## Larry Cohen: missing and missed



For the first time since the Seventies, an NABC is in progress without one of the most well known and popular players.

Despite having a shot at his second Player of the Year award (he won it in 2002), Larry Cohen is at home in Boca Raton FL preparing to run the first ACBL Regional at Sea, starting on Sunday on Royal Caribbean's Liberty of the Seas.
"It's a little weird," he said in a telephone interview from Boca Raton, "but I'm not totally away from the tournament. I've been reading the Daily Bulletins online."

Cohen's last NABC was supposed to be Houston in the spring, but he was called in as a last-minute replacement for Geir Helgemo on the Rose Meltzer squad in the Spingold Knockout Teams at the summer tournament in Washington DC (his team lost in the final).

Cohen had been talking about dropping out of high-level bridge play for about five years, but didn't want to leave regular partner David Berkowitz in the lurch.

Berkowitz, now playing regularly with Alan Sontag, joked, "I've driven Larry from the Blue Ribbon Pairs to the golf course.'

More seriously, Berkowitz said playing without Cohen for the first time in many years
"is different," but that he is enjoying his new partnership. "Alan doesn't understand my carding," Berkowitz said, "and I don't understand his bidding. Otherwise, we're doing fine."

Besides keeping in touch with bridge through the Internet and with his regular contribution to the Bridge Bulletin - Cohen writes the monthly Real Deal column - he is involved through teaching and other writing.

Although he has been one of the most talented and successful players in ACBL history - with former partner Marty Bergen and with Berkowitz Cohen gradually found the grind of high-level play taking away from his enjoyment of bridge.
"I found that it was not fun to sit down and knock brains with the best," he said. At the NABCs, he said, he didn't eat well and had trouble sleeping. "I was constantly thinking about the hands."

At this point, he said, "I love teaching and writing more than playing. Bridge is better for me at the level I teach."

Although justifiably proud of his 26 North American championships, Cohen said more isn't necessarily better: "It's not going to change my life when I die if I have 36 wins instead of 26 ."

Instead of pursuing platinum points and playing for sponsors, Cohen will be teaching and doing six cruises next year, including three sectionals at sea, "and I love giving daily lessons." He and Bergen will have a "reunion" seminar in Las Vegas next June

Cohen's wife, Maria, approves of the schedule that has him home more often.

So, was board 64 of the Spingold final his last at an NABC? Well, said Cohen, "Ever heard of Brett Favre?"

> Bramley, Fallenius capture Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs

Playing for only the second time, Bart Bramley and Bjorn Fallenius won their second major pairs event, this time the Edgar Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs. The only other time they played together, they won the six-session von Zedtwitz Life Master Pairs at the 2006 Summer NABC in Chicago.

Lying 12th after Wednesday's two semifinal sessions in the Blue Ribbon, they put together two strong games in the afternoon and evening on Thursday to win by 9.67 matchpoints ( 38 top). Second place went to John Hurd and Joel Wooldridge.

With the victory, Bramley now has 13 North American championships to his credit, Fallenius 11

They didn't make the date to play until Bramley arrived at the tournament without a partner and found out through Fallenius' wife, Kathy, that her husband was free for the pairs game
"I didn't bring my Bjorn convention card," said Bramley, "and Bjorn always says any two good players should be able to fill one out in 15 minutes. We started at 11:30 on Tuesday."

Neither player could predict when they might play again, although Fallenius indicated he might not want to tempt fate after going two for two. He did allow though, "They say three times is the charm, so I guess we'll try a third time."

## Meckstroth leading <br> In Player of the Year

After earning nearly 90 platinum masterpoints for finishing fourth in the Edgar Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs, Jeff Meckstroth has taken the lead in the Player of the Year race.

Meckstroth, playing with Eric Rodwell in the Blue Ribbon, added 87.69 points to his total for the Fall NABC and, heading into play in the Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams, now has 177.66 for the tournament and 615.76 for the year.

In second with 564.88 points is John Hurd of New York City.

The Player of the Year is the ACBL member who earns the most platinum points in a calendar year. Meckstroth has won the competition twice and has locked up the Player of the Decade award for the second time.

With a payout for first place of 200 masterpoints, the Reisinger will have a major influence on the outcome of the Player of the Year race. The Nick Nickell team, which includes Meckstroth, won the event last year in Boston.

