## Defenses to 1NT <br> A group of expert players was recently polled on their favorite methods of combating 1NT openings. The Daily Bulletin will feature the preferred defense against 1 NT of a different expert each day of the NABC.

(Players should note that several of the systems described in this series use Mid-Chart conventions and are not permitted in events that are restricted to the General Convention Chart. Players should check the director-in-charge for details.)

Today's expert: Bobby Wolff
Bobby Wolff has been a longtime champion of simple, direct systems, and his career is testimony to the fact that one doesn't need conventional complexity in order to win.
"Against expert competition, simple is best. Even something like Landy ( $2 *$ shows the majors, all else is natural) is fine. Unusual systems typically have only one benefit: surprise. Against less experienced players, however, weird systems can work very well, but that doesn't mean it's good bridge," Wolff said.

Overcalling 1 NT is an inherently dangerous business, according to Wolff, not only because of the risk of being penalized, but because of the difficulty of having a constructive auction.
"The lengths of the overcaller's suit(s) are unknown, so it's easy for bad things to happen."

Wolff and partner Dan Morse use this scheme against strong and weak 1NT openings:

"Barry Crane once analyzed his results from allowing the opponents to play 1 NT and discovered that he was scoring something like 52 to $53 \%$," said Wolff. "When his side balanced against 1 NT , however, (and some of the balancing actions were clearly not sound) he found that his percentage increased to 57 or $58 \%$. Forcing his (typically) less experienced opponents to use their judgment worked to his advantage, but again, using dangerous bidding approaches just to stir up action against weaker opponents isn't good bridge. Certainly, that approach is a reality in matchpoint games for pairs that are trying to win, but it's not sound."

Wolff said that all partnerships need to weigh the merits of their approach, especially regarding complexity and aggressiveness.
"Using complex systems, you're trading solidity for pressure on the opponents."

Wolff's philosophy when competing against weak 1 NT openings is that it's better to err on the side of aggression by competing.
"When you have a good 13 or 14 HCP , get in if possible. True, you could get doubled, but there are risks either way. Passing could be riskier than bidding. And to penalize you, they have to have the methods and right type of hand to do it."

## Allegaert, Shivdasani lead Silodor Pairs

New Yorkers Winthrop Allegaert and Jagy Shivdasani posted a $67.77 \%$ score in the first qualifying session of the Silodor Open Pairs and followed it up with a $61.62 \%$ game in the evening session to lead the event by almost two boards.

On a 25 top, the leaders' two-session total was 841 matchpoints. Average was 650.

In second with 799 are Bill Erikson and Eric Mane, and in third, with 792.5, are Stephen Landen and Pratap Rajadhyaksha.

The qualifying round drew 344 pairs, of which 182 survived to today's two-session final.

Deutsch tapped for sportsmanship award

Seymon Deutsch of Laredo TX has been named the 2007 recipient of the Sidney H. Lazard Jr. Sportsmanship Award. Deutsch, 71, is a fivetime national champion, including last year's Vanderbilt Knockout Teams in Dallas, and has two world titles: the 1994 Rosenblum Teams and the 1992 World Team
Olympiad. He is the only U.S. player (and one of only five in the world) with gold medals from both events.

A rancher and merchant specializing in fine men's and women's items, Deutsch quit bridge for 22 years to devote his time and energy to his family and business. After his layoff, he returned to the game in the late Eighties and began winning titles.

The Lazard award, administered by the ACBL Educational Foundation, is given annually to a top-level player, one who has scored a high-level finish in a major national contest. The award was established by Sidney Lazard in honor of his son, Sidney Jr., who died at 41 from cancer in 1999. According to Lazard, the object of the award is "to enhance sportsmanship among the top players and to salute those who try to win with class and dignity."

The Lazard award will be presented at the ACBL Bridge Hall of Fame banquet during the Summer NABC in Nashville.

Previous winners of the Lazard Sportsmanship Award: 2001 Paul Soloway; 2002 Rose Meltzer; 2003 Larry Cohen; 2004 Lynn Deas; 2005 Nick Nickell; 2006 Ralph Cohen.

