## Board of Directors Meeting highlights

The ACBL fully supports the use of Tournament Assistants to help sponsoring organizations to keep their tournaments affordable. Management is directed, whenever feasible, to reduce its tournament director staffing requirements when the sponsoring organization commits to hire a Tournament Assistant. Management will provide a financial impact report at the Fall 1998 meeting.

The Board of Directors will meet three times per year, Each meeting shall be prior to each NABC at the site of the NABC.

## Coleman Ieads NA Swiss

The team captained by Jack Coleman, winners of the North American Swiss Teams two of the last three years, held a slim lead in the event after two qualifying sessions.

Coleman won in 1994 and 1995 playing with Mark Molson, Drew Cannell, Boris Baran and Mark Stein. This year, Coleman added Matt Granovetter, now a resident of Israel.

The team scored 120 Victory Points, one more than Luella Slaner, Joel Friedberg, Ethan Stein, Marty Bergen and Dutch stars Enri Leufkens and Berry Westra.

A Junior Bridge Camp for approximately 100 Juniors will be sponsored by the ACBL and held in the Chicago area following the 1998 Summer NABC (August 3-9). The Camp is anticipated to cost approximately $\$ 30,000$. $\$ 15,000$ will come from the Junior Fund and $\$ 15,000$ from the budget. Every subsequent two years the ACBL will sponsor a Junior Camp to be held in conjunction with the Summer NABC. There will be a minimum $\$ 15,000$ commitment from the General Fund for this purpose.

The team posted a score of 14 in the afternoon session -- average was 13 -- but could manage only 11.5 in the evening. Their score of 25.5 was well out of qualifying range.

## A pair of sevens

Any expert knows the value of spot cards. Probably, he has been involved many times in contracts that make or go down depending on which side possesses the critical 9 s and 10 s . Lower spot cards can be just as important, as you can see on this deal from the first final session of the Open Board-a-Match Teams.

Against East's normal $4 \boldsymbol{A}$ contract, South led the $\uparrow 10$, and declarer probably wished as he saw the dummy that his contract had been 3NT. Nevertheless, he set about maximizing his chances for overtricks. Winning the A , he drew trumps ending in the dummy, and called for the innocent-looking $\vee 7$. North played low, and East let the 7 ride to South's ace. North had not actually given up anything by failing to split his heart honors, but he had begun to create the possibility of future difficulties.

South exited with another diamond to declarer's queen. East cashed the $\vee \mathrm{K}$ and the last high diamond, and now played the third round of hearts, putting North on lead. Knowing that a heart would present East with a ruffsluff, North had no choice but to break clubs. East played low, South inserted the jack, and dummy's ace won the trick. Now declarer could finesse the 10 coming back for a vital overtrick.

Well played by East, of course, who had used his $\downarrow 7$ to good effect in persuading North to let him set up the endplay. But not well defended by North, who failed to notice that his own $\because 7$ was a vital card that could enable him to escape

the trap. Instead of exiting with a low club, he should have played the $\% 9$. Now if East plays low, South does not have to waste his jack, and there is no finessing position created. If East plays the $* 10$, South covers, and the ace wins. However, North's \&Q7 now "surrounds" dummy's \& 8, and squirm as he might, East has one more club loser. Now, how many points was it that Goren recommended counting for a 7 ?

## No escape from endplay

South's problem comes down to avoiding three club losers, and consequently the defense's problem is to avoid being endplayed in clubs.

West opened the $\vee 10$, covered by the queen and won with the ace, and the heart return went to the king. Declarer immediately set about stripping the hand for a trump endplay -- he ruffed a heart. Next he took his two diamond tricks and led a third diamond to ruff.

He crossed to the A A, and East saw what was happening -- he ditched his trump king. If he didn't he would be thrown in with the king and be forced to break clubs or offer a sluffruff. Good play, but it wasn't good enough. Now declarer was able to ruff dummy's last diamond and put West, rather than East, in for the endplay. Making three.

## Like father

Marty Hirschman might be better known as the father of Sam and Dan, both of whom at one time or another were the youngest Life Masters in the ACBL.