 2006 and the Bean Red Ribbon Pairs in 2004. He was second in the NABC+ Swiss Teams in 2005.

## Airport and rail transportation for \$5 By AI Schuster, Transportation Chair

It is easy to get to the San Diego Airport or the Amtrak train depot via public transportation. Walk across Harbor Drive and catch a north-bound trolley (Gillespie Field destination) to the next stop (America Plaza). Get off and walk back to the street the trolley just crossed (Broadway). The bus stop on the corner is the Airport Shuttle (Route 992). Take the bus for a 10 -minute drive to the airport. The shuttle stops at both airport terminals, so tell the driver which airline you are flying. The time, including waiting, is about 20 minutes

Ticketing for the trip is simple. At the trolley stop opposite the Hyatt, you will see a ticket machine which accepts cash , credit cards or debit cards. Purchase a one-day pass for $\$ 5$ and show it to the trolley police, if asked, and the shuttle drivers.

If you are using Amtrak or the COASTER, the directions are the same except you cross the tracks at America Plaza and board a Blue Line (Old Town destination) and ride one stop to the Santa Fe Depot. If you feel adventurous, walk across Kettner Boulevard to the Santa Fe Depot in lieu of using the trolley to Old Town. The time including waiting is about 10 minutes.

Fortunately for his side, he got it right. Demirev was playing with Ralph Katz - and they needed some good results at that point.

Katz led his singleton club, and this was Demirev's thinking:
"We needed to crawl up from the bottom and even though the double was a pushy, we needed all the matchpoints we could collect.
"The sight of dummy was depressing. Once doubled, we had to beat to contract at any cost. If partner had AKJ 108 2, there was not much hope for the defense.
"Declarer would be $7=0=2=4$ or $7=0=3=3$. Inserting the 9 , there will be two club tricks and one or two diamonds. With three diamonds, declarer could duck twice to me.
"Declarer can also be $8=1=0=4$, so I saw my only chance - that partner had opened on a fivecard suit to the A-K and I could convince him to underlead his honors.
"Ralph was up to the task. I won the $\because \mathrm{A}$, returned the $₫ \mathrm{~J}$ for the ruff, and the 8 was returned to my queen for a second club ruff.
"Our defense would not have worked if declarer's shape had been $7=1=2=3$, but that would give partner $3=5=3=2$, which is nearly impossibly given the $2 v$ opening and the opening lead."

## JUST FOR NEW PLAYERS

Dear New Players:
The first time I ever went to a bridge club, there was a notice on their bulletin board: "Swiss Teams Friday Night." Being new and not knowing anyone, I was desperate to break the ice, so I asked, "How long are the Swiss going to be in town?" And then people wonder why I never get embarrassed anymore. People still talk

## about that one.

Have you ever played in a Swiss teams? How about knockouts? If not, it's time. The schedule is full of them because they are so much fun to play and everyone usually gets some masterpoints! I have actually taught caddies to play bridge in the afternoon and they got masterpoints in that evening's Midnight Swiss, after their work was completed. So, if you have never played, now is your chance.

The first thing you will need is another pair to play with. Swiss teams and knockouts are teams of four players, two playing North-South at one table and two East-West at another. After you play your boards, your teammates will return to your table and compare results with you. Both pairs will have played the same hands in different directions and you hope the slam you bid and made at your table was set by your teammates at the other when they cashed their two aces. (Don't ask why we got to a slam off two aces, and then made it. It's just too unbelievable.)

You don't have to know anything but how to play bridge to play in a team match. In Swiss teams, if you lose the first match, you will be matched up with some other losers and have a better shot at beating them. If you lose again, you are matched up against even bigger losers, etc. etc. Finally they will call in some caddies and a busboy! Now, here's the good part: every time you win a match, you get masterpoints! Zowie!

Knockouts are a little different in that if you lose your first round, you are knocked out.

I know, I know. You are wondering where you can get two teammates and if you have the courage to do so. I have some advice about that for you also. When you are playing in your pairs game, and some pair beats you badly, ask them if they would care to play in the Midnight Swiss or
tomorrow's Swiss teams with you. This is after telling them how wonderful they are, of course. This solves two problems: you will not have to play against them again, and you have tried and true teammates. Even if they can't play when you ask them, they will remember you and are likely to keep you on their short list.

