## 53rd Spring North American Bridge Championships

## First tournament for special guests

"You guys killed us." (Declarer had just gone down four tricks in 3 . .)
"I don't want to put them back in the board - they look so pretty." (Declarer had his cards in front of him with 10 pointing his way. He had just made $4 \vee$ doubled.)

These and similar comments were heard yesterday in a special game for students.

Twenty-four seventh- and eighthgraders from the Reno Youth Bridge organization competed. They are from six area middle schools. The League has 24 new members as all of them joined the ACBL. Some won their first masterpoints.

The RYB organization began last year as a pilot project. Area bridge player Bud Brewer recruited another player, Kathy Lane, a recently retired school teacher, and they began going to schools offering to teach bridge.

From this start, the RYB now has programs in six of the seven middle schools in Washoe County (Reno). There are 17 volunteer teachers from among local players.
"Half of our bridge teachers are former school

IMP Pairs winners Pablo Ravenna and Pablo Lambardi
Huge set propels IMP Pairs winners
Two players from Argentina who barely qualified for the second day had a monster first final session and cruised to victory in the Lebhar IMP Pairs.

The winners are Pablo Ravenna and Pablo Lambardi, both of Buenos Aires. Their score of 115.39 was comfortably ahead of runners-up Jon Baldursson and Thorlakur Jonsson of Iceland, whose final score was 99.99 .

After the first two qualifying sessions, the two Pablos were 146th out of 156 pairs who made the cut for the final. "We played with jet lag," said Ravenna, noting that their journey from South America to Reno took 20 hours. "We were lucky to qualify."
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## Poles leading in Platinum Pairs

Apolinary Kowalski and Krzysztof Jassem, two of Poland's top players, will start play today as the leaders in the first NABC+ Platinum Pairs. They hold a slim lead over Nick L'Ecuyer of Montreal and Jim Krekorian of Pensacola FL.

Jassem was on the winning squad in the Vanderbilt Knockout Teams in 2008. Kowalski has a second-place finish in the Keohane North American Swiss Teams. They are regulars at NABCs.

## Portland Unit 487

Portland and its suburbs on the Oregon side of the Columbia River comprise Unit 487. Portland has attracted large numbers of transplants from across the country in recent years, especially those who are environmentally conscious. The region's land-use planning, emphasis on bicycling and investment in light rail have combined to curb urban sprawl and automobile traffic that is prevalent in many other cities in the western U.S. Portlanders also enthuse about their many local microbreweries and their beloved NBA basketball Trail Blazers (often at the same time).

Portland typically enjoys warm, dry summers and wet, but mild winters. The rain keeps the surrounding countryside green much of the year and the climate is ideal for growing roses. In fact, Portland celebrates its nickname --- the Rose City --- every June with its Rose Festival, which includes a floral parade and many other events.

With more than 847 members, Unit 487 is by far the largest unit in District 20. It also provides more than its share of district leadership and tournament directing staff, as well as volunteers for this NABC.

Unit 487 sponsors three large sectionals each year, and co-sponsors an annual regional (The Oregon Trail) held at the Vancouver Hilton in February. In addition to the annual unit-subsidized election party (in March), there are numerous holiday potlucks and occasional catered dinner events at the clubs.

Our Clubs: The Ace of Clubs and the Eastside Bridge Club offer duplicate games six (and sometimes seven) days a week, as well as most evenings. Both of these clubs are located in attractive large-windowed spaces in modern office buildings, and provide pre-dealt boards with hand records. Both clubs sponsor annual events with perpetual trophies, but there is a special honor at the Ace that deserves mention: the Dick Braniff trophy, established in 2008, for outstanding service to the club.

Games at the Ace are generally followed by an open invitation to one of the local watering holes, where the post-mortems begin in earnest. The

Eastside club features delicious home-baked treats and other snacks.

In addition to these wonderful clubs, there are several privately sanctioned duplicate games in Portland, that contribute substantially to our membership and tournament table count.

Our Classes: Our busy ACBL-trained teachers are instructing at senior centers, private clubs, and even OHSU (Oregon Health Sciences University), where bridge is considered brain exercise that is useful for the prevention of dementia.

Welcome: The Portland Unit welcomes you to the Spring NABC 2010 here in Reno, and hopes that our large cadre of volunteers is helping you to have the best of experiences at this District 20-sponsored tournament.

