Welland Victorious in 2005 John Roberts Teams

At the end of Day One, Roy Welland's team (Bjorn Fallenius, Bobby Levin, Steve Weinstein) had 112 VPs and was tied for third place, 17 VPs behind the leaders. On Day Two they collected 77 of the 90 available VPs to soar into first place playing teams who finished second and fourth in two of their three final matches. Tied for second-third place were the teams captained by Seymon Deutsch (Billy Cohen, Walid Elahmady, Tarek Sadek, Ron Smith, Paul Soloway) and Gilad Altschuler (David Birman, Piotr Bizon, Michal Kwiecien) and finishing fourth was the team captained by Juan Ventin (Andrea Buratti, Chris Compton, Gaylor Kasle, Pablo Lambardi, Massimo Lanzarotti), the Day One event leaders. The best third session score for a team not in the overalls was compiled by the Mike Moss team (Drew Casen, Jim Krekorian, Antonio Sementa), who scored 69 VPs in their three final matches. Pairs Auction Nets Just Under \$1M

Last evening's Cavendish Pairs auction, while seeing its top-selling pair (Bocchi-Duboin) go for a Las Vegas record \$58,000 (but not an all-time Cavendish record; Bocchi-Duboin also took top dollar last year at \$53,000), fell just short of the \$1M mark, coming in at \$963,500. Special Notice: World Bridge Productions Pairs Pre-Auction

In order to generate interest and facilitate the live WBP Pairs auction, to be held on Saturday morning, May 7, provisions have been made to accept bids prior to the start of the live auction. Here's how it will work:

Arrayed around the Registration Desk will be preliminary owners' cards for all expected participants. (Not all of these pairs may attend, but the vast majority are expected.) If you wish to bid on a pair you may do so by entering the amount of your bid on the pair's card and signing your name opposite the bid amount (minimum bid = \$1000). These bids will be considered binding, just as if they were made in the live auction. If your bid is not topped in either the pre- or live auctions you will become the owner of the pair and have all of the attendant rights and responsibilities. Remember, each pair must buy back 10% of their purchase price and may buy back up to 40% of themselves if they are so inclined.

Please confirm your bids with the appropriate parties at the Registration Desk.


Adam Zmudzinski declared $3 \triangleq$ as West on the passive $\triangleq J$ lead. He won the $\triangleq Q$, crossed to the $\clubsuit K$ and led a diamond to the jack and ace. Fallenius again carefully exited passively, this time with a diamond to the nine. Declarer cashed the $\diamond K$, drew the last trump, and led a club to the king and ace. Fallenius now could either breach hearts or lead a club to his partner, who would then have to open up the hearts and concede the contract.

East did his best by cashing two spades and then shifting to a heart to break up a squeeze if declarer was 2=1=6=4. But Birman simply finessed in hearts and ran the trumps to reach this ending:



On the last trump East bared his \clubsuit A and Birman pitched a heart from dummy, then ducked a club to East and took the rest on the heart finesse.

Be prepared...it's the Boy Scouts' marching song. Maybe it is too much to expect the average bridge player to be clean in word and deed, but we can expect them to be prepared. But on this day a majority of the players in the East seat failed to live up to their responsibilities.

After the auction $1\heartsuit -P-2\heartsuit$ or the like, East drove to $4\heartsuit$, generally making ten tricks because of the favorable lie of the clubs. (Not in one case though: A declarer who should have known better saw South, Pszczola, cash the A and shift to the A—and put up the jack.) However, at two tables that we know of the bidding went $1\heartsuit -Dbl-2\heartsuit -3\diamondsuit$. East now jumped to $4\heartsuit$, but when North reopened with A he did not know what to do. He passed, hoping to have partner make the last mistake, and was paid off in unsatisfying 50-point-apiece undertricks. Had East bid A instead of $4\heartsuit$ (just as preemptive to keep spades out) he would have been far better placed to double $4\clubsuit$, or to pass and consult partner.

If declarer's false cards can be effective, the defense has the opportunity to retaliate by breaking the rules at their turn. Against 3NT here Billy Pollack led the Rusinow &J, ducked by declarer. Billy now found the devastating shift to the $\diamond 10$. Maybe declarer should duck, but he covered and David Berkowitz ducked of course. Declarer came to hand with the A and advanced a low club. Pollack went up with the king (Walid Elahmady found the same play in his match). Now declarer had two spades, one heart, and three diamonds (thanks to the fall of the $\diamond 109$ he can establish the $\diamond 76$) but only one club winner for seven tricks. By contrast, Jacek Pszczola bid 3NT over Sam Lev's 1NT opening. Lev won the spade lead and led a low club...and West did not play the king—hush money is currently being accepted; details for submission to follow—so Sam had ten tricks available by establishing both minors.