That brings up another point I touched on the other day: being nice to your opponents. This is very important for three reasons.

1) If your opponents like you, they are more likely to play "soft" against you; if they dislike you, they may make unreasonable bids that bollix you and actually pay attention to their partners' cards!
2) If your opponents leave your table happy and confident, they will be more formidable when they play the other pairs sitting in your direction. Those are your real opponents, the ones whose scores yours are being compared against. Right? Notice the word "confident." Make sure you praise their play
 and commiserate with their mistakes. Be a nice guy.
3) If your opponents like you, they will play in the Swiss Teams with you and you will both get bundles of masterpoints.

The partnership desk: Some people dread the partnership desk because they feel they are putting themselves on the auction block. Well, you are! But you know what, especially at NABCs, where there are lots of single players and pairs, you have a great choice to pick from. If you don't like the looks or demeanor of someone, ask them a few questions and then say you think your styles

and $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ is forcing. $3 \star$ was being used a "double negative" after a $2 \boldsymbol{\vee}$ or $2 \boldsymbol{\sim}$ rebid by the opener denying as much as an ace, a king or two queens. Knowing what is opposite, East bids $4 \boldsymbol{a}$ looking at close to 10 tricks. No matter how you and partner play, you have to have a way to show a bust hand facing a $2 *$ opener.

Defensive commentary: East plays the $\downarrow$ at trick one to show partner the king.

Play commentary: The title of this hand should be "resisting temptation." There is a strong temptation to cross to the $\uparrow 9$ and take a heart finesse. However, it is a very risky play as you have 10 sure tricks no matter who has the $\vee K$ ! Count tricks! You have six top spades and three aces for nine. If you can ruff a heart in dummy with the $\uparrow 9$, that makes 10 . Do it. Win the $A$ and play the $\boldsymbol{A}$ and another heart. No matter what the opponents do, you are in great shape. Just keep that $\boldsymbol{\wedge} 9$ over there. When next on lead, concede a second heart and then, finally, ruff your $\cup \mathrm{Q}$ with the $\uparrow 9$, your 10 th trick. Notice that if you take the heart finesse it loses (what else is new?) and you will not be able to ruff your fourth heart in dummy, East will overruff.

are different and go back to the desk. No problem. Listen, folks. I know marriages that have occurred thanks to the partnership desk. I also know of many matches that brought really good results in the game. Do it.

So what is the bottom line here? Be nice and you will be happy! That rule works in Real Life and in our Alternative Universe.

So enjoy those new teammates, and let me know how it worked out. mronemus@comcast.net

> As declarer, when you have a 4-3 side suit (hearts) with a high trump in dummy, consider ruffing that fourth card with a high trump in case the suit does not break 3-3.

## The Knowledge <br> By Mark Horton

All licensed London taxi drivers need to pass a special test before they can drive one of the Capital's famous black cabs. This test is called The Knowledge. They have to learn 320 routes and need to know all the landmarks and places of interest along them. Doing the Knowledge makes your brain bigger, says research by the Wellcome Department of Imaging Neuroscience. Researchers scanned the brains of 16 London taxi drivers who had spent an average of two years learning The Knowledge. They found the cabbies had a larger hippocampus an area associated with memory - than control subjects.

Bridge players are (undoubtedly to their detriment) not required to pass any tests before they play the game, but if they were the strategy required on the deal I am going to tell you about would be sure to be included.

I'll start with a problem:

## Short and sweet

On this deal from the first qualifying session of the Edgar Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs, John and Peggy Sutherlin had probably the shortest auction to the top spot.

Peggy reasonably decided that she rated to be facing no spade honors or John would have explored for notrump. With no fit in either red suit, his actual hand type was the most likely hand. If $4 *$ had been a key card ask, the might have been an option, but as it wasn't, she settled for what she thought John could make!

West cashed the $\uparrow \mathrm{A}$ and switched to the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$, followed by the $\wedge \mathrm{Q}$. When that was allowed to hold, declarer was able to discard his losing spades on dummy's diamonds, Plus 620.

The play followed an identical course, but here East overtook West's $\uparrow \mathrm{Q}$ with the ace and returned a spade for West to ruff, one down, plus 100 .

How did East know he had to overtake? The clue was simple, with $\uparrow K \mathrm{Qx}$, West would have played his low spade at trick two (or perhaps even have led it at trick one, as it was clear the defenders needed to take three spade tricks).

