## Defenses to 1NT



Ask a group of experts about their favorite methods of competing when an opponent opens a strong 1NT (15-17), and you will receive a variety of answers. The Daily Bulletin will feature one method each day during the NABC.
Today's expert is Brian Glubok.
Note: Players should be aware that several of the systems described in this series use Mid-Chart conventions and are not permitted in events that are restricted to the General Convention Chart. The director in charge can provide the information you need.

The philosophy behind competitive bidding in tournament bridge has changed a great deal since the Seventies, particularly over the opponents' strong 1NT opening. Thirty years ago, you competed if you had safety and thought there was a chance for game.

Nowadays, you compete to make life more difficult for the opponents. Conventions such as DONT, Woolsey and others described in this series illustrate this sea change.

This article presents a method that allows you to compete over the opponents' 1NT opening in a maximum number of situations, with a maximum number of hand types.

For simplicity and ease of memorization, I recommend you use the same method in direct and balancing position, and at matchpoints, IMPs and board-a-match teams.

This method is not suitable against weak 1 NT openings, for it relies upon an artificial double:
> $\mathrm{Dbl}=\quad$ at least two suits (four or more), fewer than three clubs
> $2 \boldsymbol{2}=$ at least two suits, at least one major, at least three clubs
> $2 \bullet / \bullet / \uparrow=$ natural
> $2 \mathrm{NT}=$ minors

Advancer bids as follows:
After double (two suits, fewer than three clubs):
$2 \boldsymbol{*}=$ please bid your cheapest suit
$2 \bullet / 2 \boldsymbol{*} / 2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}=$ natural, prepared to play there even if the suit named doesn't match either of yours.

After 2a: (two suits, at least one major, at least three clubs):
$2 \star$ : partner, please bid your cheapest (possibly only) major.
$2 \boldsymbol{v} / 2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}=$ natural, prepared to play there even if this is not one of your suits.

General notes. This method will not always get you to your longest fit (sometimes advancer will pass $2 *$ with four when there is a longer fit elsewhere) but it will allow you to compete in a maximum number of situations. This method is particularly useful in the balancing position, and when either team is not vulnerable. While the method does not need to change with the form of scoring or vulnerability, the degree of aggression may vary with these conditions.

2NT is always forcing. We cannot play in 2NT

## Vanderbilt moves into round of 16

Most high seeds survived the third day of play in the Vanderbilt Knockout Teams as the event moves into the round of 16 today.

The highest seed to leave the event was No. 8, captained by Richard Schwartz. His team was pummeled 163-85 by the squad led by Piotr Tuszinski. Also going down was No. 11, Steve Robinson, ousted by the Bill Cole squad 167-113. The original No. 73 seed, captained by Jason

Feldman, won again, ousting the Tony Kasday team 142-114.

Some high seeds had close calls on Tuesday. No. 2 George Jacobs trailed by 19 going into the final quarter of their match with Doug Simson's squad. Jacobs rallied to win 106-79. No. 4 Lou Ann O'Rourke trailed Mel Colchamiro 122-103 with a set to go, but came back to win 156-144.

## Top ABA player hunts Grand title



Chester Johnson, the No. 1 masterpoint holder in the American Bridge Association, is on a mission. Having earned more than 36,700 ABA points over the course of his bridge-playing career, which began in 1968, Johnson is setting his sights on a different goal - to win a North American Bridge Championship.

The American Bridge Association was founded in the Thirties as an organization for African-American players. At the time, the ACBL was racially segregated like most other membership organizations of that period. Decades later, however, when the ACBL finally allowed black players to participate, the ABA continued its mission to serve black bridge enthusiasts.

In recent efforts to combine the missions of the two groups, the ACBL recognized the masterpoint system of the ABA, allowing their players to "convert" their masterpoints to ACBL masterpoints, though not on a one-to-one basis. Johnson has more than 13,000 ACBL points under this system.