But Marty is no mean player himself. In his losing Bracketed Knockout match (they had beaten Meckwell in the previous round), he had two neat hands.

Marty was declarer in $4 \downarrow$ on a club lead and a spade shift. He ducked this and won the next spade. He noted at once that he could endplay his opponents for a diamond play -- but that would not be enough. He actually needed a singleton diamond honor in one defender's hand. Since West had made a preemptive raise, he decided to play East for the bare king.

Therefore he drew trumps, cashed the $\bullet A$ and exited with the third spade. The defense was helpless now -- a diamond would give up the defense's trick in that suit, and anything else would give a ruff and discard.

Later on in the same set Marty reached 3NT after opening an eccentric 1 NT on the South cards.

Of course West could have cashed the diamond suit off the top, but not unnaturally he led a low diamond, so Marty scored the queen. Many of us would simply try to cash out the hearts and throw up our hands in disgust when the suit failed to split.

Marty carefully led a heart toward the queen, and when he saw the 8 appear, he called for the queen and then the 10 . When East hesitated he was sunk. He finally covered with the jack, and now Marty could run the suit and make 10 tricks for a game swing since $4 \vee$ was beaten in the other room.

Arnie Fisher and P.O. Sundelin climbed to $5 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$, but Childs carried on to $6 *$. As the cards lie, NorthSouth can make $6 \boldsymbol{v}$, getting rid of the losing spade on declarer's long diamond. But this was far from clear, so Sundelin doubled. The defense got their two aces, but that was all -- down one. At the other table, the Carteaux team bought the hand for 4 A making five for an 8-IMP pickup.

Sundelin and Fisher were playing a forcing club system, so naturally Sundelin did not open with 1 -- far too strong. But on his second turn he was faced with making a decision that could carry him to the five level. With all those honors he decided that a double was called for -- a decision that most of us would agree with under the circumstances. He didn't know the opponents had a void in each hand. He also didn't know the sevencard club suit that was buried in Childs' $1 \uparrow$ overcall.

Childs played the hand in crossruff style, winding up with nine tricks for minus 200 .

This is one time an opening heart bid would have worked better than a forcing club. Fisher would have realized that his hand was valuable opposite an opening heart bid, and the auction no doubt would have been much more competitive.

That's the way it was at the other table, where Ralph Cohen and Chuck Said climbed all the way to $6 \downarrow$. For a report on the play in the other room, see page 4. Another 13 IMPs to Carteaux.

## The obvious game

Look at Board 21 from the second semifinal session of the Blue Ribbon Pairs. North has an eight-card spade suit he wants to get into the action, and East-West have a heart-club fit that plays well. But which is the making game?


4* has four top losers, and $4 \vee$ goes down after two rounds of diamonds, then two spades. And 5* goes off on a diamond lead.

Ah, but what about 3NT by East-West? With the miraculous spade blockage AND the A with South, you can't beat it!

But nobody bid it, right? WRONG!! At least two pairs managed the feat. When Dave Treadwell opened a Multi 2 in second seat, Darwin Afdahl jumped to 3NT ("knowing my partner had spades") and brought home 10 tricks.

And Chris Willenken received a diamond lead and continuation against 3NT after South had bid the suit. When he guessed hearts he registered a 490 !

Easy game, bridge!

## Grace under fire

To say that Geir Helgemo and Tony Forrester did not get off to a good start in the second final session of the Blue Ribbon Pairs is like saying that Tiger Woods is a promising young golfer. Their first six boards included minus 1100 , minus 670 , minus 380 and minus 500, and in the middle of all this they conservatively stayed out of a $50 \%$ slam that was there as the cards lay.

Many partnerships would be barely on speaking terms after this kind of beginning, but Helgemo merely looked across the table, gave Forrester a big grin, and said "Well, at least we're not going to come second this year!" Events were to prove him wrong.