So, what did you decide to do on my problem hand?

The full deal looked like this:

As you can see, the winning defense is to overtake the $\curvearrowleft \mathrm{Q}$ and give partner a ruff.

How could West tell? (At the table West failed to come up with the right answer.)

If his bridge knowledge had included the precedent of the Garozzo-Forquet example (and assuming his partner knew it too) he would have known that with $\cdot \mathrm{A} \mathrm{Q} x$, his partner would have played the low card at trick two, or in this case more accurately started with a low one in case West had started life with $\boldsymbol{*} \mathrm{K}$ x.

## Good recovery

England's David Kendrick was the hero of this deal from the first semifinal session of the Edgar Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs, while a well-known international player will remain anonymous as he has agreed to my terms not to be named for his misdefense.

We play four-card majors, and 3NT was a highcard raise to at least game.

East led the $\uparrow 7$, third and fifth, round to the jack. Kendrick started with a hack into the rough when, not reading the lead as from such length, he cashed the A then ran the 10 to West's queen. Back came a third heart, East pitching a spade, and the contract was in some jeopardy.

Kendrick tried the psychological play of a low club off the dummy and, after some thought, West got it right and played low. East won the $\boldsymbol{\star} 10$ and switched to the 9 for the king and ace, and West returned a low club to the queen and ace.

It doesn't look too promising for declarer from here, does it, but Kendrick found the way home. He cashed the top spades and threw dummy's low diamond, then ruffed the last spade. West was on the receiving end of a ruffing squeeze. If he threw a club, declarer would ruff a club and the $\uparrow \mathrm{Q}$ would be the entry to cash the $\boldsymbol{\pi} \mathrm{J}$. So he instead threw his last low diamond. Kendrick cashed the $\bullet$ Q, dropping the jack, ruffed a club and cashed the $\uparrow 10$ for his contract.

Very well recovered, but West fell from grace when he won the first diamond. Simply duck that trick and the defense is in control.

Solodar expected a club ruff, hence his conversion to 6NT. Lewis now knew her partner had to have been looking for a grand slam, so she converted to $7 \boldsymbol{v}$.

Solodar congratulated East on his double of $5 \%$ - he had thought there would be a club ruff against hearts. Note that 7 NT is not without play. It takes a diamond lead to break up the minor-suit squeeze against West.

## Bid Box Alerts and Announcements

When using bid boxes, ACBL requires that players tap the Alert strip and say "Alert" at the same time.

When making an Announcement, use the Announcement word (such as "transfer") and tap the Alert strip at the same time.

A player who Alerts or Announces a bid must make sure his opponents are aware that an Alert or Announcement has been made.

The defenders lead the $\$ 8$, and you elect to win and run the J , losing to the king. South returns his other diamond, overtaken by North to continue the suit. East ruffs high and South pitches an encouraging heart. Now if declarer gets the ending right, he can get home by taking both top hearts and running the $\boldsymbol{2} 10$. North can win and cash his second club (East unblocking the 9), but then must play a spade or a diamond, and declarer can get to dummy for the spade finesse or pitch his heart loser on the fourth club.

Of course, the defenders could have done better. The easiest way is for North to let the $\downarrow 7$ hold.

Be careful what you wish for. You may not be happy when you get it. On this deal from the first session of the Sunday-Monday Bracketed KO, a defender was focused on promoting a second trump trick. Declarer was more focused on making his contract and was only happy to oblige.

The opening lead of the Q was taken in dummy. The Q won trick two, West ducking. The $\boldsymbol{\mathrm { J }}$ was ducked around to West, who won and continued clubs, hoping to promote a second trump trick by forcing dummy. Declarer won in hand, discarding a heart from dummy and took the successful diamond finesse.

Declarer then overtook the $\$ 10$ with the ace, promoting West's 9 to a winner. Repeating the diamond finesse, he was able to discard his losing hearts. West got his second trump trick, but that was all for the defense. A heart shift by West leaves declarer with impossible entry problems and an impossible contract.

## Duplicate bridge with partials . . . or bringing rubber bridge to duplicate By Bruce Altshuler

Like many bridge players of my baby boomer generation, I learned bridge first through rubber bridge. After I was introduced to duplicate bridge, I was intrigued by the elimination of the luck of the cards and the ability to measure bridge ability by comparing results with other players. In rubber bridge, a winner is often determined solely on one side's rush of good cards in the short term.

