The field opened a strong notrump and played there, down 100 or 200. But Bart Bramley introduced a variation; playing with Justin Lall he elected as East to open "a Sydney special" – though I am not sure Sydney Lazard may not be rushing to his telephone to sue if he gets to read this – bidding 1S with that hand of power and quality. South overcalled 1N, Justin expressed an opinion with a red card, and led the Jack of spades. Declarer could duck, but the defenders were able to get four spades, two hearts, and two minor-suit tricks for 500.

Fred Gitelman-Brad Moss put in an early bid for the "Best bid hand of the year" here. Even reaching 6D here looks challenging if North treats his hand as balanced. They bid:

4D showed 5-5, as Moss would have relayed over the 3D response with a 5-4 pattern. Gitelman took a small gamble that he would buy the right doubleton in his partner's hand or enough fillers in spades and hearts. But his action was clearly with the odds.

Bertheau/Nystrom also reached 7D after relaying over a strong club. Nystrom got to show 5-5 with the King of diamonds and a major suit Queen plus a singleton heart, and Bertheau knew enough to take a shot at the grand slam.

Helness/Helgemo reached the grand slam after a 2S response to 2C, and Schermer-Chambers bid to 7D after a very similar auction to Moss-Gitelman's (but with keycard over 4D).

After a strong notrump from West and a preemptive 3H from North, what should East bid? Michael Cornell bid 3N, hoping his Queen of hearts would help create a stop, and worried that a double might get his side to spades. That led to a quick -150.

If you think that's bad, look how Larry Cohen manages to lose IMPs even when he is not playing! David Berkowitz (and Curtis Cheek) opened a strong club, the next hand overcalled 3H, and when Billy Pollack and

Joe Grue doubled for takeout at their respective tables, they passed, as Larry has taught them to do. As Pollack said, "Since David Berkowitz **wasn't** taking the blame, and this time he **can't** blame me, Larry has to be responsible for the-530. Over a strong notrump – 3H – Dbl. quite a few Wests also passed (with less justification?) for the same -530.

Note that 5D – by West of course is the ideal spot. But just how could you manage that? Quite a few pairs got to clubs, but you need the discard from the 4-4 fit.

Both the unlucky pairs mentioned in board 11 got something back on the next deal (when their opponents respectively missed slam, then went down in 6C by crossing to the Ace of spades to take a trump finesse!). Gavin Wolpert and John Kranyak – who were lucky enough to have an uncontested auction – bid as follows:

Kranyak was kicking himself for failing to redouble, but it hardly cost any cross-IMPs since surprisingly few pairs reached the grand slam. From Wolpert's perspective the asence of a diamond cue-bid from his partner made his hand much better, and facilitated the auction. **Bd: 13**

I was sitting watching Jill Meyers and could see the problem she was facing here. Sitting West, she heard the auction proceed:

It looks natural to raise to 4S – and for sure that is right if partner has spades – but of course 3S might be a last train for 3N. As the cards lie, 3N is easy, and 5D on a spade lead looks impossible. Jill Levin actually won cheaply in hand and cashed just one trump before unblocking spades, but all lines seem to lead to down 200 after that start.

It worked out far more easily when East doubled 1H. Now when East bid diamonds later on, West could bid 3NT without any pain.

Jill Meyers was back in the hot seat again here. After...

...as West she had to find a lead. The auction perhaps suggests a balanced hand coming down in dummy, which might encourage a passive lead. Be that as it may, her choice of a spade allowed declarer to wrap up 12 tricks. But this was duplicated at a far larger number of tables than you might have expected. There was more excuse for Helgemo to duplicate the unsuccessful action against 6C since he was expecting his dummy to have five hearts (and ducking the King of hearts would have been far harder here).

As far as I know, Tarek Sadek and Ahmed Hussein were the only pair to defeat 6N 'legitimately'. Sadek led a diamond against the same auction as shown above. Hussein ducked the first heart, and now declarer correctly led a spade towards his Queen to combine his chances. No luck! Down one was a huge result for the Egyptians. A small bribe will reveal the name of the World Champion whose partner led a diamond, but who took the first heart in 6N, to allow the squeeze to operate in 6N.