## JUST FOR NEW PLAYERS

## Choosing events, part 1 By Lynn Berg

How do you decide what events to enter? On any given day, there are many choices in the $0-299$ area and in the open events.

Within the 299er area, you'll find one- and two-session pairs events as well
 as Swiss teams. If you know you plan to play twice in the day, go for the two-session event. The payoff is greater for overall places in the two sessions than you would get for placing twice in the same day in two single sessions.

All of the pairs games and Swiss teams are stratified. In a stratified game, A, B and C players are mixed together. The directors make a great effort to have an equal number of players in each strat in each direction so that the field is well balanced. For instance, C might be $0-50$, B 50200, A 200-300. If you are C players, at the end of the game you only have to win in C to get points. B players must best C and B. Players in A must be at the top to get points at all.

Remember, any C and B players who do as well or better than players in strats higher than theirs win points for the higher strat. It's not unheard of for C players to win it all.

Of course, you may not be sure you want to play two sessions in one day. That takes stamina. Or you might prefer to play morning and evening sessions and spend your afternoon doing something else.

A popular evening event is a single-session Swiss team, stratified as are the pairs games. You need four players for such a team game. The entries are sold in random order, so you might be matched against anyone else eligible for the event. Most of the time, you'll be in head-to-
head matches. If there are an odd number of teams, you might be put into a round-robin with two other teams. At the end of the match, you compare results with your teammates. You'll find the IMP values in the convention card. The winners turn in the results after confirming the score with the losers. The computer converts the difference in IMPs to victory points (you can find that information in your convention card as well). When the results for the first-round matches are posted, the computer will make
new matches based on similar victory point totals-not stratification. The virtue of VPs is that with a close loss, you still get some points. For instance, using the 30 point scale, a 1-IMP loss gives 18 VPs to the winners and 12 to the losers. The maximum win is 30 points: lose by 28 or more IMPs and the score is $30-0$. Even if you should lose by 50 IMPs, the VO score would still be 30-0.

If you decide to play in open events, the big difference will be in the levels of the strats and in the masterpoints awarded. With rare exceptions, the masterpoint awards in the 0-299 games will be red. In the open, the lowest strat most likely will also be red, while red and gold points will be awarded in B and A in two-session events. Gold points are not awarded in one-session events, regardless of the level. One confusing event is the side series, which feels like a one-session event but does offer some chance to win gold. But gold can be achieved in the side series only under very

specific circumstances. You must play in at least two sessions of the same series for your section top to pay gold. That's hard to do because it requires that you be first in A . Most of the time, you have a better chance of winning gold, if that's your objective, by placing in the overall in B or A in a two-session pairs or team game.

How to decide whether to play in limited or open events? Open means just what is says -anyone is eligible to play. If you are winning consistently in A in limited events, step up to the tougher competition of the C strat in the open. If you are in the lowest strat in the limited games, you don't have to ask to be put into B or A. You'll get the points of the higher strats if you earn them. Remember, too, that the pace will be faster and more boards will be played in open events. You must be able to play at the required pace (about seven minutes per board). Limited or open, you'll meet players from all over playing at an NABC.

Bidding commentary: With 5-4 in the minors along with two doubletons and no slam interest, North treats the hand as balanced and bids accordingly.

## Lead commentary: Suits headed by the

 Q-J-8-x-(x) are not considered sequence suits at notrump, so a fourth-best card is led. To lead a queen at notrump you need a suit headed by the Q-J-10, Q-J-9 or the A-Q-J. At a suit contract the queen is led from any Q-J combination because at a suit contract two, not three adjacent honors are considered a sequence.Play commentary: As South, you have seven top tricks and can easily set up three more in clubs. That is, it would be easy if the opponents couldn't set up their spades first! But they can. Even if the opposing spades are divided 5-4, as evenly as possible, the opponents can set up three spade tricks before you can set up your clubs. You can't win the spade-club race. You must look elsewhere for two extra tricks. "Elsewhere" is hearts. You need three heart tricks. This means finding East with the king and jack. It's your only chance. Win the spade lead in dummy and lead a heart to the 10 . Now open your eyes. Guess what? The 10 has won the trick. Now all you have to do is repeat the heart finesse for nine tricks.

When you have a choice between a lowchance play (double heart finesse) or a no-chance play (driving out the $\% \mathrm{~A}$ and $\% \mathrm{~K}$ ), take the lowpercentage play. Live a little.

