OPENING CEREMONY IMPRESSIVE, NOW IT'S TIME TO DO BATTLE

The pageantry of the opening ceremonies of the 12th World Bridge Olympiad is over and competitors have settled in for the marathon that is the round-robin.

A record 73 countries are represented in the three series now under way: the Open and Women's in the Olympiad and the Senior Bowl.

At Saturday night's opening ceremonies, WBF President Jose Damiani told a huge crowd that "it is clearly symbolic to be here in Istanbul, Turkey, where we are in the gateway between different civilizations, astride two different continents..."

The WBF president did not forget the sponsors of the record-setting Olympiad, namely Mustafa Koç, chairman of the Koç Group, which includes the Koç Bank and Aygaz. Other sponsors are Turkcell and Generali.

Damiani also welcomed four countries participating in the World Bridge Olympiad for the first time – Korea in the Women's series and Bosnia, Georgia and Costa Rica in the Open.

After local volunteers had passed through the auditorium of the Grand Cevahir Hotel bearing flags of each of the nations represented, various dignitaries took turns welcoming the bridge players of the world to Istanbul.

Among them was Turkish Bridge Federation President Ata Aydin, who told the crowd that "bridge unites us all." He added: "I consider the organization of this event in our country as a milestone towards the worldwide popularity of bridge. And I believe that, with the sport of bridge, we will successfully show to the world the true meaning of getting united."

Mehmet Ali Sahin, Minister of State and Deputy Prime Minister, expressed hope that the bridge tournament "will lead to the establishment of new bridges of peace and friendship." At that, he officially declared the 12th World Bridge Olympiad open.

No smoking



declarer's task quite straightforward.

At Smolski's table, West had the opportunity to overcall $2\diamond$ and East duly led ace and another diamond. Smolski ruffed and immediately took a spade finesse, running the jack, as the finesse's success or failure would tell him what trump break he could afford. When the \clubsuit J held the trick, Smolski next took a club finesse, losing to the queen. Back came a third diamond but now he could throw his low spade from hand and there was no further pressure despite the four-one trump split; flat board.

Turkey v Bulgaria


It is traditional for the opening vugraph show to feature a team from the home country, and so it was that the host, Turkey, settled in for the first round-robin match with neighbor Bulgaria.

Unintentionally, Turkey was a genial host in the first match, dropping a 55-28 decision to Bulgaria.

Turkey started well, earning a slam swing on the first board and collecting another 2 IMPs on board 2. It was 13-0 in favor of Turkey.

Bulgaria began their comeback with an unusual 2-IMP swing on board 5.

In the closed room, where Victor Aronov and Julian Stefanov for Bulgaria opposed Yalcin Atabey and Suleyman Kolata, East-West for Bulgaria found their heart fit, playing at the three level and taking 10 tricks for plus 170.

In the open room, the auction concluded rather abruptly, and Salvador Assael had to play well to avoid a bigger loss.

Zahari Zahariev started with the $\bigstar4$. Georgo Karakolev won the \bigstarK to switch to the \heartsuitQ . Assael won the ace in hand and put the $\Diamond K$ on the table. South ducked, and Assael was encouraged to see North play the 10. Assael continued with the $\Diamond Q$, taken by the ace, as North followed with the jack. Despite the 6-2 trump split, Assael could see some possibilities.

Zahariev contined with the $\bigstar 2$, won by North with the ace, and when North continued with the $\bigstar 10$, declarer discarded a low heart as South tuffed. He won the heart continuation with the king in dummy, dropping North's jack, and cashed the good $\heartsuit 9$ to discard a club. Now it went club to the king, club to the ace, ruff a club with the $\diamond 3$. South, down to all trumps, had to overruff and return

a diamond from the 8-6 into declarer's 9-7. That was plus 90 for 2 IMPs away instead of 6.

Bulgaria forged ahead for good on the next deal when East-West played in a superior 4° contract that went down on a bad trump split while 3NT was bid and made at the other table.

Bulgaria began pulling away just past midway in the match.

In the face of all of South's bidding, and considering his assets, North's 4% was extremely conservative. In any case, neither player seemed willing to take control and ask the right questions. The Bulgarians in the other room were not similarly constrained.