Yet, rubber bridge had its own skill levels lost in a
 duplicate match - the ability to cope with partials, to push the opponents too high when they have a partial, and to learn to bid with partials, an art lost in a duplicate forum. Zia Mahmood, Bob Hamman and Grant Baze, among others, are known for their mastery of rubber bridge. The legendary Meyer Schleifer was elected to the Bridge Hall of Fame primarily on his success at rubber bridge.

In duplicate, scoring partials has been resolved by adding 50 to the partial score. In rubber bridge, a partial of $2 \uparrow$ making exactly 2 scores 60 below the line. In duplicate bridge, adding the extra 50 gives the pair 110. In rubber bridge, the partial is carried over from deal to deal. In duplicate, it seems impossible to use partials - or is it?

Why not combine duplicate bridge with the best features of rubber bridge while keeping the familiar duplicate format?

About seven years ago, bridge expert Danny Kleinman suggested to me that if one were to preassign partials to pre-selected boards uniformly throughout the duplicate field (either in MPs or IMPs), one can make duplicate compatible with partials. In fact, Kleinman's concept is so simple, I wondered why partials were not made part of duplicate bridge from the beginning of contract bridge.

My research reflects that the omission of partials to duplicate scoring was an accident of design and existing practice, and not by any forethought.

It appears that the earliest form of duplicate was invented in 1857 by the legendary English Whist maven, Henry Jones (better known by his nickname of "Cavendish"), but the form of the game was Whist, a forerunner of bridge and the most popular card game in Britain through the 19th Century.

In 1891, the Kalamazoo Tray made by the US Card Playing Co. was devised in duplicate whist and was a forerunner to our modem duplicate boards.

By the time auction and, later, contract bridge became popular, duplicating hands for whist tournaments was already a well-established concept and the boards were easily modified for duplicate bridge in the early Thirties when contract bridge tournaments became increasingly popular.

I suspect that the use of partials for duplicate was deemed impractical because partials did not fit into the design of existing duplicate Whist boards, and the impossibility of any carryover of partials and the need to specify vulnerability on each board. Partials were eliminated from tournament bridge events by a scoring adjustment of assigning 50 points for each partial bid and made. The 50 -point part-score bonus on each partial does not exist at rubber bridge.

With the use of a simple label affixed to pre-
assigned boards varied partials can be assigned either to North-South or to East-West or to both directions applicable to a third of the duplicate boards. The scoring of matchpoints and IMPs would remain exactly the same. Unlike rubber bridge, any made partial on one hand, would not carryover to the next hand.

The use of scoring honors in rubber bridge need not be included and the assignment of 50 for making a partial is no longer added to hands making a partial. However, because two-thirds of the hands in a "partials" event will have no partials at all, we can continue to add 50 for a made partial on boards without partials as before.

Thus, if East-West are assigned a 30 partial and bid and make INT, they score 40 only, not 90 . If the North-South pair without a partial bids and scores INT, they would also be assigned a score of 40 . If the deal is without a partial, a pair would continue to score their partial with the 50 -point bonus, for the familiar score of 90 for bidding and making exactly 1 NT .

If East-West have a 60 partial vulnerable, and bid $2 \uparrow$ making three, instead of scoring 140 ( 90 plus 50 ), the pair converts their partial into a game by scoring more than 100 , and score $590-500$ for the vulnerable game, and 90 for the partial. Nonvulnerable games score 300 plus the partials. Once players adjust, scoring with partials is simple.

Any combination of partials more than 100 makes game. Thus, if the North-South pair starts with a partial of 30 , they would have to bid 2NT, three of a major, or four of a minor ( 30 plus 80 ) to convert the 30 into a game of 100 or more. If a pair has an 80 or 90 partial, then any partial contract that makes converts the partial to game. However, the benefits and importance of competing to prevent the opponents from making a cheap game by converting their partial will add a new level of competition and variety to the duplicate format.

Just as in a rubber match, East-West might try to push North-South with a 40 partial from $2 \boldsymbol{a}$ to an unmakeable $3 \boldsymbol{A}$, or find themselves doubled for down two or three at the three level in an unsuccessful attempt to "push" the opponents too high.