It was instructive, too, to watch a world-class pair set about moving back up the standings to where they had started the evening, trailing Allan Falk and Adam Wildavsky by a handful of matchpoints. There were no wild swings, no psychs, no crazy preempts -- just solid bridge, good judgment and excellent card play. The following two hands are typical:


Helgemo made a well-judged balancing double of East's weak 1NT opener, and Forrester was happy to leave it in. After a spade lead, declarer ducked a heart, and the defenders continued spades. With careful discarding on the hearts and avoiding playing diamonds until it was time to cash out their top tricks, the defenders held declarer to three heart tricks and two spades for plus 300 and 21.5 out of 25 matchpoints.

Perhaps applying the law of total tricks, Forrester judged that $4 \boldsymbol{a}$ was not going to be a success and that his diamond cards were well placed for defensive purposes. His decision was rewarded when Helgemo found the killing trump lead.

Declarer had little choice now but to try to establish diamonds, a plan doomed to failure. The defenders could have had plus 500 as it turned out, but the position of the spade spots was not clear to Helgemo, and in the end he elected to take a sure down one instead of a risky play for two down.

Another good decision, since plus 200 was worth 24 matchpoints.

After the first six boards, second place must have seemed a triumph, not a disappointment, but once again Helgemo and Forrester find themselves ending a national championship saying to themselves, "Wait till next year."

## Comeback crew

In all but one of their matches in the Senior Knockout Teams, the squad captained by Robert Carteaux trailed at some point. In the semifinal and final, the team had to overcome deficits of 26 and 22 IMPs in the final quarter to win.

Significantly, only Carteaux and David Adams have anything resembling a regular partnership. The other pairings -- Chuck Said-Ralph Cohen and Adams-Al Childs -- were relatively unfamiliar.

These three deals from the second half of the final helped the Carteaux team come back. The first is from the third quarter and featured Said and Cohen against Russ Arnold and Jim Linhart. (The play in the other room is featured on page 3.)

Arnold could have defeated the slam by leading the $\curvearrowleft \mathrm{K}$, but he chose the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ for his opening shot. Cohen won the $\uparrow$ A and cashed his $\vee \mathrm{A}$, unblocking the $\vee 10$ from dummy when West showed out.

Next came a spade ruff with the 9 , a diamond to the queen, a spade ruff with the 8 and a finesse of the $\downarrow 7$ to pick up trumps.

Cohen then led the $\approx 6$ from his hand, playing low from dummy when Arnold played the *Q Cohen could then finesse the $\% \mathrm{~J}$ and cash the $\% \mathrm{~A}$ to pitch his losing diamond. At the other table, North-South collected only plus 200, so the Carteaux team gained 13 IMPs.

Going into the fourth quarter, the Carteaux team was down 22 IMPs and needed some action. Cohen and Said produced two outstanding results with fine card play and excellent bidding judgment on consecutive boards early in the quarter. They were playing against P.O. Sundelin and Arnie Fisher.

Said's 5 cuebid was all Cohen needed, and he played the slam letter perfect.

Sundelin led the $\diamond \mathrm{K}$ and switched to the $» \mathrm{Q}$, threatening a ruff. Cohen won the $\approx \mathrm{A}$, cashed one round of trumps then played the $\vee \mathrm{A}$, a heart to the king and ruffed a heart. The $\& \mathrm{~K}$ provided the parking place for Cohen's other heart loser as Sundelin followed helplessly with a diamond. Cohen ruffed a diamond back to hand to pull trumps and claim for plus 980, a $10-\mathrm{IMP}$ gain since Adams and Childs were minus 500 in the other room in a doubled diamond contract.

The next board produced 13 IMPs for the

Carteaux team.

Cohen considered his hand too good for a 1NT opener, and he didn't want to rebid 2NT over his partner's $1 \uparrow$ response, so he opted for the jump raise to $3 \wedge$. The resulting $4 \wedge$ contract was unbeatable and Said quickly scored up plus 620. That was good for a 13 -IMP gain because 3NT failed by two tricks at the other table after a heart lead.

Who answers all these questions? None other than Patty Johnson in Tournament Operations, the director who always has a smile -- and an answer -for you no matter how busy she is. This is her 10th anniversary in this job -- she took over from Ernie Clinton in 1987.
"Up to 50 players a day drop into the office with questions like these," said Patty. "And that doesn't count all the tournament directors who all have questions of their own.
"I enjoy it. I love this job. I love the people and I love the detail. I love it when all sorts of things are going on all at once. It's like being an executive secretary."