Retired as a supervisor for the Ford Motor Company after 41 years of service, Johnson is in

## 49er Pairs kicks off today

The National 49er Pairs begins today as players compete for masterpoints and the Fifth Chair Trophy. Overall winners will receive gold points.

The National 49er Pairs is a two-session event limited to players with 0-50 masterpoints. Sessions begin at 1 and 7:30 p.m. Entries are $\$ 16.50$ per player per session.

Masterpoint awards are red - except overall awards, which are paid at $95 \%$ red and $5 \%$ gold.

The first National 49er Pairs was held in 1998. Winners names are added to the Fifth Chair Trophy. The Fifth Chair Foundation is an international non-profit organization dedicated to promoting bridge on the Internet and attracting

his sixth year of retirement and uses his free time to play extensively.
"I spend a lot of time at the game. I play four to five times a week, and I travel quite a bit. I play in both ABA and ACBL tournaments," he said.

He has established partnerships with ABA and ACBL players including Herbert Taylor, Harold Bickham, Jean Randall, Harriette Buckman, Roger Lord and Harold Singleton.

Johnson recently eclipsed Robert Price as the ABA masterpoint king. Price held the title for more than 25 years. But masterpoints aren't the motivating factor for Johnson at this stage of his career. Rather, it's the lure of the Grand Life Master title, one that requires not only that a player earn 10,000 masterpoints - which Johnson has already accomplished - but that he also wins an non-masterpoint restricted North American championship.
"I've won more than 40 of the ABA national knockout titles, but I want to win one of the ACBL events now," he said.

Musing on the future of the ABA and the ACBL, Johnson believes the two organizations should merge.
"They should join up," he says. "You come to a tournament like this one and you see people from all over the world playing together. It's great. There are players from all these different countries, and they're all moving together. So should we."

## Defenders leading in Mixed Pairs

Karen Walker and Tom Kniest, defending champions in the Rockwell Mixed Pairs, took a lead of 18.74 matchpoints ( 25 top) heading into the event's final two sessions today.

Walker, of Champaign IL, and Kniest of University City MO, compiled 309.56 matchpoints in the two qualifying sessions, leading Peggy and John Sutherlin of Dallas, followed by about half a board by Jane and Bob Teel of Birmingham AL.

The auction was distinguished by its brevity and elegance. East had given some little thought to his two passes, so it was likely that there were breakers ahead in the side-suit splits.

The opening lead was the $\downarrow 7$ to the 8 , king and ace. If trumps were $2-1$, life would be easy, so I had to assume they would be 3-0.

When I led a trump to dummy and East discarded, what possible shape could he hold? By far, the most likely was $5=2=0=6$, but $5=3=0=5$ was also possible. East was not expected to have four hearts. West would have bid spades at the one level or at a higher level preemptively.

The line of play that protects against both distributions is to cash a second heart, draw trumps and pitch the two losing hearts on the $\because \mathrm{A}$ and $\curvearrowleft \mathrm{K}$. Now you ruff a heart to hand and ruff a spade to dummy, discarding your losing spades on the club and heart winners.

## Strategy at teams and at pairs <br> By Mark Ehret

Most of us got our start in duplicate bridge at the local club game. Our love affair with bridge soon took over and we just couldn't get enough. Most local club games don't offer a lot of opportunity, however, to play team games. When we hit the tournament trail, many of the events are Swiss teams or knockouts, and the strategies learned at the duplicate table aren't the same.

First, pairs games are scored by matchpoints, which come from comparing your results with the results achieved by every other pair who played the same deals. In teams, your comparison is with the other table only. The scoring method is called International Matchpoints - IMPs for short.

Bidding vulnerable games at teams is critical. If you fail to bid a game that is bid and made at the other table, you lose 10 IMPs when your side is vulnerable. If you bid game and go down when they stopped in a partial at the other table, you lose 6 IMPs. That's 10-6 in favor of bidding a vulnerable game. If a game has even a $40 \%$ chance of making, go for it.