## Negative doubles <br> By Mark Ehret

As bridge bidding evolved over the years， one of the greatest innovations was the negative double． Consider the following hand and auction：
－98 マAK42 J743 ャ862． West $\begin{array}{lll}\text { North } & \text { East } & \text { South } \\ \text { 1＊} & 1 \uparrow & \text { ？}\end{array}$
Before the negative double，it was very difficult to describe this hand．You can＇t bid $2 \vee$ because that promises five hearts and at least 10 high－card points．Double was for penalty．So what to do？Invent the negative double（accomplished by Al Roth）．

Negative doubles apply only when partner opens the bidding and your right－hand opponent overcalls．If you double，you are implying the two unbid suits．If the two suits are a major and a minor，the major should always be there，but the minor may be suspect．

How many high－card points are required for a negative double？Well，you have to think about the level that your partner will have to bid at if he has a fit with one of your suits．Suppose you hold
AAJ107 ソ943 4854 ヵ7
and you hear this auction：
West North East South

You can double to show your four spades （with five or more spades，you would simply bid $1 \boldsymbol{A}$ ）and possibly four or more clubs．If West passes，partner can bid spades at the one level if he has four of them．Therefore，you need only 6 HCP to double．By the way，if partner bids $2 *$ instead of 1 A ，just go back to $2 \star$ ．

If South＇s hand is
＾AJ 1073 ャ9 3 －9 854 \＆7， he simply bids $1 \oplus$ over the $1 \vee$ overcall．

Here are two auctions with important differences．
West North East South
1＊1＾Dbl West North East South

In the first auction above，East has ＾98 マAQ87 1073 \＆Q842 and is promising hearts and clubs．Partner would have to bid at the two level to show a heart fit，so now you need 8 HCP as your minimum to make the negative double．In the second auction，you， South，have

and can bid $2 \vee$ with five hearts and 10 HCP ．

Here is another auction to consider：
West North East South 1－2＾？
You（South）hold
－74 AKJ73＊ 83 \＆Q 1043 ．
You should double．Partner will have to bid at the three level，so you should have at least 10 HCP． You should not bid $3 \vee$ directly without a full opening hand．To bid $3 \boldsymbol{v}$ in the above auction，you should have something like：
A 74 『AKJ73－K 3 \＆Q1043．
Remember，when making a negative double， think about the level that partner has to bid at to

accept your suit．If partner must bid at the one level， 6 HCP will suffice for your negative double． If partner will have to bid at the two－level，your minimum is 8 HCP ．If partner will have to go to the three level，you should have at least 10 HCP．If you bid your suit freely at the two level，you promise at least five in your suit and 10 HCP．If you bid freely at the three－level，it＇s an opening hand and at least five of your suit．

Defensive commentary：East rises with the $\checkmark \mathrm{K}$ and returns the $\downarrow 9$ ，the higher of two remaining cards．South covers with the $\vee 10$ ， West wins the jack and shifts to a club，not playing the A （key non－play）．West knows from the return of the $\varphi 9$ that South remains with the guarded queen．West must hope that East can get in to lead another heart（if he has one！）If East has no outside entry，the contract cannot be defeated．

Play commentary：If West shifts to the
\＆10 at trick three，South does best to cash four clubs and force some discards．There are too many variations to discuss，but forcing discards on touchy deals，if it doesn＇t compromise entry problems，is usually a good way to start． Opponents hate to make discard after discard， don＇t you？

## Inferences and counting

## By Bary Rigal

New Yorkers Chris Willenken and Glenn Milgrim were relatively low on the qualifying on the first day of the Baldwin North American Pairs Flight A, but this board certainly helped them:


Milgrim's $2 \wedge$ was wide-ranging, up to 9 HCP, which persuaded West to stay silent. This was not a good move: East-West can make 3NT.

In $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$, West's $\boldsymbol{*} 7$ lead went to the $\boldsymbol{*}$ Q and a club came back to dummy's ace. A low heart to the queen saw a third club, ruffed by Milgrim. Now on a heart to the king (East discarding a diamond), West played a diamond. Milgrim took the $\bullet$ A, ruffed a heart (East again pitching) and crossed to the $\bullet K$ to reach this ending:

Declarer ruffed a heart to hand, overruffing East's $\boldsymbol{\wedge} 6$, and exited with a diamond. East ruffed his partner's winner perforce and led a trump.

At this point, East was known to have a 5-1-4-3 shape. Who had the $\boldsymbol{\wedge}$ A J ? Since West had already shown 14 HCP outside of spades, surely East had the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} \mathrm{A}$. But West had not overcalled $1 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ : would he not have bid with a 10 -count and $\uparrow \mathrm{A} \mathrm{x} x \mathrm{x}$ ? Milgrim put up the $\uparrow K$ to drop the $\uparrow J$ and claimed eight tricks.