Zahariev's 5° bid showed one or four key cards, and Karakolev could not envision South with the lower number of controls given the bidding The were lots of tricks, of course, and a 13-IMP gain for Bulgaria.

Bulgaria gained another big swing on board 15 when Karakolev and Zahariev bid to a sensible 3NT, taking 10 tricks, while Atabey and Kolata landed in a 5 contract

with no chance.

Turkey earned a 3-IMP swing on board 17 when Zorlu made a good defensive play against a notrump game.

The contract was 3NT by North at both tables after North opened INT.

In the closed room, Zahariev (East) started with a low spade to the queen and ace. Declarer then ran the $\clubsuit9$ to West's queen. West returned the $\Diamond Q$, ducked by declarer. North ducked again when West continued with the $\Diamond10$. West then continued with the $\bigstar10$ to declarer's jack. A club went to dummy's 10, ducked by West, who won the third round of clubs with the ace. Declarer took the finesse when West played a heart, and that was five tricks for the defenders and one down.

In the open room, Assael (East) started with a low heart. Declarer took West's 8 with the queen and played a club to dummy's 10 and West's ace! The $\Diamond K$ and $\Diamond Q$ were ducked, and declarer won the $\heartsuit A$ perforce when West abandoned diamonds. Declarer decided to build a long trick in diamonds by playing the $\Diamond A$ and a low diamond, pitching a spade and a low heart from dummy.

In with the $\Diamond 10$, West returned a heart to partner's king. Declarer won the spade return in hand and apparently claimed, relying on the "proven" club finesse. Zorlu naturally contested the claim, and when a tournament di-

rector was called to the table the result was down three as the defenders took two clubs, three diamonds and two hearts for three down.

The final deal of the match resulted in another swing for Bulgaria.

Karakolev's 1 \clubsuit was strong and artificial, South's 1 \Diamond was also artificial and negative.

Assael started with a low spade to the 7, king and ace. Karakolev returned a spade to the 8 and jack. Zorlu's return of the \heartsuit 6 proved ineffective when declarer inserted the 10. Declarer went to dummy with the \heartsuit K and took the diamond finesse, claiming 10 tricks after East won the \diamondsuit K and cashed the \bigstar Q.


In the closed room, North was also declarer in 3NT, receiving the same opening lead of a low spade. Atabey won the $\triangle A$ and entered dummy with the $\heartsuit K$ to play the $\diamond 9$. East won the king and put West in with a spade to the jack. At this point, the only effective defense was for West to exit with the $\heartsuit Q$, but he got out with a low diamond. Declarer could still have made the contract by cashing his diamonds, putting pressure on West.

On the run of the diamonds, West would come down to three clubs to the king, the $\Im Q$ J and the $\bigstar 4$. If he pitched a heart, North's $\Im 10$ would be good. If West let go of his low spade, North could play his two hearts, throwing West in to lead away from his $\bigstar K$.

Declarer did not read the situation, however, and when West got out with a diamond, North cashed three more tricks in the suit, then played a low club to dummy's queen. He could not avoid one down from there, giving Bulgaria a 12-IMP gain.

Cover an Honour with an Honour?

Sometimes a harmless looking play like covering an honour with an honour can have fatal consequences. Take this hand from the second round of the Open competition.



Hot favourites for the Open Team Olympiad title, Italy began with an 18-12 defeat at the hands of Iceland, but normal service was quickly resumed in Round 2, where they faced Guadeloupe.

In both rooms, the opening lead against West's 42contract was the queen of hearts. Giorgio Duboin, for Italy, played low from the dummy, seeing no benefit to putting up the king. South could do nothing to threaten the contract now and it was way too difficult for North to find the killing switch. North actually played a second heart and Duboin ruffed, led a spade to the ace and a second spade, and in the fullness of time lost one club trick and made his contract; +620.

The Guadeloupe declarer could see no harm in covering the heart queen with dummy's king. He should now be a sadder and, hopefully, wiser, man. Claudio Nunes won the king of hearts with his ace and switched to the queen of clubs. Declarer was trapped. When he won the ace of clubs defensive communications were open to get the killing club ruff when Nunes won his trump trick; down one for -100 and 12 IMPs to Italy. Of course, had declarer ducked the rightarrow Q he would have eventually lost the setting trick to the rightarrow K.

Need a scorer?