When your side is not vulnerable, however, you lose only 6 IMPs for failing to bid a making game, losing 5 IMPs if you bid game and go down when they make a partial at the other table. That means your non-vulnerable game should have at least a $50 \%$ chance of making.

Competing for the part scores at teams is not as aggressive as at pair games. At pairs, some players will never let their opponents play at the two level (unless it's a doubled contract).

In team games, the goal is to go plus. Plus 50 versus minus 110 costs only 2 IMPs. Plus 100 versus minus110 is a wash. At pairs, doubling a close part score for a plus 200 can get you a top. In a team game, doubling the opponents into

Play commentary: South wins the second
game is one of the most dangerous things you can do. You gain only 3 IMPs if you change plus 100 to pluys 200, but you lose 11 IMPs or more if the contract is made. It's a good policy not to double a part score at IMPs unless you can expect a two-trick set (that usually means you have a really good holding in their trump suit).

What about sacrifices at team games? Well, minus 500 versus minus 620 will gain your side only 3 IMPs, while at a pair game it could be a very good score. Doubling the final game contract occurs more frequently at IMPs.

It is reasonable at both forms of scoring to bid slams that have a $50 \%$ chance of
making. At teams, it can help to know whether the players in your seats at the other table are aggressive or conservative. You should not bid a grand slam at either form of scoring unless you can count 13 tricks.

Declarer play and defense at teams is also somewhat different than at pairs. Going after a risky overtrick can get you a top in a pairs event, and if you are in a normal contract, go for it.

That extra IMP you might gain at teams for an overtrick is not worth going for unless it is absolutely safe. Just make your contract. Safety plays (playing for a bad break) are correct procedure at teams. They can be the correct play at pairs if you are in a great contract that most other pairs won't reach.

Overtricks generally are not crucial at team games, so try to beat the opponents' contract even if it may give them an overtrick. At pairs, of
club with the king (not the queen - please!) and realizes (or should realize) that East is probably now void in clubs. If a spade is led and West has the ace, West can give East a club ruff. The $\downarrow$ A would then be the setting trick. If East has the $\wedge$ A, West may have the A. If so, East will lead over to the A to secure a club ruff. It is also possible that West is the one who is short in clubs. No matter. South is threatened with a club ruff and can put a stop to all this nonsense by playing the $\star \mathrm{A}$ and $\diamond \mathrm{K}$ and discarding the $\star \mathrm{Q}-$
course, that overtrick can be the difference between a top and an average.

In a team game, do not put yourself in a position to go for a "phone number." If you make a super-aggressive preempt and go down 1700, that result can cost you the match. Save your flights of fancy for matchpoints, where one bad board won't cost that much.

Worrying about what is happening at the other table doesn't do much good either. If you think your team is behind in a match, don't overreach trying to get back to even. I once bid a grand slam off a king because I thought we were behind in a match. Well, guess what: They didn't even bid the small slam at the other table, and we lost because we went down in the grand slam at our table.

Finally, don't forget your Swiss team prayer: Don't let it be my fault.
a winner that has become an albatross - before starting on trumps. Simple enough, but South has to see it.

Whenever a suit is led and continued (clubs in this case), declarer usually gets a fairly accurate reading of the distribution. If declarer is threatened with a defensive ruff, one technique to avoid the ruff is to discard a winner in the threatening suit before drawing trumps. It only hurts for a little while.

when they have bid 1NT. Doubles of their artificial bids show that suit. Doubles of their natural bids are for takeout.

As Larry Cohen emphasized in his articles on DONT (Disturb Opponents No Trump), the emphasis is not on getting to game, but on getting in the bidding, competing at the two level, and taking the opponents out of their comfort zone.

While the opponents may occasionally double you and collect a large penalty, it is both difficult and risky for the opponents to double you at the two or three level. If the cards lie well, or you have extreme distribution, you will make your doubled partscore. This will more than
compensate for the occasional penalty you will suffer.

Most important, using this convention will make you a more difficult opponent and will be fun for you and your partner. What could be better than that?