A pair may settle for INT with a 60 partial sufficient for game, but with the strength to make 9-11 tricks, eagerly waiting to inflict a severe penalty on any pair with the temerity to come into the auction. New bidding and tactical skills would be rewarded with the overzealous competitors duly punished.

I have devised a rotating set of partials so that in a set of 36 Boards, 12 boards - or one-third of the total - would be assigned fixed partials, and some boards might be assigned two-way partials. For example, on Board 26 with both vulnerable, the pre-assigned partials would be North-South +70 , East-West +80 . In any seven-board team match, two to three deals would be assigned partials. In an eight-board match, three deals would have partials assigned, and in a 16 -board match, six deals would be assigned partials. With a few labels affixed to the pre-selected duplicate boards, any set of bridge boards can be set up for this type of bridge event or special boards can be fabricated once this format becomes popular. Here is a set of 36 boards, with partials assigned. The other 24 boards will have no partials assigned at all.

More Scoring Twists：If the partial is +30 and East－West bid 1NT and make two，you score just 40 below the line making your partial 70 ，short of the 100 needed for game，and 30 above the line for the overtrick．The score would be 70 for East－ West not 120 as you would receive if no partials applied．In a matchpoint event，the other pairs would be facing the same partial conditions and the good and poor results would be scored like any other matchpoint event．If an opponent is doubled for down one，you score 100 against the non－ vulnerable pair，but you will outscore pairs who score only 70 for making 2 NT．A pair or team will have to adjust to the different scoring conditions on hands with partials．

The game and slam scoring and doubled scoring would remain the same，except as affected by the partial－i．e．．doubling the opponent into game in $2 *$ doubled with the opponents 60 on， making two would score the game bonus plus the partial value doubled，and the extra 50 for the unsuccessful double．

IMPS：IMPs would work exactly the same as matchpoints．Each board can be IMPed on its own with presumably more game swings generated by the inclusion of partials，and probably more penalties incurred for those seeking to push the opponents to a higher partial or to the game level．

At IMPs，the double partial swings when a partial has been assigned might be smaller．For example，with a 30 partial，for North－South，a team would score +60 for making $2 v$ at one table and +40 at the other table for bidding and making $2 *$ for a net of +100 for a gain of 3 IMP＇s．Without partials，the combined score would be $+200(2 v=$ $+110,2 *=+90$ ）for a gain of 5 IMPs．

Even preempts are affected by one＇s side having a partial assigned．For example，should a pair open $3 \boldsymbol{A}$ with a 60 partial when two is sufficient for closing out the game？Or should the player bid $3 \boldsymbol{A}$ as he or she would bid without the partial？Should a normal $1 \uparrow$ full opener with
six spades be opened $2 \wedge$ if starting with a 40 partial？If one does that，how will partner be able to distinguish between a true preempt and the mere desire to be in game with an opening bid？

Duplicate players would be mistaken to underestimate the bidding skill involved in navigating with or against partials．Here is one example：West deals，both vulnerable with East－ West 60 on，and you are South in fourth seat holding this hand after three passes：

## A A 2 Q 4 －Q $9753 ヶ K$ Q 87.

Without the partials，after three passes，opening $1 *$ in fourth seat is automatic．However，against a 60 partial，the vulnerable East－West pair may be able to overcall in a major and outbid you and convert their partial，making a vulnerable game by bidding at the two level，or even 1 NT ，making it too risky for your side to compete，especially vulnerable if partner is weak．With the opponents＇ 60 partial，after three passes，the best call in this example might be to pass and settle for a passout， especially at IMPs．On the other hand，the hand may be yours as you may ask yourself why，with 60 on did both West and East pass in first and third seats？Passing out this hand may lead to a bottom or the loss of IMPs if the hand is yours and partner has the majors and balance of power under control．It is a different decision than you would make without the partial where the chance of the opponents making a vulnerable game after they both pass is remote．

## Modifying of bidding methods

Pairs playing partials will have to devise bidding methods when partials have been assigned to a hand．Consider this common rubber bridge problem．

You have a 70 partial and partner opens 1 NT showing 15－17 on your convention card．As Responder，you hold
ヘQ 2 ヤKJ 8 －K 1096 ヵAJ 65.
Without the partial you have an easy 3NT raise as you are about a queen short to invite with 4NT．With a 70 partial，you don＇t need to bid