If your team cannot afford to pay a scorer, here is a possible solution: find a captain in the same position and exchange a player who is sitting out. We will try to help coordinate these exchanges at the Hospitality Desk.

Hearts were bid and supported and now John MacGregor, looking at a flat minimum, signed off in 4%. However, when Steve Allen went on with a spade cuebid, MacGregor reassessed his hand, and in particular the club

MacGregor reassessed his hand, and in particular the club honours, and took control. On discovering one or four key cards, clearly four, he jumped to 7, offering Allen the option of playing that contract should his intermediate clubs be better than his intermediate hearts. To Allen it was clear that his partner must have the $\heartsuit Q$, of course, and his own hearts guaranteed that this suit, at least, would be solid. Accordingly, he converted to the grand slam where he knew that the jack of trumps was held, allowing MacGregor the luxury of playing to ruff out clubs should they happen to divide four-one when, of course, the club grand slam would have failed. As it happens, that was not necessary and MacGregor easily chalked up all 13 tricks for +2210, despite Sofia Pessoa's brave lead of a low spade from king-to-three, but that does not alter the fact that the right slam was reached. Well bid.

At the other table, Portugal languished in 6%, so Costa Rica picked up 13 richly deserved IMPs.

Departure from Istanbul...

As the Olympiad got under way and I settled down to watch the match between the tournament favourites Italy and Iceland my thoughts temporarily turned to one of the most famous methods of transport that will be forever linked with the Turkish capital.

Imagine it is the mid-1930s, and you are in Istanbul. You dine at the Pera Palas Hotel, the hotel established by the Wagons-Lits Company specifically to cater for Orient Express clientele, and still a great hotel today. About 9pm, you head down to Sirkeci station for the 22:00 departure of the Orient Express. You need to eat beforehand, because there is no restaurant car attached to the Orient Express when it leaves Istanbul - this isn't attached until Kapikule on the Turkish/Bulgarian border, in time to serve breakfast.

As a bridge player you may hope to encounter Hercule Poirot and test out his 'little grey cells' on a few interesting deals. I'm not sure the WBF treasurer would have been happy to approve the cost of a return ticket on the legendary train, but it would certainly be the best way to visit the Orient.

Alas, the Direct-Orient Express has been withdrawn completely, ending all direct service between Paris and Istanbul. The last run was on 19 May 1977.

Okay, back to reality as the first board hits the table...

After a couple of deals Italy leads 7-0, but Iceland soon show they have not just come along to make up the numbers....



The INT opening was 12-14 and all 5-4-2-2 minimums are included. $2\diamond$ would not have been pleasant, Bart Bramley, one of the commentators on Bridgebase pointing out it is -800, but at least 3NT had some chances thanks to the fortunate heart position. Indeed, provided declarer is on the ball nine tricks cannot be prevented.

South found the best lead of the four of spades and declarer was allowed to win with the jack. He cashed the ace of hearts and then played the seven to the king, blocking the suit. A heart back to hand was followed by a top diamond, which would have been fine if North had held the ace. When South produced that card a second spade gave the defenders five tricks, +50. If declarer had cashed five heart tricks North would have been squeezed in three suits, but could still have given declarer a problem to solve by coming down to three spades, one diamond and three clubs. Declarer then has to exit in spades (he can cash the ace of clubs first – an inspired South might drop the queen to offer a losing option) to reach a winning position.

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

Here East led a heart and declarer won with dummy's ace and ran the nine of diamonds. East won and played a second heart and declarer won and played the winning diamonds. This time both East and West reduced to two clubs, and West also let go a spade, so all declarer had to do was play on clubs. No, he tried a low spade. West won with the king and had only to cash the hearts to flatten the board. No, he played back a spade and declarer won and could now get home by exiting with a heart to endplay West. No, he ran the eight of clubs to West's ten. Surely that was his last chance? No, for West finally lost this particular game of ping pong by returning the king of clubs! +600 and 12 IMPs to Italy.

I'm inclined to think the play record might just be wrong!

Those IMPs reduced Iceland's winning margin to 53-40 IMPs, 18-12 VP. A good start for them but not quite the one that Italy's supporters were expecting.