## The tough get going <br> By Barry Rigal

On this deal from the Vanderbilt Knockout
Teams, Kyle Larsen was faced with a tough defensive problem - partly because the "normal" play looks obvious and the winning play is counterintuitive.

Larsen sat East and defended $4 \vee$

Rose Meltzer (West) led the $\uparrow 4$ (fourth best). It looks natural to try to win the $\because \mathrm{A}$ and then attempt to cash three spade tricks. Larsen looked a little deeper. He realized that with only 21 highcard points out that the most likely shape for declarer was $4=6=1=2$ with good hearts and a top spade. Meltzer, Larsen figured, was $3=1=5=4$.

For South to bid $4 \vee$, he was surely a favorite to hold the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} \mathrm{A}$ instead of the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} \mathrm{K}$. If Larsen won the $\because \mathrm{A}$ and did not cash the second club, it would go away on the $\bullet$ A after a successful finesse of the queen. If he won the $\& A$ and played another club, declarer would discard two spades on the good $\because \mathrm{Q}$ and the high diamond.

So Larsen put in the $\boldsymbol{\bullet} 10$, which won. He then cashed the $\& \mathrm{~A}$ and the defense eventually got two spade tricks.

## Hero worship

In 1966, my sister and then new brother-inlaw gave me a subscription to The Bridge World for my birthday. Therein I read avidly of the exploits of Eddie Kantar and Marshall Miles, and hoped someday to achieve their level of success and recognition. Eddie would frequently write about a new convention he imposed on Marshall and the mayhem that followed when they failed to discuss follow-ups.

Well, I can at least match their success, as proved by this deal from an Internet team game (spots approximate):

## Result: minus 800

Note how, just as Kantar and Miles used to do, we achieved an auction epitomizing the partnership aspects of bridge. In fact, we surpassed my heroes - as we reached the apotheosis, we were clearly on the same wavelength more and more, practically a mind meld. Not bad for an obscure seven-round sequence in an inexperienced partnership - and we did win the match

Please do not be misled. I have had other successes of this nature, but usually aided by partnership discussion. For example, playing once (and only) with a likeable young professional player, I was asked if I would play Exclusion Blackwood. I agreed, specifying one condition: never in opener's first suit.

Leading a Swiss teams after three rounds (our teammates were really good), I picked up ^65 Q 7543 -KQ7632 *-

Of course, the $5 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ and $6 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ bids showed,
according to partner, one ace and one king outside diamonds. After we compared scores (we were no longer leading), my teammate, Geoff Hampson, asked how we went for a number on the board, and I recounted the sordid details.

Geoff shook his head sadly and said, "That must be the worst auction in the history of bridge."

I immediately responded, "That wasn't even the worst auction in this match!"

He leaped out of his chair, practically screaming, "Impossible!"

I then told him about another deal later in the match. He blinked, sat down, ashen-faced, and muttered almost inaudibly, "My God, you're right."

With my place in bridge history thus firmly cemented, I offer this additional exemplar of success in emulation of my idols, also from a Swiss teams, where I was playing with a different partner every match (five-person team). Spots are approximate.

We also won this event. So success has proved easy, once I mastered the Kantar-Miles approach. Recognition has thus far eluded me, but with these results I can't be too far from the second part of my goal.

By the way, the last deal shows that - 20 years ago, anyway - I was not yet a "true bridge player," according to no less an authority than Bob Hamman.

Playing rubber bridge in the halcyon days of his youth, Hamman dealt and found himself looking at a 9-point hand with seven spades to the king and six clubs to the ace-queen. Both sides were vulnerable.

Hamman tried $1 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$, and it went $2 \boldsymbol{v}$ - Pass $-3 \boldsymbol{v}$ back to him. He tried $4 \boldsymbol{\oplus}$, and it went $4 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$ - Pass Pass. Now he offered 4^, and it went Dbl - 5 Dbl. He "slid" with 5 to emphasize his willingness to play clubs, and it went Dbl - Pass Pass.