Willenken and Milgrim finished second in the two-day contest.


Glenn Milgrim and Chris Willenken were second in Flight A of the North American Pairs. They were second in the same event in Reno in 2004, losing by .03 matchpoints. Milgrim is from Forest Hills NY and Willenken is from New York City.

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## Perseverance

The winners of the Baldwin North American Pairs, Flight A, Dave Abelow and Dick Wegman, suffered through the pain of a $43 \%$ game in the first qualifying session of the event. The pair refused to give up, however, and after a strong second session, they qualified for the final, in which they eventually emerged as the champs.

Keeping your wits about you when you're getting clobbered is not easy, but that's exactly what Wegman did on this deal from that dreadful first set:


Wegman and Abelow play a 15 to 17 1NT range vulnerable, but Wegman (South) upgraded the excellent 14 -count. West led the $\uparrow 10$.

Declarer has nine tricks if the diamonds behave, but after winning the $\checkmark$ and playing another diamond to the ace, Wegman had to come up with another plan when East discarded a heart.

Although it's possible to go after clubs, Wegman felt sure that the opponents would soon shift to spades: It would be obvious at that point that his weakness lay in that suit.

To put the opponents off the right track, therefore, Wegman played a low spade himself! West won the king and, understandably, switched to a club. Now, there was no way for the defense to succeed since West had no more entries to play a spade for his partner.

Plus 600 was worth 18 out of 25 matchpoints.
On this deal from the second final session, Abelow went for 800, but it turned out to be a good score, not because the opponents can make a slam, but because many other pairs were doing worse. Much worse. Take a look (deal rotated):

Abelow lost two spades, three diamonds and two clubs for down three. Doubled and vulnerable was minus 800 . Other Souths were more aggressive, however, jumping to $4 \star$ over the $1 \boldsymbol{*}$ opening. They paid 1100 for their view of the

## hand

Even worse scores were generated on this layout when several North players tried to rescue their partners by issuing an SOS redouble. With nowhere to go, however, these South players passed the redouble and went minus 1600 or 2200, depending on level.

Minus 800 was worth 8.5 out of 13 matchpoints.

## Linhart, Kaplan advance



Jim Linhart and Peggy Kaplan have advanced to new masterpoint rankings. Grand Life Master Linhart has topped the 20,000 masterpoint level. ## You have been warned!

By Barry Rigal

When someone gives you a play problem, your initial reaction should be to assume that there is a little more to it than drawing trumps, taking finesses and cashing winners. When you are told, "This is a great problem," you'd better get your Agame on.

This deal comes from this year's District 6 qualifier (in Washington DC) for the Grand National Teams. Can you find the way home?

The contract may be hopeless, but the opening ed - the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ - gives you a chance

How should you play 5 ? You assume spades are 2-7, so unless West has the $\star \mathrm{K} \mathrm{Q}$ or a bare diamond honor you have no chance - do you? Since the $\diamond$ K Q position appears to make life easy, assume West has the bare honor. How should you plan the play to cover all the bases?

You win the $\uparrow \mathrm{A}$, cross to the A (dropping West's Q) and cash the $\uparrow \mathrm{Q}$ J pitching hearts as West discards on the $\boldsymbol{A} \mathrm{J}$. Now when you play a second trump, East wins the $\downarrow \mathrm{K}$ and forces you with a heart. You ruff, draw the remaining trump and play the $\because \mathrm{AK}$. East shows out, and you find that you lack the entries to get the clubs going.

The point of the deal is that if West has two spades and one diamond, you are quite likely to run into a 4-1 club break. Simply cash the $\approx \mathrm{A}$ at trick two to counter this possibility. Now cross to the $\star$, cash the $\wedge$ Q J, pitching hearts, and lead a second club. If East ruffs, all he gets is two trump tricks, so he discards. You win the $\curvearrowleft \mathrm{K}$ and play a third club, and lose just one trick in each minor.

## Convention card reminder

- Each player must have an ACBL convention card filled out and on the table. Please note that other types of convention cards, such as the WBF convention card or homemade cards that do not sufficiently resemble the ACBL convention card, are not acceptable substitutes.
- Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6-board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.