3NT with the partial，taking the slight but real risk that partner might hold $\oplus J \times$ for the unlikely but possible loss of five tricks off the top on a spade lead．Yet，partner may have opened 1 NT opener with 18 ，even up to 20 HCP ， or perhaps as few as 14 HCP because of the partial， partner having expanded or ＂shaded＂his 1NT opening range to avoid missing game or overbidding to 2 NT ．
Thus，responder＇s bid of 2NT allows partner to show ＂extras＂beyond the expected 17，or remain in an ultra－safe contract of 2NT．

For a $2 / 1$ bid（whether forcing to game or not）with a 60 partial on your side， the partnership has to make certain adjustments．

With partner opening 1 A ， holding
AQ 102 －AJ 102 －K Q 9 84 \＆7
In SAYC or $2 / 1,2$ would be your bid over 1 A ．With 60 on，can partner pass $2 \star$ ？The answer is yes，as partner may have a minimum hand with two low diamonds，and 2 ． may be your only makeable contract if partner opened light and responder barely has values to make a $2 / 1$ bid． 2 therefore should not be forcing once the partial is converted to game by going over the 100 point game
threshold．It is a forcing auction until game is reached by the pair．With a 40 partial，you can safely bid a forcing $2 \star$ over $1 \star$ ，which partner cannot pass until your combined partial is at least 100．In the above example， $3 \boldsymbol{A}$ would be a mild slam try，not a limit raise with a partial．

Even using Drury can muddy things up unless discussed beforehand．A natural $2 *$ response by a passed hand over one of a major with a 60 on may be your best and only decent contract，perhaps restricting the practicality of using Drury．With a partial，you may not need Drury since you intend to bid only high enough to convert the partial to game with your invitational hand．

What if you have a hand intending to force partner absolutely if a $2 / 1$ response by partner can be passed？The answer is：with partials，it is recommended that you use strong jump shifts to make slam bidding effective．Strong jump shifts force partner to bid again to create a forcing auction，even if you are past game territory beyond your partial．If you play Bergen raises or weak jump shifts，you will be unable to effectively explore for slam as your $2 / 1$ bids would then have to be absolutely forcing for a round with no convenient way to distinguish slam invitations below the game level．

For example，
After partner opens $1 \uparrow$ with a 90 on for your side，you hold：

かK Q J 『K 7 AK 8732 \＆106．
Your best bid is $3 \star$ ，forcing partner to rebid． Surely， $3 \uparrow$ is safe enough，and $4 \wedge$ should be $99 \%$ safe．With
＊ 1098654 A 94 ＊ 6 ＊AK 3 ， opener rebids $3 \wedge$ over $3 \bullet$ ．Responder would then ＂raise unnecessarily＂to 4Í，to show a fit with a good side suit，and above－game strength．Now， opener＇s controls in the unbid suits should induce a cuebid of $5 \boldsymbol{\infty}$ ，which is all responder needs to hear to move towards a laydown slam．However，with

AA10432 VU 94 ＊ 6 ャK J， over $1 \uparrow-3 \star$ ，with your 90 partial，bid $3 \vee$ and pass partner＇s $3 \boldsymbol{A}$ or even his $4 \boldsymbol{A}$ stronger bid without getting to the dangerous five level．

Jacoby 2NT，a game－going major suit raise， would be a good convention to use with a partial to force partner with a fit in his major．However，it would be wise to invert the meaning of $3 \boldsymbol{A}$ to show minimum opening values，and $4 \boldsymbol{a}$ to show extras， allowing the pair to stop in the safe $3 \uparrow$ with a partial without risking a set in 4 A ．

Starting a duplicate partial event would be simple．One would have to affix partial labels on the indicated partial boards shown above． The computer scoring program would have to accommodate＂impossible＂matchpoint scores such as $20,30,40,60$ and other higher scores unique to scoring with partials．The players should also be provided rubber bridge scoring tables．

If you favor assigning partials in duplicate events，contact the ACBL or the Bridge Bulletin， as it will take a groundswell of support from the members to bring partials to duplicate bridge．Just don＇t forget your side＇s partials during the auction， or you will have to ethically bite your tongue as you automatically raise to 3NT over partner＊s 1NT with 10 HCP ，forgetting your side＇s 60 partial，a mishap experienced by all rubber bridge players，at least once．

Slow play，as opposed to careful or thoughtful play，is discourteous to your opponents－－and to all other competitors as well．Players and pairs who take more than their allotted time are subject to penalty．

In general，pairs who are rarely late will be warned while pairs who are habitually tardy and／or pay no attention to time limits will be penalized．

The Keohane Trophy was presented for the Open Individual Championship until it was redesignated in 1995 by the ACBL Board of Directors for the North American Swiss Teams.