Hamman observed, "The technically correct call is redouble, but at rubber bridge, opposite a partner who bid $5 \star$, a 'real bridge player' has to recognize that it is no longer a question of finding the optimal contract but simply one of being able to wear your pants and shoes as you exit the club."

So Bob bid $5 \boldsymbol{A}$, "which was by no means a success - except in comparison with 5 redoubled."

Another hero for my pantheon!

Facts: The table result was 3NT making three for E-W plus 400 after the opening lead of the -10. The director was called when dummy's hand was tabled. N-S timed the first BIT as being 10
seconds after they noticed a pause. E-W did not think it was that long. There was agreement that the second BIT was longer than the first.

Director's Ruling: The BIT demonstrably suggested that $2 \vee$ not be passed. Pass was considered a logical alternative (LA). Therefore, in accordance with Laws 16.A and 12.C.2, the score was adjusted to the result of $2 \downarrow$ doubled by West, down one and N-S plus 100.

The Appeal: West stated that he felt that North's double of $2 \boldsymbol{v}$ was very fast and that his bid of $2 \downarrow$ was bad. E-W agreed that East hesitated prior to passing over the double of $2 \boldsymbol{\vee}$. West felt he was bidding $3 \star$ as soon as North doubled and ignored the BIT by East.

The Decision: The committee found that the BIT suggested action rather than pass. In fact, West even told the committee that he knew that his partner had heart shortness when he hesitated.

The committee considered the authorized information that North, allegedly, doubled rapidly. The evidence for such undue speed was not so clear that West's obligations (to carefully avoid taking any advantage that might accrue to his side from his partner's BIT - Law 73.C) were reduced in any way. The committee decided that West had not fulfilled those obligations. Therefore, an adjustment had to be considered.

After considering the play of $2 v$ doubled, the committee decided that most lines of play would result in the contract failing by one trick. Accordingly, the committee so adjusted the result.

Players in unlimited nationally rated events are expected to know of and adhere closely to the standards imposed by law. The committee found that this was a clear case of failure to comply to legal standards. The E-W pair should not have appealed the table director's ruling. Therefore, an appeal without merit warning (AWMW) was issued to E-W.

## Bid Box Alerts and Announcements

When using bid boxes, ACBL suggests that players tap the Alert strip and say "Alert" at the same time.

When making an Announcement, use the Announcement word - such as "transfer" - and tap the Alert strip at the same time.

A player who Alerts or Announces a bid should make sure his opponents are aware that an Alert or Announcement has been made.

## Convention card reminder

- Each player must have an ACBL convention card filled out and on the table. Please note that other types of convention cards, such as the WBF convention card or homemade cards that do not sufficiently resemble the ACBL convention card, are not acceptable substitutes.
- Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

> If a director
determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play
 only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a $1 / 6$-board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

## St. Louis NABC -

A look back
This is the third in a series of articles that look back at previous St. Louis NABCs. Here is another interesting deal from those past tournaments.

## Eight is enough

On some deals, declarer or defender is on the lookout for a certain card. That was the case on this deal from the first qualifying session of the Stratified Open Pairs, played by Barry Rigal and Beverly Perry.


When $4 \boldsymbol{a}$ is doubled, it is easy enough to predict that trumps are not going to split favorably. On the lead of the $\diamond K$, it is necessary to play low from dummy and ruff instead of playing the ace, so as to leave the ace as an entry to dummy, and to start reducing trumps to the same length as East.

Rigal led the $\wedge \mathrm{A}$ and the sight of the $\wedge 8$ was a delicious one. Next Rigal played the $\uparrow$ Q. East won and switched to the $\downarrow$. The second stroke of luck for Rigal is that West was unable to read the position in hearts and won the ace immediately, instead of ducking.

West returned the $\downarrow \mathrm{J}$ and Rigal won the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$, unblocking the 10 from his hand. He ruffed another diamond and exited with the $\approx \mathrm{K}$, ducked by East. Another club put East on lead in this position:


Rigal was now able to run clubs, remaining in dummy for trick 11 and the trump coup.