Fifty players a day? That's 500 a tournament, 1500 a year. That means she has answered about 15,000 questions since she's been handling this job.

Tournament Operations -- what's that all about?
Patty prepares all the masterpoint reports for Headquarters, makes all the necessary corrections in results, prepares section and overall reports for the Daily Bulletin, smiles and answers all questions. "I work closely with the directing staff. We work together to make things go easier and more smoothly. It's a team effort."

Patty, who is an associate national director, does an excellent job of handling Florida tournaments when she's not answering questions at an NABC. "It's totally different at our Florida tournaments," she said. "There I'm out with the players and I help make policy. It's great working with Jayne Thomas, who is chairman for most Florida regionals.
"It's a hands-on experience in Florida. I try to be out with the players as much as I possibly can."

Patty started her directing career at the Lightman Club in Memphis 22 years ago. A year and a half later she became a full-fledged ACBL tournament director, and she's been climbing the ladder ever since, reaching her present status in 1995. She's a busy director -- she works about 320 sessions a year.

Patty's husband Karl, a top-flight National Director for many years, is doing well in retirement at their home in Sebring. "He's healthy -- he plays golf five or six times a week and carries a 10 handicap. He had some problems with arrhythmia some years ago -- once we thought we lost him. But now he has a defibrillator inside him that jolts his heart back into action any time the rhythm fails.
"We play golf and mah jongg quite often with two more former ACBL people -- Tournament Director Harry Clark and his wife Sandy, who worked in the Education Department. We see Johnny Wiser, another retired TD, and his wife Daniela once in a while."
"It's great being with Karl. We've been married 15 years now, and it's wonderful. I used to work with him in Midwest tournaments and at NABCs, and I decided he was the man I wanted. I went after him and he caught me."

The Facts: 5 went down two, plus 200 for N/S. 3* was Alerted after the 3a bid and explained at length that it hadn't been discussed recently, but that it showed extra values. North reconfirmed his $3 \uparrow$ bid and East bid $4 \vee$, after which South broke tempo briefly before passing. The Director ruled that there had been a break in tempo and that the
$4 \wedge$ bid would not be allowed. The contract was changed to $4 \vee$ down one, plus 100 for N/S.

The Appeal: N/S appealed the Director's ruling. E/W did not attend the hearing. N/S were a married couple who play together a fair amount. They were in stratum B of the event. South stated she had broken tempo to digest the explanation of the $3 *$ bid. She considered, but rejected, bidding diamonds next since her partner had already supported spades. North said he thought he couldn't beat $4 \vee$ and that $4 \sim$ would be cheaper at down one or two. He said he was pretty sure his partner was void in hearts. North thought bidding $4 \wedge$ was a normal, good bridge decision.

The Committee Decision: The Committee-ofone found: (1) there was a break in tempo based on South's description of her thought process and statement that she needed some time to digest the explanation of the $3 *$ bid; (2) the break in tempo suggested South might be considering bidding because North's hand made it clear that South could not have been considering doubling; (3) North's bid was successful; and (4) there were logical alternatives to bidding $4 \boldsymbol{A}$.

With regard to (4): North's statements that he thought South was void in hearts, that N/S couldn't beat $4 \boldsymbol{\vee}$, and that $4 \wedge$ would likely go down one or two was used as the basis to define his peer group. North's 4^ bid was a good bid but the standard for determining logical alternative is high, in part for its deterrent effect.

The Committee tried to consider the 4 a bid in the context of a group of stratum B players facing the decision, all of whom believe that $4 \infty$ is likely to fail, $4 \boldsymbol{v}$ is likely to make, and who only bid 3 at their previous turn. A group so composed would have some members who might think that if 4 is a make, then N/S is going to get a bad result whether defending or going down one or two in 4 . Therefore, they might reason that it might be better not to assume $4 \boldsymbol{v}$ is a make. If they make that assumption, then passing and doubling are

The Facts: 3 made three, plus 140 for E/W. West broke tempo on her second and third doubles. The Director ruled that pass was a logical alternative to $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ and changed the contract to $2 \downarrow$ doubled made four, plus 470 for N/S

The Appeal: N/S play a 12-14 HCP notrump. When doubled, North's options were: pass (to play); redouble to show a single suiter; and bid a suit to show a two-suiter (four-four at least) in that suit and a higher ranking suit. When asked, South said that North could also be five-four, but if the
five-card suit was a major North might treat that hand as a single-suiter. The $2 \bullet$ bid simply showed a dislike for clubs and did not guarantee diamonds.

