs

Dora Kay Grubb and Byron Hill of Charleston WV were two of the many players who were happy to congratulate John and Laurie Kranyak for their win in the Rockwell Mixed Pairs.

Grubb reports that she and Hill played the Kranyaks near the end of the evening session, a time when many players are stressed and tired. The pressure is even greater for a pair who is having a 63-percent game, as the Kranyaks were in the final session.

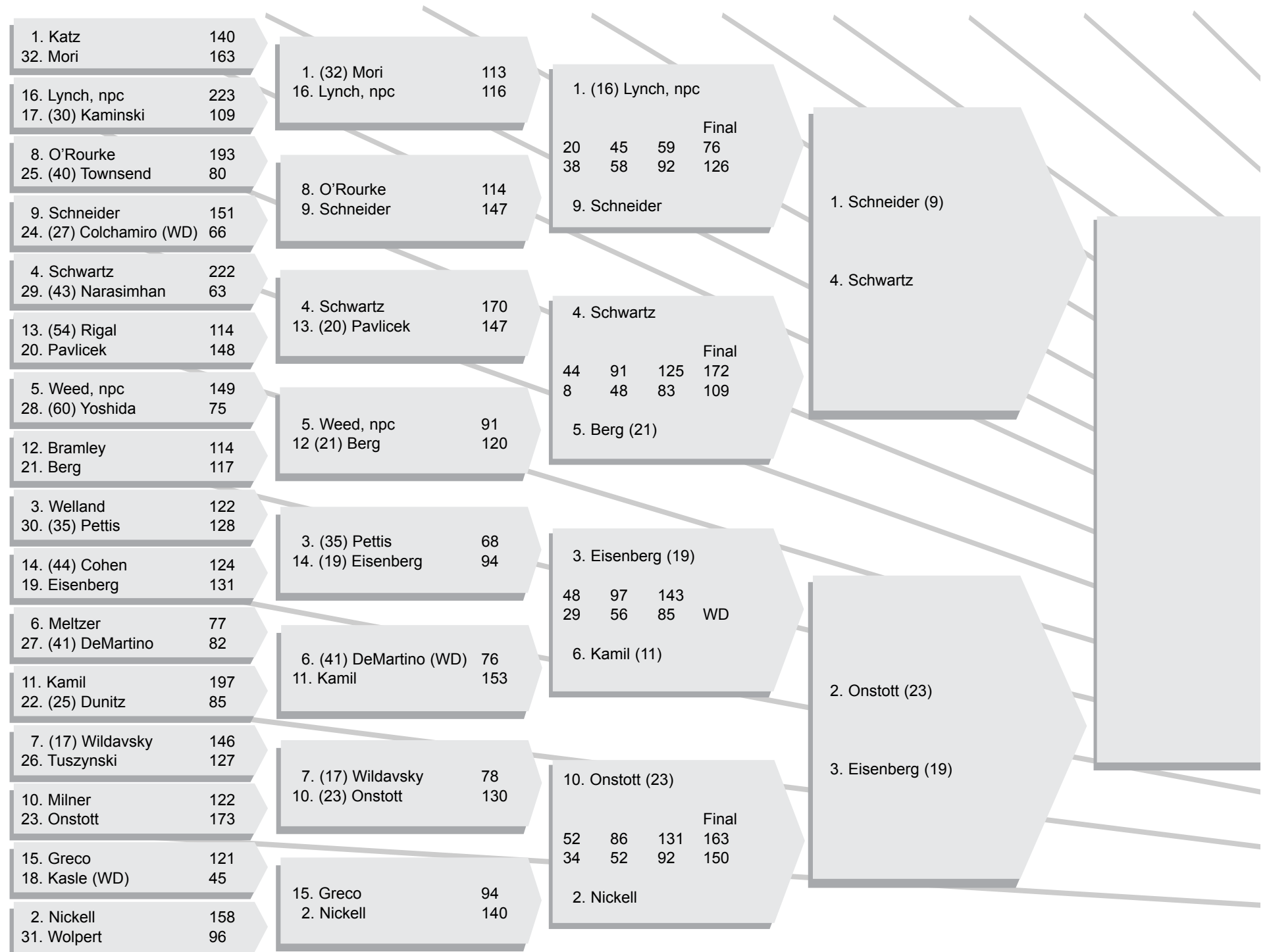

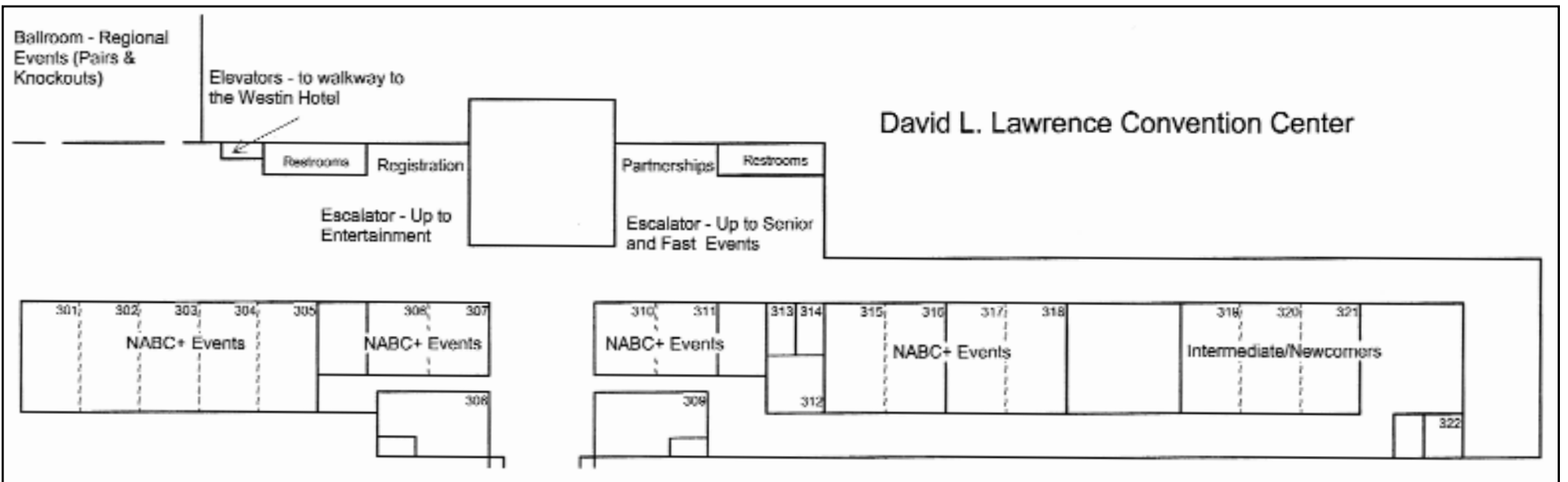