Both Easts began with a weak two bid and both Souths made a take-out double. For Chinese Taipei, Hang-Jung Hsia passed quietly with the West cards and passed again when Christian Mari's 3th came around, fearing perhaps that a double would allow his opponents to run to a bet-

ter spot. After a top heart lead and diamond switch, $3\clubsuit$ was not exactly a roaring success, as declarer was held to four spade tricks plus the ace of diamonds; down four for -200.

WBF President, Jose Damiani scented blood and redoubled 2%. I am sure that in theory Edward Lin's pass should suggest that he thought 2% redoubled was the best place to play, as otherwise it is impossible ever to achieve that final contract, but passing it out would not have been very successful this time and Ching-Yu Chang removed to his chunky four-card spade suit. Damiani doubled $2\clubsuit$, ending the auction. Damiani led a top club then switched to a trump, which Chang won in dummy to play a diamond to the jack and queen. Back came a second trump and he won then played two more rounds of diamonds. Damiani won and declarer could only come to his two top trumps; down three for -500 and 7 IMPs to France.

Hsia opened the West hand and Steve Lin redoubled then jumped to 2NT at his next turn, ending the auction. Paul Chemla led a low spade to the ace and back came a second spade to the king. Now Chemla switched to his heart for the ten and king and Lin returned a heart, passing it to the queen. Mari switched to a low diamond and Lin went up with the king and cashed his winners. When the clubs failed to divide evenly, he was one down for -100.

Damiani did not open the 11-count but doubled for take-out at his next turn. With a useful fit for both unbid suits, Albert Faigenbaum jumped to 3° , where Lin found a sharp double. Ching-Yu Chang led a diamond to the ace and Lin switched to a low spade. Chang won and back came a second spade to the ace, followed by a third round, which Faigenbaum ruffed. He continued with a heart to the ace then the $^{\circ}$ J for the queen and king. Declarer played a club to the queen then a low club towards his king and Lin ruffed, cashed the ten of trumps, then played a low diamond. Faigenbaum put in the jack and had the rest for down one; -200 and 3 IMPs to Chinese Taipei.

forcing 4 \diamond raise, before finally doubling 5 \diamond . The defence took two heart winners then switched to a trump. Faigenbaum won in dummy and tried a low spade. Though Lin went in with the ace, ruffed, the queen did not ruff out and there was no squeeze, so here too the contract was one down; -200 and 3 IMPs to Chinese Taipei.

Whether West bids his four-card spade suit or shows it via a negative double, North is in the same situation. Lin raised to 3° while Mari jumped to 4° , both ending the auction. Game was all about the trump finesse. When the king was onside Chemla had ten tricks for +620, while Chang played the queen to his ace to avoid the risk of a diamond ruff after a club lead to the ace and ace and another diamond switch, so made only +140; 10 IMPs to France.

The French team earned a moral victory by 20-19 IMPs, but that translated to a 15-15 VP draw, doing nobody any harm at this early stage of the championship.

Player Regulations

Mobile Phones, Pagers and other electronic equipment

Mobile telephones, pagers or other electronic equipment may not be brought into the playing area. Any player or team official bringing such an item into these areas will result in his team being fined 2 VP or in the case of pairs events, will result in his partnership being fined 25% of the match points available on a board during the session. The penalty is mandatory. Constant violation of this regulation will result in the player being prohibited from playing and in the team official not being admitted into the playing area.

The Chief Tournament Director may, at his discretion, prohibit a player from bringing other equipment into the playing area.

Anyone entering the playing area may be required to comply with procedures put in place by the WBF for the detection of such electronic equipment.

Attention is drawn to the following regulations:

Law 16 - During the auction, when playing with screens, a breach of tempo may be identified by the slowness or speed with which the tray is returned. The players who receive the tray are the ones who can speak to any abnormality. Consequently it is an infraction if a player on the side of the screen where the breach occurred is the first to draw attention to it and the player forfeits for his side its non-offending status. It is not considered that a delay of some 20 seconds is sufficient to convey unauthorized information.

Psyching of Conventional or Artificial Opening Bids

The psyching of conventional or artificial opening bids is prohibited in any Category 3 event (i.e. the Round Robin stages of the Open & Women's Team Olympiad, the WSIP, the WTMTC and the WUBTC), in any pairs events and for any match of sixteen boards or less. This provision overrides the current systems policy.