E/W were playing Cappelletti, so the double was for penalty. West did not think that her first double was slow, but it could have been slow because she was considering bidding $2 \wedge$ (to show spades and a minor) or doubling. When asked whether $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ would have been an underbid, she decided that it would have been; hence the double.

The doubles of $2 \vee$ and $2 v$ were also for penalty. East stated that with her hand being as weak as it was, she would not have sat for any penalty double and that the tempos of West's doubles were irrelevant. It was determined that East had 2,000 masterpoints and West 9,400. East played a lot of bridge ten years ago. E/W used to play a lot together but not for the past two years.

The opening lead was the $\downarrow \mathrm{K}$ to the $\vee \mathrm{A}$. Declarer played the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} \mathrm{J}$ and South won the $\boldsymbol{\wedge} \mathrm{K}$. Declarer used her entry to hand to play diamonds.

The Committee Decision: The Committee had varying degrees of sympathy for East's action. Some Committee members thought that they might have removed an in-tempo double of $2 \boldsymbol{t}$ to $2 \boldsymbol{}$; however, E/W were playing the doubles as penalty. West, who knew her hand to be unsuitable for the action, could not bring herself to double $2 v$ in tempo. The Committee thought that West had a normal $2 \boldsymbol{a}$ bid and had simply made a series of dubious calls.

West has an obligation in such situations to make her calls in tempo. Where, as here, West failed to honor her obligations, she deprived East of the chance to exercise bridge judgment. When East bid 2a she would have expected N/ S to have a seven-or eight-card fit. (North had not shown five hearts, so there was no strong indication that N/S really had a good fit.) West's slow double was a "bad" break in tempo.

On that basis East could not be allowed to bid after her partner's hesitations. The contract was changed to $2 v$ doubled. Since normal play leads to at least eight tricks, a score of plus 470 for N/S was assigned to both pairs.

The Committee discussed the merits of the appeal. In a split decision the deposit was returned. Two dissenters believed that East's argument was substantially without merit; three others believed that the infraction was mild enough, and the argument raised by E/W good enough, that the deposit should be returned.

## En route to victory in the Blue Ribbon

## By Allan Falk

The secret to winning the Blue Ribbon Pairs is one I'm happy to share; actually, it's not much of a secret. What you need is a partner who plays very well indeed, opponents who make mistakes, and you to smile graciously and follow suit. As I heard Chip Martel remark between sessions of the semifinal, "Yesterday we played almost perfectly and barely qualified; today we're slopping tricks and have a huge game. It's better to be lucky than good." For example, this was our first board of the first final:

This is a very tough hand double dummy to play or defend $4 \boldsymbol{v}$. It is even more challenging at the table. West, Adam Wildavsky, led the $\approx \mathrm{K}$ and another club, ruffed by South. Declarer now erred by playing a heart to the queen and ace, and he could no longer recover (even though, after a long trance by LHO, I pulled the wrong trump and underruffed late in the play!) However, if declarer (who happened to be the only non-life Master in the final) had led a J at trick two, ducked, and a second spade, I would have to play the A and a second heart upon winning the A to beat $4 \boldsymbol{v}$ ! We might still be sitting there had declarer chosen that line.

Sometimes the weak notrump hurts opener's side -- they cannot find their fits or define accurately how high to compete. Here, the weak notrump got us to the right contract immediately, and although the proper line is unclear, declarer was spared a guess after a heart lead to the queen and ace, the $\% \mathrm{~J}$, covered and ducked, hearts cashed, setting up declarer's second heart winner. Then South hopped up with the A to play the 13th heart. That left declarer with the remainder in top cards, +120 for a very good score.