Pszczola declared 4H here on the lead of the Queen of clubs. He carefully won in hand to advance the 10 of spades, losing to the Ace. He took the diamond return, crossed to the Ace of clubs to pitch the diamond loser on the King of spades, and noted his LHO's signal in spades suggesting an even number. So he ruffed a diamond to hand, ruffed a club with the nine of hearts, then elected to ruff a diamond with the six of hearts, to be safe against a possible 4-1 heart split. At least one declarer (again, a suitable bribe will allow me to release details) tried to cash a third spade to pitch his club 'loser.' The defense ruffed in and now declarer had no entry left to dummy for the heart finesse – down one!

You can always rely on Zia for a story or two. Even when things are going badly, there will always be the odd goal amongst the own-goals... Here Zia overcalled 2D over a strong notrump (showing Diamonds & a Major). It went double (takeout) – 4D, passed back to West who doubled again. When Zia heard 5C on his right he doubled and led HA and another heart; down 800. His logic was that Hamman's raise was clearly not based on HCP; he needed shortage somewhere, and hearts was the obvious place.

Zia opened 4S here and everyone passed. The defenders led two rounds of clubs; Zia ruffed and advanced a low diamond. Put yourself in North's shoes: if Zia had a 7-3-2-1 or 8-2-2-1 shape, with or without the DQ, he needs to fly with the DA and shift to a heart – which he duly did. But Zia worked out why he had played that way. He knew the heart finesse had to be wrong, (particularly since North had not doubled 4S) so he went up with the HA; BINGO! +420 to the good guys.

A Pretty Shrewd Lady

Never confuse the impossible with the unlikely. John Diamond opened 1H as South, using some feeble excuse about the vulnerability. After his opponent introduced an intermediate overcall of 2S Jim Krekorian drove the hand to 4H. After two top spades, West shifted to the DA. East now played a third spade back – to protect his trump trick...

Not so fast! Diamond discarded his eponymous diamond loser and ruffed in dummy. He led the HJ and a heart to the 10, finding the bad break, then led a diamond to dummy and ruffed a diamond. Now three rounds of clubs ending in dummy left the lead where it needed to be for the trump coup.

Antonio Sementa showed why he and Agustin Madala were leading the event after one session: He heard his

partner open 2H, and his RHO overcall 2S. He jumped to 4H and when his LHO bid 4S he led HA, and when his partner followed with the two, he found the critical switch to CA and another club. This set up the second club winner before Declarer could discard it on the diamonds (Mike Passell amongst others did the same – he had doubled 4S).

Gary Cohler played 3NT here, after a weak jump shift on his left, on a spade lead. He won in dummy and took four rounds of diamonds on which the suit-preference element in his LHO's discards suggested he had the HA; accordingly he advanced the CQ from dummy! Now he had his ninth trick without letting his RHO on lead (which would have been critical had hearts been 4-3).

When Welland-Willenken were defending, Welland had opened 2H, but Willenken led a spade anyway. Declarer tried a heart to the king for his ninth trick...unlucky! Willenken returned an unimaginative heart – down one. Note that on a diamond return declarer would have led a club to the queen for an even larger penalty.

Sometimes the most innocent of leads turn hundreds and hundreds of IMPs. Here Christiansen/Auken had a bidding accident. Christiansen misresponded to KCB then raised himself to 7S when Auken signed off at 6S. South had an impossible lead problem. A case could be made for all four suits and a trump lead was surely safe since West had driven to slam expecting to be off an ace, but he eventually selected a low club...and Christiansen really had no choice but to run this to his hand. Contract made! This happened to at least a handful of hapless Souths.

Not content with wrapping 7S around the necks of their opponents, Christiansen/Auken stopped in 6D here. On a trump lead, Christiansen discovered he had not underbid the hand. He cashed the HAK, then tried the CA and life would have been relatively easy had that lived. But South ruffed to play a second trump. Christiansen won in hand, ruffed a heart, took the finesse in spades and ruffed a heart, came to the SA, drew trumps and claimed +920.

That was tough – but not as tough on their opponents as Cohler/Weinstein. They settled in 6NT and when clubs were 5-0 they needed the spade finesse; +990 – What's the problem?
