At most tables, North-South took East-West off the hook by entering the auction if East opened, or by opening themselves.

Chris Willenken passed as South over a precision 1D and defended to 1S. He led the King of clubs, which held, then worked out that his partner (who was known to have values and only two spades, but had not balanced) rated to have a spade honor. He shifted to a low trump and the defenders now drew four rounds of trumps and cleared the clubs! Declarer had to lose eight black-suit tricks and two aces – down two and a cool 400!

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Eric Rodwell has never knowingly underbid a hand so when he opened 1H and heard his LHO jump to 3NT, he reopened with a double. When South passed Marc Jacobus could have led a diamond and collected 1100 (assuming North was going to sit for it). Instead he quite reasonably bid 4H – and when that (quite unreasonably) got doubled – intended as action – Rodwell had 990, and 12 IMPS.

As if to show there was no shortage of machismo in the partnership, Jacobus on the very next deal heard the auction start (1H) P (1S) to him. You or I might have risked 2D; Jacobus tried 1NT and was promptly raised to 3NT. He received a low club lead (a heart or diamond is also fatal to the defense, a spade more challenging). Jacobus ran the lead around to his hand and cleared the clubs.

When North won and shifted to spades, he ducked once, then won the heart shift, knocked out the DA, then took the next spade to cash CQ. Now he simply took his heart and diamond winners to exit with the HJ. At trick 13, North had to give dummy the ninth trick with the H10. That was good for 6 IMPs – the opponents in the same seats never bid and defended 2D down 200.

By now the testosterone was oozing out of every pore. Jack Zhao came in over a 14-16 NT with 2H (transfer to 2S) on his 3-count. Fu Zhong bounced to 3NT, down only one trick on a low club lead when dummy was probably just a little disappointing.... Still, only 5 IMPs to the opponents.

It was Fu's turn to take a macho bid next. After opening 1S as North, he heard the auction proceed (2C) 3C (X) back to him. He tried 4C but gave up in 4S. It would be embarrassing to go down in game after making a small try, when partner gives you a 12-count would it not?

Fu ruffed the CQ lead, drew two trumps, then led a small diamond to the jack as Rodwell ducked, and Jacobus showed an even number. Fu now had to decide what to do in hearts knowing Rodwell probably had a 1-2-4-6 shape but had elected to make a simple overcall. He chose to duck a heart completely. When this forced the HJ he was home as he could set up the H109 for his tenth trick.

But even if no honor had appeared declarer would probably have been home by ruffing the next club and playing DA and another diamond to make his last two trumps separately. Since his team-mates had found the 5C save over which N/S bid on to 5S down one, this was 10 IMPs in.

Chris Willenken was kicking himself for a missed opportunity. He and Roy Welland reached 4H on the King of clubs lead. He won, and played the King of hearts. The defenders took it and cashed the Queen of clubs, then shifted to the King of spades. To succeed, declarer has to win the ace (unblocking the Jack), draw a second trump, but not the third, and then advance the 10 of spades. West will take the Queen of spades and can get out with a diamond, but you take the Ace of diamonds, cross to hand with a trump, and run all the hearts for a

If you don't unblock spades, or draw all the trumps prematurely, you get locked out of dummy, or out of your hand and the squeeze does not work.

Fortunately or unfortunately, depending on how you look at it, Bobby recovered for the next round. Seymon broke the bad news like this, "Sorry, Sam, rules are rules and Bobby must come back. It's been a great pleasure to play with you." A nice guy who always says the right words.

After my remark yesterday about name badges I was collared by Bob Hamman who explained that he had misunderstood my suggestion. He thought I meant a name badge for myself because, as he put it, many players over the years asked him, "Who the hell is that guy we see hanging around the refreshment table most days?" Another nice guy who always says the right words!

And now down to the real business of the day. Having studied the field on my long flight here from Scotland I'm convinced that with a little luck the Norwegian pair Helgemo-Helness will finish first. The last time I watched them play was in 1999 when they pulverized a top-class field in the prestigious Sunday Times Pairs. Two remarkable facts about that win was that they had won with two rounds still to be played, and they equaled the feat of Meckstroth-Rodwell to win in consecutive years. Welland escaped for -50 in 3C; not terrible in abstract. In the other room Moss opened 1NT as South and reentered the auction with 3C when Madala showed both majors and Sementa corrected to 2S. It might have been sensible to pass, but Gitelman's 3H bid would have worked well, had partner been compelled to pass now. Alas, N/S were not on the same wavelength and Gitelman ended up in 5H doubled after an auction best kept from those of delicate sensibilities. The defenders cashed two spades and shifted to diamonds, but when Mandala did not ruff in on the third top club Gitelman escaped for down 300.

In the other key match Casen played 3C for down 100, but Schirmer-Chambers extracted more on defense. Chambers overcalled 1S over 1C and North doubled, allowing Schirmer to raise to 2S. When South bid 3C North could have cut his losses and passed. His actual choice of 3H was raised to 4H and Chambers doubled and collected 300.

Gitelman/Moss bid accurately to 3NT – note that key spade nine! On a spade lead to the ace in fact Sementa shifted to the heart queen, and now Moss won in dummy and advanced the diamond queen. Whether Sementa took it or ducked declarer was safe.

That looked good, but strange things happened in the other room. Welland opened 2C and rebid 3H to show diamonds and hearts. When his partner bid 3NT he elected to remove to 4C—which would certainly have made good sense facing a hand with his partner's black-suits reversed. They were on their way to 5D by South, which looks hopeless, but East doubled 4C and both North and South were confident enough they knew what were doing to let 4C doubled be the final contract.

The SA lead let Welland ruff and advance the CQ. East might have done better to let it hold, but he won and played a second spade. Welland ruffed away the S.10 and led diamonds from hand, losing just one more trump trick for +510 and 3 imps.

Three of or four tables reached game on the E/W cards. Where I was watching Sementa as East received the lead of two top diamonds and a heat shift. He carefully won the heart king and played a spade to the queen and a second spade to the jack. Whatever the defenders did, declarer would have a major-suit entry to hand to cope with 4-2 clubs, not a problem today, of course.

All pass

One table missed game, against Casen-Krekorian. Here Krekorian did not raise to 2D on the auction shown above, so E/W managed to bid themselves out in 2S, perhaps East thinking that his partner was marked with some diamond length from the opponents' silence?

The bottom line was that Kasle held on to win by 3 IMPs and 18-12, letting Deutsch retain second place, one VP ahead of Welland who won by 21-9.

Neil Chambers (East) showed a nice appreciation of his values here after hearing his partner open 1H and Roy Welland overcall 1S. He doubled. John Chambers rebid 1N and Neil ignored the heart fit and raised invitationally to 2N. John bid 3N and there they were, in the best contract. On a top spade lead, declarer knocked out the Ace of hearts and took nine tricks. Looks good, does it not? In the other room, Madala-Sementa bid 1H-2H-P, but North decided now would be a good moment to balance! When he bid 2S, Sementa doubled to show a maximum pass, and Sementa (a founder of the TTASL movement - Teach Them A Sharp Lesson by always bidding game or penalizing them if they reopen) jumped to 3N and collected +430.