Blanchard got off to the thoughtful lead of the $\$ 10$, proving immediately that we had wrongsided the contract (in Standard, West would open 1NT and after a possible Stayman sequence would play a spade contract). The $\& \mathrm{~K}$ was covered by the ace and the $\& \mathrm{~J}$ was returned, taken in dummy. North grabbed the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ with the ace to play a club to South's 9, and now a heart was led to dummy's ace. Trumps were drawn ending in dummy and it was time to tackle the diamonds

As East, I knew South had six hearts (North had to have exactly four for the takeout double to make any sense), two spades, and three or four clubs. North was likewise known to have three spades, four hearts, and three or four clubs. If North had three clubs then diamonds were 3-1 and the only play would be to drop the singleton $\bullet K$ with South (since the 109 are missing and will inevitably score a trick on any 3-1 break).

But if North had only three clubs he had made a takeout double with 3-4-3-3. That seemed less likely than 3-4-2-4 with $\bullet \mathrm{Kx}$ (and no singleton would seem to explain why South did not bid more than $2 \bullet$ with a six-bagger), so I led $\bullet Q$ from dummy and went down like a dog.

Let me take this opportunity to thank Blanchard-Krekorian and Ron Smith - Ralph Katz for the fact we only had to play two boards against them each day (usually zeros or nearly so for us!), and the real heros, Bobby Levin and Chip Martel, who took the second-place pair for 49.5 out of 50 the first round of the final session (while Richard Pavlicek Sr. \& Jr. were nailing our hides once again over the mantle). We appreciate your support!

Fall, Denver. None of these will be firm choices until acceptable contract arrangements have been made.

A complete revised masterpoint plan will be presented at the 1998 Spring meeting in Reno.

The following change was made in the General Chart - over natural notrump opening bids and overcalls, direct calls other than double and 2* must have at least one known suit.

Management is authorized to grant the right to award masterpoints for duplicate bridge games held via computers. Management is instructed to establish criteria for granting these games.

Management's report on computer networks is approved for implementation. Masterpoints will be issued starting Dec. 4, 1997. Fees from computer networks will be $\$ 10$ per session per year, $\$ 1$ per game and 20 cents per table.

A former member who has not paid dues for more than 90 days and has become a non-member is entitled to pay dues that were due and owing for whatever period of time he or she had nonmember status, and all masterpoints earned during the non-member period for which payment is received shall be recorded to the extent possible.

Special Conditions of Contest have been approved for the 49er National event to be scheduled for the 1998 Spring NABC. The masterpoint awards will include $5 \%$ gold. The game will be played on Wednesday, March 25. The Conditions of Contest for a 199er event in the Summer and a 99er in the Fall will be presented at the 1998 Spring Board meeting.

The Zero Tolerance policy will go into effect at North American Championships starting with the 1998 Spring NABC in Reno. Details of this policy were printed in the Daily Bulletin on Monday, Nov. 24.

An experimental 65+ two-session play-through Stratified Open Pairs will be scheduled for the 1998 Spring NABC in Reno. The game will take place on Friday, March 27.

Effective with the 1998-1999 North American Pairs, the Non-Life Master qualifying games will be sub-stratified -- 0-20, 20-100 and 100-Non LM.

Bridge Ventures is authorized to run a two-session cash prize event on Wednesday, March 25 , 1998, as part of the regular two-session Regional Open Pairs event. Two entries will be sold -- the regular ACBL entry for those wishing to play only for matchpoints, and another to win prizes out of the cash entry.

In 1998 the ACBL will appoint a Strategic Planning Committee to prepare long-range plans that will meet ACBL goals and objectives. This may require the services of outside consultants. It should not be conducted until the new CEO is on board.

The present surcharge of $\$ 1$ per session per player is increased to $\$ 1.50$ starting with the Spring NABC in Reno. Persons with free entries or reduced entry fees will pay the same surcharge.

Management, with input from the Board of Governors, will develop and administer an annual membership competition among districts with appropriate categories and awards. The Board of Governors will present these annually.