## Defending and declaring

## the 'normal' game

Everyone knows that 3NT is the most commonly reached game. The first qualifying session of the IMP Pairs gave declarers and defenders a workout in how to pick up IMPs in this contract.

Fortunately, South led a heart, expecting East to be loaded in clubs. The six-card holding offered more prospects than the eight-card one. North cashed the $\vee \mathrm{J}$ and $\vee \mathrm{K}$, then shifted to a fourthhighest \& $\boldsymbol{3}$. It's pretty much a guess for declarer in this situation: if he puts in the queen and it holds, he can duck a spade and get home when spades or diamonds divide, which therefore seems best to me.

Our declarer put in the $\& 10$. South won his $\& \mathrm{~J}$ and cashed the $\vee \mathrm{A}$, North intelligently pitching the $\AA 8$. South knew not to continue clubs now. He shifted to a spade, and even though diamonds broke declarer had no entries to cash all his red-suit winners to squeeze North, so eight tricks were the limit.

I'm sure that at many tables, West sensibly chose the path of discretion and did not overcall $1 \wedge$ when South as dealer opened $1 \star$. When North passed, East could have passed it out and left South struggling to get out for less than 400. In fact, East balanced with 1 NT and was raised to 3 NT . That left him fighting for the same 400 - but with much more at stake if he got it wrong.

Alex Ornstein did well to lead a spade to the 6, 10 and ace (a good moment for the falsecard if South has led from three to the jack). From an entry perspective, perhaps declarer does better to win the ^Q and duck a club.

Anyway, declarer led a low club up at trick two. South pounced on that with the queen and played the $\vee$, North encouraging with the 7 . What should declarer do? Should he win the first heart, the second - or duck both?

It's really not clear. If South has $\vee \mathrm{K} \mathrm{Q} \mathrm{x}$, perhaps ducking twice will encourage South to continue the suit. There again, a competent NorthSouth will shift after two rounds - North's $\downarrow 7$ denies holding $\vee \mathrm{J} 87 \mathrm{x}$ or he would play the $\vee 8$.

Our East ducked twice, won the spade shift in dummy and exited with the \&A and another club. That was the fourth trick for the defense, and South could exit with the $A J$ to lock the lead in dummy and collect his diamond tricks at the end.

Josh Parker was also in 3NT as East on a friendly low diamond lead. He won in hand, ducked a club, won the diamond return, ducked a second club then won the third diamond, crossed to the A A and cashed the $\%$ A and the long club, triple squeezing South. That player had to release the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$. Declarer cashed his spade a heart winners, dropping South's king, and exited with a heart to the 10 , taking trick 13 with the $\vee 8$ for the overtrick.

At double dummy (or even single dummy), winning the first or second heart succeeds. The fourth club squeezes a diamond out of South, and now declarer can set up a diamond or endplay South with the fourth spade to lead diamonds.

Okay, it's "hands up" time. I want every EastWest pair who defended 3NT on the above deal and who said, "Well, it's cold!" to take a second look, and then apologize to Brigidda the Goddess of Bridge.

I'll tell you what happened at every table where I asked. North opened 1NT and played 3NT. North ducked the first spade, won West's continuation of the $\uparrow 3$, knocked out the club honors and claimed 400. So what's the point?

West was asleep at the wheel. He knows partner has the a J 975 , but declarer can't see through the backs of the cards. West plays the $\uparrow 8$ at the second trick, hops up with the $\uparrow$ A and plays the $\uparrow 6$ back, and now declarer's best line is clearly to take an immediate heart finesse. If it loses and spades are $5-3$, he can go back to clubs. Unlucky! That is the defenders' fifth winner.

## Young players urged

 to spread the wordYoung players who attended the Junior reception on Saturday found food, companionship and a strong appeal from several ACBL officials for them to tell their friends about duplicate.
"Encourage your friends," said Jay Baum, ACBL's chief executive, "even if you don't think they will be great players."

ACBL President Rich DeMartino appealed to the young players to speak up with their ideas about how to get more of their peers into the game. "We want to do anything we can to get more Juniors," he said, "and we want to know what you think we can do."

Aileen Osofsky, Goodwill committee chair, kicked off the meeting by telling the young players how important they are to the future of duplicate.
"Young people are the lifeblood of an organization, and you are the future of the game. Duplicate is more than a card game. It is a community of logical thinkers."