In the Open Board-a-Match Teams, South followed an enterprising line to reach the 4-3 heart fit. Declarer won the spade lead and led a low heart at once. Wafik Abdou took the Q and played the $\oplus \mathrm{K}$, ducked all around as West echoed.

Now the $\$$ to the ace saw Larsen resist the temptation to give his partner a ruff. Instead he played a second club to the jack, queen and ace. Abdou won the second trump, underled in clubs for West to ruff, and the diamond ruff meant one down.

Although the defenders can prevail if Larsen gives his partner a ruff, it is harder work. Abdou plays a club, and now when declarer unblocks spades and leads a low diamond, he ruffs with his $\checkmark$ A and plays a third club.

## Nickell defends Reisinger title

The team captained by Nick Nickell won the 2008 Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams by more than a board, slightly ahead of the runners-up led by Roy Welland. Playing with Nickell were Richard Freeman, Bob Hamman, Zia Mahmood, Jeff Meckstroth and Eric Rodwell. Ralph Katz has joined the squad since the death of Freeman earlier this year, and will partner Nickell in this year's event.

Welland's lineup included Brian Glubok, Ron Smith, Billy Cohen, Howard Weinstein and Steve Garner.

## The Reisinger

The event is contested for the Reisinger Trophy (the Chicago Trophy until 1965). It is a six-session open team-of-four event scored by board-a-match with two qualifying sessions, two semifinal sessions and two final sessions. It was contested as a four-session championship until 1966

The event began in 1929 as the North American Open Team Championship and the prize was the Chicago Trophy, donated by the Auction Bridge Club of Chicago. (In 1928, the open team competition was for the Harold S. Vanderbilt Cup.)

The Chicago Trophy was replaced in 1965 by the Reisinger Memorial Trophy, donated by the Greater New York Bridge Association in memory of Curt H. Reisinger.

Reisinger (1891-1964), New York City, was a principal patron of contract bridge and the American Contract Bridge League in the early years of both.

Reisinger was a great-grandson of Anheuser and a grandson of Busch, co-founders of the brewery from which he inherited great wealth. That wealth enabled him to become a stalwart financial supporter of the game, as well as a noted philanthropist on a far larger scale.

In the years when there was often a struggle to meet the League's modest payroll, Reisinger was often called upon and never failed to help with a loan or an outright gift. His support made possible several early contract bridge tournaments, clubs and books.

Among the positions in which he served were director of the United States Bridge Association, president of the Greater New York Bridge Association and chairman of the ACBL. In 1953, Reisinger was named ACBL Honorary Member.

## Cell Phones and Electronic

 Devices: Know the Rules- If you're playing in a national-level event: All electronic devices are banned from the playing area.
"Electronic devices, excluding health-related equipment, capable of sending or receiving communication, including but not limited to, headphones, earphones, cellular phones and minicomputers: (1) shall not be allowed in the playing areas, adjacent hallways, restrooms or accessible break areas; and (2) shall not be used during a session.

These restrictions shall apply to all pairs, team members, captains, coaches, recorders and kibitzers and shall apply throughout any actual playing session or segment.

A violation of this policy shall result in a disciplinary penalty of one full board (or 12 IMPs at that form of scoring) for the first offense. A second offense shall result in disqualification from the event for the pair/team.

Kibitzers violating this policy shall be removed from the playing area for the remainder of the

## session."

Participants will be reminded not to approach the playing area with a personal electronic device in their possession, even if the device is turned off.

- If you're playing in a regional or Intermediate-Newcomer event: Turn those phones and pagers off.
"Cell phones, audible pagers or any similar communication equipment may not be operated or operable in the playing area during a session of play at NABCs except for health-related equipment or by permission of the director-in-charge of the tournament or event."


## Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction
may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a $1 / 6$-board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.