Gavin Wolpert played 3NT on a spade lead ducked and a second spade. He won, led a club to the king and ace, and drove out the \clubsuit Q. Now East has to shift to a heart to set the game. When he played a third spade declarer won and drove out the \diamondsuit K and had nine tricks.

Bobby Levin led the ♠Q against 3NT and continued the suit when declarer ducked. A club went to the king and ace and declarer ran the ♣J, then played a third club. Weinstein won as Levin followed with the deuce then five, suggesting suit preference for hearts. So Weinstein shifted to a heart rather than continuing spades to set the game.



Declarer's false cards are often effective, even when the position is well known to the defenders. On this deal Chris Compton led the $\heartsuit3$ against North's 3NT contract, forcing declarer to finesse. (At many tables on the lead of a medium heart spot declarer went up with the ace, hoping for a blockage after driving out the \clubsuit A.) When Kasle took the $\heartsuit K$ Nouth followed with the $\heartsuit6$, leaving the $\heartsuit2$ concealed. From Kasle's perspective, if partner had a top club and either a top diamond or spade, a heart return now could be essential: it would take declarer's fast entry out of dummy and potentially cut his communications. Of course as the cards lie this allowed South to make eleven tricks whereas a spade shift would have set the game two tricks. Most tables found that false card; Bobby Levin was one of the few defenders to shift to spades to beat the game in spite of it.

The match between the two leading teams saw a lot of imps swing on Ventin's bid here. After the auction:

Ventin, as East, elected to sacrifice and found that even 44

was going down on a diamond ruff. On a spade lead against 5[∞] doubled Lambardi took the ace and settled for two down (the diamond finesse would have held his losses to 200 but would have cost 800 had it lost). He played a trump at trick two and Welland pitched an encouraging ♣7, allowing Fallenius to underlead his ♣A—although that turned out to be irrelevant since there was no trump promotion available.

This looked like a good result for Welland but as often is the case looks can be deceiving: At the other table the opening lead (after a tangled and confused auction) against 5 was a *heart*, allowing declarer to pitch two diamonds losers and make eleven tricks. So the Ventin team gained 3 imps but still lost the match 25-5 in VPs when Buratti-Lanzarotti bid a slam on a finesse for the trump king, down a trick.

Kwiecien's 1♦ negative stopped E/W from finding their diamond fit. 4♥ had twelve top tricks when the majors behaved, but would this be good or bad? It turned out to be very good when at the other table the auction was:

South thought for a very long time but eventually passed, and conceded –130. That was 12 imps to Welland, who won the match by 1 imp. Had South acted, he would surely have collected at least +420 (and maybe an eventual heart contract would have been doubled). What the Altschuler team needed to do was to hold their losses on the deal to 8 imps. Had they done so they would have won the match by 3 imps—and taken the event on a tie breaker.

A Simple History Lesson

Okay, okay, so I didn't pick the winners last year, but Lev-Pszczola, come on! To tell you the truth I didn't know they even knew one another far less win the trophy.

It was only when I returned home and spoke to Scotland's Bridge Guru Albert Benjamin (now 96 years young, by the way) that I realized the enormity of my failure. After I told him the result he said "Did a pair Levinsky-Pszczola not win the Polish national Pairs two years running in the thirties, a feat never repeated? Then he added "It must have been their grandfathers." I was shocked. How could my vast research have missed that simple fact?

I can only assume that someone (probably Barry) has reported this to WBP because when I arrived at Bally's this

year an unsigned letter was waiting for me from them informing me that if this year's five selections did not perform better than last year's there was a big chance my annual invitation would be withdrawn. My brilliant past record (three out of three) apparently counts for nothing!

As in previous years I am bound not to disclose my selections until after the auction because prices could be affected. Amusingly enough they will be published about the same time as our election results (Friday morning). Just in case you don't know the Blair-Brown partnership will win that one with quite a few imps to spare.

How can I be so sure? Well, their success was more or less guaranteed a few years ago when they made a decision to switch to Standard American!