Osofsky described duplicate players as a large family, and she urged the young players at the meeting to "expand your family ties by sharing your love of the game."

Baum, noting that there will be youth championships this fall at the World Bridge Series tournament in Philadelphia, said he is "excited that it's going to be on our home ground, and our expectations are high this year."

He paid the young players a compliment, relating that he has received good reports about their sportsmanship and friendliness. "I have heard you're all very nice at the table, and we thank you for that."

Flo Belford, president of the ACBL Educational Foundation, urged the young players to "give something back by teaching other young people."

Jade Barrett, chairman of the North American Youth Bridge Foundation, said that in his 40 years of playing bridge he has heard many times that bridge is dying. "The game will never die," he said, "because we have a passion for it."

Before the meeting broke up, Osofsky reminded the group that the third Youth NABC is scheduled to take place during the 2010 Summer NABC in New Orleans this summer. She also noted that the deadline for submitting nominations for the King or Queen of Bridge this year is May 15. The graduating high school senior who is selected for the honor will receive a $\$ 1000$ scholarship from the Educational Foundation. For information about how to apply, e-mail education@acbl.org.

learn and advance," says Lane. "They like the challenge. We think they will eventually play online. Bridge creates lifetime contacts."
"I like thinking about the math involved in bridge," says student Alexis Jones. "I also like the people."
"Bridge can teach logic, math, critical thinking and inferential reasoning," says Brewer. "Chris Shaw's research found that kids who took bridge lessons had accelerated scores on standardized tests. We expect to find the same thing."

RYB is supported by contributions from bridge players and clubs. Parents of the students have also chipped in.

How did the young players do?
"This is the first tournament for these kids," says Brewer, "and they are excited."

After the bridge game, the students enjoyed lunch together and trophies were presented. The North-South winners Karly Agerholm and Sierra Jickling, represented Swope

(Rossmoor Resident) Middle School. Patrick Dempsey and Nathan Kerr, who also attend Swope, were East-West winners.

Following lunch, the youngsters were given a tour of the other playing areas. They received an ovation from bridge players in one of them.
"It was just the greatest youth event that I've seen at an NABC," said Aileen Osofsky, Chair of the National Goodwill Committee.

What's next for the RYB?
"I have big plans," says Brewer. "I think Washoe County should make it part of the curriculum, maybe part of a math class. It may sound crazy, but I believe playing bridge builds the brain. Why isn't it as important as the football player who runs laps to build his leg muscles?"

that were published, he and Beall looked as though they were dressed as twins because when they showed up to have their photos taken, someone asked, "Where are your jackets?" They didn't have any, so they both posed in the same loaner.

Back in Indianapolis after earning his bachelor's degree, Ashton stayed only about a year. He was restless and yearning to head west. He joined the anti-poverty Volunteers in Service to America (VISTA) and did his training in Eugene OR. His first assignment was in Nome AK. It didn't take long for Ashton to request a different location. Nome, he says, "was way too far away from anything for me."

VISTA agreed to transfer Ashton to Portland OR, where he has been ever since. His job was doing screening interviews for prisoners looking to be paroled. The office was not far away from a bridge club, and Ashton soon discovered a sizeable group of young, enthusiastic bridge players. "We just had a great time," he recalls. "I was a classic bridge bum."

As for the economics degree, Ashton says, it was never put to use "for even a minute."

Ashton was enjoying life as a bridge player when the Portland ACBL unit decided that it would save money if a local person could be trained as a tournament director - no more having to pay travel expenses for an out-of-town TD. Ashton was surprised to be chosen over a more experienced person, but he started going to tournaments for training, quickly making his way up the ladder.

He became a full-time TD in 1991 and was promoted to associate national rank five years later. He has been a national director since 2000. He has run the year-end regional in Reno for the past 13 years. Since 1999, he and Chris Patrias have worked together running the Spring NABCs, Patrias as DIC and Ashton as AIC.

Ashton still plays bridge, but doesn't often travel to tournaments. Still, he is proud of the fact that at the 1977 Spring NABC in Pasadena, he and Troy Horton came in second in the national event now known as the Silodor Open Pairs (the winners were Barry Crane and Peter Rank). Last summer, Ashton was a member of the squad that made it to the semifinal round of the 0-5000 Grand National Teams in Washington DC.

When he is not playing bridge or running tournaments, Ashton says he spends time following all major sports, going to movies and walking his dog, Tulip, a golden retriever.

Ashton has enjoyed his long association with bridge, especially the TD part. "I love it," he says. "I love the people I work with and the people I work for. They are intelligent, sociable and pleasant."

## Bid Box Alerts and Announcements

When using bid boxes, the ACBL requires that players tap the Alert strip and say "Alert" at the same time.

When making an Announcement, use the Announcement word (such as "transfer") and tap the Alert strip at the same time.

A player who Alerts or Announces a bid must make sure his opponents are aware that an Alert or Announcement has been made.

## Tough defenders

Frank Merblum and Doug Doub won the Baldwin North American Pairs by fewer than two matchpoints, so they were grateful for the round in which they scored 25.5 out of 26 , both times on defense. This was the first deal:

Doub started with the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$, which held,
followed by the $\vee \mathrm{J}$. At trick three, Doub exited with a suit-preference 2 , covered by the king and ace and ruffed by South.

Declarer then played the a J : queen, king, ace. Merblum got out with a low club to the jack, queen and ace. In with the $\uparrow \mathrm{Q}$, Doub exited with his last spade, then won the $\bullet$ A when declarer played on that suit.

Doub exited with a diamond, and the layout of the suit was such that declarer could not profit by overtaking, so he had to lose two more club tricks for minus 500. That was a top for Doub and Merblum.

Merblum led his singleton diamond and ruffed the third round after Doub took the $\bullet \mathrm{Q}$ and $\bullet \mathrm{A}$. Doub's third diamond was the 2, so Merblum exited with a heart. Declarer won the ace, cashed dummy's top clubs and pitched the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$ on the $\bullet K$. When declarer led a low spade away from dummy's doubleton ace, Doub hopped up with the $\uparrow \mathrm{Q}$ to cash the $\& \mathrm{Q}$, leaving declarer two tricks short. Plus 200 was good for 12.5 out of 13 matchpoints.

## World Bridge Series Championships set for Philadelphia in October

Philadelphia will be the bridge capital of the world in October as the city welcomes players from across the globe in a 16-day tournament that will feature something for just about everyone.

It's the World Bridge Series Championships, organized by the World Bridge Federation and including an impressive variety of games. It runs from Oct. 1 to 16.

Additionally, an ACBL regional tournament will be played concurrently with the world championships. The regional will award WBF masterpoints in addition to the usual ACBL awards.

The host hotel for the tournament is the Philadelphia Marriott Downtown. There are other hotels nearby, including the Courtyard by Marriott, less than half a block from the headquarters hotel, and the Hilton Garden Inn, a block and a half away.

Play will be at Marriott.
All events will be transnational, meaning players from any countries may play together.

This is the lineup of events: World Mixed Pairs, World Open Knockout Teams (Rosenblum Cup), World Women's Knockout Teams (McConnell Cup), World Senior Knockout Teams (Rand Cup), Generali World Open Pairs, Generali World Women's Pairs, World Senior Pairs (Hiron Trophy) and World Mixed Swiss Teams, a new event.

There are concurrent events for players and teams that fail to qualify for various stages of the primary events.

While the world events and ACBL regional are in progress, the 13th World Youth Team Championships will take place - the World Junior Championship (26 and younger for zonal team representatives) and the World Youngsters Championship (up to 21 years of age, for the Jose Damiani Cup). A new series, the World Girls Championship (zonal teams 26 and younger for the Gianarrigo Rona Cup) is also scheduled.

The Philadelphia tournament is the first to be played on American soil since 1994, when the championships were in Albuquerque NM.

## Electronic Device Policy

The electronic device
policy is revised as follows:

1. For all NABC+ rated events at NABCs: Electronic devices, including but not limited to, phones, cameras, PDAs, and others capable
 of sending or receiving electronic communication are excluded from the playing areas during any session of play. This does not apply to health-related equipment.
2. For all events at an NABC other than a NABC+ rated event: Except for health-related equipment, or by permission of the Director-in-Charge of the tournament, cell phones, audible pagers or similar equipment may not be operated or operable in any manner in the playing area during a session of play. Any such equipment must not be visible during the session. Sponsoring organizations of other ACBL-sanctioned events are encouraged to adopt a similar policy.
3. These restrictions in numbers 1 and 2 above apply to all pairs, team members, captains, coaches, play recorders (except those designated by ACBL)
and kibitzers and are in force throughout any actual playing session or segment of play.
4. A violation of any of the restrictions in numbers 1 and 2 above will result in a disciplinary penalty of one full board (12 IMPs at that form of scoring) for the first offense. A second offense will result in disqualification from the event for the pair/team. Kibitzers violating this policy will be removed from the playing area for the remainder of the session.

## Monitoring

At this and future North American Championships, ACBL will be monitoring NABC+ events with visible, real-time cameras. The images will be recorded and will be available for later official inspection and review.

By general monitoring of the session and participants' behavior, ACBL has another source of information that may be useful in determining facts and settling issues arising from some types of ethical and behavioral complaints or actions. Please summon a director if a problem occurs at the table.

This procedure is intended to assure everyone that the playing field is level and that misbehavior will not be tolerated.

As you can see, North-South have four "top" losers in $4 \boldsymbol{A}$ - and yet the datum score was NorthSouth plus 420. Of course, at some tables, EastWest went overboard in hearts, but at many more tables, North-South were allowed to make $4 \boldsymbol{A}$.

Take a look at the West problem at trick one. Everybody knows "third hand plays high," so why did so many West's duck their $\vee$ A and allow the king to score?

The answer is that West was worried in case declarer had three hearts to the king and playing the ace would give North a free discard - but take a second look at that South hand!

West has no diamond honors. What trick could possibly go away on that "bonus" discard. The right defense is to cash both aces and play a second club. Mrs. Guggenheim wouldn't have got it wrong!

## Entry fees

Players must be ACBL members whose service fees or dues are current in order to compete in any of the following nationally ranked events: NABC + Platinum Pairs, Silodor Open Pairs, Vanderbilt Knockout Teams, Leventritt Silver Ribbon Pairs, Rockwell Mixed Pairs, Lebhar IMP Pairs, Whitehead Women's Pairs, Jacoby Open Swiss Teams, and the Machlin Women's Swiss Teams. The entry fees for these contests are $\$ 20$ per player per session.

Players must also be current ACBL members to play in the Bean Red Ribbon Pairs. The entry fee is $\$ 17$ per player per session.

Regional championships are $\$ 16$ per player per session for ACBL members, $\$ 18$ for non-members.

All other events are $\$ 15$ per player per session for ACBL members, $\$ 17$ for non-members.
(Note: There is no entry fee for any flight of the North American Pairs, but participants are still required to be paid-up members.)

## Silver Ribbon Pairs

The Leventritt Silver Ribbon Pairs --- open only to players who are at least 55 years old and who have pre-qualified by placing first or second in a regional- or national-rated senior event --- gets underway today.

The Silver Ribbon Pairs consists of two qualifying and two final sessions. The winners will have their names inscribed on the Leventritt Trophy and will receive a certificate of recognition.

The trophy honors Peter Leventritt of New York, ACBL president in 1954 and assistant treasurer 1945-46. He served as president of the Greater New York Bridge Association and the Card School of New York, which he co-founded.

Leventritt (1916-1997) pioneered the use of the Schenken System in partnership with its inventor, Howard Schenken. He represented North America in the Bermuda Bowl and placed second in 1957, 1961, 1963 and 1965.

## Slow play: the curse of the game

Patty Johnson, Sebring FL, is a National Tournament Director and the Director-in-Charge for all District 9 (Florida) tournaments.

An old tournament director friend of mine, John "Spider" Harris, was famous for the saying: "Slow play is the curse of the game." Nothing is more frustrating for tournament directors than having to herd players along like cattle when slow play isn't actually the problem.

If you take a moment to think about it, most of your opponents do not take that long to bid or play a deal -- yet before you know it, the round is being called and you are nowhere near finished with the last board.

Here are some suggestions which, if followed, would solve many of our problems.

First: do not post mortem between deals whether you are in a pair game or a Swiss team event. Finish the round and then discuss hands if there is still time. We, as directors, will not cut your time but I think
you will find yourselves under less pressure by following this suggestion. Remember: we provide hand records in pair games so you don't have to worry about forgetting a particular holding.

Second: if you are on opening lead, make your lead before recording the contract in your private score. You will have plenty of time after leading to record the information and still see the entire first trick.

Third: unless you have a legitimate reason to leave the table, such as the restroom or a smoke break, please remain at the table and visit with your opponents. You might actually find this enjoyable and a new way to make friends or future Swiss team partnerships.

I wish we could make these suggestions into rules enforceable by penalty but none of us wants a bridge event decided by the pair with the fewest penalties. All I can do as a director is to ask the cooperation and help of all players because I think not only you but everyone else will enjoy their tournaments more.

Remember: those who enjoy a tournament will continue to play. Do your part to make bridge enjoyable for yourself, your partner and your opponents -- you can't play without them.

Richie Schwartz, North, doubled on his second turn to show extra values, and Aaron Silverstein, South, bid 2 A , finding his side's 4-4 fit.

West led the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$ to the king and ace, and East continued with another heart to South's jack. Silverstein took the spade finesse, losing to the singleton king, then ruffed the heart return with the 9. He continued with a diamond to the queen and East's ace. East returned another diamond to the king. Silverstein drew trumps, leaving this position:


Silverstein called for the $\bullet \mathrm{Q}$ and carefully unblocked the 7 from his hand. He was sure West had the $\% \mathrm{~K}$ and it seemed very likely that he was down to all clubs. West won the king and returned a club, but Silverstein won his jack, happy to see East follow with the 9 . He led his last club and finessed the 6 ! Making plus 140 was a fine matchpoint score.

## Balances work sometimes, but . .

Steve Robinson, North, had a good hand, but he decided not to raise Peter Boyd's heart bid because they would be playing a $5-2$ fit with minimum values. Declarer might make a couple of overtricks in hearts, but there's no guarantee. But Robinson sure knew what to do when 3 came around to him.

Boyd led his singleton spade to the ace, and Robinson returned the $\uparrow$. Boyd ruffed with the $\bullet 9$ and returned the $\bullet$ Q, the suit requested by Robinson's low spade return. Robinson overtook with the king and led another spade for Boyd to ruff. Boyd led another club to Robinson's ace and he shifted to a heart. That was plus 500 instead of plus 140 or 170 .

Notice that West has six cards and has yet to discard on the last heart. Whether he discards a club or a diamond, declarer gets one trick in that minor. Of course the a discard would allow dummy to cash the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} 10$. West duly discarded a diamond and Ehlers claimed his 11 tricks.

North led a diamond to South's ace, and South switched to a club to the jack and ace. Declarer called for a diamond which ran to North's 10 perhaps it would have been better for the defense if South won the jack and led a second club

North led a heart, ducked to partner's king and South switched back to clubs, declarer taking his king. Declarer led and passed the $\vee \mathrm{J}$, then ruffed a diamond. After taking the $\vee \mathrm{A}$, he ruffed dummy's last heart, leaving this position:


Declarer exited with the $\& 10$ to North's queen, South discarding a diamond. Now North was endplayed - he had to lead a trump away from his queen. Declarer had no problem putting in dummy's jack because of North's 1NT bid during the auction. Making plus 140 was a fine score.

So what could the defenders have done about this? South erred on the last club trick. Instead of pitching his diamond, he should have ruffed his partner's trick. Then he could lead a trump or a diamond and take his partner off the endplay, holding declarer to only eight tricks.

On the helpful lead of a low club, Robson's jack scored, but he still had only eight tricks. He made the natural play of coming to the $A \mathrm{~A}$, and when South dropped the jack, he was at the crossroads. Playing a diamond might set up the opponents' suit. Leading a heart to the 10 or the 8 wold be painful if he guessed wrong. Giving up a club (assuming the $5-1$ split to be likely) might leave him well short of entries to set up the suit.

Robson found the best solution at both singledummy and double-dummy when he advanced the $\bullet J$ from his hand. In practice, there was a fair shot that South might forget to cover. As it was, North took the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$ and was immediately endplayed.

He exited with a diamond and Robson won cheaply in dummy. Then he cleared the spades and brought home 10 tricks.

## Bid 'em up

On this deal Partha Mallela didn't score any points for bidding artistry, but he did manage to snare 24.5 out of a possible 25 matchpoints.

Sitting East, Platnick's pass of $2 *$ doubled suggested club length. North led a club to the queen, king and ace. Diamond led a diamond to the queen, ruffed a diamond, led a spade to the queen (North enjoying a quiet snooze), ruffed a diamond, led the $\wedge A$ and ruffed a spade. Then he drew all the trumps. Now he could cash dummy's winning $\bullet A$ 10, and he must have felt aggrieved that he had to concede trick 13.

This comes to a total of plus 980 . When was the last time you scored this number this way?

## Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership
 must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6-board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.
